COVID-19 update

Local cases rise, DBCH urges use of mitigation steps

In the course of a few weeks, Dutchess County has gone from having a low risk of COVID-19 transmission to a high risk. The combination of highly transmissible variants and a pandemic-weary public has yielded jumps in active cases and hospitalizations. As of May 15, confirmed active cases were at 844, up from 739 the previous week; on May 1 the count was 495, and on March 27 it was 125.

"About a little more than a month

ago, Vassar Brothers did not have one patient in the hospital who had COVID," said Dr. William Begg, the vice president of medical affairs at Vassar Brothers Medical Center, "and now our numbers have crept up in the past few weeks."

On the county's COVID-19 Dashboard, hospitalizations are sub-categorized as those admitted due to complications from COVID, and those who were admitted for another those who were admitted for another issue but tested positive for COVID-19 (labeled "with COVID"). The latest statistics show hospitalizations due to COVID were at 21 on May 15, up significantly from 3 on March 27. Hospitalizations with COVID are at 12, up from 5 on March 27.

One of the challenges going forward, Dr. Begg said, is not every patient who comes into the emergency room is tested for COVID, so exact numbers are not known.

exact numbers are not known.

He added, "The CDC numbers locally are less than valid, and it's not because they're not doing a good job. It's that our community has the ability to do home tests. Many, many people have tested positive on home tests. ple have tested positive on home tests

and not reported [the results]."

The Centers for Disease Control (CDC) measures risk using the following metrics:


Total number of new admissions of patients with confirmed COVID-19 in the past seven days divided by the total population in the Health Service Area, multiplied by 100,000 (high risk is 20 or greater). On Monday morning, Dutchess County's community transmission rate was

- New COVID-19 admissions per 100,000 population (7-day total; high risk is 10 or greater). Dutchess' count

- Percentage (7-day average) of staffed inpatient beds in use by patients with confirmed COVID-19 within the entire Health Service Area (high risk is 15 percent or greater). This number is currently not problematic at 4.3 percent.

- Percent of staffed inpatient beds in use by COVID-19 patients (7-day average; high risk is 10 percent or greater). Again, at 3.8 percent, this number is not in the high range.

Kids ready for debut of 'Littlest Farmers Market'

It started three years ago with a question, a hopeful look on the face of a child and a farmer/business owner who loves to help kids.

The result of all of that will culminate in the first edition of the "Littlest Farmers Market," scheduled Sunday, May 22 from 10 a.m. - 2 p.m. in the parking lot of Hackett Farm Supply at 2297 Salt Point Turnpike (just off the Taconic Parkway,

And yes, everyone is invited to attend. Founder Scott Davis terms the market "a kid's lemonade stand on steroids." It's basically a farmers market for kids with three simple rules 1. You have to be 12 years old or younger. 2. You have to have grown, picked, created or crafted what you're selling, and 3. You want to have a great time with other kids.

He is expecting about 25 kids with booths and a 4-H education booth.

There won't be any livestock for sale," Davis said with a chuckle, "But there's sure to be farm animals for the families to enjoy."

"And bunnies and chicks," his daughter, Siena, said with a smile. "I'll be selling homemade popsicles made from fresh juices and herbs.'

Kids will be selling farm fresh eggs, soap, popsicles, bracelets, art, jewelry, baked goods, flowers, you name it. Davis said, "I have a feeling if we do more markets throughout the summer, which is our intent, there will be more produce and garden vegetables.'

The real beginning

The idea for all of this came to Davis just before the pandemic hit. Siena had asked him to talk to local businesses to see if she could set up her lemonade stand in their parking lot.

"My third attempt landed me at the cash register of Hackett Farm Supply," he said. "I could barely get two words out when (owner) Ed Hackett interrupted me after spotting my daughter out of the corner of his eye. 'Absolutely! he said. I'd rather see a kid outside in the sunshine working and having a good time, than sitting on a couch on their iPad.'

After three weekends selling lemonade at Hackett's, a light bulb went off in Davis' head. "Why not have a farmers market run by kids?"

The delay caused by COVID-19 gave Davis and his daughter and the team at Hackett time to plan and bring the idea

"Support and an open mind were the most important ingredients of all," Davis said of team at Hackett.

Colleen Hackett is handling logistics with sponsors for tables and canopies. Williams Lumber and Home Centers has donated two canopies and Land of Oz and Crown Energy are helping out with cash donations. In addition, Chancellor Livingston Elementary School in Rhinebeck and Dutchess Day School have both featured the "Littlest Farmers Market" in their newsletters.

"We really want it to be an entire

They are also working on a "suggested donation" of non-profit organizations so the kids can learn to give back to the community.

Lori Jiava, who works for the Village, told the students about a new program which records drivers who pass stopped


Jasmine, 10, said she would tell Chase, "Thank you for having us (students)."

Hope WCSD board members 'fight for, not against' children

To the Editor:

I have raised my children in the Wappingers School District from their days as Fishkill Frogs at Fishkill Elementary through their senior year at John Jay High School. I have not always been in agreement with everything that the school district - or even their individual teachers - have done. But I have always recognized that their educators, bus drivers and miscellaneous guidance counselors and staff have overall been amazing.

My children have been baptised in the Catholic Church and one of my most joyful memories is of each of their confirmations. My uncle, a Franciscan priest, officiated my wedding. My faith has gotten me through the death of my father and the experience of tending not once but twice to a child admitted to the ICU at Vassar Hospital. It has helped me raise my children in an era of school shootings as well as in a time when the internet relentlessly bombards them. More than anything my faith has given me strength to encourage my children to accept and love themselves regardless of their sexual preferences.

I am proud of my beliefs, and feel that they are important to my family. I am, however, horrified that three individuals who ran for open Board of Education seats were backed by Moms of Liberty, a group that targets children based on their race, religion and sexuality. I am grateful, however, to the team of parents and non-parents involved in the bipartisan grassroots "Defense of Democracy" group. Over less than 10 days we came together to push back on individuals who would force our children into a day when there was harassment, abuse, and violence was perpetrated against the queer community.

At this moment I write not knowing who has won the WCSD BOE vote. I do pray that those who end up elected are ones who would fight for, and not against, our children.

Historic marker celebration set for 'Ghost of Fiddler's Bridge'

"The Ghost of Fiddler's Bridge" is a famous saga in the Town of Clinton. It's full of all the key ingredients - murder, robbery, ghosts and even a song. And now Town of Clinton residents will have a historical marker to preserve the legend.

A celebration of the installation of the new historic road marker on Fiddlers Bridge Road in the Town of Clinton is set for Sunday, May 22 at 2 p.m. at the Primrose Hill Farm at 203 Fiddlers Bridge Road.

The Clinton Historical Society obtained a grant from the W.G. Pomeroy Foundation to purchase a permanent metal sign commemorating the local legend of the Fiddlers Bridge ghost. The legend notes the 1808 murder of a local fiddler on his way home after playing at a dance. His body was found under a bridge (long gone) on what is now Fiddlers Bridge Road.

The celebration will include a portrayal of the fiddler reciting the legend, local musician Vito Petroccitto performing his original song "The Legend of Fiddler's Bridge Road," a hayride, light refreshments, and the unveiling of the sign. All are welcome to attend this free event hosted by the Clinton Historical Society.

(Editor's. note: The following is reprinted from the Clinton Historian Vol. 19-1. In 1992, Viola and Emil Schoch reenacted the 1908 event by inviting several Society members to visit the site on their tractor-towed hay wagon in the evening. Yes, violin music was clearly heard, as played by a local talented teen wearing a white sheet over her head.

The Ghost of Fiddlers Bridge by Craig Marshall & Viola Schoch

Murder! - Robbery! - Ghosts! Such is the stuff that makes for great legends, in this case, our most famous ghost legend of Clinton. The road connecting Pleasant Plains and Schultzville is named Fiddlers Bridge commemorating a tale that began in 1808

It was September 7 when an old local resident who used to play his fiddle at dances and festivals was found dead on a bridge on this narrow, winding road. Allegedly, he had been robbed and murdered on his way home after playing for a dance, and the bridge was later named Fiddlers Bridge.

According to tradition, the fiddler's ghost can be heard playing the fiddle on certain moonlit evenings between 10 and midnight at the site, which no longer contains a bridge.

Long-time Society member Viola Schoch, who lives on Fiddlers Bridge

Road, recalls an event that occurred 100 years later. She recounts:

"It seems that the town supervisor back in 1908 was my Grandma Cookingham's brother Charlie Carpenter. Grandma lived here on the hill with her husband John Calvin and their four sons. Uncle Charlie Carpenter lived in Frost Mills and earned his living as an auctioneer. There were boarding houses in Frost Mills and Pleasant Plains, and Uncle Charlie enjoyed sharing the fiddler story with those summer guests from the Big City.

They said his story was just plain foolishness.

Well, Uncle Charlie would show them. A couple of nights later, September 7, 1908, exactly 100 years after the fiddler's death, he swung into action. He gathered up those disbelievers with his hay wagon. Some of the Plains young men went along too. They were my father Harlow Cookingham, age 23, and his brother Phil (Don Cookingham's father), age 19. I know that this is all true because my dad shared it many times with our summer house guests! When the lumber wagon approached the bridge, to the amazement of almost all, the fiddler began to fiddle with great gusto.

Oh, my, those city folk would never again object to the authenticity of the story. They'd gladly name the bridge Fiddler's Bridge. And later the Town would name the road Fiddlers Bridge Road in honor of that old fiddler. That's my tale, folks. Oh, but I almost forgot one thing about that September night in 1908. Uncle Charlie and the boys had an absolutely marvelous evening!"

Mitigation steps still effective

"It's my opinion, now that we're in the third year of the pandemic, people are burned out and tired of hearing about Covid," said Dr. Begg. "But if you're high risk or in crowded [situations], you should wear a mask."

Mask-wearing is one of several steps that have proven to be effective at mitigating risk of infection. Another is to get vaccinated and boosted, if eligible.

'I think there's a huge amount of value to the second booster," said Dr. Begg. "The reason why there's value: the Pfizer and Moderna vaccines start to wear off after 5-8 months. That's why getting the booster is incredibly important. We have not seen anyone die from Covid who had two boosters. They might get sick but not [get] the severe complications.'

The Dutchess County Department of Behavioral & Community Health (DBCH) wants residents to know the COVID-19 vaccines are safe, effective and readily available throughout the community, including at local pharmacies, doctors' offices, urgentcare facilities, medical practices and the county's Immunization Clinic.

And, of course, there is the age-old advice of regular hand-washing with soap and water (vigorous scrubbing for 20 seconds is recommended); or using hand sanitizer when necessary.

If you do get sick...
The CDC and DBCH recommend getting tested when not feeling well or potentially exposed. Report positive test to healthcare providers to discuss eligibility for treatments. Free test kits are available at local pharmacies and other locations throughout the community, including Dutchess County Government offices and buildings.

Health experts urge anyone experiencing cold or COVID-19 symptoms - including coughing, sneezing, loss of taste or smell to stay home to rest, recover, and help prevent the spread of virus and disease.

Not everyone who gets infected with Covid will have the same symptoms, nor the same intensity of symptoms; and some will

Dr. Begg said that, over time, there's been a definite difference in the major symptoms of people coming to the emergency room.

The really sick ones at the beginning of the pandemic had the fever and respiratory symptoms," he said. "Now they don't have that, and that's why the pandemic is continuing on," because of people who are asymptomatic.

The basic tenets of care for those who have Covid have not changed, but the group of patients coming in and the severity has changed," Dr. Begg said. The criteria for admission is the same, primarily an oxygen level that is "not ideal," and existing medical conditions that are worsening due to Covid.

The percentage of patients admitted to ICU has changed, though.

"Most don't have to go [to ICU], which is good," he said. "We believe that's the result of being vaccinated, and maybe some of the variants are less severe."

An underlying health condition – such as obesity, diabetes or heart condition – is one of the big risk factors for developing severe Covid symptoms, Dr. Begg said.

'As the variants come and go, there are different types of monoclonal antibodies and oral agents that outpatient doctors can prescribe, as well," he said. "If you fit criteria and every New Yorker age 12 and older to there's some paxlovid, that's one of the more

recent ones. For the doctor to potentially get those, they are typically prescribed to a patient with more severe symptoms and other medical conditions.

Asked what symptoms would warrant a trip to urgent care or the ER, Dr. Begg said, "Without a doubt, if someone is having trouble breathing or a worsening of their baseline medical problem. Covid can present in many different ways." For example, if someone's emphysema suddenly worsens or if a new symptom develops, that would be a concerning development.

Regular testing doesn't identify variants

The New York State Department of Health notes Omicron is the prevalent strain, but information on sub-variants is not locally available.

"When one looks at the variants, that's a send-out [test]," said Dr. Begg. "Trying to determine the variant takes a lot longer, limited labs to do that work, and it costs more. It's a lot more in-depth. When you're trying to get down into the type of variant, it's more labor-intensive and time consuming.

Dr. Begg said Vassar and all hospitals are required to report to the state what their daily Covid rate is, as well as vaccination rates

"A select number of our tests are done offsite, at the state's discretion," he said.

Notes from the Town of Wappinger Supervisor

Part II: Looking at the 2010 Comprehensive Plan

This is the second in a series of columns by Wappinger Supervisor Richard Thurston on the Town's Comprehensive Pan.

The Town of Wappinger is at a major crossroads in its history. I noted in my first article in this series that the Town of Wappinger adopted in 2010 a Comprehensive Plan ("Plan") that created a blueprint/framework for future regulation and development of land within the Town. Revitalized business and community centers were also contemplated, most especially within our Hamlets. We have done much towards enabling the Plan but must now make some hard decisions regarding further implementation of

The Plan cited many issues that were identified initially through a Town-wide survey and other studies. Among the most important issues identified in the Plan are the following (not in a particular order). These issues are even more significant today than they were in 2010:

1. Economic. The existence in the Town of a very small commercial economic base creates many secondary negative impacts on our residents. This small commercial base also results in a direct and disproportionate tax impact on our residents. Among key issues noted: Route 9 as a high priority and 9D as secondary for commercial development; Hamlet revitalization as paramount; no Town center and inadequate number of designated historical districts; inadequate water and sewer infrastructure; limited pedestrian/bicycle/alternate transportation availability and integration; traffic flow including patterns and congestion;

2. Housing. Housing is a cornerstone to the development of a more attractive and economically sustainable/viable Wappinger community. Among the issues the Plan identified correctly are how best to address: a fragmented mismatch in housing development due to zoning regulations that contribute to high costs of ownership; the unavailability of affordable work force rental housing for our front line workers, our teachers, our store owners and even the recruitment base for volunteer firefighters; a lack of affordable senior housing for our residents who want to continue to live in Wappinger; and the absence of higher density residential housing in our hamlet commercial centers; etc.

3. Environmental. Without the preservation of our community's environmentally significant features, sustainable growth and development, and maintaining our overall quality of life, is not doable. Among key issues identified in the Plan are how best to: preserve our farmland and the waterfront corridors along the Wappinger Creek, Sprout Creek and Hudson River bordering the Town; preserve our wetlands; preserve and protect our surface and aquafer water resources; regulate increasingly stormwater runoff and improve antiquated Town drainage systems; reduce salt contamination from road salt and water softener salt; and protect the Town's many endangered species; etc.

The challenge of any crossroads is both in choosing the correct road to take and maneuvering safely to that road. Ultimately, the key challenges of the Plan are in developing sustainable economic

growth while addressing the core issues as they evolve over time. Anticipation of additional issues is not only an ongoing challenge but also an opportunity for our government. The critical components of the Plan, our economic health, protection of our environment and natural resources, and enhancing our community's appearance and character, require constant focus and attention. Among several of the more specific challenges are how best to:

• Revise the various Town Code provisions that affect the issues identified

Enhance our public open spaces such as our parks, trails, waterfront corridors, and to create interconnectivity with these spaces and facilities;

• Mitigate against future flooding not just along the creek and river corridors but also originating from our oversaturated wetlands;

• Expand the pipeline infrastructure for Town water and sewage;

 Address the need for smaller housing units for non-traditional households and seniors, most of which housing needs to be within the economic reach of our resi-

• Create more sustainable economic development and redevelopment along our commercial corridors and hamlet commercial districts (adding more car dealerships is not the solution); and

Enhance our community's character by capitalizing on our unique combination of assets in order to sustain Wappinger as an attractive place in which

In my third installment of this series of articles I will address my vision on how all of the above can be achieved.

Slump drops Renegades to 15-17 on the season

It's official.

The Hudson Valley Renegades are mired in one of their worst slumps in years.

The area's High Class A minor league baseball team, an affiliate of the New York Yankees, lost their fifth straight game and eighth in the last 11 games on Sunday afternoon in a 3-2 defeat to the Aberdeen (Md.) IronBirds at Dutchess Stadium.

Hudson Valley is now 15-17 overall.

The Renegades have yet to complete a quarter of their schedule, but are already 9.5 games behind the scorching 24-7 IronBirds in the South Atlantic League's North Division.

Hudson Valley struck first in the bottom of the first inning against Aberdeen starter Jean Pinto. Cooper Bowman and Austin Wells banged back-to-back doubles to produce a run and make it 1-0 Renegades.

The IronBirds responded in the top of the second inning on a Billy Cook sacrifice fly to tie the game at one.

Hudson Valley starter Blas Castaño lasted 4.2 innings, allowing one run on

five hits, striking out four and walking one.


The Renegades jumped ahead in the bottom of the sixth against Ignacio Feliz. Carlos Narvaez doubled to lead off the inning and came around to score on a wild pitch to give Hudson Valley a 2-1 lead.

In the top of the seventh, Donta' Williams launched a solo homer to right field off Alex Mauricio to level the score at two.

In the top of the ninth against Jhonatan Muñoz, John Rhodes lifted a sacrifice fly to give the IronBirds a 3-2 lead. The goahead run was charged to Wellington Diaz (2-1), who allowed Connor Pavolony to reach base earlier in the frame.

Nick Roth (1-1) fired two scoreless innings of relief for Aberdeen. Jake Prizina closed it out to earn his second save, striking out one in a scoreless ninth. After doubling with two outs and advancing on an error, James Nelson was caught stealing home for the final out of the game.

Hudson Valley was scheduled to start a six-game series on the road at Brooklyn on Tuesday.

GLINER'S KORNER!

Adjusting to weekly schedules, longer seasons and game times

Every week, Hudson Valley Renegades President Steve Gliner sits down with reporter Rich Thomaselli to discuss the team in particular, and minor league baseball in general.

So you were just home for a week and now head back on the road for a week. Tell me how much easier it is to play a week at a time instead of 12 games in 13 days.

From a standpoint of consistency, it's great. We know we're playing Tuesday through Sunday. It's easy. When fans know that we're home, were home Tuesday through Sunday. As I've said a couple of times, the biggest adjustment for us is having fans recognize we're playing in April and May instead of starting in June like we did for 25-26 years.

You're in a league now in High Class A filled with teams that haven't had to make that adjustment.

You have all these other teams that

were always full season that played in April and May and the biggest thing for them is there hasn't been a drastic change. For us, Brooklyn and Aberdeen, that's been the biggest adjustments. Now the weather is starting to change but when it's colder and school is going on you have people who say, 'You know, I might wait until the weather gets warmer.' But it's mid-May now and it's definitely getting better.

You always talk about having conversations with the other presidents and general managers of Yankees' farm teams, do you talk to other teams in the South Atlantic League about how they're adjusting or have made the adjustment to full-season?

We've had some conversations among ourselves and we're all experiencing the same thing. Last year was not a great year to gauge that and have those restrictions on capacity in place for much of the season because of the pan-



demic. I think two or three years down the road from now we'll learn from that and make adjustments, maybe with game times or even promotions. Like, we did a lot with our promotions in April and May and that didn't move the needle as much as we would like. No matter what you do, you can't predict the weather when you create a promotion schedule in January.

What do you mean about fiddling with the game times, especially on a weeknight?

A lot of teams start their games at 6:30 p.m., some even at 6 p.m. We've always started at 7:05 and if you look at the trends with temperatures they drop quickly. We've always been very consistent at starting at 7:05, but if you start an hour earlier, even a half-hour, you get more sunlight and warmer temperatures. Look at our Sunday home games. This is the first year in 25 years we've played Sunday games earlier than 4:30 (games now start at 2:05 on Sunday afternoons). We've gotten feedback that people have really enjoyed that.

Transportation Council study recommends roundabouts for Rt. 9 – Arterial interchange

The Dutchess County Transportation Council (DCTC) has announced the completion of Poughkeepsie 9.44.55, its detailed study of how to redesign the Route 9 interchange and Route 44/55 arterials in Poughkeepsie to make them safer, more reliable, and better integrated with nearby neighborhoods.

A cooperative effort of the DCTC, New York State Department of Transportation (NYSDOT), Dutchess County, and the City and Town of Poughkeepsie, Poughkeepsie 9.44.55 was funded by the Federal Highway and Transit Administration through the DCTC's planning program.

The 9.44.55 study was split into two phases - the first looking at redesign options for the Route 9 interchange near the Mid-Hudson Bridge, the second looking at redesign options for the Route 44/55 Arterials in the City and Town of Poughkeepsie.

For the interchange, the study recommends replacing the existing "bow-tie" configuration with roundabouts, increasing the length of on- and off-ramps, and removing some of the awkward left-side merging movements. For the arterials, the study recommends a pilot project to test a redesign that reduces each Arterial from three to two lanes of one-way traf-


fic. At this point, no funding or schedule for actual construction has been identified by NYSDOT, who would be the project sponsor.

The study team developed the recommendations based on a detailed traffic simulation analysis and comprehensive public outreach process, knowing that people experience these facilities in different ways. The traffic simulation also provided insight into where bottlenecks might occur under several scenarios, including two-way traffic on the arterials and various levels of traffic. The DCTC considers the conclusion of Poughkeepsie 9.44.55 as the beginning of an ongoing conversation with the city, town, county, and state, and more importantly, with the many residents and visitors who use the Interchange and Arterials every day.

The results of the study will inform ongoing coordination efforts and be used to leverage future funding opportunities. The study documents, including an Executive Summary, are available on the project website at poughkeepsie 94455.com/library.

In 1888, Mary Taft had purchased the island. In 1900, two years after the Spanish American War, Bannerman purchased the island from Taft.

"There is one stipulation," said Johnson, that Taft had for the sale. There would be no alcohol stored or made on the island. Bannerman followed that stipulation.

"He learned to reuse and repurpose everything," said Johnson.

Bannerman was accused of profiteering by a U.S. congressman. The navy seized the island "looking for shenanigans," said Johnson. The navy was there for a couple of months, according to Johnson, and never found anything. Bannerman died five days after World Wat I, said Johnson. Two of his three sons continued to run the business.

There was a huge fire on the island in

The island became part of the Hudson Highlands State Park. Then in 1994, The Bannerman Castle Trust was incorporated. A decade later, formal island tours begin and in 2011 the residence was stabilized. Six years later, the Bannerman Visitor/Education Center opened.

Visitors to the island can attend tours and a variety of shows. Shows also include dinner. Broadway star Craig

County encourages baby formula donations

Dutchess County Executive Marc Molinaro announced the County is partnering with Community Action Partnership for Dutchess County to encourage donations of infant formula for local families, as supply chain issues and product recalls have created a nationwide shortage of many infant formula products.

As the U.S. Food and Drug Administration (FDA) works closely with manufacturers to increase production and bring supplies back to normal levels, Dutchess County has asked local residents to donate their unused, unopened, unexpired infant formula to benefit local families in need of this critical resource. These excess supplies can be donated and provided to families in need through a partnership with Community Action Partnership.

Dutchess residents are asked not to purchase formula to donate, as this may further reduce supplies for families; but rather, only donate these resources if they already have them in their home. Residents interested in financially contributing to support purchasing formula for families in need can donate online to Community Action Partnership for Dutchess County online at dutchesscapproof.presencehost.net/how_to_help/donate. html or by calling 845-452-5104.

County Executive Molinaro said, "There is nothing more vital to a child's development than proper nutrition, and the current nationwide shortage of infant formula can leave parents in a dire predicament. Dutchess County is famous for its generosity and sense of community, and we ask local parents who have surplus formula in their cupboards to share it with families in need. Raising healthy children is a shared responsibility, and if you're able to help fellow parents through this difficult time, we hope you will consider sharing this critical commodity."

We are grateful to Dutchess County Government and County Executive Molinaro for assisting us to help the hardest impacted families in our community who have the challenging, yet rewarding, task of raising healthy and successful children."

Parents having difficulty finding formula for their children locally are urged to call their pediatrician, contact local food banks, call Community Action Partnership for Dutchess County at 845-452-5104 extension 103. The New York Milk Bank may also be a resource, particularly for babies needing specialized formulas due to allergies or insensitivities; parents can visit nymilk-bank.org for more information.

The Dutchess County Department of Behavioral and Community Health offers the following tips for local parents having difficulty finding infant formula:

• Do not make homemade formula, as homemade formulas may not provide babies the right levels of nutrients;

• You can switch brands in formulas, as for most infants, it is safe to switch to any available brand of formula, including store brands. Parents should ask their pediatrician about specialty formula alternatives that will be safe for their child;

• Do not start using cow milk, juices, solid foods, or toddler formula before recommended by your pediatrician; and

• Do not overdilute the formula, as adding extra water to formula can lead to serious health problems for children.

Families interested in assistance receiving support form a lactation specialist to increase their supply of breast milk and/or restart breast milk supply should contact their healthcare provider as well as their insurance carrier about lactation related services that may be covered. 

Two local artists reflect distinct hallmarks of each half of 20th century

They both grew up in Poughkeepsie, although one went to Poughkeepsie High School, and the other went to Arlington. They both had an artistic eye that resulted in their work gaining international attention. But the very different tenor and style of their work reflects the very different times they lived in: one in the first half of the 20th century, the other in the second half.

Ernest Hamlin Baker

Ernest Hamlin Baker (1889-1975) grew up on Church Street in Poughkeepsie, the son of a shirt factory worker. He graduated from Poughkeepsie High School in 1903 and started working at the same factory. By 1906 he had taken a correspondence course in drawing and started creating cartoons for Poughkeepsie's Evening Enterprise, a Democratic leaning newspaper just as there was a resurgence of support for Democratic. The resurgence included the surprising election of Democratic State Senator Franklin D. Roosevelt in 1910, in his first political bid. FDR won again in 1912 and was then appointed Assistant Secretary of the Navy.

Among DCHS Collections that relate to Edward Perkins, a Poughkeepsie man who was head of the Dutchess County Democratic party at the time (his service as county and then state chairman of the Democratic party stretched from 1910 to 1944, parallel to FDR's political career), is a cartoon of Perkins "orchestrating" a post office appointment that ran in the Evening Enterprise in 1913. Perkins seems to have clipped it out, signed it, and pasted it with

pride in his scrapbook (see image).

Hamlin went to Colgate College in 1910 and continued drawing, including for the Enterprise. After college, he created a noted World War One poster, and started to get into magazine covers by the 1920s.

A 1946 critical review of Baker's work explained that as Time magazine covers were becoming iconic works in the 1930s, there was less and less time for the artist to complete the work. This prompted the illustrator Baker to rely on photographs. But rather than take inspiration from a single photograph, he reviewed as many photographs as Time could provide to him, studying them in great detail and coming to know varying expressions and details. It was said of Baker, "the human face for him became a vast landscape to be explored as by a traveler." And it was from the volume of photographs, not a single photograph, that he drew from. Baker created over 300 covers for Time (more than any other person) with striking illustrations and set a new style in journalism.

By the 1930s and 1940s, Baker's fellow Dutchess County friends like Franklin Roosevelt had become US president, while Fishkill's Henry Morgenthau became Secretary of the Treasury. Both men were among the 300 covers created by Baker for Time.

Among the less likely class of items in DCHS Collections are oral histories. One we draw from today is a 2010 interview conducted by Nan Fogel with William Linich

(1940 -2016). Linich was known as "Billy Name" in the 1960s when he collaborated in New York City with Andy Warhol. At the end of the interview, Linich inscribed the published book of his photographs for DCHS: "Billy Name, Stills from the Warhol Films" (Prestel, New York, 1994).

From the Estate of Billy Name we find this quote, "I came out in 1958, in my senior year of [Arlington] high school. I told people I was a homosexual, even though I hated that word. I was just using it because it was available. It was such a relief to have it come into the public eye and have it be open, open, open until it was a blossom." Citing this as among the reasons he moved to New York City in the late 1950s, Linich and Warhol's paths crossed at Linich's apartment.

Linich held haircutting parties in the apartment he transformed for himself into a floor-to-ceiling, wall-to-wall silver with a combination of foil and silver paint. Warhol came to one of those parties in November of 1963 and so loved the silver that Warhol asked Linich to install the same at Warhol's "factory" or studio. Linich often referenced the fact that growing up he would see the Mid-Hudson Bridge regularly painted silver and this left an impression in his mind.

Warhol gave Linich (by then known as Billy Name) a still camera that he would no longer use as Warhol was moving into movies. This is how Billy Name came to take the many thousands of iconic photographs of the historic period. Linich was at the factory when Andy Warhol was shot and nearly killed, holding Warhol in his arms until the ambulance arrived.

The US Post Office published a Warhol commemorative stamp in 2002. The stamp itself is a Warhol self-portrait in a photo booth, but the image used in packaging a set of them uses a photo of Warhol by Linich.

booth, but the image used in packaging a set of them uses a photo of Warhol by Linich.

The estate of Bill Name references two quotes of Andy Warhol that are illuminating. Warhol said "Billy was responsible for the silver at the factory. It was the perfect time to think silver. Silver was the future, it was spacey – the astronauts wore silver suits – Shepard Grisson, and Glenn had already been up in them, and their equipment was silver, too. The only things that ever came

close to conveying the look and feel of the factory then, aside from the movies we shot there, were the still photographs Billy took."


'Tales of Mark Twain' set May 21-22 at The Stissing Center

Broccoli di Rabe Ingredients

• 2 bunches broccoli rabe (about 2 pounds)

• 1/4 cup extra-virgin olive oil

- 1 clove garlic, crushed and coarsely chopped

 - 1/2 teaspoon salt
- 1/4 cup very small black olives (Kalamata), pitted

leaving some water still clinging to the leaves.

• Heat oil over medium heat in a deep pot, large enough to hold all the broccoli rabe. Add garlic and Chile pepper; cook, stirring, just until the garlic starts to soften, 1 to 2 minutes. Add the broccoli rabe by the handful, letting it wilt a bit before adding more. Cover and cook, stirring occasionally, until it is tender and just a few spoonful's of liquid remain in the pan, 15 to 20 minutes. (The water on the leaves should be plenty for cooking, but check the pan from time to time and add water if

• Stir well to coat. Season with salt and stir in olives.

• Serve immediately with warm crusty Italian bread and a nice Pinot Grigio.
