Four seek BOE seats in Beacon

Registered voters in the Beacon City School District (BCSD) will have the opportunity to vote for Board of Education (BOE) members on May 16. They will also vote on the 2023-24 Budget. Polls are open from 6 a.m. – 9 p.m.

The four candidates are Semra Ercin, Kristan Flynn, Eric Schetter and Anthony White. There are four seats open. Three seats are for terms July 1, and expiring June 30, 2026. The other is for a term May 16, and expiring on June 30, 2025.

The four candidates who are running for the WCSD BOE were asked the following questions via email by Southern Dutchess News. The questions were:

1. Why are you running for the WCSD BOE?
2. What are your top 3 priorities?
3. What experiences will you bring if elected?

The candidates' responses follow, in alphabetical order,

Semra Ercin

Why are you running for the BCSD BOE?

"I am running for the Beacon School Board because I want to be actively engaged with my community, and I have three children that attend public school. I hope to work closely on the School Board with my colleagues to create and maintain exceptional and nurturing learning environments."

What are your top 3 priorities?

"On the Beacon School Board, I will be focused on making sure that children are able to experience safe, encouraging, diverse, and challenging schools that prepare them to be successful and caring citizens; teachers and administrators are properly supported; and the schools are governed by a Board that makes informed and responsible financial and policy decisions."

What experiences will you bring if elected?

"I earned a Master's in Public Administration from Baruch College and have worked as a fundraising and development professional at non-profit arts organizations such as the Brooklyn Children's Museum, the Brooklyn Academy of Music, and currently at the Hudson Valley Shakespeare Festival for over 15 years. My education and work experience have prepared me to be a critical thinker, problem solver, and capable collaborator with a strong background in fundraising, budget creation, writing, and administration. Perhaps most important of all, I am a dedicated mother to three great kids, two daughters that attend South Avenue Elementary and a son that attends Beacon High School."

Kristan Flynn, current BCSD board member

Why are you running for the BCSD BOE?

"I am running for the BCSD school board in order to continue the work I started over 7 years ago. As a board we have worked to improve how the systems of the district function and the student experience within the system. There is still room for growth and improvement, I would like to be a part of that."

Dia Beacon celebrates 20 years in Dutchess County

City of Newburgh residents offered free admission now

Dia Beacon and local officials commemorated the 20th anniversary of the art museum in Beacon with a press conference on May 5. An announcement was made that residents of the City of Newburgh, in Orange County, will be offered free admission. There will also be an event to commemorate the 20th anniversary on May 13, from 10 a.m. – 4 p.m. at Dia, 3 Beekman St, in Beacon.

"Over the last two decades it has been incredible to witness not just the growth of an amazing place for art, but also the forging of such strong partnerships between Dia Beacon and nearby communities. We truly would not be here if it weren't for support from Beacon and Newburgh residents as well as the entire Hudson Valley," said Jessica Morgan, Dia's Nathalie de Gunzburg Director.

"Thanks to everyone on your team," Assemblyman Jonathan Jacobson said to Morgan.

Free admission is offered during all regular hours to residents of Beacon. The adjacent communities of Fishkill and the hamlets of Chelsea and Glenham, also have free admission. Free admission is extended to residents of the Hudson Valley on the last Sunday of every month.

Jacobson presented Dia representatives with a check for \$150,000 of new funding for the year ahead.

nomic ties," remarked Jacobson.

City of Beacon Mayor Lee Kyriacou, during his remarks, recalled when Dia Beacon was being discussed by the Beacon City Council during the time before it was located in Beacon. He said Dia is "transformative."

Winning ways keep Renegades atop division in early going

The Hudson Valley Renegades are finding all kinds of ways to win and maintaining their hold on first place in the division.

The Renegades scored single runs in the 7th, 8th, and 9th innings on Friday night, and beat Wilmington, 3-2, plus wins of 3-1 on Saturday to take four of the six games in the home series.

Alexander Vargas clubbed a go-ahead three-run home run in the seventh inning helping the Renegades down the Blue Rocks 3-1 on Saturday night..

The Renegades own first place in the North Division of the South Atlantic League with a 18-9 record.

On Friday, the winning run came home on a wild pitch.

In the ninth inning, after Aaron Palensky opened up the frame with a lead-off single, Spencer Henson reached base on a fielder's choice. Henson advanced to second on a throwing error by Yoander

Rivero on a fielder's choice groundball hit by Rafael Flores, who reached at first.

Jack Sinclair (2-1) struck out Grant Richardson for the second out of the inning before Henson stole third after Onix Vega threw down to second base on a pickoff attempt. Two pitches later, Henson dashed home on a wild pitch to win the game for the Renegades. It was the first walk-off win of the season for Hudson Valley.

Wilmington had tied the game in the ninth with a sacrifice fly from Vega against Juan Carela after James Wood tripled on a ball lost in the lights in the outfield.

The Blue Rocks starter, Dustin Saenz, held the Renegades without a hit until a Flores leadoff single in the fifth. Tyler Schoff replaced Saenz in the seventh, and Henson clubbed his sixth home run of the season to tie the game at one.

On the second pitch of the bottom of the

eighth, Ben Cowles crushed a solo home run over the right field wall to hand Hudson Valley their first lead of the game at 2-1. The blast was already Cowles' fifth of the season in his 16th game played, after he hit seven in 93 games in 2022.

Zach Messinger started the game for the 'Gades and struck out five in five innings of work. Carela (1-1) went the final 4.0 innings and limited the Blue Rocks to just two hits while striking out three and not allowing a walk in his first relief outing of the season.

The force was with the Renegades on Thursday night as they scored all their runs early in a 6-2 win over the Wilmington.

Aaron Palensky opened up the scoring with a solo home run off Andry Lara (0-3) in the second inning. Palensky is tied for the South Atlantic League lead with eight home runs.

thanks for its local resident free admission policy that has allowed so many Beacon residents to enjoy Dia's art and facility," said Kyriacou.

According to the Dia website, diaart.org, "Dia Beacon presents the majority of Dia's collection of art from the 1960s to the present as well as special exhibitions, new commissions, and public and education programs." Since 2003, the art museum has occupied the former Nabisco box-printing factory. The site states that Dia receives visitors from surrounding communities, New York City and around the world.

"Facilitating greater access to the arts is deeply important to Dia. I can think of no better way to celebrate our twentieth anniversary than to extend our free-

admission policy across the river, making it easier for our neighbors to visit the museum as many times as they would like," said Morgan.

The Beacon community "welcome[s] residents of the City of Newburgh and the opportunity to come to Beacon at any time of the year," said Kyriacou.

Artist Robert Irwin, who was invited by Dia, conceived the master plan for a twenty-first-century museum that retained the original character of the factory's interior spaces, according to the Dia website.

Mike Neppi, who is the Chief of Staff for City of Newburgh City, said "What a wonderful day to be here." The arts and humanities, he remarked, enable growth.

"The arts and humanities connect us to each other, and for twenty years Dia Beacon has connected the Hudson Valley's communities together as a shared place to experience, learn, and grow.

There will be a Happy Hour with Newburgh Brewing Company, Two Way Brewery, and Homespun Foods on the front lawn.

What are your top 3 priorities?

1. Fiscal oversight/stewardship - as trustees we are responsible for the oversight of how public funds are used to benefit our students. Improving these systems of accountability continues to be my top priority.

2. Student mental health - we are in the middle of a mental health crisis impacting children and I would like to look for ways to fund programming to support children through this time and provide them with the tools to grow into healthy adults.

3. Building a strong school community - Beacon has grown rapidly over the past 10 years. Many people do not realize that half of our budget is funded through state aid, not exclusively taxes, which means half of our population is designated as Title 1, which is a federal law that requires states to provide funding to schools with high numbers or high percentages of students from low-income families. Addressing economic inequality is and will continue to be one of our biggest challenges in creating a unified school community. We want all of our students to feel equally deserving of opportunities and this starts with finding ways for all students to access programming that improves their student experience.

What experiences will you bring if elected?

"I was an activist working to address issues in the district for over a year prior to joining the board. I learned a lot about how districts should function and what we needed to change in Beacon. I now have 7 years' experience as a trustee upon which to build my work in the upcoming term. Additionally, I have professional experience as a strategy consultant as well as being the parent of two students in the district to inform my work on the board."

Eric Schetter

Why are you running for the BCSD BOE?

"Having worked in public education for almost 40 years, I know how important the work of the BOE is, and the vital role it plays in educating all of our children. Being a lifelong Beacon CSD resident, I strongly support our community

and our schools. The current Board of Education has done really good work over the past few years and I would like to join this group to continue along that path. My family has benefitted greatly from the BCSD, and I would like to get involved to help support the learning experience for our children."

What are your top 3 priorities?

"My 3 top priorities for joining the board are as follows:

1. Student and staff safety is extremely important. I admire the work that our teachers, administrators, safety personnel, and other staff do each and every day to keep our schools safe, but I also believe we need to look to provide more support and resources in an attempt to be as proactive as possible.

2. As COVID funding goes away over the next year or 2, it will be extremely important to be as creative as possible to maintain the added support gained through these funds, but maintaining a budget that families can afford.

3. Providing extracurricular clubs and intramurals for children at both the elementary and secondary level are very important. These activities have increased over the years, but I welcome even more to allow more opportunities for our children to get better connected to their school.

What experiences will you bring if elected?

"If elected, I bring a wealth of experience from the education field. I was a teacher in the Pawling Central School District for 10 years and an administrator in the Arlington Central School District for 25 years: an assistant principal for 5 years, and a middle school principal for 20 years. After retiring in 2021, I have served in a few interim administrative roles in Beacon, Arlington, and Hyde Park. Working in these other school districts has allowed me the opportunity to experience teaching and learning in a variety of ways, which I believe will help me in my role as a school board member."

Anthony White, current BCSD board member

Why are you running for the BCSD BOE?

"I am running for my fourth term as I feel the district has made great strides

since I started. I feel that my experience in education helps with making district decisions. I feel that my questioning as to why decisions are being made makes the administration and other board members think about decisions prior to approving them. Lastly, being a team member and good communicator are important characteristics that a board member must have. I feel these are strengths of mine and I'm willing to continue to serve the community in this role."

What are your top 3 priorities?

"The top three priorities are:

1. Increasing student achievement.
2. Increase opportunities for student extracurricular activities.
3. Ensure the students' mental health needs are being met and addressed.

What experiences will you bring if elected?

"I bring 9 years of experience to the position. I have served on the board when the board was in turmoil and feel I assisted and led, as president of the Board for 4 years, to get the district on a positive track

moving forward. During my tenure on the board, the board has shifted to being proactive instead of reactive. During my time as president of the board I have reinstated district committee, a more transparent process of sharing district business and student representatives of the board. The voters have approved the budget for the 9 years that I have served along with two capital project reserves and the funding of two capital projects."

WCSD Superintendent calls on Congressional representatives to make Federal funding available

The following letter was written by Wappingers Central School District Superintendent of Schools to Speaker of the House Kevin McCarthy, Senate Majority Leader Chuck Schumer, Senate Minority Leader Mitch McConnell, House Majority Leader Hakeem Jeffries, House Minority Leader Steve Scalise, U.S. Congressman Mike Lawler, U.S. Congressman Patrick Ryan, U.S. Congressman Marcus Molinaro, and U.S. Senator Kristen Gillibrand on May 4.

Dear Members of the United States Congress and Senate:

As Superintendent of Schools of the Wappingers Central School District, which is the 9th largest school district in New York State with over 10,200 students and 15 school buildings, I am writing this letter of correspondence to urge that Federal funding be made available immediately to enhance the health, welfare, and safety of our students throughout our schools. This will allow for the assignment of a School Resource Officer, as well as provide the much needed additional mental health and wellness supports necessary at ALL school buildings within our District. The addition of such positions that are federally funded is necessary as our country continues to grapple with the violence and mental health issues that has plagued school districts and has resulted in injuries and tragically, the loss of life. Unfortunately, the horrific events of school violence that have transpired in many schools throughout the Nation continues to create and manifest much anxiety for the families, students, and staff in my school district.

Clearly, much discussion has occurred and hopefully will continue to occur at the Federal level regarding the best ways to keep students and staff safe. An armed and

trained uniformed School Resource Officer, who works at a State/County or local police department, will be one way in which immediate steps can be taken to begin to address this major concern. These trained officers will have the opportunity to develop positive relationships with our students and proactively help to mitigate potential conflict as well as respond to those incidents that impact the health, welfare, and safety of others. Mental Health professionals will be able to serve similarly, by developing positive relationships with our students as well respond immediately to student mental health issues and possibly resolve issues prior to escalation. I personally have the utmost confidence in the seven municipal police departments within our school district, which include the New York State Police, The Dutchess County Sheriffs' Department, as well as the Dutchess County Department of Behavioral and Community Health as we have worked collaboratively with them in the areas of school safety, mental health and wellness, and violence prevention. The presence of these trained professionals in ALL of our schools, regardless of grade level or enrollment, will help foster a school culture and climate that is safe and will allow teachers and students to focus on teaching and learning.

In the absence of Federal funding, many school districts may be forced to pay for such needed safety through their own school budget. As the safety and security of our staff and students is our top priority, we may face having to make difficult decisions that will either impact safety, our overall instructional program, or both! As a district with fifteen (15) schools, we currently allocate approximately \$1.8 million for School Safety and Mental Health Services. I am hopeful that federal funding will be made available for these most important positions as the ability to provide these necessary services should not be based on whether each local school district has the financial means to do so. This could be achieved by providing multi-year Federal Grants to school districts. It is my belief that we can all agree that everyone, regardless of the wealth or the ability of their School Districts to fund these services, deserves the safest school environment that promotes teaching and learning and provides students with opportunities to achieve their highest academic, social, and emotional potential. Thank you very much for taking the time to review this correspondence and I am hopeful this request will receive strong consideration.



Letting young players be themselves is ideal philosophy for manager Santos

Hudson Valley Renegades manager Sergio Santos has the ideal temperament for the game of baseball, and knows how to deal with his young players.

He lets them be themselves.

"This is a level where there is just as much teaching, if not more, than at every other level," he said. "And we want them to succeed. Moving up a level is to reward for us. But there also comes a time when you have to let them be themselves. Most of these kids are at that age, where they just have to figure it out for themselves."

His philosophy of hand-on and hands off, and knowing when the situation calls for which, has proven to be successful. As of this writing, the Renegades are in first place in the North Division of the South Atlantic League.

"Like I said, at this level you don't think of it from a team standpoint," Santos said. "We just want them to

move up and move on. Half of these guys won't even be here at the end of the season. That's just the nature of the beast at this level."

Santos, 40, is a Former pitcher in the Los Angeles Dodgers, Chicago White Sox, Toronto Blue Jays and New York Yankees organizations. He was drafted out of Mater Dei High School in California in 2002. Santos gave it his best, but it is difficult to latch on to a team that is pitching rich.

But it wasn't for a lack of trying.

"One thing I've learned from all my years in baseball, and I try to pass it along to these guys," Santos said, "is that you have to be willing to put the work in. Sometimes it works out, and sometimes it doesn't. But don't let anybody accuse you of not trying your hardest."

So does Santos also look to move up? Perhaps do the AA level in Trenton or Triple A in Scranton Wilkes-Barre?

"I'm not angling for it," Santos said, "but I wouldn't turn it down, either."

The GM's learning process and the value of good communication

Have you learned anything new about the franchise since moving up to general manager?

I'd say that there are always lessons to be learned, no matter how long you've been involved with something. He allowed me to get involved with a lot of things. So I really haven't been shocked by anything.

Steve Gliner has been a kind of de facto mentor for you. What have you learned from him?

Balance. I have learned from him how to balance my professional and personal life. Steve has a great way of stepping back and looking at things from a different perspective. I'm sure it has to do with his 30 plus years in the business, but that balance and sense of perspective is critical in a customer driven business. Nothing surprises him. Steve has taught me the ability to evaluate the situation, especially when it comes to customers.
