Farms diversify to survive and thrive

The family farm – it's the epitome of a small business enterprise. For those who love what they do, it's an idyllic lifestyle.

You're the boss. You can work as much (or little) as you want, but you still have to make a living – pay the bills, balance costs vs. income, support the family, pay for the kids' education – and the list goes on.

And somewhere in the equation, items like creativity, changing with the times and building relationships all go a long way into developing the successful small farm.

To get a taste of how area farmers are surviving and thriving, we are speaking to a variety of individuals – Uplands Farm in Verbank/Millbrook with dairy cattle, Clover Brooke Farm in Hyde Park with llamas, alpacas, goats and sheep, Hardeman Orchards in Red Hook with apples and peaches, and Hudson Valley Flower Farm in Beekman with a wide variety of cut flowers for gifts and much more.

Surviving and thriving is all about diversification and exploring opportunities to add income in non-traditional ways. Current examples include – weddings and a music venue at Hardeman Orchards, and llama/alpaca hikes, goat and donkey walks, plus soap-making, beer brewing and felt-ing/fiber arts classes at Clover Brooke Farm.

But success also comes from reaching beyond the Hudson Valley and setting yourself apart on the larger stage.

Mark Adams, President Emeritus of the Dutchess/Putnam/Westchester Farm Bureau said, "Local farms compete in a world marketplace. We pay about the same price for fertilizer, supplies, equipment and maybe energy as farms in other states."

"But labor is much more expensive in New York. Local farms have adapted by switching from labor-intensive crops like vegetables, to grain and hay, which are harvested by machine, plus beef cattle."

"We keep farming as long as we can make enough money to have a decent life - a home, food, a car, and maybe go to the movies once in a while."

World market place? Stephen Van Tassell, owner of Uplands Farm, noted "We developed a cow family which we were able to market worldwide as a source of top genetics in the Holstein industry. The cow family ranked at the top of the breed for components, such as butterfat and protein, which is still a huge benefit in our current market, giving us a large advantage over the average milk price."

And now let's take a look at each farm, focusing on history, costs and income and the lure of farming.

County to participate in Thanksgiving STOP-DWI enforcement campaign

Dutchess County Executive Marc Molinaro announced police agencies throughout Dutchess County will participate in a special enforcement effort to crack down on impaired driving to coincide with the national Thanksgiving holiday. The statewide STOP-DWI High Visibility Enforcement Campaign effort starts on Wednesday, Nov. 23rd and will end on Sunday, Nov. 27th.

The Dutchess County Sheriff’s Office, New York State Police and municipal law enforcement agencies will collaborate across the state and will be out in force in this coordinated effort to reduce the number of alcohol-related injuries and deaths during this period.

The Thanksgiving holiday period is among the most active on U.S. roadways, with the American Automobile Association estimating some 55 million motorists traveled for the holiday in 2019,

the vast majority of whom drove to their destination. According to the National Safety Council, 29 percent of driving fatalities during the 2019 Thanksgiving holiday period involved an alcohol-impaired driver.

County Executive Molinaro said, “Thanksgiving unites loved ones from across the miles to celebrate all our blessings as Americans. While many of these joyous gatherings may include alcohol, it’s incumbent on those imbibing to plan a safe ride home – both for their own safety and the safety of those with whom they share the road. There is no excuse for impaired driving, and as they do every day, the dedicated men and women of law enforcement will purge local roadways of inebriated motorists during the Thanksgiving weekend.”

The Thanksgiving Engagement Campaign is one of many statewide

enforcement initiatives promoted by the New York State STOP-DWI Association with additional funding from the STOP-DWI Foundation with a grant from the Governor’s Traffic Safety Committee. The Statewide STOP-DWI Crackdown Campaign also targets Super Bowl Sunday, Memorial Day weekend, 4th of July, Labor Day weekend, Halloween and national Holiday Season in December.

While STOP-DWI efforts across New York have led to significant reductions in the numbers of alcohol- and drug-related fatalities, still too many lives are being lost because of crashes caused by drunk or impaired drivers. Highly visible, highly publicized efforts like the STOP-DWI Crackdown Campaign aim to further reduce the incidence of drunk and impaired driving. Residents can make a difference with a sober plan by downloading the “Have a Plan” mobile app.

State Police arrest E.F. man on criminal possession of a weapon

The New York State Police announced the arrest of Essam A. Saleh, 29, of East Fishkill, for Criminal Possession of a Weapon in the third-degree, a class D felony on November 15.

According to a press release from State Police, at approximately 2:10 p.m., Troopers conducted a traffic stop on a 2015 Mercedes-Benz 500 on the Taconic State Parkway in East Fishkill for multiple vehicle and traffic law violations. An investigation determined the operator, Essam Saleh, was in illegal possession of a Palmetto State Armory PSAK-47 rifle, stated the release.

Saleh was issued an appearance ticket returnable to the town of East Fishkill Court on December 29.

"Uplands farm was purchased in 1922 by my Great Grandfather, a New York City businessman with no farm knowledge or experience. He brought my adult grandfather here to help. My father Henry was born and farmed lifelong. The early days were a subsistence model that helped the family survive the Great Depression. Over the decades, dairy became the focus as it remains today.

"I was born with a consuming desire to continue the dairy farm. I had the opportunity to breed and manage the herd to my desire. I married Jill and we chose to work solely on the farm with no off-farm jobs or support to raise our family in what I still feel was an idyllic lifestyle.

"The economic conditions during that period changed dramatically, including dismal margins due to low milk price and an increased requirement for cash/income to cover real estate taxes that went from \$800 annually in the 1970s to near \$30,000 today. We also had a young and extended family to support.

"We have developed business relationships, which continue to help keep us viable. I consider myself one of the most fortunate people in the history of man. I wake every morning looking forward to the day ahead. I have never been hungry and I have been surrounded by some of the finest people around the world through a lifetime in the dairy business. Uplands Farm remains an important core to a diverse group of family and friends and I hope it lasts forever."

Clover Brooke Farm – Andrea Parent-Tibbets

"As first generation farmers, my husband and I started our farming journey in 2016 with much to learn about farming and long-term sustainability as our goal. Our first major project was rebuilding the century old dairy farm that had not been managed for 30 years, prior to our purchase. Rebuilding infrastructure on the farm, clearing pastures, installing over 5,000 feet of fencing, repairing/rebuilding barns, building animal shelters and improving soil health for long-term grazing/crop production, while tackling most of the projects ourselves to save on outside labor costs, consumed all of our savings.

"We have learned that diversification is paramount to the survival of most businesses and farming is no different. We recognized we had to find ways to recover some of our costs to continue our projects that we had envisioned for the farm. We looked at ways to use the assets we had invested in (beautiful bucolic farm, friendly animals, past careers in education and finance) and decided to open our farm up to visitors.

"We jumped into social media at record speed, establishing our presence on an assortment of online platforms, networked to spread our name, collaborated with like-minded organizations, and developed a 'Virtual Farm Visit Experience' during COVID, which was picked up by national media.

"We raise llamas, alpacas, sheep and goats, producing luxurious yarns and other fiber products for sale. We also offer Llamaste Yoga and Lavender Loofahs and have partnered with Fearless Farmers, Inc. to offer Regenerative Farming classes for summer campers and elementary school groups. We welcome



over 4,500 visitors a year to the farm who enjoy our many experiences, becoming an Agri-tourism destination for many looking to vacation in The Hudson Valley.

*"Farm on!"***Hardeman Orchards – John Hardeman**

"I grew up on the farm I currently operate. My father managed it until he retired and then I managed it until I bought my own orchard. In the late 1990s, with Scenic Hudson's pilot program to purchase development rights to protect farmland, I was able to buy this farm. "I operated both orchards, which were about 100 acres in production, and then sold the remote orchard to reduce the debt load and focus on the home orchards. Over time as the dynamic of the apple industry changed (a slump in apple prices, government regulations, loss of local support businesses) the larger orchards got bigger and smaller ones diversified or closed.

"I scaled back the orchard to retail and pick-your-own and started to make hay, grow some corn and lease out land to a neighbor to grow barley for the local malt/beer companies.

"I have recently started to use one of my barns as a seasonal music venue and for weddings as a way to supplement farm income.

"It has become more difficult to move a large amount of apples by retail. I rarely sell bushels, half bushels or even quarter bushels (the latter being about 12 lbs.) of apples as people don't cook and bake as much as they used to and tend to buy a few apples at the supermarket. Also, the fruit choices at big stores has increased (years ago it was apples, citrus and bananas) due to global trade.

"I never started farming to get rich, but more as a lifestyle. I enjoy the seasonal diversity, working outside, the connection to the environment, planting and nurturing crops to production and supplying food to people."

Hudson Valley Flower Farm – Shelley Wollert

Wollert visited a U-Pick cut flower farm with friends (and sisters) Christina and Clarice Jensen in September of 2021. They were all so moved by the experience, they decided to start their own business as a cut-flower growing collective, farming on their individual properties in Beekman, Beacon and Hillsdale and combining the fruits of their labor.

Wollert left her 10-year career as a technical project manager to spearhead

the creation of Hudson Valley Flower Farm. While friends thought it was an unpredictable departure, Wollert's family has roots in farming all the way back to her grandmother in New Zealand, who was a "land girl" during WWII, growing local produce. Wollert also had a career as a children's music artist and actress, and brings her artistic sensibilities to her floral arrangements and handmade gifts.

"It's definitely been a challenge to bal-

ance investing in the farm vs. profits, especially since this was our first year and we had a lot of start-up costs. But I am optimistic that we have found an enthusiastic and appreciative market here in the Hudson Valley for local cut flowers that will continue to grow," said Wollert.

"This year was our first season at Hudson Valley Flower Farm, so we are learning a lot about growing in a sustainable way - making sure to nourish the soil and our pollinators to maintain a balanced ecosystem. In planning for next season, we looked at which varieties of flowers did particularly well for us and we are also appealing to buyers. We are focused on growing more of what works in order to make the most of what we can produce on our parcels."

Hudson Valley Flower Farm offers local, sustainable flowers and handmade gifts in custom arrangements for purchase, for special events large and small, and wholesale to premium local shops, florists, and businesses.

"Like so many people," said Wollert, "living through the pandemic has made me rethink just about everything. There was a reshuffling of priorities and a yearning more than ever to make beautiful things that spark human connection and happiness. Hudson Valley Flower Farm is that happy place for me."

Budget Committee of Legislature amends, advances 2023 county budget

- \$150,000 in additional funding for the Office of the Aging's community outreach, for \$246,500 total.
- \$4,000 in additional funding for the Dutchess County Behavioral & Community Health Department's Veterinary Services, for \$22,000 total.
- \$25,000 in additional funding for the Sheriff Department's SPCA program, for \$103,000 total.
- \$50,000 in additional funding for Emergency Response in the professional service program, for \$298,883 total.





County to host 6th Annual 'ThinkDIFFERENTLY' Conference

Dutchess County will host the sixth annual Collaboration of Services and Care Across the Life Span for People of All Abilities ThinkDIFFERENTLY conference on December 2 at 9 a.m. The conference will be held in a hybrid format, both in person at The Henry A. Wallace Center at the FDR Presidential Library and Home located at 4079 Albany Post Road in Hyde Park and virtually on Microsoft Teams. The event is for families and providers to discuss planning care for someone with intellectual and developmental disabilities. Registration is required and can be done at dutchessny.gov/tdconference.

County Executive Molinaro said, "Dutchess County puts emphasis on supporting those of all abilities and our goal is helping families navigate through life

and be aware of the many programs and services available to them. Bringing providers and families together is a great way to continue the conversation on best practices and decide where there may be room for improvement. As we launch the development of our All Abilities Action Plan, we are thrilled to host this collaborative event for those with disabilities and service providers."

Dutchess County's Director of Emergency Management Bill Beale will provide the keynote presentation, discussing emergency preparedness with a focus on those with disabilities. He will address families that may include a person with special needs and how they can prepare themselves to assist their loved ones during an emergency.

Throughout the afternoon, guest

speakers will share insight and discuss resources and services valuable to residents of all abilities during different periods in their lives.

Presentation topics include:

- Early Intervention (EI) and Preschool: discuss processes and differences in evaluation from EI to Preschool for speech and other services.
- The IEP and 504: how to seamlessly navigate these processes and programs.
- Transition Planning: providing information on the support and services available during transitional periods for those ages 15-21.
- Adult Opportunities: providing opportunities for adults of all abilities such as the ThinkAHEAD college program through Dutchess Community College or employment opportunities in programs such as "Think Jobs."

The afternoon will conclude with an "open discussion" for parents, where they will have the opportunity to speak with other parents, ask questions, and gather information to better serve their family members with intellectual and developmental disabilities.

Dutchess County All-Abilities Director Dana Hopkins shared, "The annual ThinkDIFFERENTLY conference is a day that many in our community look forward to. Attendees can hear from and speak directly to the providers that serve their family members. I truly believe there is

such value in that. Each year we have received positive feedback that attendees have left with a wealth of knowledge. On the other side, community providers, benefit from hearing from families and caretakers on current needs as it enables us to best serve our residents of all abilities."

Molinaro recently presented his proposed 2023 budget that included Dutchess County's forthcoming ThinkDIFFERENTLY All Abilities Action Plan. 


CCEDC provides key resources to help agricultural community

Cornell Cooperative Extension Dutchess County (CCEDC) offers the local agricultural community the resources that are needed in order to survive, which are especially important during tough economic times.

"Much of what we do is through one-on-one conversations as each operation has specific needs and challenges," said Jennifer Fimbrel, Dutchess County Agricultural Navigator.

She said the hot topics for 2022 were rising fertilizer costs, Highly Pathogenic Avian Influenza (HPAI), the lack of USDA slaughter facilities and start-up farms.

"I am asked at least twice a week about how a landowner can reduce their taxes through adding a farming venture or from new farmers looking to acquire farmland," she said. "CCEDC is part of the American Farmland Trust NY's Regional Navigator network. Through their website 'Farmland For A New Generation NY,' we are able to provide them with an entire network of farmers looking to farm. We also offer landowners information on how farm lease works here in the Hudson Valley, ventures that might work best on their soils and should they farm the land themselves or find a farmer to work the land independently."

Fimbrel said (HPAI) or bird flu has been, and continues to be an issue in NYS.

"By keeping not only commercial poultry producers informed about preventing HPAI in their flocks, but also home flocks, we only had one case in Dutchess County," she said. "HPAI is a real threat to those who depend on poultry for eggs, meat and breeding stock."

It isn't going away and we partner with our colleagues from around the state and NYS Agriculture and Markets for reporting and preventing HPAI in our domestic flocks."

Fertilizer costs were at an all-time high this past year and farmers were concerned how to best mitigate the risks of producing at higher costs or reducing yields on their products. "We discussed with individual farmers about the spring fertilizer costs, where costs might be cut and the ramifications on yields, giving them the tools they need to make decisions about their crops," said Fimbrel.

The lack of local slaughter facilities has been a constant discussion, according to Fimbrel. "We encouraged partnerships between farmers to ease travel time and keep the food system moving. Slaughterhouses are not an easy sell in many parts of the county and finding labor is even more difficult. The pieces aren't all there, but we have been working on it."

She said CCEDC's partnership with Dutchess County for the Ag Navigator program has again offered the "Farming in Dutchess" virtual series. Topics have been of interest to a variety of people, including school districts, municipal officials, farmers and landowners.

"We also work with municipal officials when they have questions about what qualifies as agriculture, building permit fees, zoning and Agriculture Valued Assessment," said Fimbrel. "Agriculture is not an easy business and we at CCEDC offer the resources to allow our farmers to make the decisions that best suit their operations."

More than 200 supporters attended the Beacon Historical Society's sixth annual "Beacons of History" Awards on Nov. 10. The recognition honors those who have made substantial contributions to Beacon and who have helped to preserve its history and sense of community:

Organizational Honoree:
Melzingah Chapter of the Daughters of the American Revolution

Founded in 1895 by Katherine Wolcott Verplanck, the Melzingah Chapter of the Daughters of the American Revolution is one of the most active DAR chapters in the

nation. It is most notably known for its rescue of the c. 1709 Madam Brett Homestead from demolition in 1954, when plans called for a supermarket to be built on the site; it is not only the house of our community's first European settler but also the oldest building in Dutchess County. In addition to operating the property as a house museum, the DAR chapter has long promoted local history, including its erection of the Mount Beacon Monument in 1900 and donation of the George Washington Bust in 1999. Members also volunteer at Castle Point VA Medical Center, organize Main Street banners to recognize veterans, conduct history essay contests and complete other service work as part of a worldwide service organization committed to promoting historic preservation, education and patriotism.

Individual Honoree:

Anthony Lassiter

Born in Highland Hospital in 1947, Tony was educated in the Beacon City Schools and drafted into the Army as a combat engineer. In February 1969, Sgt. Lassiter was sent to Vietnam, where he was injured by hostile forces six months later. Awarded a Purple Heart, he was honorably discharged in November. Tony then enjoyed a 30-year career at IBM, served as a Sergeant with the Dutchess Co. Sheriff's Office and volunteered for 15 years on the Beacon Planning Board. He also volunteers on the City's Housing Authority, as Vice Commander of American Legion Post 203, Quartermaster of the VFW (Military Order of the Purple Heart), Treasurer for the Beacon Lions Club and with the St. Andrew's/St. Luke's Church Food Pantry and the Spirit of Beacon Day Committee.

"As a special surprise at the event, U.S. Army Command Sgt. Major Robert Jenks presented, on behalf of the Secretary of Defense, a special commendation to Tony and 10 other Vietnam-era veterans in the

audience to commemorate the 50th anniversary of the Vietnam War through a Department of Defense program that seeks to properly welcome these men and women home decades after their return from war," said Beacon Historical Society President Diane Lapis. "It was very moving, and a wonderful testament to Beacon's sense of community to see these men recognized."

The event was a friend- and fund-raiser for the Historical Society. Special appreciation is extended to the five Mount Beacon-level sponsorships that ensured its success: City of Beacon Housing Authority, Art & Mary Lou Johnson, Karen & Denny Meyer, The Roundhouse at Beacon Falls and the VanBuren Family. The Beacon Historical Society was founded in 1976 to "preserve, procure and present whatever may relate to the natural and cultural history" of Beacon. Its collection includes books, records, manuscripts, newspapers, photographs, maps, genealogies, portraits, relics, letters, journals, etc., and its purpose remains to educate the public and foster an awareness of Beacon's history.
