The 45th annual Spirit of Beacon has a new leader. It was announced at the recent City Council meeting on July 5 that Katie Hellmuth Martin, who is with "A Little Beacon Blog," has agreed to take the chair position. The announcement was made by Gwenno James. James has been organizing the event with a committee of volunteers for the past four years.

"I just wanted to come here to give an update on Spirit of Beacon Day," James told the council members.

James continued, "We had great response since that time. I want to thank you for the outreach you have done."

The team is in place for September, it was stated.

"Gwenno thank you for stepping up a few years ago," Martin said. Martin noted that James was given assistance from the prior committee members and now James is helping the new committee members.

Spirit of Beacon Day has a website, Facebook page and GoFundMe page.

Martin said she is humble and excited to work with the community.

James announced she that would be unable to continue in the Spirit of Beacon Day position at a Council meeting held in June. More than 100 organizations take part in the annual event. James became the Chair after her predecessor, Rose Story, decided to

Decommissioned Downstate Correctional Facility set for filming

The decommissioned Downstate Correctional Facility, on Red Schoolhouse Road in Fishkill, will be used for filming from July 13 to August 1. Other locations being used are in Beacon and Warwick, according to a casting call from Rita Powers Casting Group.

"I can only say that prison locations are ideal for Narrative Films and TV shows. We are working with four potential productions, and hope to be able to bring economic development to the region by referring films and TV shows to the Department of Corrections, which still oversees the property," said Laurent Rejto, with the Hudson Valley Film Commission.

Production called for union and non-union talent to play extras and possibly day players.

Production was seeking all ethnic types to fill the following roles:

- Corrections officers
- Prisoners
- Theater actors
- Church ladies
- Diner patrons

Rita Powers, with Rita Powers Casting Group, said, "The casting has blown up. I have over 600 submissions and counting! [I] Love Beacon and Dutchess!"

"DOCCS (Department of Corrections and Community Supervision) works cooperatively with the Office of General Services (OGS) and Empire State Development (ESD) to facilitate the reuse of the closed facilities," said Thomas Mailey, with DOCCS, via email.

Mailey noted that Gov. Kathy Hochul has convened a prison redevelopment commission. Downstate facility was one of six prisons in the state that was to be decommissioned, which was announced in late Nov. 2021. In March, DOCCS said the facility was closed.

Dutchess County Executive Marc Molinaro said, "Film and TV production have certainly discovered what we have known all along, there is no place like Dutchess County! Our picturesque vistas, talented people, unique buildings, easily accessible transportation network and proximity to NYC and so many other reasons have all made Dutchess County a



sought-after destination for movie, television and video production.” Molinaro added: “It is thrilling to see the people and places of Dutchess County as we watch HBO series, Hallmark Channel productions and feature films on the big screen.”

Mailey remarked, “DOCCS regularly works with news media outlets, as well as film production companies, providing backgrounds for movies and documentaries, where and when it can be done safely.”

“It is no way meant to be an option for reuse, unless it is sold to a company, such as Broadway Stages, who purchased the former Arthur Kill Correctional facility in Staten Island,” Mailey added.

Legislature committee votes down warning sign proposal at gun shops

The Dutchess County Legislature’s Government Services and Administration Committee voted down a proposal by a 7-4-1 margin on Thursday, July 7 for a local law to implement the posting of warning signs anywhere a gun can be purchased within the County.

The proposed signs would have addressed the relationship between gun ownership and violence in the home.

The Democratic caucus introduced the legislation last month, asking for bipartisan support. Thursday night’s vote prevented the proposal from coming to the floor at this past Monday’s full board meeting.

“This law will fail to achieve its purported purpose and will spread dangerously misleading claims about suicide, and will harass legitimate gun dealers and Dutchess County residents at the same time. It will implicitly blame gun owners and gun sellers for raising the suicide rate, holding them responsible for suicide when the data shows otherwise,” said Legislator Will Truitt of Hyde Park, majority leader.

Minority Leader Yvette Valdés Smith said, “This common sense gun safety measure would have protected the public by warning of the dangers associated with owning a firearm while simultaneously encouraging the use of our 24/7 Dutchess County HELPLINE. This law isn’t about reducing firearm ownership, it is about education and awareness and it could have

saved lives.”

Legislator Brennan Kearney (D-Rhinebeck) stated, “Dutchess County had the opportunity to become a leader in the public health movement by addressing gun violence danger through signage. I am disappointed that neither a single Republican legislator, nor a single Republican in County leadership would even consider this legislation.”

Legislature Chairman Gregg Pulver said “Anyone who doesn’t think that mental health is a big part of this problem is mistaken. That’s why I’m proud that Dutchess County is taking the lead in New York State in sponsoring a Stabilization Center to help those with mental health struggles, and work toward preventing violence in the community. The Stabilization Center at 230 North Road, Poughkeepsie is a great example of such a facility, where people looking for help can find it.”

The proposed sign, according to the Democratic Caucus would have read, “Access to a weapon or firearm in the home significantly increases the risk of suicide, homicide, death during domestic disputes and unintentional deaths to children, household members and others. If you or a loved one is experiencing distress and/or depression, call the Dutchess County Helpline at 845-485-9700 or the national suicide hotline at 988.”



July 16 event in Amenia to reveal rich mosaic of rural life in early DC

The public is cordially invited to the gathering of descendants of Amenia's Bockee family (pronounced boh-KAY) at the historic Smithfield Church in Amenia on Saturday, July 16, at 2 p.m. It is offered as a live, in-person event only and includes refreshments and a display of historical items.

The Dutchess County Historical Society (DCHS) and Amenia Historical Society (AHS) co-host the event since both organizations have important collections related to the family.

The talk will be given by DCHS and AHS Trustee Betsy Strauss, DCHS Collections Chair & Trustee Melodye Moore, and DCHS Executive Director Bill Jeffway. There will be questions and an opportunity for discussion and refreshments in the historic church, a beautiful setting for historical items which rarely leave the protective confines of DCHS and AHS archives.

The period of time we will examine ranges from the late 17th century, when the Bockee family first purchased 350 acres in the area in 1698 (they actually built a home and settled around 1761) through to the end of the Civil War, and

into the mid 20th century.

As talented, educated, community-oriented establishment figures with means, the family could have chosen to live in Poughkeepsie or New York City, and for certain periods of time, certain family members did. But essentially, over the centuries the family chose to live a rural life.

Those not familiar with the area or its history, may be surprised that any rural area could be at the intersection of major events like the Revolutionary War, the abolition of slavery, and the Civil War, or whose economy included lead mining and railroads.

Dutchess County life

This dynamic family gives us a rare view into the varied mosaic of Dutchess County life at the time. Stories include the situation of Indigenous Peoples. The area, in broad terms, was a border area with the Mohican to the north and the Wappinger to the south. Adjacent to the Bockee land in the early 1740s, there was a significant settlement of Moravian missionaries determined to convert Indigenous Peoples to Christianity. The story of its rise, and fall, tell us a lot about the challenges faced by Indigenous Peoples.

Women in the family were both determined to be well educated themselves, and determined to educate others. Men in the family, through political elections and legislation, and through service in the Civil War, sought to advance the end of slavery in the United States. As was not uncommon at the time, the family advanced the abolition of slavery, but themselves enslaved men and women.

These intersections of politics, law, economics and social activity are physically manifested in the Federal Square, which we encourage attendees to visit after, along with a visit to the adjacent cemetery where family members are buried.

The highlights of the items on exhibition include the unveiling of the recently restored early 19th-century portraits of Abraham and Martha (Oakley) Bockee. The portraits were a recent gift to DCHS from Jean Oakley Winans Fisher in memory of Margaret Bockee Link. A successful fundraising drive allowed for their professional restoration. The wedding dress of Martha Bockee will be on display.

We will feature photographs of the Bockee family home taken from the landmark 1931 Dutchess County Doorways by Helen Wilkinson Reynolds and photographer Margaret DeMott Brown.

Attendees will also see the medical chest used by Dr. Jacob Bockee in the military hospital in New Orleans where he served with his wife and daughters. After the war, the active leadership of the

family and family economy was taken over by Catharine, who established a school for young ladies in Poughkeepsie. Of special interest is the beautiful satin quilt made by students of her students. Viewers will be able to admire the fine needlework, as well as the personal messages and names of students embroidered on each quilt square.

For those of us who still have not ventured out a lot given the pandemic and may hesitate, we believe a physical trip to the Smithfield Church is well worth the trip on the 16th.

During a 1926 DCHS pilgrimage for members that included a trip to the Smithfield Church and nearby Troutbeck estate, under the heading of "the value of local history" the philosopher and author Lewis Mumford spoke to the audience about what he saw as the power of being physically present in local history.

I paraphrase for brevity: "Local history touches on things that have happened on the spot, and local history becomes part of our life in a way that is not possible from if taken only from books and secondhand accounts. Things we can see and touch are the things that awaken our imagination."

Two former Renegades chosen for Futures Game

Two former players for the Hudson Valley Renegades – and one player with the potential to be assigned to the New York Yankees' High Class A farm team in Dutchess County in the very near future – have been chosen to participate in the prestigious Futures Game on Saturday, July 16.

The Futures Game is held in conjunction with the annual Major League Baseball All-Star Game. The Futures Game showcases young talent that is expected to make the big leagues in short order. The game is on July 16 at Dodger Stadium in Los Angeles.

The Futures Game is set up much the same as the All-star game, American vs. National, although the game is only seven innings instead of the traditional nine. It will be broadcast live on the Peacock Network at 7 p.m.

Former Renegades Anthony Volpe and Ken Waldichuk, and potential

Renegade Jasson Dominguez, will represent the New York Yankees.

Volpe, a shortstop, plays with the Double-A team in Somerset, New Jersey after starting at Hudson Valley last year. Volpe is considered the No. 8 prospect in all of baseball out of thousands currently playing in the minor leagues. According to MLB Pipeline, Volpe is also considered the No. 1 prospect among all Yankee minor leaguers. After a slow start, Volpe is hitting .245 with 11 home runs and 44 RBI.

Waldichuk, a left-handed pitcher, is with the Yankees Triple-A team in Scranton-Wilkes Barre (Pa.). The lefty is currently 6-3 with a 2.44 ERA. He is the Yankees' fifth-best prospect and No. 74 overall in Major League Baseball.

Dominguez is in Low Class A ball in Tampa. The highly regarded outfielder is New York's third-best prospect and 40th best in baseball. He is hitting .267 with nine home runs and 35 RBI.

Eight is great as Renegades extend winning streak

The Hudson Valley Renegades finished off the first six-game series sweep in team history on Sunday afternoon as they defeated the Jersey Shore BlueClaws 9-6 in 11 innings. The Renegades have now won eight straight games.

One thing I wanted to discuss that we didn't have a chance to do was the Renegades' participation in the New York Yankees HOPE Week last month. The Yanks have done this for years in terms of giving back to the community. They expect their minor league teams to do it, but obviously because of COVID it wasn't done last year in 2021. What was it like this year?

For me, let me say that HOPE Week was something I always admired from afar. It's important to give back to the community. The Yankees have done a great job of doing that over the years and us becoming one of their affiliates (last year) made me not only think about it, but also made me really look forward to

actually participating in it.

What events did the Renegades participate in locally?

We did three, although one was partially postponed by weather. We went as a team to Hudson River Housing-Liberty Station and we met with some of the military veterans. There was a lot of interaction between them. Then we did our annual D3 event, which is Disability, Dream and Do, and that was our hallmark event. We had the entire team out on the field for a camp with children with special needs. It was really great. The kids went from station to station and our players were terrific with them. It really was just a great morning, and to see the kids and their families enjoying themselves, and seeing the players getting as much out of it as the kids, was really rewarding. And then we went to the Fishkill Food Pantry and donated our time there. We were going to follow it up with a food
