## Renegades close in on title for first half of league season

The Hudson Valley Renegades are on the brink of a North Division Championship in the South Atlantic League.

The league determines its playoffs by first and second half champions.

Hudson Valley took five of six games against the Rome, Ga., Braves during the past week at Heritage Financial Park.

The Renegades pounded out 15 hits in a 10-1 victory over the Rome Braves on Sunday afternoon. With the win, the Renegades secured a series victory and preserved their first-place lead in the SAL North with three games left to play in the first half. Their magic number to clinch a playoff spot has shrunk to two.

Drew Thorpe (6-1) started the game for Hudson Valley and walked just two batters while allowing three hits in six shutout innings. He struck out the side twice in an inning and went on to finish with eight total. The New York Yankees No. 6 prospect also extended his scoreless streak to 24.1 innings after hurling six more scoreless innings.

Ben Cowles delivered a walk-off single in the bottom of the ninth to hand the Renegades a 4-3 win over the Rome Braves on Friday night.

In the ninth with the game tied at three, Kyle Battle was hit by a pitch on the arm to place the go-ahead run on base. The next batter, Spencer Jones, singled to left field to put runners at first and second and just one out. Cowles then laced a 2-2 pitch from Peyton Williams (1-1) to right-center to score Battle and deliver the 'Gades a 4-3 win. For the Renegades, it was their fourth walk-off win of the season, and second in as many nights.

Rome began the scoring in the first with a run against Juan Carela on a sacrifice fly from Keshawn Ogans. Carela dazzled after that, tying his career-highs of 7.0 innings and 10 strikeouts. It was the third straight start for Carela that he has fanned 10 batters, and he became the first Renegades pitcher to strike out 10-or-more batted in three straight starts in team history. Additionally, the 21-year-old starter has allowed three or fewer hits in three of his last four starts.


### Lila Quinn, Valedictorian

# Hudson Highlands Trail to take 'trail-first' approach to implementation

Hudson Highlands Fjord Trail, Inc. (HHFT) announced that it will focus exclusively on implementing the proposed 7.5-mile main trail connecting the City of Beacon to the Village of Cold Spring, associated parking areas, trailhead entries, and its visitor center, suspending development of any additional project elements. This represents the latest refinement of the project as it continues to evolve as a visitation management strategy through data, community input, and expert advice.

Additional enhancements in the 2020 Draft Master Plan, including a play area and an outdoor classroom at Little Stony Point, as well as forest nets and a swimming area, will not be included in the pending Generic Environmental Impact Statement (GEIS). Further enhancements will be considered only after construction of the main trail is complete – currently projected for 2031 – and subsequent tourism trends and community needs can be analyzed. Any future enhancements will undergo their own specific environmental review process.

Christopher Davis, HHFT Board Chair, and Philipstown resident said, "Members of the community first envisioned the Fjord Trail nearly twenty years ago as a solution to safety concerns around Breakneck Ridge and on Morris Avenue/Route 9D, and related impacts on the Cold Spring and Nelsonville village centers. Since then, we have shaped and reshaped the vision to

ensure the proposed project delivers on that community vision. Many of the program spaces were included to accommodate existing local uses of areas within the park, but we want to proceed with care to ensure we don't inadvertently add to visitation and congestion. The focused and strategic approach we are now proposing ensures that we achieve the vision and provide managed access to this beautiful Highlands region that we and our partners have spent so many years working on."

"Over the past year, HHFT has hosted or attended twenty public meetings or events and numerous listening sessions to gather input. As visitor counts continue to increase, it is clear the project needs to prioritize visitation management to help mitigate the impacts of existing and projected tourism on local communities and the landscape," said HHFT Executive Director Amy Kacala. "By taking a 'trail first' approach, we are reaffirming our top priority: managing visitation to existing destinations in the Hudson Highlands State Park Preserve and the related impacts on the Village of Cold Spring. This has always been the core goal of the project."

Work on the environmental review continues and will include additional opportunities for local communities to weigh in. HHFT has invited each of the project-area communities — Cold Spring, Nelsonville, Philipstown, Beacon, and Fishkill — to name representatives to a

Visitation Data Committee that will help review the ongoing traffic study, pedestrian counts, and visitation projection for the project. This committee will be granted a stipend to engage a third-party consultant to lend technical capacity to their review.

The work of the Visitation Data Committee and HHFT's visitation management consultants will be shared with the community for input and comment in a series of three meetings to be held this fall. These meetings will enable the community to learn about and comment on: (1) routes through the Village of Cold Spring that were considered and which of those remain technically viable; (2) the visitation projection, how it was developed, and what visitation management techniques might be employed to help manage visitors, and; (3) view a live model, based on projections, of how visitors would move through the Village under different route alternatives. Details on the upcoming workshop series will be announced over the summer.

HHFT Board member and Cold Spring resident Richard Shea said, "HHFT is demonstrating through these actions the degree to which we listen to and incorporate community input. The work of the data committee and the fall public meeting series will be additional opportunities for dialogue. I urge all to join in these important conversations to find the best solution for the villages, town, and region."

The Hudson Highlands Fjord Trail offers a solution for managing tourism in the region and will make the beauty that surrounds us more accessible to people of all ages and abilities, including and particularly local residents. The proposed main trail is intended to reduce visitor overcrowding and relieve traffic congestion by providing six access points across its 7.5-mile route; sidewalks from train to trail; public restrooms at each trailhead, open from dawn to dusk; four parking lots at trailhead entries at Notch, Dutchess Manor, Breakneck Connector, and Little Stony Point; a shuttle van system to help alleviate traffic and encourage public transportation use; trash and recycling collection along the trail; and a Visitor Center at Dutchess Manor.

Last month, Hudson Highlands Fjord Trail, Inc. announced that it had hired ORCA Consulting (ORCA) as its visitation management advisor to support ongoing efforts to help refine the plan and develop operational strategies to help mitigate impacts of high visitation on Cold Spring, Philipstown, Nelsonville, and the Hudson Highlands State Park Preserve. As experienced visitation management experts with three decades in the field, ORCA will work with HHFT to employ state-of-the-art tools and strategies, in collaboration with municipal, state, and other partners, to effectively manage visitation in local communities and major trailheads of the Hudson Highlands State Park Preserve.

### New Veterans One Stop Building continues to excite

Since Dutchess County Veterans' Services relocated its offices to Mental Health America (MHA) of Dutchess County's (MHA) Veterans One Stop at 1335 Route 44 in Pleasant Valley in January, the number of veterans visiting the new campus has steadily increased. In fact, we've seen a three-fold increase in walk-in traffic to our new offices.

The new Veterans One Stop, owned and operated by Mental Health American (MHA) of Dutchess County, houses our Division of Veterans' Services, Hudson Valley Veterans Alliance and the Veterans Sportsmen Association, and is designed for vets seeking help in so many areas. Our office at Veterans' Services helps vets with claims applications, referrals, receiving burial benefits, filing discharge papers, applying for medals, obtaining New York State property tax exemptions and much more. MHA offers the Vet2Vet program – I mentioned that great program in last month's column – as well as housing and employment assistance, suicide prevention services, multiple artistic therapy programs and many other services.

The 10,000-square-foot structure is also easily accessible, making it even easier for veterans to come here. In addition to having a dedicated bus stop via Dutchess County Transit's Route D, the facility has ample parking for those who drive. Not having to navigate the parking situation that was required at our former location in the City of Poughkeepsie is a big driver for the increased traffic at our new offices. We would often make referrals to the vets who came to our offices, only to later discover they didn't follow through on that referral because they didn't want to make several stops or pay for parking multiple times. This, along with our staff no longer working out of cubicles but having personal offices with doors that close for privacy, has created a relaxed and safe environment for those visiting the service center.

The new site also features several large rooms for health and wellness classes, movie nights, dance and art instruction plus several sizable conference rooms and spacious wheelchair-accessible bathrooms for those who need the space to maneuver. New floors and walls have been completed, and the One Stop houses

a fully stocked food pantry, as well as a clothing and supplies closet for veterans needing assistance in those areas.

The sky is the limit in what we hope to accomplish at the site to support our veterans. We are always exploring new options and implementing new techniques as we listen to, and communicate with, those who come to the One Stop location. I hope those reading this column who haven't visited us yet do so, and I ask those of you who may know friends or family members who might benefit from the services to encourage them to stop in.

Everyone at the Veterans One Stop, including us here at Veterans' Services and our neighboring partners, strives to deliver a professional and personalized analysis for veterans and their families so they get the services they need and the benefits they've earned from their years of service to our country.

Remember, you must apply to receive these benefits; they are not automatic. Please call us at 845-486-2060 for an appointment or find more information at dutchessny.gov/veterans.

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

The clubhouse manager has been busy. And he will continue to be busy for this level of baseball and the Hudson Valley Renegades.

The Renegades are the High Class A farm Club of the New York Yankees. At this level of minor league baseball, it's very transient. You're either moving up or you're demoted.

Only two-and-a-half months into the season, the Renegades have had more than 20 roster moves. The latest was left-handed pitcher Josh Maciejewski, who was transferred to the Triple-A Scranton/Wilkes-Barre RailRiders after a short rehabilitation stint. The Renegades roster currently stands at the South Atlantic League maximum of 30 Active, 3 Injured List, and 1 Minor League rehab.

The most notable, of course, was the promotion of Aaron Palensky, who was leading the league in homeruns at the time he was called up to Double-A.

"It's not a place where you set down roots," manager Sergio Santos said with a smile.

"Look, it's a beautiful area with a beautiful ballpark and great fans," outfielder Spencer Jones said. "But the whole idea is to move up and move on."

Jones is the only Renegades player who

has appeared in 50-plus games. At this level, the old baseball idiom is true. You can't tell the players without a scorecard.

It makes it more difficult for fans to follow the team.

"We're not selling baseball, per se," said general manager Tyson Jeffers. "We're selling the entertainment value of a night out with the family."

That's why you see so many promotions, giveaways, and such things as fireworks at minor league baseball games across the country. Hey, where else can you go to see a lady shot out of a cannon and watch a baseball game at the same time? Yes, in the past, the Renegades have hosted the Dynamite Lady, who shoots herself out of a cannon on the field.

"This is like a weigh station," Santos said. "Hopefully, it's another rung on the ladder. You can't become too attached to a place, no matter how great it is, at this level."

Just don't tell that to Wade Miley. The star reliever once pitched for the renegade before moving all the way up and eventually getting traded to the World Series champion Kansas City Royals. While he was here, however, he met a girl from Marlboro and got married.

Talk about becoming attached.



May. Hopefully we will have look back at the end of the year and say we had a successful season and right now that's looking very promising.


**Are there any memorable moments for you from the first half of this season?**

BOCES BERC Campus). The program is modeled after Astor's existing PHP in Poughkeepsie, New York, which provides short-term intensive therapeutic treatment to youth 11 – 18 years old who are struggling at home, at school or in the community. The programs primarily use an evidence-based treatment model, Dialectic Behavioral Therapy (DBT), which has been shown to be effective for people of all ages.

The PHP can support a youth and their family at any point in their mental health and/or substance use treatment, whether it is their first time participating in services or they are transitioning from another program. The program helps youth learn to

safely manage their emotions to prevent out-of-home placement to psychiatric hospitals and other residential programs.

## About the Counseling Centers and School-based Programs

In Sullivan County, Astor will be opening a counseling center at the Family Services building in Liberty this summer. In addition, Astor is in conversations with the school districts throughout Sullivan County about school-based behavioral health services.
