Williams never lost sight of Bill's dream to host an event that could bring the community together. The nostalgia was not lost on Williams that this concert could be a great salute to some of the older Veterans from both WWII and the Korean War.

Williams has now hit the ground running to make Bill's dream come true.

The Red Hook VFW Post 7765 is hosting "The Gene Krupa Story" led by Arthor Von Blomberg on Saturday, Oct. 1, at the new Red Hook High School Auditorium. Performance starts at 4 p.m. and doors will open 3 p.m.

The Post is seeking local sponsorships and donations to help underwrite the cost of the event. The goal is to allow all Veterans and senior citizens to attend the event free of charge. Unreserved general admission tickets are available for a \$50 donation. Discounted tickets for high school students 18 yrs and under are available for \$20.

**Southlands Foundation honors caring leader 'Farmer Lenny'**

Hudson Valley communities have long been blessed with caring and generous leaders. The most impressive tend to be the ones who give generously of time and energy, sharing a boundless love of people and of the land.

In that pantheon of Hudson Valley heroes, Rhinebeck's Lenny Miller is very near the top. He's spent much of the last 30-plus years sharing his love of the land and of animals, and of people with countless visitors, especially children, to the Southlands Foundation near Rhinebeck. He was recently honored at the annual Southlands Foundation Gala.

The Southlands Foundation (TSF) in Rhinebeck is a not-for-profit organization providing a historical and agrarian connection to the community, cultivating respect and love for the land and its animals through education, conservation and outdoor recreation.

TSF teaches horseback riding, horsemanship, and the love, understanding and skillful care of horses to adults and children. They offer horse stables, indoor and outdoor riding arenas and horse show opportunities. In addition, their 200 acres are open to the public for miles of trails to ride or walk.

2022 Foundation Gala Committee member, Susan Williamson, in her remarks at the Gala, noted "Today we celebrate our 2022 Community Hero Honoree - Lenny Miller. Lenny has given back not only to the TSF community, but the entire Rhinebeck community in so many ways over the years. His accolades and awards are abundant, because he brings such a giving soul and joy of life to all he does. Lenny's special place at Southlands started when he met our

founder, Ms. Dows, and grew with her and with Southlands over our 40 year history as a not for profit. Lenny will always be our hero."

Lenny has been the face of Southlands for countless guests, especially for visiting school groups. The nursery school

kids were among his favorites.

"I'd be there to greet them when they arrived," he recalls. "I'd have a couple of miniature horses or miniature donkeys.

# Updated COVID-19 booster available locally

With the head of the World Health Organization recently claiming the end of the COVID-19 pandemic is “within sight,” individuals are still urged to protect themselves from serious illness or death from the virus. Eligibility for the updated COVID-19 boosters has been provided by the federal Food & Drug Administration (FDA):

- Individuals 18 years of age and older are eligible for a single booster dose of the Moderna COVID-19 Vaccine,

Bivalent if it has been at least two months since they have completed primary vaccination or have received the most recent booster dose with any authorized or approved monovalent COVID-19 vaccine.

- Individuals 12 years of age and older are eligible for a single booster dose of the Pfizer-BioNTech COVID-19 Vaccine, Bivalent if it has been at least two months since they have completed primary vaccination or have received the most recent booster dose with any authorized or approved monovalent

COVID-19 vaccine.

The term “bivalent” refers to the updated booster containing two messenger RNA (mRNA) components of SARS-CoV-2 (COVID-19) virus, one of the original strain of SARS-CoV-2 and the other one in common between the BA.4 and BA.5 lineages of the omicron variant of SARS-CoV-2.

Vaccine boosters are available at many locations, including Dutchess County’s Family Health Clinic at the Family Partnership Center in Poughkeepsie (appointments required), and local phar-

macies and healthcare organizations. Colleen Pillus, communications director for the County Executive’s office, noted that residents can make an appointment at the county’s clinic by calling (845) 485-3535 or emailing [clinics@dutchessny.gov](mailto:clinics@dutchessny.gov). To find pharmacies/retailers offering the bivalent booster near you, you can use [www.vaccines.gov](http://www.vaccines.gov) and plug in your zip code for a quick list of where it is available.

Quartermaster Richard Wambach. “This is a wonderful opportunity for people of all ages to come together to salute and celebrate the Veterans considered to be part of ‘The Greatest Generations.’”

According to Arthor von Blomberg, the show’s creator, producer, and guest drummer, “The Gene Krupa Story is a two-hour Big Band Swing Show honoring the musical achievements of the world’s most famous drummer, Gene Krupa.”

The show includes original arrangements made famous by Krupa, including “Drum Boogie,” “Let Me Off Uptown,” “Drummer Boy,” “Drummin’ Man,” “Opus One,” “How High The Moon,” “Sing Sing Sing,” and many more. Vocalist Amy Bright will sing, and von Blomberg will be featured as the show’s guest artist on the drums.

Krupa, known in musical circles as

“the man who made drums a solo instrument,” was a standout, flamboyant drummer, composer, and bandleader who produced music from the 1930s until his death in 1973. In 1959, Krupa’s life story was memorialized in the film “The Gene Krupa Story” starring Sal Mineo; the promotional material for the movie hails Krupa as “the man who hammered out the savage tempo of the jazz era.”

True to Krupa’s reputation for spirited live performance, audience members of all ages can expect a thrilling, high-energy performance with von Blomberg leading the charge on drums.

“Swing music, in its day, represented 75 percent of the world of pop music back in the 1940s,” von Blomberg said. “I’m finding that many young people, thanks to the Internet, are listening. And they don’t necessarily think of it as old music, just different and fresh.”

I'd introduce myself, tell them about Southlands and introduce the little animals. Then I'd confess that I needed some help. We had to get the animals back to the barn and maybe they could help me lead them there."

From that point, the kids were enchanted and already falling in love with animals and with the land.

"I remember, some of the little ones would want to hold my hand. That was always so nice," he said.

Growing up, Lenny was the middle son of a very large family, 11 boys.

"As my older brothers got bigger and working, I had to help with the younger ones," he said. Taking a little visitor to Southlands by the hand was thus the most natural thing in the world. Lenny's "family" simply kept expanding over the years.

Williamson adds that "Lenny has been an anchor here at Southlands for decades, hosting the annual nursery school visits, as well as supplying us with his own and friends' animals to provide a petting zoo for all of our community events."

He has spent well over 20 years of his career there leading a 4-H club that introduced kids to draft horses. Draft horses have been a lifelong love for Lenny. He had reintroduced them to Southlands and then used them as

teachers with his 4-H kids.

Draft horses are B-I-G. They were originally used to carry fully armed knights into battle in early generations. That took strength and stamina. Knights in armor were pretty heavy and the horses needed to be able to run hard when called upon. As the time of knights with swords and lances on horseback faded, the horses evolved into being the animal of choice for pulling heavy loads, farm wagons, large coaches, or pulling a plow through less-than-cooperative soil.

Managing their direction with just a couple of reins in one's hands is a nearly lost skill today. Driving them or even working with them can be intimidating, if for no other reason than for their size. Imagine a petite 10-year-old girl or young boy finding the confidence to take charge of a pair of them.

Lenny has shared this skill with all of the youngsters.

"I'd start them walking behind with just the reins. I'd stay close. By the time we were done, they'd be up in the wagon and driving the whole thing," he said.

Williamson said, "His leadership of the 4-H club mentored children, as well as adults. The big draft horses giving them the confidence that things larger than their own lives could be managed.

The little minis taught them patience and humility. He never missed an opportunity to help people find their higher self."

"Farmer Lenny," as they have come to call him, has been a hero to so many kids over the years as he taught them about the land, about animals and about life.

Nowadays, mostly retired, he can find himself surrounded at the Dutchess County Fair by "his kids" introducing him to their own children and telling their kids how lucky they had been to have gotten to work with this warm and gentle man.

## Sheriff's Office warns residents about scams

The Dutchess County Sheriff's Office is warning the residents of Dutchess County and surrounding areas about scams that once again seem to be on the rise.

Scams are ways in which criminals will attempt to get money from people by contacting them and making up elaborate stories. In some cases the perpetrators have tried, sometimes successfully, to use the victim's emotions about a loved one in trouble to get money. It's common for the perpetrators of these scams to try to get money by telling people that one of their relatives has been seriously hurt or is in jail, and that they need money right away. In many cases they will pose as a law enforcement official or another relative to try and convince the victim that it's legitimate.

The latest scam involves the perpetrators posing as representatives of law

enforcement. In a recent case, the perpetrators identified themselves as "Dutchess County Sgt. Cook," and attempted to get money from the victim by claiming that they needed to pay money to avoid pending criminal charges.

The Sheriff's Office would like to offer the following tips to help people avoid these scams:

- Legitimate law enforcement would not attempt to satisfy a warrant or make promises to avoid prosecution by soliciting money.

- If you receive an email about an order you didn't place or asking you to send money call the company using a legitimate number. DO NOT follow the instructions in the email, click on any links in the email, or call the number provided in the email.

- If someone asks you to purchase merchandise, transfer money, provide bank information, or enter a code given to you by them, use caution as it is likely a scam.

- Do not meet up with someone that you don't know; if you're asked to do this it is surely a scam, and it is very dangerous as well.

- If you're contacted by someone you don't know asking for money, for any reason, that's a signal that it's most likely a scam.

- If someone calls you and tells you that a relative has been hurt or is in jail, confirm it first before sending any money. Call other relatives or a legitimate law enforcement agency for confirmation before any money is sent. If they're posing as a relative, try and contact that relative for confirmation.

- Sending money overseas is especially risky; use extreme caution.

- Ask the person for their call-back number and ask to speak to their supervisor to confirm the info; if it's a scam they will most likely hang up at this point and the number they give you will be bogus.

- If the person is telling you that a loved one is in the hospital or jail, find out which one and contact the institution yourself to confirm.

- If a loved one has recently passed away be wary; in some cases perpetrators have even preyed on victims by searching through the obituaries and calling surviving loved ones. If you get calls from people you don't know soon after someone passes away, be careful and confirm it before you send any money.

- In some cases someone will call and tell the victim that they've won money, but to "process the claim" they need to first send money. Beware this is most definitely a scam and don't send any money – you should never have to pay money to claim a prize. If it seems too good to be true, it most likely is.

- If there's any doubt about a phone call or email you've received contact the Sheriff's Office before sending any money.

- Scams tend to increase during the holiday season, be especially alert for them during those times.

It is very important to not send any money to anyone that you don't know until you've confirmed the situation through an independent source and feel comfortable with it. If it's a scam, once the money is sent it's very difficult, and most times impossible, to get it back. If anyone thinks they may have been the victim of a scam, they are encouraged to contact the Sheriff's Office at 845-486-3800 or via the tipline at 845-605-CLUE or [dcsotips@gmail.com](mailto:dcsotips@gmail.com).

# Chili, pie winners announced at 11th Rhinecliff Field Day

The Rhinecliff Volunteer Fire Co. & Rescue Squad held its 11th Annual Field Day and Chili Cook-Off on Saturday, Sept. 17, at Firemen's Field in the Hamlet of Rhinecliff.

An informal kickball game set the event off, but of course, the Chili Cook-Off was the highlight of the day. There were five entries this year and each one brought their own take on what makes a good chili. Entries included both tradition and exotic recipes including an East Moroccan Vegan version. Contestants were Rhinecliff locals Joe Baer, Paul Butler, Rudy McGuire, Jean Jaeger and Rhinecliff newcomer, Siobhan Bledsoe. Judging commenced at 5 p.m. by Director of Morton Memorial Library and Community House, Sandy Bartlett, Former Fire Chief and current Secretary of the Rhinecliff Fire District, Bill Cotting and Local Culinary Expert, Tom Turck putting their taste buds to work.

After considerable deliberation by the judges, the winners were chosen. The first place \$100 prize was awarded to Saibhan Bledsoe for her bean and meat chili, with Paul Butler winning second place, a \$50 Prize. Butler was also voted for the People's Choice Award.

Butler commented, "Making the chili is a process and a social time for me and my friends. This year we made 35 lbs. of chili and took only 10 lbs. Home."

Ivan (Happy) Metzke, age 11 of Team Butler, said "We all help make the chili, but Paul is the boss. We started

chopping stuff up the night before and worked on it all day long."

The winning chili was thick, had a smoky taste with a nice combination of spices and carrots and roasted corn that added sweetness. The entire team of Jake Rose, Chris Butler, Bobbie Spour and Neal Hamilton, came out to the event to see how their creation fared.

The pie contest was equally delicious with three worthy contestants. Judging the pies were President of the Rhinecliff Fire Co., Zachary Bendiner, story-teller Lauren Kingman and Paul Butler. First place went to Rhinecliff local Jeanne Jaeger who brought a Key Lime Pie, and another pair of Rhinecliff newcomers, Matt and Sam Sharpe, placed 2nd with a Pumpkin pie. Evie Tourtelot received an honorable-mention for an exceptionally beautiful lattice-topped Apple Pie.

With the crowd gathered, Event Chair Cynthia Baer brought attention to the work the Rhinebeck Grange and Morton Library have been doing to create pollinator beds on the borders of the field, and announced that construction for the 16 x 28 ft. Picnic Shelter at Firemen's Field will begin this Fall.

"I have been saying that by this time next year, we will have a Picnic Shelter here since 2019. This time it is for real," said Baer.

# Renegades finish strong, plan for 2023

On and off the field, it was another strong year for the Hudson Valley Renegades.

The area's High Class A minor league baseball franchise, part of the New York Yankees farm system, finished well above .500 and made a strong run in the second half of the season at a playoff spot. The Renegades finished two games behind Brooklyn in the North Division of the South Atlantic League.

The biggest loss might have been President and General Manager Steve Gliner, who stepped down two weeks ago to take a consulting position with the Renegades' owner Diamond Baseball Holdings.

So as we head into the off-season, here are a few season-ending tidbits before the club reconvenes in April for the 2023 season.

- Gliner will still be around. Construction on three critical elements at Dutchess Stadium will begin before the end of the month as per new Major League Baseball stipulations in its Player Development Contract with minor league teams. The home clubhouse will be turned over to the visiting team for 2023, and perhaps into 2024, as a new home clubhouse is built for the Renegades. The bullpens will be moved off the playing

field. And the outfield wall will be padded for the first time since the Stadium opened in 1994.

Jasson Domínguez, one of the Yankees' prized prospects who was promoted to Hudson Valley in mid-July, was not only named the South Atlantic League Player of the Week for the week of Sept. 5-11, but he was promoted. Dominguez made the leap to Double A Somerset, N.J., for the postseason. Whether he remains there to start the 2023 season remains to be seen. "This award is a testament to the hard work Jasson put in this year," Renegades Hitting Coach Rob Benjamin said. "He believed in our development process and constantly pushed himself to get better. We are all proud of the year he's had - it takes a village."

- Five Hudson Valley Renegades players were selected by Major League Baseball to participate in the 2022 Arizona Fall League. They include Dominguez, infielders Tyler Hardman and T.J. Rumfield, and pitchers Nelson Alvarez and T.J. Sikkema. Domínguez, Hardman, Rumfield, and Alvarez will play for the Mesa Solar Sox, while Sikkema, now with the Kansas City Royals organization after being part of a midseason trade, is a member of the Surprise Saguaros.

# County awards more than \$200,000 in historical grant program

Dutchess County Executive Marc Molinaro recently announced \$205,000 in funding has been awarded for 16 local programs, as part of the County's Historical Sites & Museums Infrastructure grant program, which provides funding opportunities for local nonprofit historical societies and museums. The program supports local historical institutions through vital capital and operating infrastructure investments, ensuring the continued preservation of Dutchess County's unique heritage.

Announced in June 2022, Dutchess County's Historical Sites & Museums Infrastructure grant program addressed critical capital and operating funding gaps that impact the preservation of local historic and cultural institutions.

One-time grants were available between \$5,000 and \$30,000 per institution, with capital infrastructure projects limited to facilities owned by a non-profit organization. To be eligible, facilities must be a separate structure, and funds cannot be used for improvements to a room used for or by historical societies within a facility owned by another entity.



## Who were the Robin Hoods? Visit renovated HP Museum

Located in the historic 1905 Eagle Rescue & Engine Firehouse, the Hyde Park Historic Society Museum has reopened to the public.

In three re-designed gallery spaces, visitors will learn about the Frog Hollow one-room schoolhouse, a thriving community of freed slaves, European contact with native communities, the dangerous ice harvesting industry, and even a few major-league sports stars. Documentaries and hours of recorded interviews are also

available to guests of the museum.

“We wanted to showcase the multicultural story of Hyde Park – from thousands of years of indigenous peoples to the 21st century. New, engaging displays, showcasing over 400 years of our town’s history, can now be accessed in this historic space in the center of town” says Zachary Veith, Museum Director.

The front “Community Room” explores the rich history of Hyde Park through local biographies, photography

displays, and artifacts such as Robin Hood baseball team uniforms.

The second “Reference Room” displays a wall of ice harvesting tools made right here in Hyde Park and FDR’s original voting booth as president, alongside the Historical Society’s collection of books, maps, and postcards for all to browse. The final “Textile Room” demonstrates the domestic life of Hyde Park with historic spinning wheels, period clothes, and even Mrs. Sarah Delano Roosevelt’s hats!

According to Carney Rhinevault, Hyde Park Historical Society President, “This air conditioned, open, bright space will be welcoming for both long-time residents and newcomers to town. This museum shows that Hyde Park has more history to tell than some might expect.”

The Town of Hyde Park Historical Museum is open Saturdays 10 a.m. – 3

p.m., Sundays 11 a.m. – 3 p.m. and other times by appointment. The museum is located at 4389 Albany Post Road in Hyde Park, with parking available next-door at Town Hall. The Historical Society hosts public lectures on the last Tuesday of each month.

# Wake up!

Staying alert during Sunday morning sermons was always a challenge.

As the Leaves of autumn begin to turn golden, and as kids go back to school, thoughts of my childhood flood me. I find myself dreaming of going to school, school lunches, school playground, making wine, raking leaves, jarring tomatoes, falling asleep in English Class. More specifically, I dream of falling asleep in church.

It's Sunday morning here at Coppola's, and I just got here from church. As you can probably gather from the theme of this article, I fell asleep during the sermon.

Most people can identify with dozing off during a sermon during Sunday church. It's quiet, usually the priests voice is somber, it's Sunday morning, you probably didn't have your coffee yet. Heck, I'm falling asleep writing this. However, when I was a kid, I turned falling asleep in church, into an art form. I was so good at it that people started to fill the side of the church that we sat in order to watch the show.

At the old St. Peter's Chapel, which was attached to the gymnasium, if you are facing the altar, we usually sat in the farthest set of pews, second row, facing

the altar. There were rows of pews to our right and those rows of pews faced us.

Sunday church for me meant sitting next to my father. I was not allowed to sit next to my brothers. Because I was restless, I constantly fooled around with my brothers. My brothers knew this and always egged me on. Not that egging me on was anything much more than them looking at me. In order to get everyone to behave during church, I was separated from them. However, that strategy was a double-edged sword.

Because I was not stimulated by my brothers, I crashed during church. Pop was vigilant in trying to keep me from falling asleep. He had many methods, all doomed to failure.

Method 1: Read Along. This method was doomed from the start. What better way for your eyes to get tired than having them follow along, especially a 4-5 year old who barely reads in the first place. Moreover, there was a lot of Latin in those days so to me all I heard was "blue, blue, blee, blah, blah, amen."

Method 2: Bribery. I was bribed with everything from fresh donuts to flat out cash. Nothing worked. On the contrary,

the more I tried to stay awake, the more I would fall asleep. And just so we are clear on this, when I fell asleep, I would be out cold.

Method 3: Threats. See Method 2.

Method 4: The Hair Pull, the Pinch, the Hand Squeeze, the Thigh Slap. All these methods would work initially; however, as the adrenaline exited my body, they invariably were doomed to failure. Moreover, when the adrenaline left my body, I would be even more tired and sleepy and would fall asleep even faster. I remember in high school putting a rubber band on my wrist and snapping it to try to stay awake in Miss Murphy's English class only to wake up with dried drool on my face with Miss Murphy screaming at me to wake up.

All during these episodes, the peanut gallery in the pews to the right – remember those pews – would be watching and snickering with my father flashing a look to the parents as if to say, "Hey. Ima trying"

Finally, my father gave up. I can remember stretching out on the pew and putting my head on Pop's lap. I can also remember the shocked looks on my brothers' faces as they looked at me getting comfortable. As I dozed off, I can vaguely remember him leaning over and saying to my brothers, "Dontcha you getta no ideas."

The only time I would wake up was when they would ring the bells. I would wake up saying "hello!" and usually by then Pop could take no more, and I would usually get one of the Method 4 scenarios.

As you wake up from one of your Sunday sermons, try out this classic recipe for one off my favorite breakfasts, remember if you want to stay awake try coffee first. *Caio!*

### CAPRESE FRITTATA

#### Ingredients:

- 1 teaspoon olive oil
- 4 eggs
- 2 tablespoons pesto
- 2 oz. diced red onions caramelized
- 2 oz mozzarella, torn into small pieces
- 2 tablespoon grated Pecorino Romano
- pinch salt and pepper

6 cherry tomatoes, halved

#### Directions:

Set your oven to 220°C (425°F). On the stovetop, in a non-stick frying pan with an ovenproof handle, heat just enough oil to create a thin film over medium-high heat.

Break the eggs into a mixing bowl and beat with a fork to combine. Stir in the pesto, half the mozzarella, caramelized onions and season with salt and pepper.

Pour the mixture into the pan and immediately turn the heat down to low. Let it cook for a few minutes until it's no longer completely runny. It does not have to set completely, like an omelet; only the base needs to be set at this stage.

Sprinkle over the remaining pieces of mozzarella and Pecorino Romano and place the tomatoes, cut side up, pushing them gently down into the frittata as you do so.

Put the pan into the oven and let it cook for 10 minutes. It's ready when it has puffed up a little, letting you know that the top has set.

Let it rest for 5 minutes before sliding onto a board or plate and cutting into wedges to serve.

Serve with a loaf of crusty bread and a nice cup of espresso.

## Young people learn financial, computer skills during two-day county program

Dutchess County Executive Marc Molinaro congratulated eight local young people who completed the Dutchess County Department of Community and Family Services' (DCFS) two-day "Youth Financial Literacy & Computer Training Program," an annual course that teaches participants valuable financial and computer skills.

DCFS again partnered with the Dutchess County Workforce Investment Board and the Dutchess One Stop to coordinate financial, computer and budgeting training for local young people, many of whose families receive services from DCFS.

The young participants began the intensive program by learning how to identify their skill set, then composing a résumé and cover letter to grab potential employers' attention. They also gained important computer skills, including learning the dangers and appropriate use of the Internet and social media; and they learned about financial literacy, budgeting and using formulas in Microsoft Excel through a hands-on, real-life scenario where they made budget decisions for a family of four. In addition to Excel, participants learned how to use Microsoft Word and PowerPoint to complete school assignment and projects. The participants concluded the program by learning about the Dutchess County One Stop Career and Employment Center, as well as the available services to help them find jobs.

Molinaro said, "I'm proud of each of the young men and women who have

completed the Dutchess County's Youth Financial Literacy & Computer Training Program – young people who have dedicated themselves to preparing for a successful future for themselves and their families. Dutchess County thanks its partners for their continued collaboration, make this annual program a success for the hundreds of participants who have benefited from the lessons it teaches. I congratulate each of today's graduates, and we, as a county, look forward to seeing how the skills and resources they've gained this week will result in bright futures."

Ranging in age from 13 to 18, the students were required to achieve satisfactory attendance and satisfactory grades in school to qualify for this week's program. After successfully completing the program, each participant earned a laptop computer and printer to help them follow their goals of attending college and pursuing a career.

Since its inception in 2007, the computer training program has served 276 youth. Ninety-five percent of youth participating in the program from 2011 to 2021 are no longer on Temporary Assistance.

This program has been recognized as a best practice for youth job preparation and was showcased at the 2015 summer conference of the New York Public Welfare Association. The program is funded through the Temporary Assistance for Needy Families program and the Foster Care Block Grant.

## Mediation Center releases 'The Teens are Alright' mini-documentary

As young people throughout the county got ready for a new school year, a group of teens from Beacon High School spent the summer preparing to engage in a whole new way. Through a partnership between the Mediation Center of Dutchess County's Restorative Justice Initiative and Cornell Cooperative Extension's Green Teen program, seven students participated extensively in Circle practice, a method for building community, strengthening communication, and addressing conflict. With funding from the Community Foundations of the Hudson Valley, the partnership created an instructional video so other youth-serving organizations could learn about Circles. Filmed by Lex Catania, the resulting mini-documentary, "The Teens are Alright," outlines the process and explores the experiences of youth participants.

"Empowering youth is a key area of focus for our Restorative Justice Initiative," said Claudia Abbott-Barish, Director of Restorative Justice Programs at the Mediation Center of Dutchess County. "Rooted in Indigenous philosophy, Circle practice can be a transformational approach to community building and conflict resolution. We've seen the positive effects of this work for years and wanted to share that story."

The 13-minute documentary

introduces viewers to the practice, with a focus on the experience of youth participants. Through the process, the teens describe how Circle helps them connect with themselves and each other. Through their distinct voices, it becomes clear that with these supports the teens are, indeed, alright.

"We're so grateful to the youth, Green Teen staff, and filmmaker for bringing this story together," Abbott-Barish continued. "As with all of our initiatives, we are proud that this documentary was created by the community - and will become a resource within the community. We're especially grateful to the Community Foundations of the Hudson Valley whose funding made this possible, and to the Dutchess County Agency Partner Grant program which supports our youth programs."

# Kendall submits local law to legislature to establish 'Domestic Partner Registry'

Dutchess County Clerk Brad Kendall has submitted a local law to the County Legislature establishing a "Domestic Partner Registry" under the aegis of the Dutchess County Clerk. Establishing a Domestic Partner Registry would address the following concerns:

- The ravages of COVID 19 over the past 26 months are well known. In some cases, the partners of those affected have been denied visitation rights, benefits and the ability to participate in medical decision making.

- Many of our new residents have moved here from jurisdictions that provide domestic partner registries.

The five boroughs of New York City, Suffolk County, Westchester County, Putnam County, Rockland County and some municipalities in Nassau County have all established domestic partner registries. When our new residents move to Dutchess County they are unable to continue to prove their partner status since most jurisdictions require residency.

The county legislature has previously

considered the establishment of a domestic partner registry on two occasions.

In 2002, the proposal was removed from consideration by the sponsor: Resolution 203042 (4/3/2003); Status: PULLED; Category: LOCAL LAW - DOMESTIC PARTNERS - BEHAVIORAL AND COMMUNITY HLTH/MENTAL HYGIENE/HLTH (dutchessny.gov)

In 2007, the proposal was defeated in committee: Resolution 207194 (8/9/2007); Status: DEFEATED IN COMMITTEE; Category: LOCAL LAW - DOMESTIC PARTNERS (dutchessny.gov)

Earlier debates about a domestic partner registry sometimes got derailed by extraneous concerns. Establishing a registry now would allow those whose long-term relationships have been acknowledged in other jurisdictions to be recognized in their new county of residence. It will also allow partners to participate more fully in joint financial and medical decision-making.

## Arlington Fire District awarded grant for trench rescue training, certification

The Arlington Fire District has been notified by Sen. Charles Schumer's office that it has been selected to receive a grant in the amount of \$166,144, under the Assistance to Firefighters grant program. These grant funds will be used for the training and certification of Arlington's firefighters in the highly specialized area of Trench Rescue. Under this grant program, FEMA will provide \$151,040 toward the training costs, while the Fire District will contribute \$15,104.

According to Fire Chief William Steenberg, "Technical rescues, like trench collapses, are amongst the most challenging and dangerous incidents that our responders could ever be called upon to handle. It requires specialized training and equipment that are beyond the capacity of most agencies. While relatively infrequent, these incidents challenge first responders to stabilize the collapsed area, and successfully rescue those individuals who have become trapped inside of the trench. As the largest agency in the region providing technical rescue services, this grant will allow us to continue to maintain the highest possible training and readiness level for our firefighters."

"We are proud and honored to be able to provide this high level of service to our community. This is in addition to our core missions of Fire and EMS protection.

Our Firefighter/EMTs and Firefighter/Paramedics stand ready to assist you in any potential emergency 24 hours a day, 7 days a week. We offer our sincere thanks to Senators Schumer & Gillibrand, and Congressman Maloney, for their ongoing support of the FEMA AFG grant program, and the Fire Service in general."

In addition to Trench Rescue, Arlington Fire District maintains fully operational technical rescue teams in the areas of Swiftwater Rescue, Confined Space Rescue, Rope Rescue, Trench & Structural Collapse Rescue, through their Special Operations Team. Additionally, the district is the largest participant in a Regional Special Operations Team with the City of Poughkeepsie FD, and LaGrange Fire District.

The funds provided in the grant will provide for a combination of both classroom and hands-on training in Trench Rescue, and lead to the certification of at least 45 members as Trench Rescue Technicians. This training will be conducted within the Fire District, thereby avoiding the costs associated with multi-day out of town travel to the NYS Academy, or other locations, where these courses are typically conducted. This allows for a substantially greater number of people to become trained and certified.

## PERIPHERAL ARTERY DISEASE (PAD) FREE SCREENING CLINIC (9/24)

September is Peripheral Artery Disease (PAD) Awareness Month. Dutchess County residents over age 50 can schedule an appointment to get a free ankle brachial index (ABI) screening from students in Marist College's Doctor of Physical Therapy (DPT) and Physician Assistant (PA) programs.

The event takes place Saturday, September 24, 9:00 am – 1 pm, at the Marist College Allied Health Building (29 Beck Place, Poughkeepsie), second floor. Marist DPT students will also provide educational handouts to help participants understand what can be done to prevent and treat this condition.

PAD involves narrowing of the arteries that carry blood to the legs and feet.

PAD may cause cramping, pain, make it hard to walk, and impact quality of life. Risk factors linked with PAD include smoking, high blood pressure, diabetes, high cholesterol, and being over age 50.

PAD can affect both men and women, but there is an increased risk of PAD in people of African American and Hispanic origin. The ankle brachial index (ABI) is a non-invasive screening for PAD that measures and compares the systolic blood pressure at the ankles and the arms using a handheld doppler and blood pressure cuff. Early diagnosis and treatment of PAD can help restore mobility and lower the risk of heart attack, stroke, and leg amputation.


