Roundabout 'to help tremendously' with traffic near John Jay HS in East Fishkill

The first roundabout in East Fishkill has been permitted by the New York State Department of Transportation. There was a groundbreaking ceremony at Patriot Way, formerly known as Auditorium Dr., and Route 52 on the evening of June 16. The roundabout is by John Jay High School, which is in the Wappingers

Central School District.

"This is going to help tremendously with the John Jay traffic problem," said Wappingers Central School District Superintendent Dr. Dwight Bonk. There are more than 1,800 students enrolled at the high school, said the superintendent.

"We're fortunate to have worked with the Town of East Fishkill" and it will be

mutually beneficial to all the community in reducing traffic in the morning and afternoon, noted Bonk.

The project said East Fishkill Supervisor Nicholas D'Alessandro is to commence in the next two weeks and has a completion date of November 2022.

Legislature authorizes purchase for emergency shelter

Following a 17-8 vote at the June legislative board meeting, the Dutchess County Legislature on June 13 authorized the allocation \$3,100,000 of American Rescue Plan (ARP) funds to purchase 26 Oakley Street in the City of Poughkeepsie and help establish the emergency housing shelter set to be created there. The resolution establishing a Stakeholder Group was adopted unanimously.

After last month's legislative committee meeting, Chairman Gregg Pulver announced a 30-day postponement of consideration and the formation of a legislative work group that included several legislators and county officials to brainstorm a community input committee. That committee will consist of up to 11 members and intends to "ensure meaningful community input into the development and ongoing operations of the proposed emergency housing facility for individuals experiencing homelessness." The members will come from various backgrounds, and will include one county legislator, one representative of a local school, neighbors, business owners, a Poughkeepsie city councilperson, and a local faith leader. With the commencement of work at Oakley Street, the Stakeholder Group brainstormed in the work group and enacted by the legislature is now free to commence its work as well. The group will review the Request for Proposal (RFP) for a vendor to work on the facility and will also have formal input on selecting a facility director.

Legislator Steve Caswell said, "The research and development of this is reassuring and we hope the Oakley Street facility will bear fruit for the benefit of our homeless residents. The current arrangement for our homeless has issues and we will be glad to see the current PODS temporary housing system replaced by something better. I'm happy that our homeless residents will be getting the care they need, both for their own sake and for the sake of the surrounding community."

Democratic legislators said City residents have voiced their concerns' regarding the County's proposed homeless shelter for this location. The City's 5th Ward is struggling with gun violence, crime, drug use, and high unemployment. After an initial 30-day delay of the vote, Democratic





Local 'Farm-to-School' meals are building for the future

Late last month, Larry Anthony, the director of food services for the Red Hook, Rhinebeck and Pine Plains school districts, tried a little experiment on students to which the respective schools were serving lunch.

Anthony sourced, prepared, and sampled several different foods to students, in order to promote the farm-to-school menus he will be offering as part of the lunch program in 2022-23.

It wasn't a blind taste test or anything; the students knew up front what they were being served, as exotic it might have sounded to some of them. The food, all from local companies and farms, included local fiddlehead ferns, blue oyster mushrooms, asparagus, wheat bread from Our Daily Bread in Chatham, Sfoglini whole wheat pasta, egg salad made with Feather Ridge Farm eggs, Slate Farm meatballs, Upstate yogurt, and Hudson Valley Fresh milk.

The samples were a taste of the kinds of seasonal menu items that will be part of the school lunch menu next year.

Wait, what?

Asparagus?

"The kids loved it," Anthony enthusiastically told the Northern Dutchess News. "The feedback was tremendous. They all loved the asparagus. It's just simply roasted with some olive oil, salt and pepper, and sprinkled some parmesan. It's something they recognized anyway."

It's all part of a new state program called the "Thirty Percent Initiative." New York State will give schools another 19 cents per meal, in addition to the six cents it already receives, for every lunch the school sells that has at least 30 percent of New York-based products.

Anthony said that based on current numbers, and the additional 19 cents per meal the district could gain by fully committing to the Thirty Percent Initiative, Red Hook could stand to gain another \$40,000 per year, while Rhinebeck and Pine Plains could gain another \$25,000-\$28,000.

It was a pre-pandemic program that got put on the back burner, but is now revived - a program that Anthony strongly believes in and endorses.

"Being that we're in such a rich fertile area for agriculture, there are a lot of farms providing a lot of good food. But it's always been tough to get the logistics and the infrastructure sorted out," he said. "And, to be honest, with the "Thirty Percent Initiative" there are going to be more processes like separating all invoices and having an audit involved. That's not an appealing part of it, but it's well worth it."

Fortunately, this is all old hat for Anthony. He has been building the farm-to-school program and incorporating NYS foods into the lunch and breakfast menus in the districts for several years now. Not only is the food more nutritious and help the kids, it will support farms in the Hudson Valley and New York State.

To that end, the Red Hook, Rhinebeck and Pine Plains districts are partnering with Cornell Cooperative Extension and Katie Sheehan to implement the program.

"You know, we're just paving the way here. It's like clearing the land and building an infrastructure," said Anthony, who said that school districts in Beacon and Onteora are greatly interested in the program as well. "To me, I feel like the Wright Brothers. They saw the future. That's what this is all about."

There is \$500 million in new industrial development in the town, said D'Alessandro. Councilman Emanuele Marinaro said a lot of private money is coming into the project.

"A lot of residents are happy about the bypass road to I-84 and the drop off zone for students. The roundabouts they have mixed feelings about. They're (roundabouts) proven to reduce speed and to keep traffic flowing..." said D'Alessandro.

According to information from the town, the Insurance Institute for Highway Safety (IIHS) cites numerous reports that indicate big reductions in accidents, including one that found crashes involving injuries went down by up to 80 percent at sites where roundabouts were installed at intersections. There are also traffic flow benefits, which bring with them a reduction in emissions.

The project, according to town officials, is part of the East Fishkill Route 52 Mitigation Plan. The plan was developed

by the town's engineering department, which collaborated with Hudson Valley Engineering.

Marie Johnson, who is on the Wappingers Central School District Board of Education, remarked, "It's more than needed." Johnson said she lives near John Jay. "I can't leave my house between 7 and 7:45 a.m. during school days. It does not work," said Johnson.

East Fishkill Councilman Thomas "Tom" Franco said he has two children who attend John Jay. The board members have been "very meticulous" with how the town will be affected, he said.

Councilman Anil Beephan said the project has been "a long time coming" and he cannot wait to see what it is like after the project is completed.

Dutchess County Legislator Joseph Cavaccini noted the recent roundabout in the town of Wappinger hamlet of New Hackensack at Route 376, All Angels Hill Road and New Hackensack Rd.

"I think it's a great opportunity for the Town of East Fishkill and the students. This will mitigate the traffic issues," said

the legislator, who added that it might take some time for drivers to get used to the roundabout.

East Fishkill residents Phyllis and James "Jim" Forde, who live near the project, were in attendance during the groundbreaking.

"I can't say it will help. I can't say it will hurt," said Jim Forde, adding that one would have to see how traffic is affected.

It was noted that project updates will be posted on the East Fishkill website and Facebook page. Updates, according to town officials, will also be sent out through GovDelivery.



'One-stop-shop' for veterans services could be a game-changer

We're so lucky to have so many different organizations here in the Hudson Valley, small and large, who support our veterans. As the co-founder of VetZero, I can certainly attest to that! We all work well together, but geographically we're all spread out across Dutchess County and beyond. That can make it difficult for our veterans who don't have a reliable source of transportation to get the specific help they need.

Think about it: right now, a veteran would have to travel down to Castle Point for health care, then visit the Dutchess County Division of Veterans Services office in downtown Poughkeepsie to get help on their benefits claims, then travel again to see the veteran counselors at MHA Dutchess Veterans Programs for their mental health needs, and so on. When you don't have your own car or you aren't able to drive yourself, it can be almost impossible for veterans to get all the assistance they need and deserve. There is the VetZero Heroes ride program for veterans, of course, but it couldn't possibly serve all our veterans at the same time.

Luckily, a possible solution to this dilemma doesn't seem so far away. Recently, I spoke with my friend Andrew O'Grady, CEO of Mental Health America (MHA) of Dutchess County, which of course oversees MHA Dutchess Veterans Programs, and he shared some very promising news.

"MHA received a donation of a medical arts building from an incredibly generous donor. Our plan is to make this facility into a veteran 'one-stop-shop' facility which will make it so much easier for our

veterans in Dutchess to get all the assistance they need," Andrew told me. "Instead of having to go across town or across the county to visit different agencies, they would be able to simply go next door in the same building, saving time and energy."

The proposed facility is located right on Route 44 between Pleasant Valley and Poughkeepsie and will become the new home of MHA Dutchess Veterans Programs and its veteran counselors. I've seen the building myself and it is very impressive.

At this time, Andrew and his team at MHA are encouraging all local organizations who help veterans to consider moving into an office in the new facility.

"The rent will probably be much less than what they are paying now, and having as many organizations as possible under one roof makes it better for our veterans," Andrew said.

Andrew told me he hopes to have the new facility up and running by the end of this year, if not sooner. His goal is to invite the VA to add a satellite office at the new building; Adam Roche and his team at Dutchess County Veterans Services have been invited as well.

If you are part of an organization in Dutchess County that has a passion for helping veterans, perhaps you should consider finding out more about becoming part of this promising project. One can reach Andrew and MHA Dutchess at 845-473-2500 or info@mhdutchess.org.

As you can see, transportation is such an important issue for so many veterans today. I think this proposed new facility

Legislature authorizes purchase for emergency shelter

caucus members said they again asked for more time regarding the purchase of this facility, but were denied.

Minority Leader Yvette Valdés Smith, said, "The Republican legislative caucus worked on the purchase and planning of this facility behind closed doors for the better part of two years. The Democratic caucus, the City of Poughkeepsie Common Council, and community residents only learned of the 26 Oakley St. location on March 3, 2022. The lack of transparency and honesty at play when real lives and vulnerable communities are at stake is shocking and abhorrent. This is bad government."

Assistant Minority Leader, Barrington R. Atkins, whose district includes the 5th Ward, stated, "The blatant disregard to hear community voices as well as elected officials and representatives of the people is a disgrace. This process has been complicated by the authoritarian approach we often see from Republican County Executive Marcus Molinaro's office. My Democratic colleagues and I have worked hard under difficult circumstances to make sure the needs of the Fifth Ward and the needs of the homeless in

Dutchess County are considered in the Legislature's final plan but many issues

still exist."

City of Poughkeepsie Legislator, Craig Brendli, said, "Controversial projects require transparency from the beginning; we did not have that. The City of Poughkeepsie has done its fair share. I feel that it is possible to find a place outside of a city neighborhood that works and has the potential to provide strong outcomes."

Legislature Chairman Gregg Pulver said, "This shelter was discussed during an hour-long presentation in March, and prior to that in the Legislature's February leadership meeting. The process has been very public. I think it's fair to say a three-month discussion on a project is plenty of time. Although county staff were studying the site well in advance, the Republican caucus has not been involved for two years, and no binding action regarding the Oakley Street site was taken until yesterday, June 13. Then, following debate, passed the purchase resolution with a 17-8 bipartisan (15 Republicans, 1 Democrat, 1 Conservative) vote.

"A formal public advisory committee - sponsored only by three Republicans - was also created by the Legislature, comprising up to 11 members, to give community input on the shelter and its ongoing operations. We want to continue to hear from the public and everyone wants to make this project successful."

The Town of Fishkill Planning Board has accepted an application for the former Dutchess Mall, off of Route 9, at its June meeting.

"I know this has not been referred yet to our engineer and attorney," said Planning Board Chairman Jonathan Kanter.

"Why don't we see if there is a motion to accept an application," said the chair.

According to the Planning Board agenda, the applicant seeks to "construct a 350,166 S.F. warehouse building with associated off-street parking, loading docks and trailer spaces. The Applicant seeks to subdivide the 39.3-acre parcel into two (2) lots. Proposed Lot A is for the proposed warehouse and shall consist of 29.8 acres and Proposed Lot B is for a future development and shall consist of 10.4 acres."

Kanter noted that it will be referred to the Town Engineer, Town Planning Board

Attorney, Town Traffic Consultant, Dutchess County Department of Planning & Development (Site Development Plan only), New York State Department of Transportation and the Rombout Fire District for comment.

"We have an acceptance of the application and referrals will be made," stated Kanter.

"We know there's a road ahead of us. We look forward to working with the board," said Richard O'Rourke, Esq., with Keane & Beane, PC who is the applicant's representative. The applicant is CHI/Acquisitions, L.P., A Delaware Limited Partnership. O'Rourke did not respond to an inquiry seeking comment. According to Debbie Colonna, assistant for the Planning Board, the project is scheduled for its first review at the next scheduled Planning Board meeting on July 14.

Renegades games getting shorter, thanks to minor league experiment

Steve Gliner was somewhere between flummoxed and perplexed and pleasantly surprised.

The Hudson Valley Renegades president was preparing for a post-game fireworks show at Dutchess Stadium during the team's last homestand following a Saturday night game against Jersey Shore.

First pitch for the game was 6:05 p.m.

Last pitch of the game was 7:56 p.m.

Yep, that's right – one hour and 51 minutes from start to finish for a full nine-inning contest.

"I couldn't believe it," Gliner said. "We had to kill an hour before the fireworks started because it wasn't dark enough outside yet. We've never had to do that. Our games normally run about three hours, so 1:51 is insane. But the pitch clock has definitely made a difference."

What Gliner is referring to is one of several experiments taking place across minor league baseball this season, including for the Renegades, the county's High Class A affiliate of the New York Yankees.

In order to shorten the length of games, a pitch clock is being used to hurry pitchers along and prohibit hurlers from taking too long. At the Triple A level, minor leagues are using a pitch clock of 14 sec-

onds between pitches with no runners, and 19 seconds with runners on base. At the Renegades' High-A level, pitchers are on a clock of 14 seconds with no runners and 18 seconds with runners on.

The goal is to monitor the results in the hopes of introducing it to Major League Baseball games as early as the 2023 season.

Has the fledgling program worked?

According to the Associated Press, pitch clocks have shaved 29 minutes off of the average previous time of minor league games that used to push three hours long.

Neither MLB officials nor television executives are too concerned about three-hour contests, but when pitchers sometimes take 30, 45, even 60 seconds between pitches, game times can push four hours. That's when the length of games becomes worrisome and executives believe fans lose interest, especially compared to faster action in basketball, hockey and football.

A competition committee in Major League Baseball was established to review the results. Baseball Commissioner Rob Manfred said the committee will meet for the first time this week.

"The pitch clock has definitely made an impact and definitely moved the game

along," Gliner said. "From a timing perspective, a game that is 2:20 and 2:30 seems to be ideal. Baseball has looked

for ways to make the game more fan-friendly, but you don't want to reinvent it too much."

Inaugural Community Day for Hudson Highlands Fjord Trail June 25

The Hudson Highlands Fjord Trail (HHFT) Inaugural Community Day is set for June 25. The event will take place from 1 – 4 p.m. The rain date is June 26.

“People can expect a fun, free community event with music, hands-on art and nature projects, and free ice cream and other refreshments. Hudson Highlands Fjord Trail staff will be there to talk with the public about the project,” said Derin Tanyol, project associate for Hudson Highlands Fjord Trail.

The event is taking place at the former Dutchess Manor catering facility, 263 Route 9D, in Fishkill.

“HHFT purchased the building in late 2020 with the goal of restoring it and appointing it as the Visitor Center for the Fjord Trail. These changes will take place in 2023–2025. Right now, the building is the same—except Beaconites who know the building by way of the large burgundy “Dutchess Manor” sign on the road should be aware that the sign has been removed. We’ll have lots of balloons and other signage on Community Day so people won’t miss it,” noted Tanyol.

As for what one can do once at the free admission event, there will be the following:

- Live music by Philipstown’s own Hudson Lovell
- A collaborative art-making experience with HeARTful Yoga by Dani (aka Cold Spring’s Dani Locastro)

- Free ice cream from Nelsonville’s Homestyle Creamery

- Family-friendly activities:

- Bee B&B: Celebrate National Pollinator Week with Park Director Drew Polinsky, who created a special activity where families can help build and decorate their own Bee B&B

- Kites: build, decorate, and fly a kite on the big open lawn at Dutchess Manor, where HHFT will eventually have our home base.

The Trail, said Tanyol, “will be a 7.5-

mile linear park along the Hudson River, inviting people of all ages and abilities to immerse themselves in nature and the renowned beauty of the Hudson Highlands. The Fjord Trail will serve as the gateway to some of the most breathtaking and popular day hikes in the United States, including Breakneck Ridge, Mount Taurus, and Little Stony Point.” The trail began as a grassroots community project years ago, when residents of Cold Spring and Philipstown began discussing solutions to visitor safety and congestion at nearby Breakneck Ridge, remarked Tanyol. “The primary challenge was to create a safe pedestrian route for the growing number of hikers flocking to the spectacular trails of the Hudson Highlands. Heavy pedestrian use of State Route 9D, a 55 mph highway, was seen by concerned neighbors as an accident waiting to happen,” said Tanyol.

Construction in the Breakneck area will begin late in 2022, where HHFT will create an off-road connector trail between the Metro-North Breakneck station and a safer, relocated trailhead, according to Tanyol.

“This phase of the project is called the Breakneck Connector and will also include improved, rationalized parking, signalized crosswalks, restrooms and garbage facilities, and a bridge over the railroad tracks which will take visitors to the river’s edge and the eventual Shoreline Trail (Phase 2 of the Fjord Trail project). The Fjord Trail will also include forest and marsh walks. Completion of the Hudson Highlands Fjord Trail is projected for 2027,” she said.

Electric & Gas Bill Relief Program approved by NY State Regulators

Central Hudson Gas & Electric Corp. is implementing the Electric & Gas Bill Relief Program, approved by the New York State Public Service Commission on June 16, to assist low-income families and individuals throughout the state who experienced hardship during the COVID-19 pandemic.

Residential utility customers who receive income-qualified government assistance for utility bills and other expenses and have past-due balances for service through May 1, 2022, will have those balances forgiven through a bill credit. Customers who qualify for this program remain responsible for charges incurred after May 1. To qualify, customers must:

- Be enrolled in the utility bill discount program or Energy Affordability Program by December 31, 2022.

Or

- Have received benefits under New York State’s Emergency Rental Assistance Program (ERAP) or the Home Energy Assistance Program - Regular Arrears Supplement in the prior heating season.

Customers already enrolled in the bill discount or Energy Affordability program or who have received ERAP or RAS benefits in the prior heating season will receive a bill credit automatically and do not need to take any action. Income-qualified customers not currently enrolled in a bill discount or Energy Affordability program may do so by December 31, 2022 to be eligible for the program.

Qualifying governmental assistance

programs include: Home Energy Assistance Program (HEAP), Lifeline Telephone Service Program (Lifeline), Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program (SNAP), Medicaid, Veterans Disability or Survivors Pension, Supplemental Security Income (SSI), Federal Public Housing Assistance, Bureau of Indian Affairs General Assistance (if living on tribal lands), Head Start (if living on tribal lands), Tribal TANF (if living on tribal lands), Food Distribution Program on Indian Reservations (if living on tribal lands), Utility Guarantee / Direct Vendor programs, Temporary Assistance for Needy Families (TANF), Safety Net Assistance.

Funding for the statewide program is provided by \$250 million in state assistance, allocated proportionately to each New York utility based on balances due for income qualified residential accounts, and a temporary surcharge on utility bills. For Central Hudson customers, the surcharge is estimated as approximately one-half percent on utility bills for a period of one year, included in Miscellaneous charges (MISC on the Central Hudson Bill) to assist low-income families served by Central Hudson, as approved and ordered by the state.

A partial bill forgiveness program is in development for all other residential and small commercial accounts affected by the COVID-19 pandemic by New York State, utilities and stakeholders. Details will be provided later in the year.

County accepting applications for Historical Sites & Museum Infrastructure grant program

Dutchess County Executive Marc Molinaro announced applications are now being accepted for the County's Agency Partner Grant: Historical Sites & Museum Infrastructure grant program, which addresses critical capital and operating funding gaps that impact the preservation of local historic and cultural institutions.

Capital infrastructure projects are limited to facilities owned by a non-profit, and the facility must be a separate structure; funds cannot be used for improvements to a room used for or by historical societies within a facility owned by another entity. All eligible Dutchess County historical societies or museums, however, can apply for operating infrastructure funds.

The total allocation for this one-time initiative is \$200,000, with grants available between \$5,000 and \$30,000 per institution. Applications for these grants are being accepted through an online portal, and the deadline to apply is Wednesday, July 20th at 4 p.m. Application guidance and instructions are available on the Department of History's website.

Historic sites and museums that are run as non-profits typically rely heavily on membership dues and donations for revenue resulting in revenue streams that are small and unpredictable. The cost for annual maintenance of aging historic sites is significant, and additional upgrades to bring sites up to current accessibility standards create an additional burden on budgets.

Operating infrastructure costs are necessary to provide for the maintenance of artifacts, the provision of programming and the collection of oral histories. These operating costs can be significant and are integral to providing visitors with a full educational experience yet historic sites and museums struggle to fund these efforts.

County Historian Will Tatum said, "Dutchess County's rich heritage is well documented in countless museums and historical sites throughout our community, and these assets are troves of knowledge for residents and visitors alike who wish to gain a greater understanding of our unique history. These invaluable resources, though, require upkeep that can often be a financial hardship. Dutchess County is proud to offer this grant opportunity to protect these vital repositories so their information can be preserved for

Bike New York registering riders for June 26 ride

Bike New York is registering for its Discover Hudson Valley Ride out of Poughkeepsie. The ride, which brings approximately 2,500 cyclists from the New York City Metropolitan Area and surrounding communities to the Hudson Valley, begins in Victor C. Waryas Park at 7 a.m. on June 26.

Largely considered one of the most scenic rides in the region, Discover Hudson Valley is centered on the Walkway Over the Hudson footbridge. A capital infrastructure project helps maintain or improve an organization's assets, such as a renovation, replacement, or expansion of an existing facility. Operating infrastructure funding supports the necessary tools, networks and systems that ensure the organization's mission is protected and strengthened, including activities that reinforce the organization's capacity and compliance with existing legal, regulatory and financial reporting requirements. Examples include:

- Equipment, supplies, or other one-time expenses (e.g., projectors, microphones, scanners, speaker systems, computers, e-books, pop-up event/program, display cases, signage boards, etc.) purchased within the term of the agreement.
- Information technology upgrades (e.g., phone systems, websites, accounting, donor development, case management software, replacement of antiquated computers and other related hardware, etc.)

Ineligible expenses include ongoing operating expenses, ongoing program expenses, restoring fund balance or reserve accounts and fundraising.

Legislator Steve Caswell said, "Residents of every age can learn about how Dutchess County came to be at our varied museums and historic sites. I'm proud to have proposed this great use of County resources to ensure all who are interested in learning about Dutchess County's history can do so, and I thank my legislative colleagues who supported this initiative."

All applications will be reviewed for eligibility by the Dutchess County Department of Planning and Development with final funding approval recommendations made by the County Executive. Grant awards will be announced in September 2022.

Legislator Joseph D. Cavaccini said, "Our residents and visitors can glean so much about our county by studying its history, and I'm pleased to support this grant opportunity to assure these vital resources can continue to operate without interruption to the benefit of so many who use them."

Poughkeepsie Rising receives \$50,000 grant for production of 'Ella the Ungovernable'

Poughkeepsie Rising announced that it has received \$50,000 of ARPA funding from the City of Poughkeepsie toward a professional community theater production of "Ella the Ungovernable," a new play by Dutchess County resident David McDonald. The play follows the life of Ella Fitzgerald from poverty and incarceration in a notorious Hudson, NY reform school to her triumphant first appearance at the Apollo Theater in 1934. Ella The Ungovernable is slated to debut for four performances at the beginning of December at one Poughkeepsie's main theaters (details to be announced soon).

The story of Ella The Ungovernable is that of never, ever, giving up, no matter what the odds. The play provides hope and encouragement to a public demoralized by pandemics, politics and school shootings. The concept behind the play is that of creating consciousness by creating community consciousness, empowering communities through an act of group creativity. "I was interested in the idea of creating something beautiful within a community that would resonate outwards and create a shining light for the rest of America to see," says playwright David McDonald. "Poughkeepsie will be at the forefront of that."

One of the main priorities of the production from its inception was that of inclusion. "It was our goal from the beginning of this production to create a project that would involve and welcome every individual and civic organization that wanted to be involved," says the play's producer, Nicole "Sui" McArthur of The Living History Theater. "We have been delighted to see that people instantly 'got' what we were endeavoring to accomplish and wanted to be a part of it!"

Starting from a core group of four, the leadership team of the project has grown to include many of the bright lights of Poughkeepsie's civic life. Some of the play's local allies include: Tim McQueen of IIIHarmonics; Chris Burney of New York Stage and Film; L'Quette TAYOR, Community Matters 2; Talent Davis of MASS Design Group; Melaine Rottkamp of Dutchess County Tourism; Ondie James of Majesty 6:33 Productions; Stacey Bottoms of Beulah Baptist Church; Liz Dahmen of Hudson Valley Performing Arts Laboratory; Celebrating The African Spirit; Family Services Inc.; Kollabo Kingdom; Poughkeepsie Youth Theater; United Universalist Fellowship; Planet of People (POP) Radio; Willis Williams and Jacinta Kroner of 2B Scene; Aleria from The Art Effect and many others.

The intention from the beginning was not

merely to do the play over the course of a few weekends in December, but to create a sustainable, permanent production and production entity in Poughkeepsie. "It is our hope to create a permanent cast and home for "Ella The Ungovernable" in Poughkeepsie, and if it is as much of a hit as we think it can be, even put together a Poughkeepsie-based touring production," said McArthur. "Our hope, ultimately, is to establish a permanent theater company in Poughkeepsie and employ and train generations of Poughkeepsians."

With this in mind, the group formed the new non-profit, Poughkeepsie Rising, a performing arts movement, whose goals combine engagement and opportunity for Poughkeepsie Youth with the City's economic revival and cultural renaissance. Ella is the first of a proposed series of productions which will provide sustainable and long-term employment for the youth of Poughkeepsie – on-stage, backstage, management, marketing etc. The Poughkeepsie Rising organization consists of Ondie James, president; David McDonald, vice president; Jasmine Garvin, vice president; Gully Stanford, treasurer; and new board member, Tim McQueen, from III Harmonic.

Playwright David McDonald originally approached Jeffrey Aman, Chair of The Poughkeepsie Public Arts Commission (PPAC) this past November, with the idea of using the play as a vehicle of community building and empowerment. As it turns out, the Public Arts Commission had harbored a vision of turning Poughkeepsie into a cultural destination based on the performing arts, and "Ella The Ungovernable" turned out to be the perfect vehicle to test that concept. "We were all aware of the fact that Hamilton had started out at The Powerhouse at Vassar a decade ago before moving down to the city a decade ago," recalls Aman. "But what if...just what if...we were able to create a theatrical juggernaut like that here in Poughkeepsie and keep it in Poughkeepsie? That idea was intriguing to us."

In April, Aman arranged for the "Ella" team to brief a meeting of the Public Arts Commission which enthusiastically endorsed the project. Strong support from city leaders came quickly, followed by support from the City's American Rescue Plan Task Force, which approved the award. "The city's expanding support of the arts is an integral piece of our post-pandemic economic recovery," said Mayor Rob Rolison. "The pre-production excitement in the community is contagious, too, as the team-building and community engagement around the production is underway," the mayor said.

"It's rare to see a project like this that just

Strange Brews

An intrepid traveler recalls some memorable beverages

On the first day of summer, our thoughts turn to cool drinks – lemonade, iced tea, absinthe – wait a minute – absinthe? I can't help but recollect some of the strange brews I've imbibed over the years:

Coca Tea (Cuzco, Peru) – At the Inka Grill overlooking the historic Plaza de Armas, Sue, daughter Becky and I would relax with cups of coca tea, resting up for our three-day hike to the ruins of Machu Picchu. The tea bags were filled with shredded coca leaves, the same plant used to produce cocaine. After drinking about 20 cups of this tea, I started doing the math, finally figuring out it would take about 2,500 cups of the tea to – well, you get the picture. Later on, in a smokey cafe, I partook of a foul-tasting concoction called Chicha, which I found out was made from fermented human spit.

Ba Ba Ba (Saigon, Vietnam) – We hired a guide and a driver for our two-week sojourn in Vietnam. The guide, Hung, had never met an American before (this was 1995). He assumed that, like the Taiwanese and Japanese tourists, all we wanted to do was visit temples. After about 25 temples I explained to Hung that I'm not all that religious. Coffee (Adama, Ethiopia) – Sue and I have toured coffee farms in Panama, Costa Rica, Colombia and Ethiopia. We were treated to the exceptional Ethiopian Arabica coffee at our visit to Syngenta Flower Farm in the Rift Valley. Everywhere in Ethiopia, coffee is served with a side dish of popcorn! In the middle of our lunch, a flock of ravens swooped down on the patio and ate all the popcorn.

Vino Tinto (Seville, Spain) – I'm not much of a wine drinker, except at art galleries, where it's the only drink available (I guess that's to get you in the mood to buy the paintings). In Seville, we joined a bunch of Spanish kids getting drunk in a park, on a combination of Vino Tinto – a cheap red wine – and Pepsi Cola. It's the most horrible concoction I've ever tasted. But Sue liked it.

Pombe (Lusaka, Zambia) – There are no tourists in Zambia. I inquired at a tourist agency about a trip to see wildlife,

and the agent looked confused. "Don't you sell tickets for wildlife safaris?" I asked. He replied, "The only tickets we sell are plane tickets for people who want to get out of here." Eventually, Sue and I hooked up with a guy named Benson, who took us around town (where I famously had a meal of roasted mice). Somewhere along the way I started drinking Pombe – an alcoholic beverage made from millet. It looks like milk and tastes like gasoline. I must have drunk too much, because later on, when Benson showed up to take us to a local concert, he asked, "Where's Mark?" "In the bathroom throwing up. He drank too much Pombe," replied Sue. At that point Benson delivered this famous line which we still laugh at today: "You couldn't restrain him?"

Absinthe (Madrid, Spain) – Sue was game to go on a search for traditional Absinthe, the supposedly hallucinogenic beverage made from the herb artemesia (wormwood). Prowling through the back alleys south of the Plaza Mayor, we uncovered a dusty bottle high up on a shelf in a rustic saloon. Maybe Ernest Hemingway or Pablo Picasso had taken a dram from that very flask. It could have been a hallucination, but after we got robbed a few hours later, I swore I saw Karl Malden pop up and say, "Don't leave home without your American Express Travelers Checks."







Audiences are invited to meet the musicians and to learn more about the musical process as Lyra Music’s Guest Artists

share their personal insights and inspiration with the students and the public.

Beacon is not the only Hudson Valley location where Lyra Music outreach concerts take place. They will also be in Cornwall-on-Hudson, Garrison, Milton, New Paltz, and New Windsor. “These free events will be performed by Lyra Music faculty, staff, and students; many will be outdoors making them perfect for a gathering of friends, a date-night picnic, or a relaxing family event,” said Odo.

According to Odo, “Lyra Music’s co-founder and artistic director, Akiko Sasaki is a resident of Beacon and as we considered how to move forward after the pandemic, she was excited about the idea of bringing Lyra home. Beacon has such a vibrant music and arts scene and, as home to the Howland Chamber Music Circle, where Akiko is also the Music Director, is a community that warmly welcomes and supports classical music.”

Guest artists joining us this summer will be the Horszowski Trio, Jesse Mills, violin, Ole Akahoshi, cello, and Rieko Aizawa, piano performing works by Bernstein, Mendelssohn, and Smetana. Jesse is well-known locally as the 1999 winner of the Hudson Valley Philharmonic String Competition, said Odo. Also The Horszowski Trio will perform.

“During our second week, we are thrilled to present cellist Estelle Choi, pianist Henry Kramer, and violinist Kristin Lee who will be performing works by Barber, Debussy, and Schubert. Estelle Choi is a founding member of the Calidore String Quartet which was the grand prize winner of the 2016 M-Prize International Chamber Music Competition, an Avery Fisher Career Grant winner, and member of the Chamber Society of Lincoln Center,” said Odo.

“Music was an essential part of my childhood because my mother was an opera singer (she was the founding member of Seoul City Opera in South Korea),” Kristin Lee told the Southern Dutchess News through an email. Lee played the piano and violin as a child in Korea. It was when her family moved to the United States, Lee had to put a pause on the piano. The reason? Lee said “because the whole family thought we would move back after one year of my father’s work in the states ([A] [p]iano isn’t the most transportable instrument when you are flying across the ocean..) Many decades later, here I am playing the violin for my life and I can’t be more grateful!”

This will not be the first time Lee will be participating in a Lyra Festival. She previously performed in the 2018 Lyra Festival.

“Lyra Music is a non-profit organiza-
