'He is a great dad'

Helping local community is Scofield family tradition

Glenn R. Scofield Sr. and Glenn R. Scofield Jr., father and son, have given back to the local community in many ways. Both have been in law enforcement and volunteered with the local fire department. The senior Scofield was the Town of Fishkill Highway Superintendent for more than 50 years. Before him, the elder Scofield's father was the highway superintendent. The younger Scofield is currently the police commissioner for the Village of Fishkill.

"I never had to worry about him. He was never a wise guy," Scofield said about his son. "I'm happy where he came from, in the fire department and police department, rising up the ranks."

The elder Scofield's two other sons, Keith and Dean, have also given back to the community by volunteering with the Village of Fishkill Fire Department.

"Keith, he recently relocated to South Carolina. He was a Lieutenant [in the fire department]," explained the younger Scofield, about his brother. "He did some amazing saves (saving people's lives) with the fire department."

Dean was the fire chief for 14 years. He is also on the Village of Fishkill Board of Trustees. Dean "made some incredible improvements in the fire department," noted his brother.

Both also remarked that Ryann, who is the daughter and sister of senior and junior respectively (and who also have a step-daughter and stepsister Michele respectively), was active in sports in the community.

"Dad was very good to all of us. He made sure we were taken care of. He worked all those years at the Highway Department," the junior Scofield said about his father. Up until the late 1960s, the elder Scofield was a sergeant with the Village of Fishkill Police, his son noted.

He also worked part-time as a deputy for the Sheriff's Office. "I actually had the good fortune to have him as a role model – his dedication to the community was the biggest thing I took away from it," said Scofield Jr.

"He is a great dad," said Scofield Jr., who added his father even coached the children's sports teams for a while.

Asked what his relatives have planned for him this Father's Day, the elder Scofield said the family will wait until that day to tell him. His son will be traveling with his own son, for baseball.

"We'll catch up though," remarked the younger Scofield.

The American Heart Association celebrates 100 years


The CEO of the American Heart Association, Nancy Brown, says that on June 10, 1924, a spark ignited the torch that the American Heart Association proudly carries today. It's a reference to the widely recognized logo of the Association, which features a torch.

On that day in 1924, six physicians formed the American Heart Association as a scientific society by electing a board of directors and officers. The society grew out of meetings of physician and social workers who had begun to seek answers about heart disease in 1915, shortly before heart disease became the No. 1 cause of death in the U.S.

In this Centennial year, the American Heart Association is celebrating accomplishments that have cut deaths from heart disease in the U.S. in half.

That accomplishment has happened in large part due to the scientific reach, public policies and public awareness raised by the Association.



Mount Gulian to host garden tours June 15-16

Mount Gulian Historic Site, Beacon, in cooperation with Dutchess Tourism, will open the garden and unique horticultural history of the site on Saturday, June 15 and Sunday, June 16. Special garden tours will be given at 11 a.m. and 1 p.m.

"Our Heritage Garden was originally planted in 1804 by Congressman D.C. Verplanck and his daughter Mary Anna as an English ornamental garden, then the rage for wealthy families in the Hudson Valley. It was part of a much larger "kitchen garden" that was used for food for the family. So, both garden lovers and the history minded enjoy coming here," explained Elaine Hayes, who is the executive director of the historic site.

Hayes was asked which flowers and plants visitors most are interested in learning about.

"Fraxinella, the "gas plant" is always a favorite, as well as our historic yucca, peonies, and roses. We've reconstructed a portion of the original garden plan, including restoring the pergola, and sundial which visitors enjoy seeing," replied Hayes. According to gardenmyths.com, "The name gas plant refers to the ... fragrant, flammable oils produced both during flowering, and while it produces seeds. The fragrance is lemony and quite pleasant. If you touch the plant, you will feel the oils produced." Visitors will receive a copy of the 1912 garden map before going on a tour.

Visitors can learn about James F. Brown and Virginia Eliza Darby Verplanck and their importance to the garden's history.

Hayes explained, "Mr. Brown was an enslaved man who escaped from Maryland in 1827. A key employee of the Verplancks for forty years, he was the estate's master gardener and a close acquaintance of Andrew Jackson Downing, the father of landscape architecture who lived in Newburgh, [Orange County]. Brown's personal journal includes detailed reports on plantings, harvests and attending horticultural fairs." She continued, "Mrs. Verplanck was a well-known gardener and author of two garden books from the early 1900s. She was one of the important women who lived at Mount Gulian at the turn of the last century."

A short film about Mr. Brown, "Cultivating Freedom: From Slave to Citizen" will be shown.

Admission to this special tour is: \$14 adults; \$12 seniors; \$8 youngsters (6-18 years). Children under 6 and Mount Gulian members are free. Visitors can sign up for membership.

Reservations are preferred but walk-ins will be accepted if spots are available. For reservations call 845-831-8172 or email info@mountgulian.org. Payment may be made on the day of the visit.

Juneteenth event to raise funds for Beacon Community Kitchen

A Juneteenth fundraiser is planned for 5-10 p.m. on Saturday, June 22, at "The Yard" in Beacon. The event is being organized to raise funds and awareness for the Beacon Community Kitchen and the Learning Farm of Ithaca. It is also supported by John Brown Lives.

Juneteenth is a federal holiday that recognizes the end of slavery and celebrates the perseverance and resilience of African Americans in their struggle for freedom and equality. The fundraiser seeks to honor the lives lost in the fight for freedom while supporting local organizations.

The event will include dance performances, a multi-course dinner prepared by local chefs, realism painter Doris Hughes-Moore and the folk band "Magpie," which features Terry Leonino and Greg Artzner.

Magpie performs music inspired by abolitionist John Brown and the other men who died by his side. They honor their stories through narrative folk music. Leonino said they are performing a song cycle that honors the lives of John Brown's cohort to contribute to the honoring of the lives lost in the fight for emancipation.

"History is one of those gifts that is a visual for us to look forward and learn from our past," Leonino said. "So that's

what, what the beauty of an event like this is when you have all the generations of today getting an opportunity to learn about things that they might not know about and enjoy visual art, music and dance, all in one place."

In addition to recognizing the importance of Juneteenth, the event also seeks to raise money for two organizations. The Beacon Community Kitchen is a local program that is part of the non-profit community organization, In Care of Multi-Services (ICOMS). Services are primarily provided through the Tabernacle of Christ Church. The event celebrates diversity, equity, inclusion and community as a whole.

Candi Rivera, a volunteer for the event and the founder of ICOMS said the fundraiser will be a great way to unite the community.

"I think [the event] will give the community an opportunity to see how everyone can come together and put all their differences aside whether it be political, social, whichever," Rivera said. "We're coming together as one for this event so that it can be a success."

The Learning Farm of Ithaca uses food to bring people together. They provide high-quality food and beverages and prioritize the well-being of people and the


The Elmira River Sharks was purchased by the Manning family to be relocated to the Hudson Valley.

The general election for the Village of Fishkill will be held on Tuesday, June 18. There are four candidates running for two seats on the Village Board of Trustees. The candidates are Danielle Hughes, Anne Machado, Trudi Newhard and Tricia Rice. Newhard is currently on the board. The term is for three years.

The polls will be open from Noon-9 p.m. at Van Wyck Hall, 1095 Main St. in Fishkill.

The four candidates were emailed the following questions:

1. Why are you running for office?
2. What experience will you bring?

Danielle Hughes

Hughes is running on the Crossroads Party line.

Why are you running for office?

"My name is Danielle Hughes. I had lived in the village in my twenties and was happy to be able to move back 5 years ago to start our family. My husband and I felt lucky to find a home that afforded us a walking lifestyle and small-town feel," she stated.

What experience will you bring?

"My inspiration to run for office comes from an eye-opening experience during a recent development process. Like many residents, I felt frustrated by the lack of transparency and often felt dismissed when voicing concerns about the scope of the project."

Hughes continued, "As a law enforcement officer, I value community and how change affects our citizens. I aim to be a part of a team that can ensure the village remains beautiful and historical while responsibly growing with the times and positively responding to Village residents's concerns."

Anne Machado

Machado is running on the Crossroads Party line.

Why are you running for office?

"As a member of the Village community for 30 years I've seen changes to

Village life. I became more vocal over concerns I had about the direction of the Village during the consideration of a recent development project development project. We neighbors had hoped the Village would have responded to our concerns and facilitated more reasonable development. After attending some of the Trustee meetings, I thought my voice would better serve residents as part of the Village Board. The Village Trustee position is an opportunity that presented itself and I was inspired to run for office," said Machado.

Trudi Newhard (Incumbent)

Newhard is running on the Fight For Your Right Party line.



Dutchess County to receive over \$600K for Summer Youth Employment Program

Governor Kathy Hochul announced last week that more than 20,000 youth from low-income households are expected to be employed across the state this summer through New York State's Summer Youth Employment Program. The Office of Temporary and Disability Assistance is distributing \$55 million, an increase of \$7.9 million over last year, to all 57 counties and New York City to help youth who might not otherwise have access to summer jobs enter the labor market, acquire professional skills and explore possible career paths.

Dutchess County will receive \$601,494 for the local program, according to a press release from the governor's office.

"The Summer Youth Employment Program helps young New Yorkers find good summer jobs that will give them valuable experience and skills to help prepare them for future employment," Governor Hochul said. "For many participants, this will be their first time in the workforce, and these new experi-

ences will help them greatly as they pursue their educational and career goals into adulthood."

The Summer Youth Employment Program supports communities across the state in creating summer jobs for youth from low-income families. Participants work in entry-level jobs at places such as parks, summer camps, child care organizations, cultural centers, educational facilities and community-based organizations, among others.

To be eligible for the program, youth must be between the ages of 14 and 20 and be a member of a household with a household income below 200 percent of the federal poverty level, which varies by household size and, for example, is \$51,640 for a family of three.


The FY25 Enacted Budget included an increase of \$7.9 million for the program over last year to address minimum wage increases and to increase the number of participants. The program served more than 18,400 young people last summer.

As the Association has evolved, it has kept science at its core, investing \$5.7 billion in research in its lifetime. The Association has funded 15 Nobel prize winners, including 10 whose Heart Association-funded work led to the Nobel prize.

This means that if you have a stent, take medication to improve your blood pressure or cholesterol, or have had cardiac or brain surgery, the American Heart Association has likely helped you. Research today extends to precision medicine, figuring out what makes people respond differently to treatments and medication. The American Heart Association will also continue to study the link between COVID and cardiovascular disease.

When Damar Hamlin of the Buffalo Bills collapsed on the football field in early January 2023, CPR saved his life. The American Heart Association's science created and continues to refine CPR. Today, creating a Nation of Lifesavers is a top priority for the Association, as CPR is taught throughout communities. Passage of the CPR in Schools Law in New York in 2015 means that everyone who gradu-

ates from a New York high school knows Hands-only CPR, so that more people are ready to change the statistic that only 10 percent of people who suffer a sudden cardiac arrest survive.

Other legislative accomplishments include the Pulse Ox law, which requires that blood oxygen levels be tested in newborns before they leave the hospital, and the Clean Indoor Air Act, banning tobacco use inside.

Ending health disparities is a priority of the Association, as study after study shows that health and treatment outcomes are often worse in under-resourced communities.

Each year, thousands of people join the American Heart Association's events, like the Hudson Valley Heart Walk on the Walkway Over the Hudson, and the Go Red for Women Luncheon. Survivors share their stories and raise awareness that heart disease and stroke can happen to anyone. Information about heart disease and stroke is also readily available at events, as are health screenings.

Children participate in the Kids Heart Challenge at their schools, raising money while learning about a healthy lifestyle.

The Get with the Guidelines program pro-

vides measurements that hospitals can use to provide the best outcome for patients with cardiac issues.

Volunteers are essential to the work of the American Heart Association. Susan Browning, president of Vassar Brothers Medical Center and western regional president of Nuvance Health, is chairing the 2024 Hudson Valley Go Red for Women Luncheon on Nov. 14 at The Grandview in Poughkeepsie.

"We realize that the work is not yet finished," said Susan Browning, president of Vassar Brothers Medical Center and western regional president of Nuvance Health, and chair of the 2024 Hudson Valley Go Red for Women Luncheon. Doubleheader action and strong out of the bullpen

DAILY DOUBLE: Hudson Valley has had four doubleheaders scheduled this year, the most in the minor leagues.

CONSISTENCY: Baron Stuart continued his strong stretch of pitching on Wednesday at Frawley Stadium in Wilmington, going 5-plus innings for the fourth consecutive start. He allowed just two runs on three hits in five innings, while striking out five. The Renegades right-hander has been charged with just eight earned runs in his last 23.1 innings.

DIVISION RACE: The South Atlantic League North division continues to be very closely contested, with 4.5 games separating the top five teams. Hudson Valley as of June 7 was just a half game back of Jersey Shore and Brooklyn and

four games back of first-place Greensboro.

THE 'PEN IS MIGHTIER: The Renegades bullpen collectively sports a 3.00 ERA (72 ER/215.2 IP) this season, the best mark in High-A and sixth-best in MiLB.

STELLAR STARTERS: Starting pitching continues to be excellent for the Renegades. In the team's last seven games as of Friday, all seven starters went at least five innings, striking out 33 batters in 39 innings. Each pitcher has also allowed three earned runs or fewer in their outings. On Tuesday at Wilmington, Jackson Fristoe tossed a career-high six innings, allowing just two hits and no runs. In his last two starts, Fristoe has not allowed a run and has been charged with just two hits across nine innings.

Rain storms dominate as Renegades grab key victories over Blue Rocks

The Hudson Valley Renegades not only had to dodge the opposing team, but rain storms as well last week.

Inclement weather was the dominant theme of the Renegades' series in Wilmington.

It necessitated the scheduling of three doubleheaders, one of which was cut short by a game because, you guessed it, the rain.

Lifted by several strong offensive performances and a season-high 17 strikeouts by four pitchers, the Renegades defeated the Blue Rocks 8-2 on Sunday afternoon at Frawley Stadium. The win moves the Renegades to 2.5 games out of first place with nine games remaining in the first half of the South Atlantic League season. The Renegades are home at Heritage Financial Park this week with a six-game series against the Brooklyn Cyclones.

In the third twinbill of the rare eight-game series, the Renegades split a doubleheader with the Blue Rocks on Saturday night at Frawley Stadium. The Renegades took game one 4-0 on a combined one-hitter, and fell in game two, 4-2.

Ben Shields was masterful for the Renegades in the opener, shutting down the Blue Rocks across 6.0 scoreless innings. He allowed only one hit, a two-out single to Matt Suggs in the bottom of the fifth, while walking three and tying his career-high with eight strikeouts.

Shields (2-2) threw his second consecutive quality start, and combined between his last two outings has thrown 12.0 innings, allowing three runs on six hits, three walks and 13 strikeouts. He com-

bined with McKinley Moore to complete a one-hit shutout of Wilmington, the fifth shutout thrown this year by Hudson Valley, and the second one-hitter.

The Renegades took the lead in the top of the fourth when Beau Brewer ripped a two-run double to left-center off Bryan Caceres (0-5) to chase Josh Moylan and Nelson Medina home. Medina had a breakout game at the plate, finishing 2-for-2 with a run scored and a walk, ending an 0-for-28 skid with a key performance. Hudson Valley tacked on two more in the top of the seventh when Jared Serna doubled and scored on a Jesus Rodriguez triple, and Rodriguez dashed home during the next at-bat on a wild pitch by Chance Huff.

Blane Abeyta got the start for the Renegades in game two, and allowed three runs on three hits in the bottom of the second to allow the Blue Rocks to take a 3-0 lead. Wilmington added another on a sacrifice fly in the third to take a 4-0 advantage, but Hudson Valley pitching was perfect after that.

Behind an outstanding pitching performance by Jackson Fristoe and four homeruns, the Renegades blasted the Blue Rocks, 10-2 on Tuesday night.

On Wednesday the Renegades defeated the Blue Rocks 4-2 in game one of their scheduled doubleheader at Frawley Stadium in a game called due to inclement weather in the top of the seventh. The nightcap was postponed due to inclement weather. Baron Stuart delivered a strong start for the Renegades in the first game of the scheduled twinbill, allowing two runs on three hits across 5.0 innings, while walking three and striking out five. Stuart

(3-1) picked up a win in his fourth straight start, including one in a spot start with Triple-A Scranton/Wilkes-Barre.

The Blue Rocks jumped out to a 2-0 lead in the bottom of the second when TJ White brought in Will Frizzell with a sacrifice fly, and Gavin Dugas scored on a balk by Stuart. The Renegades struck back with a run in the top of the third against Luke Young. Beau Brewer led off the inning with a single and came home to score two batters later on a Jared Serna RBI double to cut the deficit to 2-1. Hudson Valley took the lead in the top of the fifth when Rafael

Flores blasted a two-out, two-run double to right-center off Thomas Schultz to put the Renegades in front 3-2. Flores finished 1-for-3 with a double and two RBIs, and extended his hitting streak to 10 consecutive games. Serna extended the lead to 4-2 by driving in pinch runner Roc Riggio with a single in the top of the seventh before rain began to fall and the game entered a delay. Serna finished 3-for-4 with a run scored, a double, and two RBI.

Hudson Valley split another double header on Thursday and lost a single game on Friday night.



Does it give you a sense of pride or satisfaction to see someone who played for the Renegades make it to the Major Leagues?

There are a lot of players over the years that you develop a relationship with and become fan favorites. It's really cool to be able to see that and to say, 'I knew them when...' I believe we have a few of those guys this year. They are great clubhouse guys and have the potential to crack a Major League roster. You always root for those kinds of players.

Each week writer Rich Thomaselli and Hudson Valley Renegades General Manager Zach Betkowski sit down to discuss the Renegades in particular and minor league baseball in general.

You have had a bout with inclement weather. How difficult is that?

Yeah. So usually our communication system is just transparent with the weather. I always note to both field staffs and umpires that I am not a meteorologist. I'm simply just looking at radars that predict whether much like meteorologists will do.

And I'll just show them exactly what I've seen. And, in a lot of cases, we'll just take it hour-by-hour, minute-by-minute. And we just agree to transparent with one another and not try to jeopardize player safety and player development, because ultimately those things are first and foremost. We don't want anyone getting hurt. But, we have a responsibility to run our business and fans that are attending our games expect to see baseball. So we want to be fair to both parties.

When a new player joins the

Renegades, what do you and your team have to do?

The Yankees have staff here that will welcome them. We have a clubhouse manager who has been with the team now for five-plus years that takes great care of them when they arrive at the clubhouse facilities. And then, we also integrate them into the Renegades culture and experience. We'll kind of just see if they want to provide a headshot, if they have preferred walk-up music, and then just, you know, show them and answer any questions they may have.



Dutchess Land Conservancy gains funding through FPIG program

Governor Kathy Hochul announced recently that nearly \$33 million is being awarded to not-for-profit conservation organizations to protect a total of 12,356 acres of valuable farmland on 33 farms across the State through the Farmland Protection Implementation Grants (FPIG) program. This is the third and final group of conservation easements funded through Round 19 of the program, which is helping to keep agricultural land in production, ensure the long-term viability of New York's farming operations, and strengthen New York's agricultural industry.

In Dutchess County - Dutchess Land Conservancy - Knapp Farm (cash crop oper-

ation awarded under Viable Agricultural Land - Other category) was awarded \$679,462 for 145 acres with 78 percent productive soils.

Round 19 of the State's Farmland Protection program supports the State's top priorities - like food security, climate resiliency, and source water protection - and includes the agroforestry, equine, and wine sectors as eligible applicants. In addition, the eligibility criteria includes three newer categories: field crops, livestock or livestock products, and access to farmland. Access to farmland is intended to help address ongoing challenges facing new and beginning farmers as well as retiring farmers in this area.

Serino introduces new 'Fly Car' initiative for life-saving equipment, EMS recruitment

With support from the Dutchess County Legislature, Dutchess County Executive Sue Serino is working to forge a new partnership with local fire departments, rescue squads and ambulance corps to bolster Emergency Medical Services (EMS) recruitment, as part of multi-faceted effort to spotlight and address the growing EMS crisis, which has resulted in longer ambulance response times.

Serino is proposing a new program to provide life-saving equipment to fire departments for their "fly car" vehicles in exchange for unified EMS recruitment messaging to be displayed on these highly visible vehicles. The unified messaging will connect people to information about Emergency Medical Technician (EMT) and Paramedic volunteer and career opportunities.

Serino said, "This new Fly Car partnership is part of the outside-the-box thinking we are doing to tackle the EMS challenges. Putting targeted EMS recruitment messaging on the outside of Fly Car, and adding new life-saving equipment inside, we are working to incentivize neighbors to join this vital line of work and make a career of saving lives." Dutchess County Legislature Chairman Will Truitt said, "While New York State may not recognize EMS as an essential service, we do here in Dutchess County. We are focused on trying new, innovative approaches, like this 'Fly Car' recruitment initiative, to help support and grow EMS resources throughout the county. There is not a singular solution to solving the issues that surround the EMS crisis, and I am pleased that Dutchess County is willing to be creative with a multi-pronged approach."

Across the nation, including here in Dutchess County, there are a multitude of challenges straining Emergency Medical Services. The primary challenge is staffing, with fewer volunteers than ever before and the number of people entering, or getting recertified, in the EMS field on the decline, according to a 2023 EMS Sustainability report from the New York State Department of Health's Bureau of Emergency Medical and Trauma Services.

Fewer people serving in the EMS field results in a negative impact on response time. While the industry standard for an EMS response time to a Priority 1 call, or a life-threatening emergency, should be under nine minutes 90% of the time, currently in Dutchess County, nearly 50% of those calls take nine minutes or more.

Fly cars, which are non-transporting, EMS vehicles, can have a vital role in helping people before an ambulance arrives. Fly cars are often first on the scene of an emergency, transporting EMS first responders who can provide emergency medical services to stabilize patients and prepare them for ambulance transport if necessary.

Serino, with the Dutchess County Department of Emergency Response, has been hosting regional meetings across the County to discuss EMS data and potential solutions with municipal leaders and fire department officials. In conversations with many local fire chiefs and rescue

squad leaders, there has been an expressed need for specialized life-saving equipment on fly cars, to better equip EMS first responders to be as effective as possible on scene. Equipment such as Lucas Chest Compression System, a portable, mechanical device that provides automated, external closed compressions to manage a cardiac arrest, can be a difference-maker in a situation where the first responder is solo at the scene for an extended period.

Under the County Executive's proposed initiative, all Dutchess County fire departments, rescue squads and ambulance corps will be eligible to apply for up to \$20,000 grant awards for life-saving equipment for their fly car vehicles. In exchange, the fly cars will feature branded, unified recruitment messaging on portions of the vehicle such as the rear windows/tailgates. The branding will include a centralized web address on the vehicles to prompt residents to consider career and volunteer opportunities and learn more about the EMS field, including the paramedic program at Dutchess Community College and scholarship opportunities. If approved by the County Legislature, the program will be funded with \$200,000 from the County's contingency fund.

New Hamburg Fire District Chief Jeff Renihan is highly supportive of the program. "It is so important for our EMS responders to have the right equipment when they are the first on the scene. Purchasing equipment like a LUCAS chest compression system is often out of reach for districts like ours, without

increasing fire taxes. We are grateful to Dutchess County Executive Sue Serino and the County Legislature for their commitment to being creative with solutions and their willingness to partner with the local fire departments. This new Fly Car program will enable our district to get critical life-saving equipment without burdening our taxpayers, while also getting out the message to help recruit new EMS first responders. It is a win-win proposal, and we look forward to partnering with the County," said Renihan.

The fly car equipment and recruitment initiative is part of a robust, multi-pronged approach that Dutchess County is taking to support and enhance EMS. Efforts also include the County seeking supplemental coverage to fill gaps in service and address areas where the longest response times occur, as well as "EMS Public Education" to ensure people understand when to call an ambulance to ensure adequate resources for priority calls.

Supporting current EMS first responders is also a priority. To help them avoid burn out and remain in the field, the County has been providing critical training specific to the needs of these high-stress roles including Mental Health training and First Responder Resiliency training. Hundreds of local responders have taken advantage of the various training offered so far this year.

The Dutchess County Legislature's Public Safety Committee considered the County Executive's resolution during committee meetings on Thursday, June 6.



Sunday Church Bells

When Pop comes for dinner, Luigi's kids love to hear stories about their father as a child.

The other day my father came over for dinner. He's 91 years old so he likes to eat early. Since my kids are all older it's difficult to get them all together, let alone at an early hour. I picked up my father at 3:30 p.m. for 4 p.m. dinner. I was relieved to see all the kids home when I pulled into my driveway.

As we sat around the table for dinner, my father asked each of his grandchildren where they were working, etc. Once my father was updated with everyone, attention turned to me. My kids wanted to hear stories about what I was like when I was little because they didn't believe all my stories. Of course, the one thing my father remembers was going to church.

I must have been 4 or 5 years old at the time. We always went to St. Peter's Church in Hyde Park, which was a chapel with the school gymnasium behind it that was opened up for Sunday services. The gymnasium also doubled as the cafeteria when school was in session, but that is another story for another day. Anyway, it was hot. Damn hot. As always, my four brothers and I were dressed in a jacket and pants for church. Never short sleeve shirts. Always long pants, never shorts. Always socks and shoes. Mom's rule, period.

We always sat to the left of the altar and had a perfect view of the priest and the altar servers. My brother, John, was an alter server at the time and Fr. Cody was the priest. I can still see John standing on the altar facing us in his black and white robes, hands devoutly clasped in front of him trying to look pious. Sweat pouring off his face with the flicker of the altar candles accenting the beads rolling down his nose. I, on the other hand, was busy making faces at him, trying to make him laugh. I would get into it pretty

good, sticking my tongue out, waving, and pushing up my nose like a pig. It always stopped abruptly when my father would reach behind me and smack the back of my head. I would wait a fair amount of time for my father to forget I was there, then start the game again, making faces until my father would spy me out of the corner of his eye and smack the back of my head again to make me stop again.

When Fr. Cody would start his sermon, I would nap, or try to. Honestly, I tried to stay awake, but I couldn't. I always fell asleep. Fr. Cody would start his sermon and automatically my eyes would get heavy and start to close. I would fight it for a few minutes but before I knew it, my head was bobbing, my mouth was open, drool was coming out of my mouth, and I would start to snore. When Pop noticed, he would reach behind me and yank my hair to wake me up. I remember waking up in a pool of perspiration and drool. The humidity in the church was so bad that the pews would get wet from our sweat, and we would stick to the wood. My poor father. He never had a moment's peace with me.

My favorite part of the mass is when the bells would be rung. When the altar server would ring the bells, they would always get carried away and make enough noise to wake the dead. I was told by my brother that there would be full scale arguments about who rang the bells. It was the best job. Sometimes they would fight over the bells right on the altar. Each altar server would have their hands on the bells and try to ring it for themselves. You could see them leaning into each other fighting for position.

The church would be silent at the most

solemn moment of mass. Altar servers fighting for bell position. Everybody's head is down in prayer. Fr. Cody would pick up the host and say, "This is my body which will be given up for you," the bells would start ringing. I would blurt out, "Hello? Hello?" Like it was a telephone ringing. Every time, I would get smacked. Every time my brothers would crack up and I would rub the back of my head.

People around us got quite used to it and even started to look forward to the brief comedy in the middle of Sunday mass. I remember one time Fr. Cody looking over to me laughing as I rubbed the back of my head.

The one good thing about Sunday was Sunday dinner. Mom always made something special if we were home instead of at our grandmother's house. When it was a special Sunday, she would make ricotta gnocchi. Because the gnocchi were light, she would make a quick tomato sauce to go with it. With some chunks of mozzarella mixed in to beef it up.

I remember coming home, getting out of our church clothes and watching Abbot and Costello and the Bowery boys as mom put together dinner. If the phone rang, I would jump up to answer it, saying "Hello. Hello?"

Ricotta Gnocchi

Ingredients

Gnocchi

1 (8 ounce) container ricotta cheese
2 eggs
1/2 cup freshly grated Parmesan cheese
1 teaspoon salt
1 teaspoon pepper
1 teaspoon fresh minced garlic
1 cup all-purpose flour, or as needed

Sauce

3 tablespoons olive oil
1 jar Coppola's Tuscan Sauce
1/2 lb. meatloaf mix

8 ounces fresh mozzarella cheese, cut into small chunks

Directions

Whip together the ricotta, eggs, Parmesan cheese, salt, pepper, and garlic in a large bowl. Mix in 1 cup of flour. The dough should be soft but semi-firm. Add a teaspoon of flour at a time until you reach the proper consistency.

Divide the dough into 3 or 4 pieces. Roll the dough into long half-inch tubular segments. Cut each segment into bite sized pieces, and place on a lightly floured baking sheet. Place in the refrigerator to firm up until ready to use.

Heat olive oil in a saucepan over medium heat. Stir in meatloaf mix and brown. Drain liquid and add Tuscan Sauce. Stir and let simmer for 10 minutes.

Bring a large pot of lightly salted water to a boil over high heat. Drop the gnocchi in the water and let them cook until they float to the surface, 1 to 2 minutes, then drain.

To assemble the dish, stir the cubed mozzarella cheese into the sauce and allow the heat of the sauce to soften but not melt the cheese. Place the gnocchi in the pot and toss lightly, careful not to damage the gnocchi.

Serve with crusty Italian bread and grated cheese.

Luigi Coppola is one of five brothers born to Francesca and Antonio Coppola. The Coppola family came to America from Naples, Italy in 1954. Antonio and his brothers opened their first restaurant in Poughkeepsie in 1961. Luigi and his brothers Nick, John, Antonio and Vincent have carried on the family tradition in the way their parents taught them, using classic recipes taught to them at their apron strings. The root of the matter

As a pescetarian whose diet is primarily plant-based, I am always scouting the produce section for new veggies to try. Cassava (kuh-sah'-vuh) is a root that has been popular in tropical regions for millennia. In the last several years, I have seen this vegetable in grocery stores much more frequently.

Cassava has always interested me because of its versatility. Like a potato, it can be boiled, roasted, and fried. Thin, bagged chips are sold which could compete with Lay's and Pringles. Most interestingly, tapioca is made from cassava. That makes the tropical root an important thickener and binder for puddings, noodles, bread, soups, and gravies.

What's in a name?

Like all living things, the cassava plant has a scientific name. It is *Manihot esculenta*. It also has several other common names. Among them are Brazilian arrowroot and yuca. My discovery of those additional titles left me perplexed.

I'll explain my confusion. There is a striking plant, commonly called Adam's Needle, which grows locally. It is one of approximately fifty species of plants from the yucca genus.

Maybe you are more observant than I. It was quite some time before I noticed that yucca (yuh'-kuh) and yuca (yoo'-kuh) are two different words. Indeed, they are two different plants.

Brazilian arrowroot is another moniker for *Manihot esculenta*. Arrowroot powder or flour are called for in recipes that require thickeners. Like tapioca, arrowroot might be used in place of cornstarch.

However, the plant commonly used to produce arrowroot powder or flour is *Maranta arundinacea*. Although arrowroot and tapioca may be used in similar ways, there are differences in texture and flavor.

Yuca, Yucca, and Arrowroot

As one of the world's most drought-resistant crops, cassava (yuca, Brazilian arrowroot) can withstand

harsh conditions and thrive in poor-quality soils. The individual plants have fan-shaped leaves with multiple lobes. Cassava varieties grow as herbs, shrubs, and trees. They are related to willows, flax, Saint John's wort, the castor oil plant, poinsettia—and many more. Cassava and other members of the Spurge family produce sap with a purgative (laxative) effect.

Cassava roots have brown, fibrous skin and white interior flesh. They should be peeled and cooked before eating. Raw cassava contains chemicals which can release cyanide (a toxin) in the body. Once processed, the flesh is safe to eat. In fact, cassava is a staple food in Latin America, Asia, and Africa.

Yucca plants belong to the order Asparagales and are members of the Agavaceae family. This means that they are related to both asparagus and agave. The *Yucca* genus contains approximately 50 species.

Yucca plants have large, bluish-green, sword-shaped leaves. Their inflorescence consists of a tall stalk with white bell-shaped flowers. Yuccas are low-maintenance plants which can withstand harsh conditions. Although they produce edible seeds, flowers, and fruits, their roots are inedible.

Plants from the genus *Maranta* are most commonly used to produce arrowroot powder or flour. They are commercially grown in tropical regions. Other types of plants called arrowroot grow in Florida, India, Asia, and Oceania, though they are not grown for large-scale food consumption.

Arrowroot powder, like cornstarch and tapioca, acts as a binding agent in cooking. Arrowroot powder is milled *Maranta*, cornstarch is processed from corn kernels, tapioca is extracted from cassava. All are gluten-free thickeners and can be used in similar ways, but there are differences in texture and flavor.

To summarize, yucca plants grow around here. Yuca can be bought in most grocery stores and can be cooked like a

potato. Since the two are almost homonyms, I think it is less confusing to call yuca cassava. Absolutely do not call yuca/cassava arrowroot or tapioca. That is the root of the matter.


