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Council passes the 'All-Electric Building' law

The Beacon City Council unanimously passed the "All-Electric Building" Local Law at its March 20 meeting.

The law "establishes a local energy conservation construction code supplement to prohibit the use of fossil fuels in all new construction and major renovations concerning residential and commercial buildings to further the City's policy goals, promote the public health, safety, and general welfare and protect, secure and guarantee an individual's right to a healthy environment as required under the New York State Environmental Rights Amendment (the "Green Amendment")."

"The All-Electric Building Local Law closely follows and accelerates State proposals, and we hope the Law can serve as a ready model for other communities to adopt. I thank Councilmembers Dan Aymar-Blair and Paloma Wake for their leadership on this initiative and appreciate the strong public support from Beacon residents that supported this critical effort," Beacon Mayor Lee Kyriacou remarked in a statement.

According to the resolution, "under the City's All-Electric Building Local Law all new residential and commercial construction would be required to be all-electric as of January 1, 2024." The resolution states that "the Governor's proposed budget legislation prohibits the installation of fossil-fuel equipment and building systems in new residential buildings on December 31, 2025 and in new commercial buildings on December 31, 2028."

It was noted that, "The Law does not, however, include or apply to retrofitting existing structures unless the buildings undergo major renovations (more than 75 percent) and does not require owners of existing buildings to convert fossil fuel appliances absent significant renovations."

Beacon's "All-Electric Building Local Law" is the third law of its kind in the State, according to a release from City officials. New York City and Ithaca passed laws which require new buildings to be constructed "all-electric" for heating, hot water, and appliances, and is modeled on several proposed State initiatives, stated the release.

During public comment, one resident remarked that the state power grid is not ready. She also noted, "I do not believe the City of Beacon has to rush into taking a stand."

A Beacon Climate Action Now representative thanked the Council for listening to the public and said this is the right time.

Another resident asked about grid upgrades and pricing regarding electricity. She "begged" the council "to educate themselves first before putting laws into effect that affect so many."

Council member Dan Ayman-Blair, who backed the law, said, "Like every community, Beacon has to do its part in reducing emissions. With a third of our emissions coming from buildings, it seemed the right next move. The technology was ready, the trades were ready, and the grid was ready. Fortunately, the people of Beacon were ready too."

So long, Dutchess Stadium. Hello, Heritage Financial Park.

The Dutch, as it was more commonly referred to, will still physically exist and be the home of the Hudson Valley Renegades minor League Baseball team as well as a series of high school and college games. However, after 30 years it will now have a new name.

In an announcement last week, the Renegades have entered into a naming-rights agreement and will rename the stadium "Heritage Financial Park" after a

Valley-wide credit union.

"In baseball terms, Heritage Financial Credit Union (HFCU) is a five-tool player, and we are honored to welcome them into the Renegades family!" said Tyson Jeffers, new General Manager of the Renegades. "From our first conversation, it was clear that HFCU shares in our fan-first, community-first culture, and is dedicated to making a difference in monumental ways. We look forward to Heritage being by our side as we execute our long-term vision of expanding our community outreach, improving our customer experi-

ence and making Heritage Financial Park the premier venue of the Hudson Valley."

"When we purchased the Renegades over a year ago, our vision was a big one and we are thrilled that we have found a partner who shares that enthusiasm for the future in Hudson Valley," said Peter Freund, CEO of Diamond Baseball Holdings. "We cannot wait to rename the stadium 'Heritage Financial Park' as it undergoes the largest construction project in its history."

The stadium was actually built in a

Parent: Autism acceptance opens doors for everyone

As World Autism Day approaches on April 2, Jackie Mandel would like everyone to understand and focus on autism acceptance. "Autism is not a choice, but acceptance is. Autism is not a disease, it's a disability and society should embrace what these individuals can offer."

Jackie and her husband, Andy, are the parents of Jonathan, "a very happy, affectionate and active young man," who is a resident at Anderson Center for Autism in Staatsburg, about 105 miles from their home in Port Washington.

For Jackie and her family, embracing Autism Acceptance has also meant making the actual decision to place Jonathan in full-time residential care at Anderson Center.

"The decision to move Jonathan to Anderson was difficult to say the least, but our feeling was this would be the best thing for him," said Jackie. "Jonathan has been very happy there and has been given more opportunities there than we could have ever provided him. Anderson is a wonderful place, led by extraordinary staff. Students and residents have the opportunity to learn, grow, develop relationships, gain independence and thrive."

"The staff does not infantilize Jonathan. He is respected and treated as such. It is very comforting as a parent to see the relationships Jonathan has with the staff in his house and teachers at the school."

Jackie terms caring for Jonathan as "an unbelievable journey that has truly opened our eyes."

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She said Jonathan enjoys being out and about and active. In the past, he has participated in the Mid-Hudson Valley Special Olympics Track & Field and Basketball Skills events. He also loves the beach, jumping in the ocean and swimming in the pool. Jonathan is very social and enjoys being with his family.

"Recently, he was with us in Massachusetts as we all attended his cousin's wedding and Jonathan had a great time during all the festivities and danced up a storm," said Jackie.

As parents, she said they realized when Jonathan was young that it was important to expose him to the community as much as possible. "Obviously, there were behavioral ups and downs in the early years, but we worked through them and we feel that benefited him tremendously. Obviously, we feel very lucky that Jonathan has the personality and temperament he does and realize that we are extremely fortunate," she said.

When Jonathan was 4 ½ years old, Jackie said he began attending a day school for individuals with autism. "He was there for 10 years and it was a wonderful experience for him (and us). It was there where Jonathan learned how to communicate and learn. Jonathan is non-verbal and the (instructors at) the day school recognized how critical it was for him to learn how to communicate his wants and needs," she said. "He received a communications device, which has now morphed into an APP on an IPAD. After 10 years at his wonderful day school, we felt Jonathan would have more vocational opportunities in another setting. When he was 14 ½ he moved into the Anderson Center and has been there ever since."

For Jonathan, now 21, and preparing to transition into adult services, quality of life at Anderson Center has meant:

- Learning how to "hoverboard" and participating in the Special Olympics.
- Preparing to celebrate the milestone of graduation this year.
- Living in a home with other individuals who have autism.
- Not being able to see his family for quite some time during the global pandemic.
- Developing the skills needed to feel confident and able to do things for himself, despite being nonverbal.
- And weekend visits from his family, who take him to the Hanger Cafe in Lagrangeville, where small private planes are taking off and landing as he enjoys his favorite menu item - eggs in a skillet.

And for staff members at Anderson Center, it is all about their organizational mission to "optimize the quality of life for people with autism," said Patrick Paul, CEO/Executive Director.

He said that means:

- Providing evidence-based educational, vocational and residential services to people with autism.
- Offering families an opportunity to belong to a supportive community of parents, caregivers and siblings who share a similar journey.
- Giving international scholars the training needed to set up programs for people with autism in their home countries.
- Teaching communities, groups and businesses who want to become more accommodating and gain designation as "autism supportive environments."
- Working with institutions of higher education to prepare the next generation of professionals for roles within the field.

• And serving as "thought leaders" among a field of experts who are seeking to do all they can to enrich life for people with this neurological disorder.

With incidence rates increasing (1 in 44 people diagnosed with Autism Spectrum Disorder), Jackie reminds us that that we

need to better-prepare educators for the fact that more and more individuals with autism are learning in their classrooms and that we "need to look at each person as an individual with their own set of unique characteristics."

Thrift store opens at Beacon High School

There is a new thrift store in Beacon High School for high school students. The store is called BHS Thrift.

"The idea for the store came about when dress shopping for last year's prom, the dress prices were upwards of six hundred dollars. I was with my mom and my aunt when I said that I wished there was

an easier way to access prom attire," said Mia Nelsen-Cheyne, who is with Beacon High School's Students for Gender Equality Club and the store's executive director. "I knew that prom dress drives were a thing, but I wanted something that could be accessible all year round."

Mia, who is a junior, continued, "I began to research thrift stores and swap

shops and then came across a PBS documentary about a group of students who began an in-school thrift store where all the clothes were one dollar, and that money went to buying food and toiletries for the students. I presented the idea to our principal Mr. (Corey) Dwyer who loved it and together we decided that instead of the clothing being a dollar, we would directly ask community members to donate that would not only create a self-sustaining sustainable store but in addition to get all of Beacon involved and creating another was to build our community."

"Any and [a]ll" donations are being sought. "We're looking for shelf stable food, toiletries, and clothing for the high school students, including but not limited to prom attire," Mia remarked.

The store will be 100% student-run.

Dwyer said via email, "The BHS Thrift Store will allow students to access clothes, toiletries, and non-perishable

"Our mission is to create equality in all aspects of school, there should be absolutely no barrier during the school day. All students should have equal access to not only the necessary school supplies but also personal items too. In addition to that, everyone deserves to feel beautiful and confident, not only [for] prom but in an every day setting. Students spend most of their time at school and school functions. It's our job to make that time as comfortable as possible," stated Mia.

When new Hudson Valley Renegades General Manager Tyson Jeffers set out to find a naming-rights partner, he was given two stipulations.

One was to select a truly local company. And two, it had to be already invested in the area and known for its community involvement.

"When we started this process of finding a naming-rights partner, we were looking for a five-tool partner, a partner that wanted more than just putting their name on the side of the building," Jeffers said.

Heritage Financial Park will replace the name of Dutchess Stadium outside the building. Terms of the agreement between the Renegades and Heritage Financial Credit Union were not disclosed.

Technically, it is still a county park and the county will have an active role in helping to run the facility. But the county won't be on the hook for as large a financial burden as it has in the past 30 years. And the Renegades get another source of revenue. Naming-rights deals can be

lucrative or, at the very least, help defray expenses for a franchise.

The Renegades, as with every minor league team's arrangement with their Major League parent, as per the contract agreement with them, must have certain standards in place. For instance, the Renegades are in the midst of putting padding on the outfield walls, building a new visitors clubhouse and renovating the home clubhouse and adding a batting cage.

Not only will the Renegades benefit, but so will high school teams like Beacon and Roy C. Ketcham and even Marist College, that call the stadium home on occasion.

"Once we met with Heritage Financial Credit Union, we felt an immediate connection and that their community-focused culture and their mission directly aligned with ours," Jeffers said. "This led to many meetings ending with a beautifully-crafted partnership that will rename the facility to 'Heritage Financial Park' and have exponential community impact."

record 72 days in 1994 following the Dutchess County legislature's approval. The franchise relocated here from Erie, PA, and has been here ever since. The team was a longtime farm club of the Tampa Bay Rays before switching over to the New York Yankees and becoming their high Class A affiliate three years ago.

Michael Ciriello, President and CEO of the Credit Union said, "We are so pleased to partner with the Renegades as this new partnership closely aligns with our mission and further supports our community development outreach initiatives. I believe a quote from the great Jackie Robinson says it the best: 'A life is not

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New manager Santos leads Renegades field, support staff

The New York Yankees have announced their minor league field and support staff for the Hudson Valley Renegades for 2023. Sergio Santos will take over as the manager of the Hudson Valley Renegades, the Yankees High-A affiliate.

Santos takes over as the 18th manager in team history and third in three years during the Yankees era. He is joined on the coaching staff by Pitching Coach Preston Claiborne (1st season), Hitting Coach Kevin Martin (1st season), and Defensive Coaches Rob Benjamin (2nd season) and Derek Woodley (1st season). They will be joined by Athletic Trainer Brandon Rodríguez (1st season), Strength Coach Isiah McDonald (1st season), Clubhouse Manager Ryan Shute (3rd season), Video & Travel Assistant Carlos Cespedes (1st season), and Advanced Scouting Analyst Matt Wells (1st season).

"I'm extremely excited for the start of the season," said Santos. "I know our staff is top-notch, and I'm looking forward to the players who are going to be here and experience the Hudson Valley. I hope everyone comes and supports the Renegades because it's going to be a great year."

Santos begins his second season coaching in the Yankees organization in 2023, and his first with the Renegades. In 2022, he managed the FCL Yankees to the Florida Complex League Championship, defeating

the FCL Rays 2-1 in the FCL Championship Series. The team finished with a 38-17 (.691) record, winning the FCL North by 10.0 games and posting the second-best record in the league. Prior to joining the Yankees, Santos was a coach and mentor at the MLB Urban Youth Academy in Compton, California from 2018-22.

Born in Los Angeles, Santos was selected in the first round (27th overall) of the 2002 First-Year Player Draft by the Arizona Diamondbacks out of Mater Dei High School in Santa Ana, California. He spent the first seven seasons of his professional career as a shortstop before converting to pitching in 2009. He made his Major League debut on April 8, 2010 with a scoreless relief inning for the Chicago White Sox. Santos pitched for six seasons in the majors with the White Sox (2010-11), Blue Jays (2012-14), Dodgers (2015) and Yankees (2015).

Santos racked up a career-high 30 saves in 2011 with Chicago, and across 194 career MLB appearances posted a 3.98 ERA and 11.2 strikeouts per nine innings. During the 2011 season, Santos established a new Major League record by posting 25 straight scoreless appearances on the road to start the season, a record that had previously been held by Mariano Rivera. His time in the majors with the Yankees lasted only 3.0 innings across two appearances before an elbow injury ended his season.

This session, we hit the ground running by introducing my first piece of legislation, "Melanie's Law" (A3277). This bill addressed an overlooked loophole in criminal law that excludes non-immediate family members from receiving an order of protection in the case of a domestic violence. I am proud to partner in the Senator Rob Rolison to address this much-needed change. When I ran for Assembly, I promised to hold Public Utilities Companies accountable; I am proud to say I am doing just that. My second bill is the "Public Utilities Accountability Act" (A4980). This bill holds utility companies accountable for their reckless and predatory billing practices. This legislation would require overcharges to be refunded at the customer's discretion via check or credit.

My office continues to work tirelessly to address the needs of our district and solve constituent cases. 
'Searching Our Muse,' a night of dance and poetry at the Howland

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




Upstate historic performing arts centers unite to seek ongoing state support to better serve communities

In a statewide effort, the 13 downtown historic performing arts centers from Jamestown to Poughkeepsie have come together to form Alive Downtowns! This coalition, having met virtually since the start of the pandemic, is seeking an ongoing \$20 million in operating support from the state. Their goal is to encourage New York lawmakers to think of the upstate historic theaters as they do zoos and aquariums and public television statewide - organizations that have public benefit to the citizens of the state.

Alive Downtowns! members are Bardavon 1896 Opera House (Poughkeepsie), Clemens Center (Elmira), Palace Performing Arts Center (Albany), Proctors Collaborative (Schenectady, Albany, Saratoga), The Reg Lenna Center for the Arts (Jamestown), Rochester Broadway Theatre League's Auditorium Theatre (Rochester), Shea's Performing Arts Center (Buffalo), The Smith Center for the Arts (Geneva), Stanley Theatre (Utica), State Theatre of Ithaca, Syracuse Area Landmark Theatre, Troy Savings Bank Music Hall, and Ulster Performing Arts Center (Kingston).

Combined, these facilities have an average age of nearly 100 years and have been keystones to their respective downtowns for all those years. They serve over 5 million people annually including thousands of students. Their aggregate budgets exceed \$100 million and their economic impacts for Upstate's major downtowns conservatively exceed \$350 million.

Upstate New York's historic theaters are essential to the cities continuing attractiveness, urban education opportunities and economic viability.

John Parkhurst, Chief Operating Officer of the Rochester Broadway Theatre League commented, "The COVID-19 shutdown of nearly two years has impacted us greatly as an industry. We are coming back, all of us, but, frankly, without this coalition it would have been much harder."

In meeting with local legislators and the Governor's office, the response has been very supportive. The coalition is grateful for that response and hopes to reach all state elected officials to assure an annual appropriation that will allow its members continue to be part of growing upstate downtowns guaranteeing accessibility for all citizens for years to come.

Chris Silva, long time Executive Director of the Bardavon 1896 Opera House in Poughkeepsie added, "This group of performing arts centers are economic, educational and cultural engines in Upstate. We are hoping the state can make a modest investment in us that will pay huge dividends."

Alive Downtowns! is an affiliate corporation to the Upstate Theater Coalition for a Fairgame, established eight years ago in response to the establishment of casinos in the eastern and southern tiers of the state. More information about Alive Downtowns! can be found at afairgame.net.



PROCESS FOR PROPOSED LOCAL LAW A OF 2023, "A LOCAL

LAW AMENDING THE SENIOR CITIZENS' TAX EXEMPTION

INCOME LEVEL"

WHEREAS, Real Property Tax Law §467 has recently been amended to allow municipalities by local law, ordinance or resolution to increase the income level to qualify for the senior citizens' exemption; and

WHEREAS, the Town Assessor has, in consultation with the members of the Town Board, determined that it is in the best interests of the Town and its citizens to provide for an increase in the exemption within the parameters dictated by the New York State amendment to Real Property Tax Law §467; and

WHEREAS, the Town Assessor has made a recommendation, based upon the input from the Town Board members, for an increase in the grant of the exemption contained in the Town Code; and

WHEREAS, the Attorney to the Town has drafted a Local Law providing for the increase in the income levels allowed to qualify for the exemption; and

WHEREAS, the Local Law was presented to the Town Board on March 6, 2023 and the Town Board has determined that the Local Law is acceptable for purposes of commencing the local law adoption process; and

WHEREAS, the Town Board has determined that this is a Type II action under SEQRA which does not require environmental review.

NOW, THEREFORE, be it
RESOLVED, that the Town Board hereby schedules a public hearing on the adoption of Local Law A of 2023 entitled: "A Local Law Amending the Senior Citizens' Tax Exemption Income Level" on April 3, 2023 at 7:05 p.m. at the Town of Pleasant Valley Town Hall; and be it further

RESOLVED, that the Town Clerk is hereby directed to publish and give notice of said public hearing, as may be required by law, and to post a copy of said Local Law on the Town's website and to further make a copy of said Local Law available at the Town Clerk's office during regular business hours.

**TOWN OF PLEASANT VALLEY
PROPOSED LOCAL LAW A OF 2023
A LOCAL LAW AMENDING THE SENIOR CITIZENS'
TAX EXEMPTION INCOME LEVEL**

BE IT ENACTED by the Town Board of the Town of Pleasant Valley as follows:

SECTION 1. Chapter 86, Article 1, Section 86-1(B) of the Pleasant Valley Town Code is deleted and in its stead the following new §86-1(B) is enacted to read as follows:

"B. The percentage of exemption shall be based on the annual income ranges as specified herein, as follows:

INCOME RANGE	PERCENTAGE OF EXEMPTION:
\$34,000 or less	50%
\$34,000 to \$34,999	45%
\$35,000 to \$35,999	40%
\$36,000 to \$36,999	35%
\$37,000 to \$37,899	30%
\$37,900 to \$38,799	25%
\$38,800 to \$39,699	20%
\$39,700 to \$40,599	15%
\$40,600 to \$41,499	10%
\$41,500 to \$42,399	5%
\$42,400 or greater	No exemption

SECTION 2.

If any clause, sentence, paragraph, subdivision, or part of this local law or the application thereof to any person, firm or corporation, or circumstance, shall be adjusted by any court of competent jurisdiction to be invalid or unconstitutional, such order or judgment shall not affect, impair, or invalidate the remainder thereof, but shall be confined in its operation to the clause, sentence, paragraph, subdivision, or part of this local law or in its application to the person, individual, firm or corporation or circumstance, directly involved in the controversy in which such judgment or order shall be rendered.

SECTION 3.



Students display impressive math skills at Pi Day event

On Tuesday, March 21, The Math & Physics Exploration hosted the 8th Annual Pi Day Recognition event. This year at the Van Wyck Junior High School, 59 students were recognized for their competence in being able to multiply infinite power series to prove algebraic identities. However, this year was special because a fifth-grade class of 21 students along with these 59 students were able to multiply 18 x 18 digits to get an answer of 35 digits.

Could this be the only class in Dutchess County, that can achieve such a feat? I am sure that they are willing to challenge any class that doubts this!

The students were asked to compare the approach that they learned with other techniques for doing long multiplication. They found that they could do the work three times as fast, and could be more confident that they had the correct answer. The students were learning how important the layout of a problem was to being able to understand what they were doing and being able to check and correct their work. They were encouraged to challenge what they were learning and to understand the strengths and weaknesses to different approaches for learning and doing long multiplication.

The success of teaching the students was how teachers Nelson, Patterson and Reaves - doing a residency with Dr. Irvin Miller, Executive Director of the Math & Physics Exploration - integrated Miller's techniques with theirs. Most importantly, the work ethic of the students improved as they began to be

able to easily identify the associative, commutative and distributive properties.

In the spirit of STEAM, a project was introduced to all the students, in which they were asked to make a ruler that could be used to add and subtract positive and negative numbers. All they needed was some cardboard, a pen, glue and their creative skills.

The Pi Day program began as Superintendent Dr. Bonk and Assistant Superintendent Dr. Cardwell praised the students for their academic growth in learning math and their ability to transfer those skills to learning other subjects. Peggy Kelland, Vice President of the Wappingers Board of Education, continued the praises of Drs. Bonk and Cardwell, and discussed how appreciative she and the board were of their initiation and support of the Enriched Math Program. In gratitude for his interest in the efforts of the students, Mia from the 5th grade class presented Dr. Bonk with a picture she had painted.

The keynote speaker, State Senator Rob Rolison -- who has championed education even as Mayor of Poughkeepsie -- spoke about the importance of good quality education. He was pleased to see the future that these students would bring with their ethics and skill.

Town Supervisors Nicholas D'Alessandro (East Fishkill), Richard Thurston (Wappinter), Ozzy Albra (Fishkill) and Jon Baisley (Poughkeepsie) have been supportive of this program for about four years.

Some of the aforementioned people, along with the students' principals, signed certificates of recognition. Dr. Shuchat through Theresa Maher provided the resources and skills to produce the trophies for the students.

The program continued as 5th grade teacher Nelson described the academic impact on her students as they changed as mathematicians, and improve their work ethic. Nicolette and her mom spoke about how importance math has been to their family. Her mom, Katherine, not only has been supportive of her daughter and son, but she learned some math from them. Nicolette saw how doing the homework and studying made math easier for her than for children

who did not.

Sixth-grader Morgan from Fishkill Plains talked about the importance of practicing to perfect your skills. Johnny Price from Brinckerhoff looked forward to Tuesdays, when he could proceed at a new accelerated rate through the ever-increasing mystery of math. Dean from Oak Grove can now multiply large numbers that he could never have done without the program. Cillian from Oak Grove learned how to challenge what he was taught.

Dr. Miller thanked the Hudson Valley Savings Bank, Top's Markets, Adams Fairacre Farms, and the Daily Planet for their support of this recognition event.


Ramadan is a holy month of fasting for
