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Hochul highlights statewide moratorium on new hyperscale data centers

Governor Kathy Hochul held a roundtable with State, business and local leaders from across the state last week to highlight her Executive Order that creates the nation's first moratorium on new hyperscale data centers, establishing the standards for data center development and creating a blueprint to support localities. The Governor is temporarily pausing State environmental permits for up to one year in order to build a nation-leading regulatory framework that protects ratepayers, the environment, the energy grid and communities across the state.

"Progress shouldn't arrive with a higher utility bill, depleted water supply or noise pollution, which is why I signed the nation's first ever statewide moratorium on hyperscale data centers," Hochul said.

President Donald Trump posted on Truth Social, in part, last week, "One of the biggest Driving Forces in the Future for Jobs, are Data Centers. They are big, strong, bold, and Money Machines for the State in which they are built. Governor Kathy Hochul, for political reasons, has terminated all Data Centers being built, or to be built, in New York State."

"New York State has made a terrible decision. All of this Income, and other Benefits, will be going to Red States, and some Blue, where Data Centers are sought as Cash Cows, with Lower Taxes and Record Setting Jobs. They must pay for their own Water and Power, and any leftover goes back to the State and local Community. Data Centers are tremendous WINS for the States and Communities that are lucky enough to get them. New York should change its Policy, IMMEDIATELY," Trump stated, and noted the U.S. should not lose "all of this incredible new Technology, to China, and other countries!"

New York State is experiencing growth in demand for data center development driven by artificial intelligence and other computing operations. The increase in demand has led to proposals across the state for the construction and operation of data centers that could require massive amounts of energy and water to run and cool thousands of computer servers.

Assemblymember Didi Barrett said, "New Yorkers across the state have expressed support for a pause on new hyperscale data centers and common-sense regulations to protect our natural resources, communities and ratepayers. I commend Governor Hochul for her leadership in signing this timely executive order. It's a critical first step. There is still much more to learn, discuss and do to fully understand the impact of data centers. I look forward to continuing to work with the Governor, Senator Gonzalez and my Assembly colleagues to ensure progress."

Southern Dutchess Eyecare, 969 Main St. Suite H, also has a T-shirt that is unique to help the Food Pantry. Dr. Brian Powell stated that they still have shirts available for a donation of \$5, although they have run out of some sizes.

“Both of my kids participated in scouts, and at some point, one of their troops held a food drive for the pantry. While they gave us a tour, I remember the volunteer stating how they would get a lot of donations around the holidays, but their stores could be bare in May. With that in mind we started doing food drives at our office during the month of May,” explained Dr. Powell. “When we started to participate in the Fishkill Block Party in fall 2021 we started doing T-shirts to give out at the block party with any donation to the food drive. We continued to give away any shirts left over from the

block party at our office. Some years the block party has not happened, so we have just given away all the shirts from the office. Designing the shirts is fun, and it is something the entire office enjoys doing to help the community. We will likely design another shirt sometime in the fall and give the donations received to the food pantry once all the shirts are gone.”

On August 1, St. Mary, Mother of the Church, in Fishkill will host a food drive, it was noted by Verdesi.

Verdesi shared that the food pantry has dedicated volunteers.

One of those volunteers is Ron Cafarelli, the stockroom manager.

Cafarelli said, “People are very generous. They are giving because they know someone is hurting more than them.”

Doyle noted that they keep track of whether a client has special dietary needs, such as if the food needs to be gluten free.

The mission of the Fishkill Pantry is “to assist individuals and families in the Southern Dutchess area who are coping with financial emergencies by supplying basic food and hygiene needs.”

In 2025, the pantry supplied 258,000 pounds of food in 2025, said Verdesi, “We will surpass that this year.”

The food pantry has an outdoor fridge pantry program, as well.

In June, 853 individuals were served by the food pantry. There were 20 new households, consisting of 53 members, registered in June, according to the food pantry’s numbers given to the Food Bank. Twenty-six deliveries were completed to 45 members last month.

In the building, there is the stockroom, where shelves were empty. Every refrigerator is labeled for specific items, such as beef, turkey, pork, dairy. There were recently picked apples ready to be given

out. There is even a place where food for pets is kept in case a client needs assistance feeding a pet.

“A lot of the credit goes to the volunteers. If it wasn’t for them, we would not be here helping the community,” shared Colon.

“It takes a lot of them (volunteers),” added Doyle.

“The community has really embraced us,” said Colon.

The Fishkill Food Pantry is located at 1153 Main St. in Fishkill. The hours of operation are:

Hochul highlights statewide moratorium on new hyperscale data centers

Last month, the East Fishkill Town Board approved a three-year moratorium on Data Centers.

Earlier this year, the Governor directed the Department of Public Service (DPS) to begin the Energize NY proceeding, which will require data centers to either pay more for their energy or supply their own, allowing the state to keep energy more affordable for New Yorkers. As part of that proceeding, the Governor is now also directing DPS to develop a Generic Environmental Impact Statement (GEIS)

for data centers to ensure new data centers coming online are being held to consistent standards.

During the development of this GEIS, which will take up to a year, a moratorium will be in place and the Department of Environmental Conservation (DEC) will not issue any discretionary permits not already deemed complete, it was stated. The state will use the GEIS to assess the potential environmental impacts of the construction and operation of data centers in the state, including their effect on energy demand, water use and quality, and air quality. Once the State finalizes these standards, the moratorium will be lifted, allowing new data center projects to proceed as long as they follow state, zoning code and other local approvals, it was stated in a release.

The Governor also directed Empire State Development (ESD) to issue a Community Investment Framework (CIF) within 60 days, which will provide clear guidance to local entities to help them negotiate community benefits as part of any large-scale data center deal, including local infrastructure improvements, child care investments, and direct financial support for their community. The CIF will also establish frameworks that provide organized labor a seat at the table and prioritize prevailing wage standards and project labor agreements for data center construction, local hiring, apprenticeships and workforce development to maximize economic benefits. This framework will additionally include a formula to help communities assess where to begin investment negotiations. An outline of the CIF is currently available on ESD’s website, and the public is able to submit feedback.

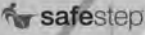
It was noted, additionally, the Governor is directing DPS to consider creating a New York Grid Acceleration Fund to require

data centers to invest in the state’s aging grid infrastructure and energy needs so all New Yorkers benefit from responsible development, according to the release. The fund could support the procurement of new clean energy supply and establishment of an insurance pool to which developers may need to contribute to protect against speculative large loads that create uncertainty and increase costs. DPS will also consider approaches to require data centers to fund new clean electric generation dedicated to their operations, including but not limited to customer-sited distributed energy resources and battery storage.

Hochul is pursuing legislation to repeal sales tax exemptions for massive data centers across the state.

This year, Hochul launched the FutureWorks Commission to advise on policy and private sector actions to protect the security of workers while harnessing the economic benefits of AI for all New Yorkers. This blue-ribbon Commission is composed of nation-leading experts, workers’ advocates, and business leaders, and will be charged with advising Hochul on how to navigate the AI transition.

'Beloved' Dover resident recognized during 'Veteran of Distinction' ceremony

Dutchess County Executive Sue Serino and the County's Office of Veterans Affairs celebrated U.S. Army Nurse Corps Second Lieutenant (2LT) Helen Slocum-Mostachetti, a beloved Town of Dover resident who served during World War II, at the County's most recent "Veteran of Distinction" ceremony, held at Dover Town Hall on July 14.

Serino said, "Helen's life reflects the very best of our community. She has served our nation, cared for others and built a lasting legacy of love and dedication. Her story reminds us of the impact one person can

have through a lifetime of service. She is a true American hero. It was so special to celebrate with Helen and her family as we honored her as a Dutchess County 'Veteran of Distinction.'"

Helen Slocum-Mostachetti graduated from Dover High School in 1941, completed her nursing training at then-Vassar Brothers Hospital, and served as a nurse in the Army Nurse Corps from 1945 to 1947, caring for wounded veterans at Army hospitals in Texas and Oklahoma. After her military service, she devoted decades to nursing and education in the

Hudson Valley, retiring in 1981 before continuing as a school nurse and substitute teacher for the Dover Union Free School District. At the age of 103, Helen is renowned locally for a lifetime of service to her country and community, as well as her enduring love of family, golf, the New York Yankees and New York Jets.

Dutchess County Veterans Affairs Director Adam Roche said, "Helen represents the strength and dedication we honor in all of our veterans. She answered the call to serve our nation and cared for those who sacrificed for our freedom. Her service, resilience and commitment to others are an inspiration to us all."

Monthly “Veteran of Distinction” ceremonies take place on the second Tuesday of each month from April through November, hosted in the community where the honored veteran resides. This year’s ceremonies are spotlighting members of the Greatest Generation, Dutchess County’s living World War II veterans.

County Legislature passes tax incentive to address housing shortage by increasing accessory dwelling units

The Dutchess County Legislature has announced legislation, sponsored by

Legislator Trevor Redl (D-Town of Poughkeepsie), to encourage the construction of accessory dwelling units (ADUs), commonly known as backyard cottages, in-law apartments, and garage apartments; by adopting a New York State property tax exemption authorized under §421-p of the Real Property Tax Law.

The proposed local law would allow Dutchess County to opt into an existing State tax incentive designed to encourage homeowners to create additional housing on residential properties. To ensure the exemption serves its intended purpose, the legislation would limit eligibility to ADUs used for long-term residential housing and exclude units used as short-term rentals, such as Airbnb or VRBO.

Legislator Trevor Redl (D-Town of Poughkeepsie) said, “Accessory dwelling units are widely recognized as just one way to increase housing supply. ADUs provide flexible housing options for sen-

iors wishing to age in place, young adults entering the housing market, caregivers, and working families, while allowing homeowners to make better use of existing residential properties.”

“To reduce the cost of housing, we need to use every tool in the toolkit, and create a wide variety of housing. ADUs provide gentle infill development, adding housing stock without creating sprawl and without strain-

ing services like water, sewer, and the electric grid. I'm proud to advance this common-sense solution," said Legislator Lisa Kaul (D-Town of Poughkeepsie)

The resolution passed unanimously. The local law will take effect upon filing with the Secretary of State and will apply only to accessory dwelling unit projects with building permits issued on or after the effective date.

Assemblyman Beephan gives take on data centers and moratorium

To the Editor:

Over the past several months, I have heard from countless residents—especially here in East Fishkill—who have expressed serious concerns about the rapid growth of large-scale data centers in our communities. Those concerns weren’t anti-technology or anti-business. They were about protecting our electric grid, preserving our water supply, safeguarding our quality of life, and ensuring that local communities have a seat at the table before projects of this magnitude move forward.

That is why I proudly became the sole Republican co-sponsor of the Responsible Data Center Development Act, bipartisan legislation that passed both houses of the New York State Legislature on June 4. The bill called for a one-year statewide moratorium to give New York the time it needs to establish responsible policies before approving additional large data center developments.

This week, Governor Kathy Hochul did not sign that legislation. Instead, she issued Executive Order 62, creating a statewide moratorium through executive action.

While I would have preferred that the Governor sign the bill passed by the Legislature, I am encouraged that she ultimately recognized what residents and local officials have been saying for months: New York needs to slow down and get this right. Why is this necessary?

The numbers speak for themselves.

As of May 1, there were 51 large-load projects waiting to connect to New York’s electric grid. Together, those projects would require nearly 12,700 megawatts of electricity—an enormous increase in demand. More than 8.3 gigawatts of new demand entered the system in 2025 alone, prompting the Public Service Commission to begin formally examining how projects like data centers could affect the state’s electrical infrastructure.

These aren’t small facilities. Large data centers can consume tremendous amounts of electricity and water while placing significant demands on local infrastructure. They also raise legitimate questions about noise, environmental impacts, wastewater capaci-

ty, emergency services, and whether existing residents and businesses will ultimately bear the costs of expanding the grid.

The Governor’s Executive Order pauses certain large data center projects while state agencies conduct a comprehensive review. That review will examine:

- Electric grid reliability and energy demand
- Water usage and water quality
- Air quality
- Noise impacts
- Effects on disadvantaged communities
- Infrastructure needs
- Environmental impacts across New York State

The executive order also directs state agencies to hold a formal public process, including public hearings and public comment, and to develop statewide standards for future projects. Empire State Development has also been directed to create a Community Investment Framework that could require future developers to invest in local infrastructure, energy affordability, childcare, education, broadband, wastewater improvements, and other community priorities.

However, there are important differences between the Governor’s Executive Order and the legislation passed by the Legislature.

Our bill would have established a broader statutory framework with stronger protections. It covered a wider range of projects, required local public hearings before approval, directed utilities to create a separate electric service classification for large data centers, established additional environmental reporting requirements, required developers to invest directly in host communities, and included renewable energy standards for future facilities.

By contrast, the Executive Order generally applies only to much larger facilities—those with the potential to consume 50 megawatts or more—and leaves many of the long-term policy decisions to state agencies through future studies and rulemaking.

Regardless of the differences, one thing is now clear:

New York has acknowledged that we cannot continue approving massive data center developments without first understanding their impacts on our communities.

For me, this has never been about opposing innovation or economic development. Technology companies can and should be part of New York’s future. But growth must be balanced with responsible planning. Our residents deserve reliable electricity, clean water, transparent decision-making, and confidence that local taxpayers won’t be left footing the bill for infrastructure upgrades.

I sponsored the legislation because I listened to the people I represent. Residents in East Fishkill and throughout our district made it clear that they wanted time for local governments to evaluate zoning, update comprehensive plans, and fully understand what these projects could mean for future generations.

I appreciate that the Governor has now taken action to establish a temporary statewide pause. While I still believe signing the Legislature’s bipartisan bill would have provided stronger and more durable protections, this Executive Order is an important acknowledgment that the concerns of our communities are real.

As this process moves forward, I will continue fighting to ensure that any future data center development is done responsibly—with transparency, meaningful local input, protections for our infrastructure and environment, and policies that put New Yorkers first.

This conversation is far from over, and I remain committed to making sure the voices of our communities continue to be heard.

Water rescue at Norrie Point State Park

The Town of Hyde Park Police Department issued a release on July 16 with details of a water rescue at Norrie Point State Park in Staatsburg.

On July 16 at approximately 7:20 a.m., the Dutchess County 911 Center received a report of two individuals who had fallen from a cliff approximately 15 feet into the Hudson River at Norrie Point State Park. Due to the nature of the incident, a Water Emergency Response was initiated, with police, fire, EMS, and specialized rescue resources responding to the scene.

Upon arrival, Town of Hyde Park Police officers located the two individuals in the water, both of whom were in distress. Fire department rescue personnel successfully removed both subjects from the water. They were treated at the scene by EMS personnel before being transported to a local hospital. Both individuals were reported to be in stable condition.

The identities of the individuals are not being released due to the medical nature of the incident.

All responding units cleared the scene and returned to service by approximately 9:59 a.m.

The Town of Hyde Park Police Department was assisted by the Roosevelt Fire District, New York State Police, Dutchess County Sheriff’s Office, New York State Park Police, Fairview Fire District, City of Poughkeepsie Fire Department, East Kingston Fire Department, Hyde Park Fire Department, West Clinton Fire Department, New York City Department of Environmental Protection Aviation Unit, Dutchess County Department of Emergency Response, Ulster County Department of Emergency Services, Empress EMS, and LifeNet Air Methods.

The Town of Hyde Park Police Department thanked all responding agencies for their coordinated efforts and professionalism, which resulted in the successful rescue of both individuals.

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WWII Army veteran William Cole memorialized at ‘Honor-A-Veteran’ ceremony in Hyde Park

Dutchess County Executive Sue Serino and the County’s Office of Veterans Affairs memorialized the life and legacy of U.S. Army Staff Sergeant (SSG) William “Bill” Cole, a respected Hyde Park resident, at this month’s “Honor-A-Veteran” remembrance, held last week at Roosevelt Fire District Station 3 in Hyde Park.

William Cole was a member of “the Greatest Generation,” who answered his nation’s call by enlisting in the United States Army in 1944 and serving with the 5th Infantry Division in the European Theatre during World War II. After returning home, he built a career with IBM and remained deeply committed to his family, church and community as a dedicated parishioner of St. James Church and member of American Legion Post 1303. Known for his humility, generosity and willingness to help others, SSG Cole quietly lived a life of service and sacrifice. 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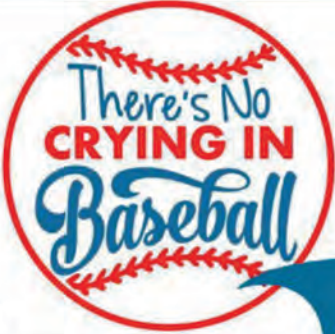

Commanding presence!

Tanner Bauman's 6-foot-5 frame sets the stage for southpaw rising through the ranks for Yanks

When the New York Yankees drafted Auburn's Tanner Bauman two seasons ago, they got another reliable lefty arm within a formidable prospect pitching staff. The 24-year-old Jacksonville native was a ninth round pick in 2024. He comes to the midpoint of the season having seen action in Tampa, Hudson Valley and a spell in Somerset this season. With a 3-0 record in 22 games, Bauman has become a repeat apparition from Aaron Bossi's bullpen. Bauman acted as starter and

reliever as an Auburn Tiger, over two seasons in the program. His second and final year in the Tiger orange and blue saw a dominant campaign - particularly in his strikeout and usage. Bauman was second on the team in innings, adding a career-best 6.0 sharp frames in his final Auburn appearance. Bauman's 6-foot-5 frame brings a commanding presence to the Hudson Valley mound; a 27-12 strikeout to walk ratio bodes well for the southpaw's rise through the Yankee ranks. With a minor league career that has offered seven starts, Bauman has not earned a loss since his arrival to High-A Hudson Valley in 2025. Bauman does his best work on the road; his earned run average (1.50) a fraction of what he's displayed at Heritage Financial Park this season (8.03). Bauman allowed three straight Brooklyn baserunners on July 17, ending his inning-long outing on two straight strikeouts.

Westchester Medical Center Health Network (WMCHHealth) has announced that eight of its hospitals have been unified under a single hospital license, an administrative change that will help WMCHHealth operate as a more connected health system.

Doctors, nurses and care teams will be able to share information more easily, coordinate care faster and better support patients who need advanced services across the network.

Patients will continue to receive care from the same physicians and caregivers

at the same local hospitals. WMCHHealth employee pay, benefits, seniority and day-to-day work responsibilities will remain the same.

“This unification strengthens our ability to deliver safe, high-quality and consistent care for every patient we serve,” said David Lubarsky, MD, MBA, FASA, President and Chief Executive Officer of WMCHHealth. “While nearly all of these changes are expected to take place behind the scenes, the benefits for patients, physicians and employees will be felt every day.”

The change includes: HealthAlliance Hospital in Kingston, Good Samaritan Hospital in Suffern, Bon Secours Community Hospital in Port Jervis, St. Anthony Community Hospital in Warwick, St. Josephs Place skilled nursing facility in Port Jervis.

Margaretville Hospital is not part of this integration to preserve its Critical Access Hospital designation, and most of the network’s nursing homes are also excluded. Mid-Hudson Regional Hospital in Poughkeepsie already operates as a division of Westchester Medical Center.

The integration will help patients benefit more directly from WMCHHealth’s network-wide resources and specialized services while continuing to receive care locally.

WMCHHealth is also advancing plans to unify its electronic medical record (EMR) platform across all hospitals, in alignment with New York State’s Safety Net Transformation Grant strategy to improve stability and quality across safety net providers. A unified EMR will give clinical teams consistent, real-time patient information to support faster, better-informed decisions.

The River Pool at Beacon is open. “The pool opened earlier than it usually does. It was assembled in record time, and a full team of lifeguards were ready to work. The opportunity to cool off during these heat waves has happily brought people to the pool,” said Marianne Loach, with River Pool.

Loach shared, “People are delighted to have a safe place to dip and cool off in the river.”

The rainbow-colored circular floating pool with a netted bottom is open Tuesdays-Sundays from noon to 6 p.m. until Labor Day in September.

According to riverpool.org, “It is securely installed in the Hudson River, located off the north shore of Pete and Toshi Seeger Riverfront Park, in Beacon, NY. Swimmers safely sit & float in The River Pool, to relax and cool off with an on-duty lifeguard.”

It is noted on the site, “The late Pete Seeger, noted American folk singer, and his wife Toshi, were social/environmental activists, and founding members of River Pool. They believed that River

stewardship begins with being on, near, and in the river.”

Loach remarked, “The small pool is in a beautiful location on the Hudson River surrounded by beautiful scenery with a chance to watch different fowl such as eagles, osprey, cormorants, ducks, geese and others. For children it’s great for safe playing and splashing. For adults it’s a chance to cool off.”

On the website, one can check out the water quality sampling by the Dutchess County Health Department.

The annual River Swim was cancelled this year. The Swim is a way funds come in to keep the pool going.

“It’s disappointing that the River Swim was cancelled because Newburgh dock insurance would not cover the swim event this year. Once again, further limiting swim access to the Hudson River,” said Loach.

The River Pool is located at 2 Red Flynn Dr. in Beacon.

“Volunteers are always needed and appreciated for installing and removing the River Pool from the river. We welcome all support,” said Loach.

More than 40 gang members from Newburgh, Poughkeepsie sentenced to prison for racketeering, violence, narcotics and firearms offenses

United States Attorney for the Southern District of New York, Jay Clayton, announced last week the last sentencing of gang members and narcotics distributors as a result of a long-running investigation conducted by the Federal Bureau of Investigation (“FBI”) in Newburgh and Poughkeepsie. Twenty-six of the defendants were convicted of being members, associates, and co-conspirators of the violent street gang the Young Gunnaz (“YG”), including YG leader Kashad Sampson, according to officials. Twelve of the defendants were convicted of being members and associates of the violent street gang the Double Nine Grim Reapers (“Grimz”), including Grimz leaders Jeremy Williams, Randy Jones, and James White. U.S. District Judge Kenneth M. Karas imposed the sentences in the YG case, United States v. Kashad Sampson, et al., 22 Cr. 640, and U.S. District Judge Philip M. Halpern imposed the sentences in the Grimz case, United States v. Jeremy Williams, et al., 22 Cr. 641. RODNEY GEORGE, a defendant in the Sampson case, was the last in this series to be sentenced and received 108 months in prison.

“For years, members and associates of the Young Gunnaz and the Double Nine

Grim Reapers brought shootings, armed robberies, narcotics trafficking, and fraud to communities across the Hudson Valley,” said U.S. Attorney Jay Clayton. “Today’s final sentencing marks the end of a years-long prosecution that removed over 40 of these violent gang members and drug traffickers from our streets. No gang should get to claim a block, a neighborhood, or a city as its own, and this Office will continue to work with our federal, state, and local partners to dismantle violent criminal organizations and protect the communities they prey upon.”

As alleged in the Indictments, other court filings, and statements made during court proceedings:

Since at least 2018, the Grimz has been a brutally violent street gang. The Grimz was founded by co-defendants Jeremy Williams, a/k/a “Dubs,” and Randy Jones, a/k/a “Nickelz,” and has hundreds of members across New York State, including throughout Orange County, Dutchess County, and the New York State prison system. The Grimz is a highly organized and efficient street gang with an organizational commitment to violence that strictly enforces its internal laws and celebrates gun violence. The highest-ranking members and leaders of the Grimz, like co-

defendants James White, a/k/a “Infared,” and Octavious Griffin, a/k/a “Tate,” have so-called “serial numbers” within the Grimz, which include the name of a 9-millimeter firearm.

Since at least 2019, the YG has been a violent street gang that operated through New York State and engaged in large-scale narcotics trafficking, wire fraud, armed robberies, and shootings according to officials. For the most part, the YG defendants were part of the PlayBoygzz subset of YG, which was led by, among others, co-defendant Kashad Sampson, a/k/a “Shoca.” Like the Grimz, senior members of YG glorified violence and demanded action from its members.

For years, the Grimz and YG terrorized communities in this District and demonstrated a complete disregard for human life, it was stated. The Grimz defendants were responsible for multiple armed robberies and shootings in the City of Newburgh, including the November 3, 2020, attempted murder of a rival gang member. During that attempted murder, which involved co-defendants Justice Jackson, a/k/a “Tweak,” Tyrell Simon, a/k/a “Rello,” a/k/a “Insane,” Thomas Rodriguez, a/k/a “Tom Tom,” a/k/a “Checks,” and others, Rodriguez shot a rival gang member multiple times while the rival gang member sat in his vehicle. The rival gang member survived after receiving life-saving medical treatment at two different hospitals. The Grimz were also responsible for trafficking large amounts of deadly narcotics, like crack cocaine and heroin, on the streets and for trafficking K2, a synthetic cannabinoid, within the New York State prison system.

The YG defendants were responsible for at least approximately 13 shootings, three armed robberies, and a large-scale narcotics trafficking conspiracy responsible for flooding the streets with fentanyl, heroin, crack cocaine, and other drugs. In addition, some of the YG defendants also participated in a widespread scheme to defraud the New York state unemployment insurance program during the COVID-19 pandemic. In total, these defendants made just over \$1,000,000 through this scheme and caused at least one of their victims to fall into financial ruin because, as a result of YG’s fraud, the victim lost her total disability social security payment. Clayton praised the outstanding investigative work of the FBI’s Hudson Valley Safe Streets Task Force, City of Newburgh Police Department, New York State Police, Town of New Windsor Police Department, Town of Newburgh Police Department, New York City Police Department, and Nassau County Police Department. Clayton also thanked the FBI’s Westchester Safe Streets Task Force, the New York City Department of Correction, Correction Intelligence Bureau, the Department of Labor Office of the Inspector General, and the City of Poughkeepsie Police Department for their assistance in the investigation.

The Audacity of galls: They stay on brand

Walk through any forest in springtime, and you will likely find thousands of peculiar bumps, blisters and fuzzy swellings on the emerging leaves and twigs. These are plant galls, and they represent one of nature's most audacious heists. Interestingly, while these growths are common across nearly every continent, the word "*gall*" stems from the Latin *galla*, meaning a round tree swelling—a linguistic crossover completely unrelated to the historic European territory of Gaul.

Gall-causing organisms belong to a diverse guild of specialized parasites, whose behavior is studied under the scientific field of cecidology (seh-sid-OL-uh-jee). Each parasite type uses a unique mechanism to force its chosen plant to

grow a specialized home and food source.

Overriding host genetics

In nature, a massive evolutionary divide separates ordinary organisms from these parasites. While typical garden aphids simply suck sap and everyday mites spin webs, gall-formers possess an exclusive biological toolkit. Specialized lineages of insects, mites, fungi, bacteria, roundworms and viruses secrete precise mimic proteins, hormones or viral genetics. These molecular keys override the DNA of a host plant's immature stem cells, forcing the plant to build customized, nutrient-rich shelters for the invaders.

Developing wasp and aphid larvae find secure nursery shelters within these structures. Mites utilize the humid bunkers

to safely raise multiple generations. Fungal pathogens exploit the distorted tissue to develop and eventually broadcast their spores. Bacterial infections drive direct genomic transformation, creating localized food factories for multiplying clones. Meanwhile, soil-dwelling roundworms warp roots into underground feeding chambers, and specialized viruses manipulate cellular pathways to construct tumorous housings along stems.

The ultimate specialists

These organisms are strict botanical specialists. They are host- and organ-specific, operating within a narrow seasonal window. Because they must hijack the plant's growth hormones right as new cells actively divide, gall formation is heavily concentrated during the burst of early spring. Once a leaf or branch hardens for the summer, it becomes structurally immune to new manipulation.

This strict requirement means a perfect genetic match is mandatory. Mites specialized for maple leaves cannot spread to a nearby rose bush. Even on a single leaf, different species target completely different tissues. For instance, on hickory leaves, two different species of *Phylloxera* insects divide the territory: one forms stem galls that restrict water flow and kill twigs, while another forms benign globular galls between the leaf veins.

Universal parasites

While individual species are limited to specific hosts, the phenomenon of gall-making is nearly universal across the plant kingdom. Golf-ball-sized growths swell on goldenrod stems, bulbous fungus smut warps corn kernels, and bacterial crown galls infect roses. Even non-flowering ferns and mosses are vulnerable. A mature tree can support hundreds of different gall-inducing species. Conifers like pines and spruces are less prone to diverse insect galls because their sticky resin and defensive chemistry repel most attackers, though they still host specialized woolly insects called adelgids.

Cosmetic blemishes or fatal injuries?

These tiny invaders interact with plants through saliva, secretions or molecular mechanisms that trigger localized tissue irritation. Most resulting bumps or fuzzy growths are merely unsightly blemishes. Because they cause insignificant damage to

the overall health of a mature tree, experts generally recommend no treatment.

However, location matters. Galls that encircle branches can disrupt the flow of water and nutrients, causing dieback or stunting young trees. Furthermore, galls caused by systemic bacterial infections or aggressive rust fungi can seriously weaken or eventually kill the host plant.

Metabolic Drain

In natural ecosystems, close, long-term biological relationships between different species are symbiotic. While some symbioses are mutualistic (benefiting both) or commensalistic (leaving the host unaffected), gall-making is strictly parasitic.

Even when gall damage appears purely benign, it stems from a theft of energy. The invaders hijack the plant's genetic programming, forcing the host to divert valuable resources away from its own growth and reproduction to build and feed the enemy's home. Because the developing larvae continuously consume living tissue, the plant incurs a persistent metabolic drain.

A history of irritation

The word “*gall*” carries several meanings that these parasitic organisms exemplify. Our gallbladder stores bile, a bitter fluid that helps digest fats. In ancient humoral medicine, an excess of yellow bile—also called gall—was thought to make a person irascible or audacious. Separately, by the 12th century, friction sores on horses were called galls. Over time, the word evolved to mean any skin irritation, and eventually, the act of vexing someone.

Whether inducing a metabolic drain on a host plant, acting as an acerbic substance, or causing a historical medical irritation, galls are living proof of biological audacity. They are bitter, brazen, abnormal growths that literally bend nature to their will.

The Great Chicken Escape of ’06



About 20 years ago, Pop decided he was gonna be a chicken farmer. Not for money. For the eggs. Just because, as Momma put it, “Your faddah, he need-a somethin’ to keep him outta my kitchen.”

Every winter, they’d head to Florida, leaving me in charge of the chickens. Easy job ... until the blizzard from hell showed up. Snow everywhere. Snow on the coop. Snow in my boots. Snow judging my life choices.

I go out to feed the chickens — open the coop — and boom. Gone. All of them. Not a feather, not a cluck, nothing.

I panic. I call Pop in Florida.

Me: “Pop, the chickens are gone.”

Pop: “Gone? Whaddaya mean gone? They don’t-a drive!”

Me: “They’re missing! I think a raccoon got them.”

Pop: “A raccoon? All-a twelve? What, he bring a the U-Haul?”

In the background I hear Momma yelling:

Mom: “Tell him check-a the fence! Tell him check-a the gate! Tell him check-a his brain!”

Pop: “Your mothah say you gotta check-a your brain.”

Me: “Thanks, Pop. Very helpful.”

I spend the whole day imagining the lecture I’m gonna get when they come home. Mom crying like she lost money.

Pop shaking his head like I ruined the family legacy. But the next morning — there they are. All twelve chickens. Just strolling around the yard like they went out for cappuccino.

I called Pop back.

Me: “Pop, they’re back.”

Pop: “Back? Where they go, Atlantic City?”

Mom: (yelling in background): “I told-a you! Chickens, they smarter than him!”

It took me a while to figure it out.

The snow had piled so high inside the fenced area that the chickens simply walked up the snowbank, stepped over the fence, took a little winter vacation, and came back when they felt like it. They didn’t escape. They just ... took the stairs.

When I finally explained the whole snowbank situation, Pop just shook his head like he was disappointed in both me and gravity.

Pop: “So the chickens, they figure it out ... but you? Nothin’. Mamma mia.”

I could picture Mom crossing her arms, giving me that look — the one that could curdle milk — and said:

Mom: “Eh. In this family, even the chickens get-a more respect than you.”

And that, right there, was the moment I realized: I wasn’t just chicken-sitting ... I was being outsmarted by poultry and

out-appreciated by my own parents. Anyway, Chicken Cacciatore is an old-fashioned favorite. “Cacciatore” mean “hunter” in Italian. Fitting, don’t you think? Enjoy the recipe!

Chicken Cacciatore

Ingredients:

- 4 chicken thighs
- 2 chicken breasts, bone-in and skin-on
- 2 tsps. salt, plus additional to taste
- 1 tsps. freshly ground black pepper, plus more as needed
- ½ cup all-purpose flour, for dredging
- ¼ cup olive oil
- 1 large red bell pepper, chopped
- 1 medium onion, chopped
- 3 garlic cloves, finely minced
- ¾ cup dry white wine
- 1 32 oz. jar of Coppola’s Marinara
- ¾ cup reduced-sodium chicken broth
- 3 tbsps. capers, drained
- 1 ½ teaspoons dried oregano

Directions:

Season the chicken pieces with 1 teaspoon each of salt and pepper. Lightly coat all the pieces in flour, shaking off the excess.

Heat the olive oil in a large, heavy sauté pan over medium-high heat. Add the chicken in a single layer and brown well on both sides, about 5 minutes per side. If the pan is crowded, brown the chicken

in batches. Transfer the browned pieces to a plate.

In the same pan, add the chopped bell pepper, onions, and garlic. Cook over medium heat until the vegetables soften and the onion becomes translucent, about 5 minutes. Season lightly with salt and pepper.

Pour in the white wine and let it simmer until reduced by half. Stir in the Marinara Sauce, the chicken broth, capers, and oregano. Return the chicken to the pan, turning the pieces so they’re coated in the sauce.

Bring everything to a gentle simmer. Cook over medium-low heat until the chicken is fully cooked — about 30 minutes for the breast pieces and about 20 minutes for the thighs.

Serve over hearty pasta. Rigatoni or penne. Oh and, of course, a nice loaf of bread.

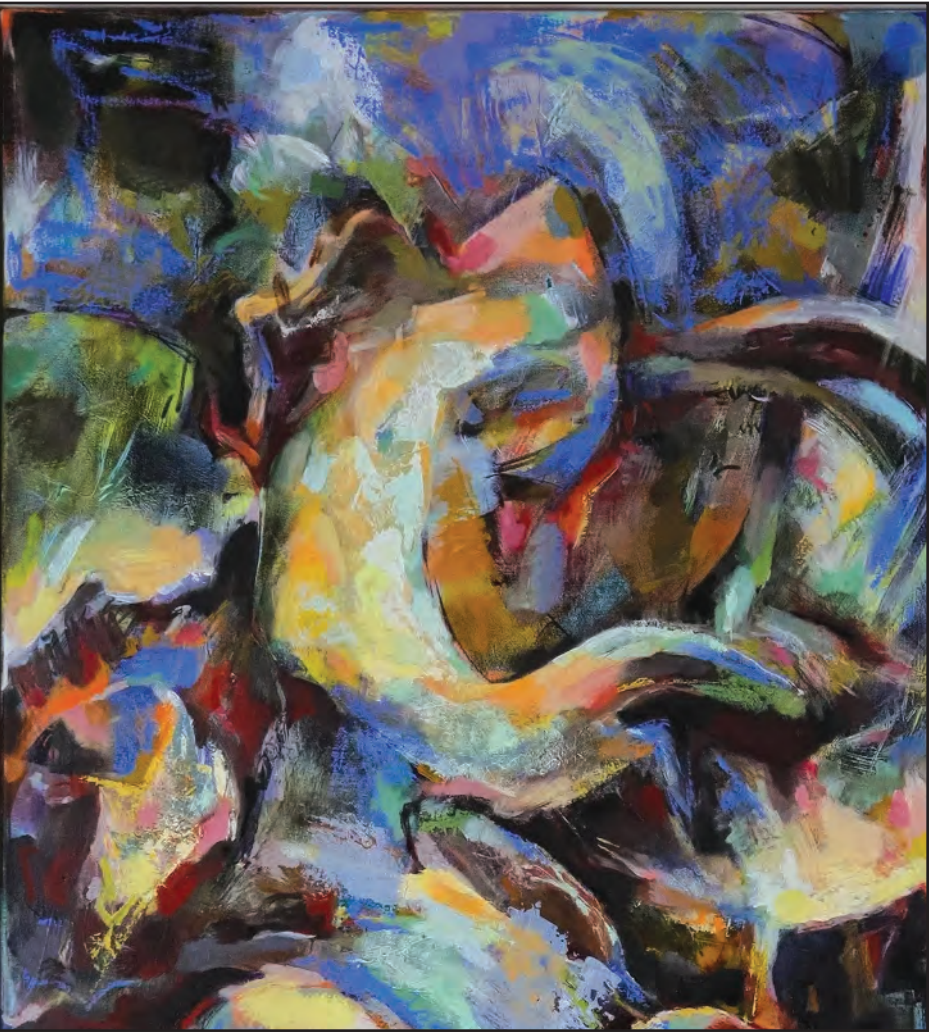

Nataliya Hines’ ‘Ghost in the Machine’

“Ghost in the Machine” explores how meaning is constructed, inherited, and adapted in service of a new mythos. Titled in reference to Arthur Koestler’s concept of the fragmented mind, the work reflects on the tension between self and system, and the imperfectly evolved impulse to reconcile the two. The nine paintings in this exhibition depict figures emerging from primordial folkloric memory and personal history, forming a speculative mythology. Grounded in the elemental, cyclical sensibility of nature-based belief systems, the works consider how experiences of transcendent beauty in nature can provide a sense of connection and continuity. The exhibition reflects an uncanny, preternatural space for navigating the harmony and discordance within identity and our need for belonging; it is a place to consider a past and future of our own in the shadow of the one written for us.

Robin Adler, Karen Allen, Eileen Sackman with ‘Bone Broth’

Structural integrity drives this three-person exhibition by Robin Adler, Karen Allen, and Eileen Sackman. Just as a skeleton supports an organism, the bones of a composition and materials dictate artistic form. Together, these artists explore the limits of the structures beneath: how much pressure and strain a foundation can endure before deteriorating, and the tension required to bring a creative vision to life. Through translucency and light, abstract figuration and shadows, and emotional tone, Adler, Allen, and Sackman seek to unearth the beauty of structure within each of their works.

William PK Carter’s ‘Blessings of Extinction’

“Blessings of Extinction” compares short-term adaptation to long-term evolution in nature, arguing that the survival of a marginalized species depends on the eventual extinction of its predators: white supremacy and heteronormativity. In that comparison, this exhibition highlights the impact that an individual’s seemingly small lifestyle changes can have on the overall trajectory of their entire community—demonstrating how choosing to be visibly authentic in one’s daily life sends ripples of hope through those who’ve come before and will come after them.

The show includes wall-mounted illustrative quilts depicting the evolution of a fantastical creature and three puppet performances held in and outside of the gallery. This project is made possible with funds from the New York State Legislature and administered by Arts Mid-Hudson. In partnership with Dutchess County Pride.
