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## Legislature committee proposes salary raises for elected county officials

Members of the Dutchess County Legislature Budget, Finance and Personnel Committee have offered an amendment to the Fiscal Year 2024 Budget that would increase salaries for elected officials in County Office.

A public hearing on the proposed County Budget will be held on December 4 at 7 p.m. in the Legislature Chambers on the 6th Floor of the County Office Building. The full County Legislature will vote to approve the County Budget on December 7.

Positions that would be receiving increases include: County Executive, Sheriff, Clerk, Comptroller, Legislator, Chair of the Legislature, Majority and Minority Leaders, and Assistant Majority and Minorities Leaders.

Budget, Finance, and Personnel Committee Chairman Michael Polasek performed extensive research on the topic, comparing the Dutchess County salaries to surrounding counties in the Hudson Valley. He said his findings showed that Dutchess County positions salaries were on-average \$25,000 less than those in other counties in the region.

Polasek said, "I conducted an exhaustive review of salaries for other elected officials in the Hudson Valley region and reviewed County contractual raises over the past twenty years. Further, had legislators' salaries followed Dutchess' largest collective bargaining unit's annual COLA increase (not factoring in merit-based raises) for the past 20 years, a legislator would be compensated roughly \$25,000. # Matt's Auto Body – best work and Salt Point proud!

Local businesses are often thought to be the backbone of a community's economy. Aside from providing employment and service, the best integrate themselves into the very fabric of the community. They support their neighbors well beyond the services their business provides.

In Pleasant Valley and Salt Point, Matt's Auto Body provides an example of community involvement that stands out far above the average. Most organizations in those communities benefit from the support of Matt's Auto Body in one way or another.

The business has grown within the community with a history that goes back even further than the current one.

Matt Lawlor and Bob Beckmann grew up together in Salt Point and have been friends since childhood.

Initially, they worked in another shop part time, while in school. They graduated from high school later and Beckmann went on to college and joined IBM in 1979. In the early 1980s, the two of them were working from a home garage. In 1988 they decided to open their shop together.

The historic connection to today's shop is also a family one. Matt's dad had

a body shop in Salt Point. He was a well respected member of the community and his work was very high quality. He died in the early 1970s. After his death, the business may have gone on for a year or so, but closed soon after.

Bob and Matt knew there were some

good feelings in the area about Matt's dad's shop from years prior, so they decided to resurrect the name and open "Matt's Auto Body." They incorporated in 1989 and will be celebrating their 35th



that number is almost identical to the United States Bureau of Labor Statistics CPI Inflation rate for that span of time. For those reasons, we believe it was fair and equitable to the hardworking elected officials in their next term and I am pleased it garnered bipartisan support."

Democratic legislators opposed the proposed salary increases. Minority Leader Yvette Valdés Smith said, "I will not vote for these pay raises. I believe in a living wage for all, and I know how much we all give as public servants.

However, this huge increase in salaries cannot be justified."

Legislator Kristofer Munn said, "Last year the Republicans stuffed a \$25M giveaway for luxury stadium improvements into the budget at the last minute with no notice and no transparency - we opposed it. In January, they changed the law to allow them to change salaries after Election Day - we opposed it. And now they have voted for higher salaries - again as an amendment dropped at the last minute."

### We cannot let Ukraine fall victim to Russia

To the editor:

Like most everyone, our dismay and concerns for the immediate future have grown exponentially with the further spiral of disorder and hate launched after Hamas's horrific 10/7 attacks upon innocent civilians and the resulting open warfare in Gaza with Palestinian civilians trapped in the middle.

Rather than uniting the world against the purveyors of hate – Russia and its Iranian Theocratic allies – on all of the fronts of conflict, these attacks have compartmentalized our attention span and divided our societies. Russia still plans for victory in Ukraine by outlasting the West, and the diversion of U.S. weapons and ammunition and the near complete disappearance

of Ukraine news from many outlets. This has Putin smiling over his 10/7 birthday present, and Iran no longer needs to worry about Saudi Arabia normalizing relations with Israel creating an alternate pro Western trajectory for the region.

While we acknowledge the complexity, some steps forward are more obvious than others. First among these is ensuring Russia's defeat in Ukraine. The victory of democratic values over barbaric authoritarianism remains in our core national interest, and in this goal, all of us can play a role. The Hudson Valley sent a bi-partisan delegation to Congress. We must urge our Representatives Molinaro, Lawler and Ryan to get U.S. aid for Ukraine funded through the House of Representatives at the level the moment and our future security requires.

Leaders and analysts across the political spectrum have called this defeat of Russia in Ukraine via our weapons and ammunition the best investment in our security we could ever make. Ordinary people from across our region have stepped up in extraordinary ways to support Ukrainians. We cannot let Ukraine fall victim to Russia aided by our indifference or partisan politics. Please call or write to them today as defeat of Russia on this front will deal a blow to violence in all regions being driven by it.

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## Barrett hosts roundtables on electrifying state's transportation systems

Assemblymember Didi Barrett (D-Dutchess/Columbia), Chair of the Assembly's Energy Committee, hosted a series of roundtables on Wednesday, Nov. 1, to discuss electrifying New York State's transportation sector. The event was held at the Legislative Office Building in Albany in collaboration with Assemblymember William Magnarelli, Chair of the Assembly's Transportation Committee, and it included several other Assembly Committee Chairs and several dozen stakeholders in the public and pri-

vate sectors as relevant to the specific topics.

The roundtable sessions focused on three key issues: school bus electrification; innovation in climate technology and transportation; and the electric vehicle charging infrastructure. Among the many topics discussed were: the need for better communication between government agencies and school boards/leaders to help districts plan and prepare for the electrification of school buses; climate smart innovations that employ underutilized resources across the state, like small dams and regional airports; progress and challenges to achieving the adoption of zero-emission vehicles by 2050; and

balancing the expansion of electric infrastructure with the energy load needed to meet the everyday needs of New Yorkers.

"As we work to reach our Climate Leadership and Community Protect Act (CLCPA) goals, thoughtful and informative discussions like these are critical in helping us support and prepare our constituents, municipalities, and school districts as they make this transition," said Barrett. "The transportation sector is a key player in both the challenges and in finding solutions to effectively and responsibly meet our goals. I thank my colleagues and all the panelists for participating in this important conversation."

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# Rock Steady Farm in Millerton wins \$40K grant

Rock Steady Farm in Millerton has received a \$40,000 grant after being named one of four winners in a nationwide program called the "Co-op Innovation Awards."

The 12-acre farm describes itself as being rooted in social justice, food access and farmer training. Rock Steady Farm grows high-quality produce and makes it available to historically marginalized communities in the Hudson Valley and New York City.

The funding will help Rock Steady Farm launch a paid apprentice program for new farmers, according to a press release.

This apprenticeship program, called "Pollinate," is intended to help train queer and trans farmers, and farmers of color, who practice — or are planning to practice — cooperative farming models at a scale that can provide more healthy food for the wider Hudson Valley community.

"This award will help Rock Steady Farm create the conditions for queer, trans, and BIPOC farmers to thrive, despite the structural barriers that exist for queer and trans farmers of color in the food and farm industry," Rock Steady Farm co-owners D. Rooney, Maggie Cheney, Kyle Ellis, and Rica Bryan said in a written statement.

The Co-op Innovation Awards are issued by Capital Impact Partners and National Cooperative Bank, two mission-driven financial institutions that are seeking to strengthen underserved and disinvested communities nationwide. The

awards aim to increase cooperative development in communities living with low incomes and/or communities of color.

The four winners received a combined \$170,000 in catalytic grant funding. The other cooperatives were a composting organization in Western Massachusetts that provides job and ownership opportunities to formerly incarcerated individuals; a health provider in New Orleans that focuses on services for pregnant women and parents; and an organization in Olympia, Washington, that is working to convert multi-family properties into resident-owned housing cooperatives.

Rock Steady Farm was founded in 2015. According to its website, the farm's co-owners believe that all people have a right to healthy, delicious produce. Their vegetables feed a 450-member sliding scale Community Support Agriculture, or CSA, which includes no-cost and subsidized shares. Rock Steady also offers its vegetables wholesale to select food pantries and mission-aligned community organizations.

"The recipients of this year's Co-op Innovation Awards are helping to strengthen the kinds of shared pillars — access to housing, employment, health care, and healthy foods — that help build healthy communities and generational wealth," Ellis Carr, president and CEO of Capital Impact Partners, said in a written statement.

Since 2015, the Co-op Innovation Awards have issued a total of \$855,000 in grants.

- Student Transportation 10:45 a.m.-11:15a.m.: Students rights to transportation and how parents can support and advocate for their student's needs.

- Driving while on the spectrum 11:15am-11:45 a.m.: An autism self-advocate will talk about his perspective of learning to drive with autism.

- General Accommodations for Accessibility 12:30 p.m.- 2:15 p.m.: Understanding accessibility for rights for

people with developmental, intellectual, and physical disabilities in public spaces.

- Question and answer period for afternoon session topics 2:15 p.m.-2:45 p.m.

Dutchess County All-Abilities Director Dana Hopkins said, "Throughout the year my team and I interact with service providers and families and transportation is one of the most asked about topics. This is why we made sure to put heavy emphasis on this topic

at this year's conference. We are excited to provide up to date information on both transportation and accessibility to ensure the needs and rights of the population are being met."

## Dutchess County to participate in STOP-DWI Thanksgiving effort

### Impaired driving crackdown runs Nov. 22-26

Law enforcement agencies throughout Dutchess County will participate in a special enforcement effort to crack down on impaired driving to coincide with the national Thanksgiving holiday. The statewide STOP-DWI High Visibility Enforcement Campaign effort starts on Wednesday, Nov. 22 and will end on Sunday, Nov. 26.

Various law enforcement agencies will collaborate across the state and will be out in force in this coordinated effort to reduce the number of alcohol-related injuries and deaths during this period.

The Thanksgiving holiday period is among the most active on U.S. roadways, with the American Automobile Association estimating some 55 million motorists traveled for the holiday in 2019, the vast majority of whom drove to their destination. According to the National Safety Council, 29 percent of

driving fatalities during the 2019 Thanksgiving holiday period involved an alcohol-impaired driver.

The Thanksgiving Engagement Campaign is one of many statewide enforcement initiatives promoted by the New York State STOP-DWI Association with additional funding from the STOP-DWI Foundation with a grant from the Governor's Traffic Safety Committee. The Statewide STOP-DWI Crackdown Campaign also targets Super Bowl Sunday, Memorial Day weekend, Fourth of July, Labor Day weekend, Halloween and national Holiday Season in December.

While STOP-DWI efforts across New York have led to significant reductions in the numbers of alcohol- and drug-related fatalities, still too many lives are being lost because of crashes caused by drunk or impaired drivers. Highly visible and publicized efforts like the STOP-DWI Crackdown Campaign aim to further reduce the incidence of drunk and impaired driving. Residents can make a difference with a sober plan by downloading the "Have a Plan" mobile app.

# Matt's Auto Body – best work and Salt Point proud!

anniversary in 2024.

Bob was working days at IBM during that time, so Matt handled the day work and Bob was working the shop at night.

## A little history

They started on Cottage Street in Salt Point in a one-bay garage.

"We had one bay and one tow truck," they recall. Soon the work filled three bays. Now, almost 35 years later, they are in several locations around Salt Point. They have approximately 20 employees, and 10 tow trucks.

In 1993, with IBM's first big employee "buy out," Bob retired and went into the shop full time.

The current primary premise, a large well-equipped shop with a facade that fits perfectly into the country aesthetics of the community, was built in 1997.

"It was an adventure," said Beckmann. "We hired a framing company to put the basic shell together and were using two-tier trusses to give us what needed. Some of the trusses got 'racked' (knocked out of alignment) on the truck during shipment. So these guys were taking nails out and trying to bring the whole thing back into line. I guess they overdid it."

"All of a sudden the whole thing came down like a house of cards. One moment we had this beautiful shell of a building and the next we had an unrecognizable pile of sticks."

Bob and Matt recovered quickly, but the memory is still alive with them and in the community.

## Community involvement



Truly successful small businesses not only provide the services their community requires, but are often integrated personally into their community. Matt's Auto Body and the folks who work there understand this philosophy completely.

"We have lived here in Salt Point all our lives," said Beckmann, "and we love the community." They sponsor and/or have an active presence in practically all events in Pleasant Valley and Salt Point.

They are deeply embedded into the Pleasant Valley Volunteer Fire Department. Matt's wife, Melissa, has served as one of the local fire commissioners. Any time there is a parade in the town, it's a sure bet that several of the groups - Boy Scouts, Girl Scouts, Church groups - will be riding a float constructed on one of the Matt's Auto Body trucks.

When FDR High School's Crew Team has their rowing shells needing repair, it's done at Matt's free of charge. Beckmann also coaches crew for FDR.

An interesting project in their shop right now is the body of a replica Shelby Cobra sports car. "It's pretty neat," said Matt. It turns out that the Industrial Arts Class at Franklin D. Roosevelt High School took on a year-long project to

build a car from the ground up. The students are doing the mechanical work and put together the chassis elements, engine, wiring and suspension.

"It's a great project for the class," said Beckmann, "so we are doing the body and paint for them, providing the time and materials as a donation."

Matt's Auto Body is certified by Subaru, Honda and General Motors. They repair a lot of BMWs and other high end imports, as well.

## Doing it all

But there is more to the services Matt's provides than just collision repair.

"You know," notes Beckmann with a smile, "being out here in the boondocks - OK, in a small town - we get to do a lot of weird stuff, too. We do cars, we do big trucks, we do little trucks. We work on horse trailers, campers, and boats. We do mid-size towing. We've also done some very high-end vintage car restorations. If it needs straightening or painting, we can handle whatever the community needs. They count on us to be able to help."

Restoration of antique and vintage vehicles is a different sort of effort than simply doing collision repair. Very few

shops are trusted to tackle it.

"We've got an affinity for neat cars," said Beckmann. "We've been doing restorations and rebuilding cars our whole lives. Rebuilding an important vintage car pulls so many of our team's skills together into those projects."

The business has grown considerably in its now 35 years of incorporation. They keep on being part of the community every day.

Bob's sons, Mike and Phil, are working there also and share the commitment to community. Mike's profile is also on a "Hometown Heroes" veteran's honor banner in front of the shop. It honors his service in the U.S. Air Force. Another "Hometown Heroes" banner in front of the shop honors Mike's grandfather, George Beckmann, a U.S. Navy Veteran.

Along with all the other similar banners throughout Pleasant Valley and Salt Point, it's just another reminder that all the people at Matt's Auto Body are more than just a business.

They are an ongoing part of the community's life and expect to be doing that - for a very long time to come.

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# Coming to America

Poughkeepsie has a thriving Oaxacan community.

The rats were real. It was only a movie, but the rats were real. So was the story, of a Guatemalan brother and sister who fled persecution at home and journeyed north with a dream of finding a new home in California. "El Norte" (1983) broke new ground as one of the very first "independent" films, back when the Sundance Film Festival was just a gleam in Robert Redford's eye. My Dutchess Community College Spanish class got together to watch "El Norte" ten years after its release, and we were all mesmerized at the sight of actress Zaida Silvia Gutierrez crawling through a drainage pipe that connected Tijuana and San Diego, as a swarm of rats bore down on her. Her terror was infectious. A couple of the students at the screening rushed over to a Hispanic student and started hugging him. I had to laugh, because I knew Alfredo was actually born in Pleasant Valley.

Not much has changed in the 40 years since "El Norte" was released. It's generally accepted that about 10 million undocumented people live in the United States, with more arriving daily.

Poughkeepsie is home to a thriving community originally from Oaxaca (wa-

ha-ka), Mexico, some members documented, some not. They found work in restaurants, motels, on farms, as housekeepers, even working in schools and hospitals. The Poughkeepsie-Oaxaca Friendship Committee (I'm a member) sponsors exchanges between the two cities. Art and cultural events, especially the annual Guelaguetza Festival at Waryas Park, celebrate the success of the community.

I'm reminded of my grandfather's arrival from Italy 100 years ago, and how hard he worked to make a life for his family.

Not every new arrival in Poughkeepsie hails from Oaxaca. My friend Josefina Lopez Hernandez came from Xalapa, Vera Cruz, Mexico. Sue and I were guests at her wedding last summer. I asked Josefina about her journey to Poughkeepsie.

Josefina was born in Xalapa on March 19, 1970. Although the city is a popular tourist destination, known for its Aztec history and as the birthplace of the jalapeno pepper, poverty is endemic. When her father deserted the family and her mother died, Josefina decided to try

for a better life. Out of nine children in the family, three set off for the north (el norte) – Luis, Guillermo and Josefina. Luis somehow saved enough money to make it to the Untied States. Back then – 1999, \$2,000 would pay for a spot on an airplane to a northern border town and a guided crossing of the Rio Grande.

Luis told me that yes, he did crawl through a drainage pipe, but he didn't see any rats. He also spent a week wandering around in the Arizona desert after his guide – a "coyote" – deserted the group. When Luis and Guillermo arrived in Poughkeepsie, they started saving up enough money to send for Josefina.

Josefina took off to the north with her two children just a month after the 9-11 terrorist attacks. She says she wasn't afraid. Her fate was in God's hands. In Poughkeepsie she started working for cash at a local greenhouse operation (not mine). She still works in agriculture. Her son Leiver tragically died of cancer last year. Her other son Hiram is an auto mechanic.

Undocumented workers work legally

with false social security cards. Their employers are not required to verify the card's authenticity. The workers pay taxes and social security just like everyone else, except they will never see a penny of Social Security benefits.


As a Farm Bureau member, I've advocated for a path to legality for the people who live in fear of the federal immigration patrol. Every policy maker I talk to says their hands are tied because immigration is a "toxic issue." Once in a while a bill is entered in Congress to provide a pathway to citizenship, or at least to a legal work permit, but it gets nowhere. (Whatever happened to Senator Schumer's U.S. Citizenship Act?) Right now the issue is on the front burner as we approach the next presidential election.

As a native of Poughkeepsie, I am proud that our community treats all new arrivals with respect and an open heart.





sired to authorize the financing of such capital project; NOW, THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED, by the County Legislature of the County of Dutchess, New York, as follows:

Section 1. The purchase of maintenance equipment, with alternative fuel modalities where appropriate and available, including incidental equipment and expenses in connection therewith, for said County, is hereby authorized at an aggregate maximum estimated cost of \$2,702,760, allocated as follows:

(a) The purchase of equipment, each item of which costs \$30,000 or over, including incidental equipment and expenses in connection therewith, at a maximum estimated cost of \$2,686,600, being a class of objects or purposes having

a period of probable usefulness of 15 years, pursuant to subdivision 28 of paragraph a of Section 11.00 of the Local Finance Law; and

(b) The purchase of mower equipment, which costs over \$15,000 but less than \$30,000, including incidental equipment and expenses in connection therewith, at a maximum estimated cost of \$16,160, being a specific object or purpose having a period of probable usefulness of 10 years, pursuant to subdivision 28 of paragraph a of Section 11.00 of the Local Finance Law.

Section 2. It is hereby determined that the plan for the financing of the aforesaid objects or purposes is by the issuance of \$2,702,760 serial bonds of said County hereby authorized to be issued therefor pursuant to the provisions of the Local Finance Law, allocated as

Vrba presented the award bearing her name to Hannon for demonstrating selflessness, service, inclusiveness and leadership. Hannon, a veteran in the hospitality

industry, is known for her tremendous work ethic, unwavering dedication, and providing exceptional customer service. Vrba praised her for her commitment to collaboration and relationship building between her partners, colleagues and the community through her work at Revel 32°.

In her remarks, Rottkamp highlighted the growth and success of DTI's role as Dutchess County's designated destination marketing organization (DMO) over the past ten years. Visitor spending increased 46.6% from \$481 million to \$706 million with the average breaking down to \$1.9 million spent by visitors per day on food and beverages, recreation, accommodations, retail and transportation. Occupancy tax collected by the county has more than doubled to \$4.2 million. State and local taxes collected from visitors increased 45% to \$88 million in net new money now coming into our county and state governments. Without that spending by visitors, Dutchess County residents would need to pay almost \$800 more per household in taxes to make up the difference that funds things like improvements to roads and bridges, public safety, parks, youth programming and other services.

"Dutchess County needs to compete with every other destination for its fair share of visitor spending, investment and talent and the excellent work done by our team to leverage the power of destination development and promotion has become

a catalyst for our community's vitality," said Rottkamp. "Investment in Dutchess Tourism by County government and the Dutchess County IDA continues to fuel the work we do and our vision to make Dutchess County the destination of choice for travelers from all over the world. With that investment, we have seen the powerhouse for economic development that tourism has become."

Rottkamp also noted that the collective income of Dutchess employees working in the hospitality and tourism sector has grown 55%. Those wages also contribute to the local economy when those workers spend money on housing, groceries, clothing, transportation and services.

"We have highlighted twenty-one attractions and individuals across eight different categories who all deserve our appreciation for their dedication, spirit and commitment to making Dutchess the world-class destination it has become," said Dutchess County Executive William F.X. O'Neil. "Dutchess County's tourism industry collectively is a community collaboration of more than 1,200 businesses and organizations, and more than 9,000 of our friends and neighbors working in the hospitality field. It's a vital driver of our economy, and the County's investment in Dutchess Tourism is an investment in our community's economic growth and success, ultimately enriching the quality of life for those who call this place home.
