## Dutchess sees redistricting changes

In the often confusing world of politics, the new re-drawn districts in New York have added more fodder to an already perplexing situation. On the local scene, many Dutchess County residents will find themselves in new districts for federal and state elections.

Adding further confusion, a special election has been called for the current Congressional District 19 due to the resignation of Antonio Delgado, who Gov. Kathy Hochul recently appointed as her lieutenant governor. The candidates, current Dutchess County Executive Marc Molinaro and current Ulster County Executive Pat Ryan, will face off in the special election, set Aug. 23. The winner will be sworn in around Sept 5-10 (depending on election certification) and serve until Dec. 31, 2022.

Also set Aug. 23 are primary elections. Josh Riley and Jamie Cheney are vying to be the Democratic candidate for the new District 19.

There are no primaries in the new District 18.

In the new District 17, Democrat Sean Patrick Maloney (currently the Congressman for District 18) will run against State Sen. Alessandra Biaggi, the Democrat who currently represents District 34. According to Ballotpedia, Charles Falciglia, William Faulkner, Michael Lawler and Jack Schrepel are running in the Republican primary for District 17.

As of Jan. 1, 2023, with the new maps will be in place, none of Dutchess County will be in the 19th District.

In the General Election in November, Molinaro will run against the victor of the Democratic primary (either Riley or Cheney) for the new District 19, and Ryan will run against Republican Colin Schmidt in the new District 18, which includes most of Dutchess County.

For the 41st State Senate District, Sue Serino (the current senator for District 41) will vie against Sen. Michelle Hinchey from Ulster County. (The final list of primary candidates was not available as this paper went to press.)

In the 39th Senate District, Republican Rob Rolison will run against the as-yet undetermined Democratic challenger (among the primary candidates is Julie Shiroishi). Incumbent Jonathan Jacobs (AD105) is running. According to information on Ballotpedia, no Republican is currently listed. With 105th Assembly District incumbent Kieran Lalor not running for re-election, the race includes Democrat Jill Feldstein and Republican Anil Beephan Jr. AD106 Democratic incumbent Didi Barrett will run against the winner of the Republican primary between Brandan Gaylord and Dean Michael.

## Dutchess County native, Broadway star to perform in Beacon June 25

A Broadway star is coming home to Dutchess County to celebrate Beacon Performing Arts Center's 5th Anniversary Celebration on June 25 at 7 p.m. at Beacon High School, 101 Matteawan Rd., in Beacon. Patti Murin, a graduate of John Jay High School in the Wappingers Central School District, portrayed "Princess Anna" on Broadway in Disney's "Frozen." She also has portrayed "Glinda" in "Wicked" across the nation, and roller skated her way in "Xanadu" (Euterpe), her Broadway premiere.

Tickets for the concert are now on sale online at [www.BeaconPerformingArtsCenter.com](http://www.BeaconPerformingArtsCenter.com) with prices marked at \$15 for adults and \$8 for students and children.

"Growing up in a small town, I never would have imagined that it would develop into such a vibrant arts scene that people flock to," Murin said in a release.

Beacon Performing Arts Center (BPAC), 327B Main St., is hosting the event to celebrate its five years with a concert of Broadway songs. BPAC, a 501c3, was started by Broadway performers Jake and Kate Vander Linden and Tim Grady. Among some of the shows performed by BPAC have been "The Little Mermaid Jr.,"

## 'Good response' for Spirit of Beacon Day, volunteers can still sign up

This year's Spirit of Beacon Day is slated to be the 45th year of the event. Since the beginning, it's been run by volunteers from the community, according to Gwenno James. James has been organizing the event with a committee of volunteers for the past four years. There are more than 100 community groups involved. The event is usually held on the last Sunday of September, said James.

A call for volunteers was put out during the recent Council meeting at City Hall.

"I wanted to let you know that the Spirit of Beacon Committee has had a very good response from our community since making the call for more volunteers at last week's city council meeting," said James in an email to Beacon Free Press on Monday.

"Many folks have responded with a willingness to step in and get involved, and a new Chair of the committee will soon transition to take on the lead," said James. "So the good news is, our committee does now have the volunteers and committee members needed to organize and run the event in September. It's a true testament to the spirit of our community!" James did not yet want to release the person's name who is taking over as chair.

James told the Council during the meeting earlier this month that she needs to step down as chair due to work commitments. Other committee members also needed to step down during the past couple of years, she noted.

"It's a great day. And the mission is for the community to get to know each other better," James said.

Committee members asked other community organizations to assist with

finding someone.

Since 1977, according to a press release James sent to the Beacon Free Press, "the Spirit of Beacon Day has been organized by a small core volunteer committee, and the torch has been passed on from one generation to the next. The committee has always worked closely with the city administration, alongside the support of the mayor and city council." James became the Chair after her predecessor, Rose Story, decided to step down from the position.

Chris White, administrator for the City of Beacon, told Beacon Free Press after the meeting held earlier this month, "Spirit of

Beacon Day has been an important celebration of our community for more than four decades. The City is grateful to the dedicated volunteers who have organized this event ..."

doubt, be in my shoes one day," Murin remarked.

The anniversary celebration concert is being produced by BPAC and The Beacon Players, Beacon High School's drama club.

This will not be the first time that The Beacon Players Director Anthony Scarrone has worked with Murin. Scarrone was the advisor for the John Jay High School's drama club, Proscenium, when Murin attended the Wappingers Central School District high school.

Scarrone said, "I have the distinct pleasure (and honor) of being the first director to cast Patti in her first role in a musical. It was her 6th grade elementary school production of "Cinderella" and Patti sang and acted her heart out in the pivotal role of...a mouse."

Scarrone continued, "Patti of course, went on to John Jay, joined Proscenium and continued her involvement in theater, playing everything from a secretary in "Plaza Suite" to dual roles in "Jesus Christ Superstar" and capping her time with us as Mary Lenox in "The Secret Garden."

Scarrone said, "There were other shows of course but I believe that Patti's most memorable moments came as part of the cast in "Godspell." Anyone in that cast walked away with an unbelievable feeling that many have told me still resonates with them today."

Recalling when Murin starred in "Frozen" on Broadway, Scarrone remarked, "I will say that I did not sleep the night before I went to see "Frozen" and my heart jumped when Patti made her first entrance." He noted, "Although, so very proud of all that Patti has accomplished, starring on Broadway, TV and even Hallmark movies, I will forever treasure the multiple page letter on paper from a yellow legal pad with a stick of gum attached (a certain individual was always in trouble for chewing gum) it has meant the world to me and always will. After all, it came from a future star."

Murin is a regular on the Hallmark Channel, seen in the movies "Love On Iceland," "Holiday For Heroes," and "To Catch A Spy." She has recurring roles on "Chicago Med" as Dr. Nina Shore, and "Royal Pains" as Ava, according to information from BPAC.

"When the company started, we had a dream of creating theater in a community like this and never expected that five years later Beacon Performing Arts Center would grow to what it has now become. It means the world to us that we are here celebrating the past five years, and many, many more to come," said Grady.

# Fairy House Hunt at Locust Grove

Locust Grove will be holding a Fairy House Hunt Saturdays and Sundays through June 26. Attendees can discover 30 fairy houses hidden among the flowers and trees at Locust Grove, 2683 South Rd., in Poughkeepsie. Admission is \$10 per person (children under 4 free admission).

"We love to get kids and families out into nature and into our gardens," said Emily Ellison, Director of Public Programs for The Locust Grove Estate & Locust Lawn Farm. "And, we really appreciate the funds that Fairy House ticket sales and sponsorship bring in!"

Locust Grove is an independent not-for-profit museum, nature preserve, and education center. It was gifted to a foundation in 1975 by Annette Young, the longest resident of Locust Grove. Her family bought it from Telegraph inventor Samuel Morse's family who used the Estate as a summer residence before then, remarked Ellison.

"We do not receive funding from the local, state, or federal governments. All proceeds from ticket sales and sponsorships of our public events help keep the Locust Grove gardens open free to the public since 1979," said Ellison.

Without fundraisers like Fairy House Hunt, Harvest Hunt in October, Holiday Hunt in December, Sunset Sensations (wine and food tastings every second Thursday of the month) wedding rentals, donations, membership, and volunteers, said Ellison, "we would not be able to keep our doors open every day from 10 a.m. to 5 p.m."

"The Fairy House Hunt was an idea first brought to in 2017 by staff members and volunteers who have marveled at its success and growth into a beloved annually recurring program ever since," said Ellison. That first year, there were only two dozen houses. The event, at that time, was held for only two days.

"Generous volunteers handmade and re-assemble the houses each year. We are so grateful for their talents and kindness," Ellison stated. It was noted that upon entrance, each child is given a numbered "treasure map" to "find" each of the tiny handmade houses hidden among the flowers and trees.

"Last year Fairy House Hunt attracted over 1,200 visitors. This year we hope to see over 2,000!" said Ellison.

# Bannerman Trust receives \$1,000 grant for development officer

The Bannerman Castle Trust, Inc. was awarded a \$100,000 matching grant from the Environmental Protection Fund's Park and Trail Partnership Grants program to hire a Development Officer to refine and implement the Trust's development activities and to identify and steward major gift donors and prospects. The Bannerman Castle Trust, Inc. will raise an additional \$25,000 in matching funds, for a total of \$125,000.

The grant is one of 30 awards totaling \$900,000 for organizations dedicated to the stewardship and promotion of New York's state parks and historic sites, trails and public lands. The grants will be matched with private and local funding and will support projects to strengthen Friends groups and enhance public access and recreational opportunities.

Friends groups—nonprofit organizations often made up entirely of volunteers—are essential to the stewardship and promotion of our state park system. These dedicated groups raise private funds for capital projects, perform maintenance tasks, provide educational programming, and promote public use through hosting special events.

The Park and Trail Partnership Grants are administered by Parks & Trails New York, a statewide non-profit organization, in partnership with the NYS Office of Parks, Recreation, and Historic Preservation.

Parks & Trails New York Executive Director Robin Dropkin said, "With more and more people discovering the outdoors, and visitation to our parks, trails, and public lands soaring, the need for strong public/public partnerships has never been greater. The Park and Trail Partnership Grants help bolster the role of Friends groups in these vital partnerships."

The Bannerman Castle Trust, Inc. (BCT) is still a growing organization, although it entered its 30th year dedicated to the preservation of Bannerman Castle in 2022. The Trust's primary goals are to facilitate public access and to host educational and arts and culture programs at Bannerman Castle on Pollepel Island, all while striving to complete the stabilization and adaptive reuse of the larger

Castle structures.

"The grant award will allow us to hire a dedicated Development Officer so that we can pursue and secure funding to stabilize and repurpose the larger, historical structures on Bannerman Island as part of an outdoor amphitheater concept for theater and concert events. We're tremendously grateful to have been selected," BCT President Len Warner stated.

When the BCT was formed in 1993, many skeptics said that efforts to save Bannerman Castle and open it to the public were infeasible due to the degradation and damage experienced during the decades that the site was closed to the public. Since that time, BCT has had great successes - with the help and generosity of friends, supporters, the NYSOPRHP, and Parks & Trails NY - Pollepel Island opened as another destination within the Hudson Highlands State Park in 2004 to limited 'hard hat' tours. During the intervening years, the BCT partially stabilized the main castle tower with steel bracing and focused repairs; rebuilt the roof and interior floors of the former Bannerman residence to create a museum and visitor center; restored the island's historic terraces, gardens, and trails; and installed public restrooms - creating one of the Hudson Valley's most exciting and unique heritage tourism destinations!

"A Development Officer will help the Bannerman Castle Trust, Inc. to go after and obtain funding for major capital improvement projects to rehabilitate the iconic Bannerman Castle warehouse structures. The framework we envision for the castle improvements is the development of an outdoor amphitheater concept, which would be constructed adjacent to the existing castle. My sincere thanks to New York State Parks, Parks and Trails New York, BCT's Board and Advisory Council, and the BCT staff and volunteers - Neil Caplan, Executive Director, BCT.

## Renegades gain key wins, close in on .500 mark

Propelled by a six-run outburst in the bottom of the seventh inning, the Hudson Valley Renegades took the series finale from the Jersey Shore BlueClaws by a score of 10-7 at Dutchess Stadium on Sunday afternoon.

Hudson Valley is a game away from the .500 mark at 28-29 overall, although the club is still 10 games out of first place in the South Atlantic League's North Division. Fortunately, the first half of the season ends in 10 days. First-half division champions automatically qualify for the playoffs, team records are reset to 0-0 after the first 66 games, and the second half of the season then begins with a new 66 games.

The BlueClaws took the lead in the top of the third against T.J. Sikkema when Rixon Wingrove brought in a run with a groundball to first. Spencer Henson threw home, but the throw was not in time to get Ethan Wilson and Jersey Shore took a 1-0 advantage.

Making his 10th career start, Sikkema finished with a career-high 3.1 innings pitched, allowing just one run on six hits, striking out four and not issuing a walk. The four strikeouts tied a career-high for the left-hander.

The Renegades struck back in the bottom of the third against Jersey Shore's Andrew Painter, with Aaron Palensky leading off the frame with a solo home run to left. After Hudson Valley loaded the bases with one out, Henson brought in a run with an infield single, and Tyler Hardman drew a bases-loaded walk to extend the lead to 3-1.

Jhonatan Muñoz allowed a two-run home run to Johan Rojas in the top of the fourth to tie the game. The BlueClaws added another against Muñoz in the fifth to go in front 4-3.

The Gades immediately tied the game in the bottom of the fifth against J.P. Woodward. Anthony Seigler drew a lead-off walk and scored on an Eric Wagaman double.

In the bottom of the sixth, the Renegades broke the game open after loading the bases with nobody out against Andrew Baker. Trey Sweeney delivered a two-run single to put the Renegades in front. Everson Pereira brought in another with a fielder's choice groundout. Saul Torres followed with an RBI triple and Wagaman crushed a two-run home run to extend the lead to 10-4.

The victory comes on the heels of a dazzling pitcher's duel less than 24 hours earlier when the Renegades slipped past the BlueClaws 1-0 on Saturday night.

Josue Panacual (2-0) turned in one of the best starts of his career, tossing a career-high seven shutout innings on the night. In just his second start in High-A, the right-hander scattered six hits – all singles – and didn't walk a batter while striking out nine to tie his career high.

Only one BlueClaw, Johan Rojas in the first, reached third base, and the team did not get another runner into scoring position until the seventh in Panacual's dominant outing.

Seigler led off the bottom of the fourth with a solo home run that was tucked just fair down the left field line. The blast was

Seigler's third of the season with the Renegades, and gave the club the only run it would need and the only run allowed by Jersey Shore starter Ben Brown in six innings. The right-hander allowed only two hits and struck out 11 as he matched wits with Panacual.

At a total time of an hour and 51 minutes, this was the fastest game of the season for Hudson Valley by 17 minutes. It was also the

first time that the Renegades completed a nine-inning game in under two hours since July 13, 2018 against West Virginia.

The contest was the first 1-0 win for the Renegades of the season, with their last coming almost exactly a year ago – June 10, 2021 at Brooklyn.

The Renegades will spend the next two weeks in North Carolina with games against Greensboro and then Winston-Salem.

were a New York-Penn League (Low Class A) team for 20-something years.

What we can control is the ballpark experience and the ability to come out with family and friends to enjoy the game, listen to the music, watch the fireworks, get the giveaways, laugh at the between-inning entertainment and promotions. # Salvia

These often overlooked members of the sage family have a lot going for them

Why don't more gardeners plant salvia? The annual red flowered salvia – Vista, Sentry, Red Hot Sally – there are dozens of varieties of the species Salvia Splendens, ranging in height from six inches to two feet tall, blooming all summer long and DEER DON'T EAT THEM! Perfect for large containers, beds or the back of a flower border.

Red salvia (there is also a purple variety of salvia splendens) is one of about 900 species of salvia known to gardeners. They're all in the sage family, with square stems and an unusual semi-tubular flower that is built to prevent self pollination. I'm not aware of any salvias that are native to New York, but don't let anyone tell you pollinators pass them by. Bees, especially bumblebees, and butterflies love salvia. Some of the long tubular flowered varieties like the hybrid "Wendy's Wish" are hummingbird magnets. Our native ruby throated hummingbirds seem to have learned that since bees can't probe all the way to the end of the blossom, Wendy's Wish has lots of nectar to spare.

Here are a few more of the most popular salvias for your garden:

• **Blue Salvia (salvia farinacea)** – an annual that survives into late October with spires of blue blossoms; some varieties, like "evolution," are deep blue or purple, while the standard "Victoria" is a pleasing cornflower blue. Deer won't go near it, and neither will woodchucks, rabbits or most humans. The leaves smell like

cat urine.

• **Indigo Spires** – In 1979, a hybrid cross between two species of salvia was discovered at California's Huntington Gardens. One of the parents was the blue salvia farinacea and the other a salvia shrub native to Mexico. Over the last several years, varieties of indigo spires have been developed, including Mystic Spires Blue and Rockin' the Blues from Proven Winners.

• **Perennial Salvias** – Noted area horticulturalist Rebecca Curtis pointed out some of the more popular perennial salvias. Meadow Sage is the common name of the species Salvia Pratensis, which is a hardy perennial in the Hudson Valley. Closely related are the varieties of the species Salvia Nemerosa, which includes May Night, Caradonna, the dwarf "Marcus," and Proven Winner's Violet Riot. Rebecca swears that these perennials will bloom all season if they are trimmed or dead-headed after the first flush of blossoms fade in late June. Some varieties, especially May Night, can flop over in hot humid weather so may need to be staked. Perennial salvias prefer full sun and can tolerate drought and poor soil.

• **Garden Sage** – Rub your grilled chicken with sage, top off your summer cocktail with a sprig of pineapple sage, all members of the salvia/sage family. Pineapple sage grows huge in the garden, eventually throwing out enormous crimson blossoms swarmed by hummingbirds.

• **Russian Sage** – For some reason, botanists decided in 2017 to reclassify Russian Sage as a salvia, removing it from the genus perovskia and calling it salvia yangi. This is an extremely hardy perennial shrub with long panicles of sky blue blossoms. Lives forever in poor soils and is almost impossible to kill. Landscape designers love it. And you can

happily plant Russian Sage along a south wall or in the back of a garden, because it's not native to Russia!
