**Serino kicks off campaign for County Executive**

Sue Serino (R,C-Hyde Park) officially announced her campaign for Dutchess County Executive in a kick-off celebration at the Eveready Diner in her hometown of Hyde Park on Wednesday, Feb. 15. Serino is a four-term New York State Senator, former Dutchess County Legislator and long-time local small business owner.

Serino is building her campaign on the foundation of listening, caring and leading. As County Executive, these would be the guiding principles she would put to use in helping Dutchess County continue to grow and prosper.

U.S. veteran Carmine "Toot" Giordano was honored during a recent ceremony and celebration at the Beacon Elks Lodge, off Wolcott Ave., in Beacon. Giordano is believed to be the last surviving World War II veteran from Beacon, and now lives in Fishkill. He is 101 years old.

Giordano served in the U.S. Army Air Corps/U.S. Army Air Forces (now known as the U.S. Air Force).

"I was underage [when I tried] to enlist," Giordano explained before the event that celebrated him took place. He was drafted when he was 21 years old.

"I knew I was going to be drafted. I knew I was going to have to go and accept it," Giordano recalled.

Virgil Capollari, Chair of Dutchess County and Fishkill Veterans committees, said, "I think this is very important that we take the time to honor such a great person who still connects us to the greatest wartime in history. I am very humbled, and we are truly blessed."

Denise Doring VanBuren, president of the Beacon Historical Society (BHS), told of how the historical society asked the community to send in World War II veterans' names from Beacon. The announcement was in the Beacon Free Press. VanBuren said the result was that

Giordano was the only WWII veteran still alive today that could be identified. The BHS reached out to Giordano at that time. The BHS reached out to Giordano then.

"All of Beacon has a new sweetheart," said VanBuren during her remarks. She said Giordano "was raised during the Great Depression" and later made the world safe for democracy. "Less than one percent of these men and women are [still] with us," she said.

Giordano was a local barber and hairdresser for 40 years, it was stated. He will turn 102 on July 14, said VanBuren.

"Let us never forget these men and

It was noted that Giordano's mom called him "Tootsie" and then it was shortened to "Toots" and then "Toot."



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## Current Poughkeepsie mayor Nelson announces mayoral candidacy

Marc Nelson, current Mayor and former City Administrator under former Mayor Rob Rolison, has announced he was entering the race to continue serving as Mayor of Poughkeepsie.

Nelson assumed the role of Mayor on January 1 upon the election of former Mayor Rob Rolison to the New York State Senate. He lives in the City of Poughkeepsie with his wife, Lisa.

The election for Mayor of Poughkeepsie will be held on November 7.

"In all of my roles in City Government, First as Commissioner of Finance, then as City Administrator, and now as Mayor, I have been laser focused on returning our city to fiscal health and rebuilding the capacity of City Hall to serve our residents, businesses and taxpayers. During this time we have accomplished much, strengthening our partnerships throughout our community and with other levels of government, resolving legacy issues even as we work to address new challenges in a changing world. Our work is not done and I'm hopeful the people will elect me to a full four-year term," Nelson said.

Some of Nelson's accomplishments during his tenure serving the Queen City include reducing the general fund deficit by more \$10 Million, restructuring local government to achieve significant cost savings, championing strategic development with a focus on housing at all price points, expanding the city's Youth Grant Program, and negotiating an equitable agreement with Dutchess County for the sharing of sales tax revenue for the next decade.

He is also credited with the successful oversight of millions of dollars in infrastructure improvements throughout the City, and for sharply reducing the number of vacant and abandoned buildings in our neighborhoods - a multiyear effort which led to the city taking title to the former YMCA, one of the most blighted eyesores in the City and now destined to become a state-of-the-art youth center.

"To continue down the path of success, we need to ensure continuity of the same effective leadership we have come to know and trust. The job is too important to not rest it in the hands of someone who knows this city and has the experience and knowledge to get the job done. The people of this city deserve no less," Nelson said.

Nelson serves as Chairman of the Poughkeepsie Joint Water Board, and on the Dutchess County Board of Health, and was a founding board member of the Dutchess County/City of Poughkeepsie Land Bank.

Prior to coming to Poughkeepsie, Marc held the position of Municipal Tax Collector for the City of Hartford Connecticut. He holds a bachelor's degree in economics and political science from the University at Albany and a Master's in Public Administration from Marist College where he wrote his Master's thesis on combating urban blight.

"I look forward to campaigning to earn the vote of every resident of this great city. I believe in the end, voters will agree that at this pivotal time, I am the right person with the right experience to keep our city on the right track," Nelson said.

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

## Privatizing is a better plan

### To the Editor:

I believe a precedent has been set, and the opportunity is upon us to privatize the Fire Department! As of last year, Emergency Medical Services (EMS) have been privatized in Beacon and are provided by a for-profit company called "DocGo". I believe there is much to be learned from this experiment and we should apply this successful model to more city services! Private companies are known to be more efficient.

Even if the government of Beacon didn't want to privatize, they could instead move to a billing model (like the for-profit sector) to take the burden off the taxpayer. People whose houses catch on fire would be responsible for the cost of the water (per gallon), distance from the station (per mile per truck), and firefighters (per hour). The 2022 adopted city budget lists the overall cost of the fire department at 2.1 million dollars (subtracting \$200,000 for ambulance services.) The Fire Department website boasts "more than 1,900 runs per year" which if you divide their budget of \$2.1 million by 1,900 calls, that leaves a cost of only about \$1100 per run. What's \$1100 more dollars if your house has already burned down? As of 2021, there were 13,271 people living in the City of Beacon. If you divide the fire department budget by residents, you get an annual cost of about \$150 per person. If that money went back to the people, I could pay for about one half of getting my hair done!

In the near future, this model could be able to be applied to the Police Department and Detectives (which are two different line items even though detectives are just police wearing suits) which cost the Beacon taxpayer just over six million dollars per year. Billing options could include, person hours, K9 hours, successful fingerprint

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hits, and arrests made - all billed back to the person who experienced the crime. If you don't want to get billed, just don't call 911!

This model is currently working for EMS in town, where if you have a medical emergency and are going to be spending many thousands of dollars on hospitalization, the town doesn't mind saddling you with an extra \$1000 bill from a for-profit ambulance company! I hope you see my point and are just excited as I am to apply this model to many more city services.

## Hudson Valley CA\$H Coalition, AARP Foundation Tax-Aide to provide free tax-preparation services

Hudson Valley residents who need help with a tax return, free tax preparation is available from AARP Foundation Tax-Aide's IRS trained and certified volunteers through the Hudson Valley CA\$H Coalition. Last year, 4,218 residents of Dutchess, Orange, and Putnam Counties received help preparing and filing their taxes. This year with volunteers both tenured and new, they hope to assist close to 8,000 individuals, seniors, and families file their tax returns.

To receive help, call 2-1-1 to schedule an appointment through United Way's Hudson Valley Region 2-1-1 Helpline (or by dialing 1-800-899-1479) from 9 a.m. – 4 p.m. Monday through Friday. A call specialist will review eligibility, make an appointment, and provide directions to the appropriate tax site. This free tax preparation service is provided to all those who are eligible thanks to AARP Foundation Tax-Aide, Hudson Valley CA\$H Coalition members, United Way of the Dutchess-Orange Region, Community Action Partnership for Dutchess County and many other community partners.

"Last year, \$5.4 million was returned in the form of tax credits and refunds to people who need it most in our community," noted Jeannie Montano, President and CEO of United Way of the Dutchess-Orange Region. "Part of the mission of United Way is fighting for the financial stability of every person in our community. We hope that individuals, families, and seniors will take advantage of this free help and call 2-1-1 to schedule an appointment."


"We know that people in our community are working diligently, but finding it hard to survive," Montano explained. "Many of these are the people identified

in United Way of New York's ALICE (Asset Limited, Income Constrained, Employed) Report. They're our friends. They're the people who greet us with a smile and help us every day at restaurants, day care centers, dental clinics, and offices. The refunds and EITC that they receive thanks to the AARP Tax-Aide volunteer tax-preparers truly make the difference in their very day-to-day survival, and help pay rent, medical bills, buy food and fulfill other basic needs. We proudly support the Hudson Valley CA\$H Coalition and its partner organizations with grants from the United Way Community Fund, as well as support from KeyBank and IBM Corporation. This program is a great example of how we can all come together to help Mid-Hudson Valley residents gain financial stability, a cornerstone of our mission."

The more than 30 tax preparation locations are conveniently located throughout Dutchess, Orange, and Putnam Counties and will be staffed by AARP Tax-Aide volunteers, six days-a-week, including evenings and weekends from February 1st through April 14. Assistance will be available for the hearing-impaired. The tax service is open to area residents of all ages who meet eligibility guidelines. AARP membership is not required.

In Dutchess County, there are 14 free AARP Foundation Tax-Aide sites located in: Beacon, Dover Plains, Fishkill, Hopewell Junction, Hyde Park, Millerton, Pleasant Valley, Poughkeepsie, and Wappinger Falls.

Everybody knows about the Dutchess County Fair, the roots of which began on October 16, 1841 with the formation of the Agricultural Society of Dutchess County at Daniel P. Emigh's hotel in Washington Hollow. A fair was held the following two years at the same location, then for the next eight years alternated between Poughkeepsie and the Washington Hollow location. After a successful 1851 fundraising campaign for the "purpose of building a suitable house to hold the Dutchess County fair in" the annual agricultural event settled into seven acres in the vicinity of the current Barracks of Troop K of the New York State Police where it remained for the next 35 years.

Twenty years later, in 1871, a group of Amenia men met on July 3 to form the Eastern Dutchess Agricultural Society. Their Articles of Association stated that the "particular business and objects of such a society are and are to be the encouragement of agriculture and mechanical pursuits such as the breeding and raising of stock, the raising of crops, the improvement of land, the invention and improvement of agricultural implements and other like purposes by the offering of premiums for the exhibition of the same."

Existing documents don't reveal why the farmers and business leaders of Amenia, a mere 14 miles from the Washington Hollow fairgrounds, felt the need to create another agricultural society, but within a few weeks the new association had elected its first officers and on October 17th, 18th, and 19th they held their first fair on property leased from Mary Ingraham and A. B. Rice that already included a race track. Annual fairs took place in the same location until 1892 when stockholders of the fair voted to sell the property, a decision that the Poughkeepsie Eagle News reported was "regretted by the farmers and stock raisers of Eastern Dutchess, although the fair has generally had too much competition to prove a

thorough success."

Newspaper articles and fair reports included in a ledger owned by the Dutchess County Historical Society reveal that the Amenia fairs included all the usual attractions: the showing of cattle and horses; displays of agricultural machinery, a floral hall, displays of ladies handiwork and exhibits of fruit and vegetables. In 1886, declared by the officers to be the "biggest affair of the kind ever held in eastern Dutchess," an emphasis was placed on trotting and mule races, footraces, daytime fireworks, games of baseball and all the sights and amusement of the sideshows."

From 1871 – 1887 the Amenia and Washington Hollow fairs co-existed and in general offered the same competitions and attractions. There was, however, at least for a couple of years, one unique aspect of the Amenia fairs that was the result of the election of Hyatt Frost as a Vice President of the Association on July 19, 1871. Frost was born on March 4, 1827 in the town of Southeast. "The Frost Genealogy" reports that "Hyatt was born and brought up in the neighborhood where originated the idea of exhibiting wild animals."

### An elephant and armadillo

Hyatt and his brothers became deeply interested and when the first elephant, Old Bet, came to this country it was with great pride that Hyatt got the privilege of carrying water to her. By 1849, Hyatt was running a one-wagon sideshow for the Van Amburgh Circus that featured an armadillo said to be a "big bug of California."

Isaac A. Van Amburgh, born in Fishkill, is credited with developing the first trained wild animal act in modern times. Van Amburgh began his career as a cage cleaner in the Zoological Institute of New York, a tiny traveling menagerie. Isaac showed a talent for training the wild animals and in 1833, at the age of 22 astonished the country by entering a cage of wild cats at the

Zoological Institute. His reputation established, by the next year Van Amburgh had his own traveling menagerie and by the mid-1840s his show was the largest show in England where he performed for Queen Victoria and Prince Albert in 1844. After Van Amburgh's death in 1865, Hyatt became the sole proprietor of the circus, retained the Van Amburgh name and traveled all over the United States and Canada with his wagon show. In 1866 Hyatt entered into a partnership with P.T. Barnum and established a combined Barnum and Van Amburgh Museum and Menagerie on Broadway. In 1868 a fire destroyed the museum and killed some of Van Amburgh's animals. The partnership with Barnum ended but Frost continued travelling under the name of Van Amburgh and Co.

### Frost, the 'showman'

The year before Hyatt took over the circus, he had married Sarah Halsted, daughter of Joseph and Sallie Halsted of Amenia. The 1870 Federal Census reveals that by this time Hyatt and Sarah were living in Amenia. His occupation is listed as "showman," his personal estate was valued at \$8,200 and his real estate had a value of \$36,000. He had clearly established himself as a successful entrepreneur and that may have influenced the decision of the organizers of the Eastern Dutchess Agricultural Society to elect him to the Vice Presidency of the organization in 1871. His home, which is still standing today and is part of the Maplebrook School, is located at the corner of Route 22 and Perry's Corner Road. The photograph of the house in the 1912 Frost Genealogy shows it to be beautifully landscaped, no doubt the work the French gardener Henry Faure, listed as living in the household in 1875.

But his home in Amenia was only seasonal as Frost continued to crisscross the country with his traveling show from spring through late fall. In 1875, the circus left Cambridge City, Indiana on April 21st and closed out the season in Amenia on October 26th, having stopped in 149 places throughout Indiana, Michigan, Ohio, Pennsylvania and New York.

The 1877 season began in March and continued until January of 1878 when it closed down for the year in Louisiana. In its heyday, the company included

over 100 principal equestrians, acrobats and athletes in the profession, 212 horses used to transport the circus itself, and 185 men, women and children, including performers.

Amenia served as the winter quarters for the circus until 1881 when, as a result of disagreements among the owners, it was decided to sell the company assets and dissolve the partnership. The dispersal of the circus assets took place at a public sale on the Amenia fairgrounds. Imagine the excitement in this small rural village generated by the event as described in the New York Times following the event "...the event attracted showmen from all over the Union to the little village perched at the very top of the bleak Dutchess County hills." Seventy horses were offered, with wagons, harness and circus paraphernalia, besides all the menagerie animals. The big buyer of the day was Adam Forepaugh, a horse trader and circus owner who competed with P.T. Barnum to own the title of the largest circus in America during the 1870s and 1880s. In 1877 he commissioned the first railroad car for a traveling circus. Forepaugh was successful buying Bolivar the elephant for \$7,100 and the double-horned rhinoceros for \$2,450. Following the auction all the animals, whether sold or not, except for the horses, remained over the winter in buildings on the fairgrounds.

Frost succeeded in reorganizing the company and continued touring for another eight years. Upon his retirement, the Van Amburgh name was released to Ringling Brothers who continued to use it as a sub-title for a number of years.

As you drive through Amenia today and pass the Freshtown Plaza, cast your imagination back to the days when, instead of seeing a grocery store and a Tractor Supply, the fields and buildings were filled with monkeys, hyenas, lions, elephants, a two-horned rhinoceros, a herd of camels and various other exotic animals. It must have been a sight to behold.







# Meals on Wheels of Wappingers Falls has new home

Volunteers with Meals on Wheels (MOW) of Wappingers Falls have been settling into their new location. The new site is at the Zion Episcopal Church on Satterlee Place.

"They've been very, very good to us," said Christina Contelmo, who coordinates the volunteers for the MOW program in Wappingers Falls. The program is open five days a week, she said. They serve approximately 50 clients.

"We have six routes," said Contelmo.

Board members meet once a month, said Contelmo. Darlene Shephard is the president of the MOW in Wappingers Falls. Each day there are approximately 12 volunteers to deliver meals.

Richard Herodes, with MOW, said about the new location, "I love it. It is working out well. It has been a smooth transition."

MOW's former location for decades was at the First Presbyterian Church, off South Ave., in Wappingers Falls. Contelmo said MOW has been at the Presbyterian church since the 1970s.

"When we moved in there, we were about two years old," she said of MOW. At that time, the organization has approximately 10 clients.

During the last service at the Presbyterian church, Contelmo said they offered MOW a generous donation.

"Some volunteers have been doing this almost since the beginning," Contelmo remarked.

The organization provides meals to people who are unable to cook or shop for themselves, she explained. Most of the clients are seniors but some clients have physical issues and live alone, she noted.

"The volunteers amaze me," said Contelmo. "The clients are so happy to [see the volunteers]. It's to check on them and to give them a quick visit." Contelmo mentioned she suggests to the volunteers to give the clients "a thought for the day," something that they can think about that day.

Contelmo said she wants it known how much MOW "appreciated our years at the Presbyterian church."

The Zion Episcopal Church officials, stated Herodes, "appear to be terrific hosts."

## Work to begin on Breakneck trailhead March 1

Hudson Highlands Fjord Trail, Inc., New York State Office of Parks, Recreation and Historic Preservation (OPRHP), Metro-North Railroad (MNR), and New York-New Jersey Trail Conference (NYNJTC) announced that initial work to relocate the Breakneck trailhead farther up the ridge and repair eroding trail surfaces will begin on March 1, 2023 and is scheduled to be completed by July 1, 2023. During this construction phase, OPRHP will close the Breakneck Ridge trailhead to the public.

During this period, the Wilkinson Memorial trailhead is expected to remain open, along with the Metro-North Railroad train station, however additional utility relocation work by Central Hudson along the Route 9D corridor may make

The scope of this initial work, which launches Phase 1: Breakneck Connector & Bridge of the Hudson Highlands Fjord Trail project, includes a new series of stone steps at the initial ascent of the Breakneck Ridge trail, repair of existing erosion conditions, closure and restoration of unauthorized social trails, and the construction of a new trail steward station further away from busy Route 9D. Tahawus Trails and JIG Builders will complete this work.

From March 1 through July 1, 2023, hikers wishing to access the viewsheds at the peaks of Breakneck Ridge will need to

take alternate routes, including Wilkinson to the Nimham Trail, or the Cornish Brook/Undercliff Bypass/Undercliff trails from the Washburn parking lot. No descent through the construction zone will be permitted.

With potentially reduced parking available in the Breakneck area during this period, hikers are encouraged to take the Metro-North Railroad train to the trail, when possible.



The complete scope of work for the Breakneck Connector & Bridge phase of the Fjord Trail, which completed its SEQRA environmental review process in December 2022, will take place in the area just north of the tunnel on Route 9D to the Metro-North Railroad train station in the Town of Fishkill, NY. Slated to

begin in winter 2023/2024, the remainder of work at Breakneck will include the construction of a shared use trail parallel to Route 9D from the train station to trailhead, new and improved parking areas, enhanced crosswalks, two trail bank areas, stormwater management enhancements, new ADA restroom facilities, and a comprehensive replanting of the area with a native plant palette.

The main Breakneck Connector construction will occur in tandem with the Breakneck Bridge project. The Breakneck Connector construction will be managed by HHFT and its selected construction manager, Consigli Construction Company. The Breakneck Bridge construction project will be managed by OPRHP. Both projects are scheduled to be substantially complete by the end of 2025. Related closures to specific affected trailheads, interruptions of service at the Breakneck Ridge train station, and roadwork along Route 9D will be announced when details are finalized.

The mission of the Hudson Highlands Fjord Trail is to develop and operate an accessible linear park, in cooperation with the State of New York, located between Cold Spring, NY and Beacon, NY. The Fjord Trail, envisioned by locals over fifteen years ago, aims to address safety, manage visitation, and respect the landscape. It will add organized parking, public restrooms, trash/recycling collection, and distribute users of the park along a 7.5-mile route with six main access points. Hudson Highlands Fjord Trail is a subsidiary nonprofit of Scenic Hudson, Inc.

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
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
