Superintendents look forward to new school year with excitement

Local school superintendents Dr. Dwight Bonk and Dr. Matthew Landahl answered questions about the upcoming 2022-23 school year in the Wappingers Central School District (WCSD) and Beacon City School District (BCSD) respectively. Both districts welcome back students this week.

WCSD welcome 10,500 students back
“The District has been working dili-

gently during the summer months in preparation for the start of the 2022-23 school year, which begins on Wednesday, September 7th. We remain very thankful to our community for the support of our 2022-2023 Budget, which enabled the District to add staff and services in the area of student mental health and well-ness. The District is also grateful for the voter-approved Capital Improvement proposition, which allowed for significant

improvements to the infrastructure of our 15 buildings,” said Bonk.

He noted, “The District continues to make the necessary systemic changes that provide for the most effective and efficient District Operations. The District welcomes Dr. Kathy Affigne as the Interim Principal of Brinckerhoff Elementary School. The District will

Oktoberfest is coming to Germania of Poughkeepsie. The annual event will be held September 9 – 11 at the Germania Fairgrounds, 51 Old DeGarmo Road in Poughkeepsie. The schedule is Friday from 5 – 10 p.m.; Saturday from 1 – 10 p.m. and Sunday from noon – 5 p.m. Daily admission is \$5 (16 and under are free). There is \$1 discount for veterans and military with ID. Parking is free. The event is held rain or shine.

Sylvia Reuter and Georgia Herring are the co-chairs for Oktoberfest this year.

“Oktoberfest is a festival...it’s a celebration of Bavarian History and German culture, food and (of course) beer!,” said Reuter.

“My family joined the club back in 2009, and we have helped out every year at the festival. The club is run 100% by our member volunteers. The festival is a great time for families - in fact, my granddaughters (5 and 3) are going to be dancing in the traditional German Dance group called the Almrausch,” stated Herring.

The annual festivity will have dancing and music. Music will be provided by the Bratwurst Boys, The Joe Unger Band and The Adlers Band. Traditional dancing will be performed by Germania Almrausch Schuhplattler Verein.

The event is about “getting together and having a good time with each other. It’s that feeling of Gemütlichkeit (German for the feeling of warmth and coziness),” remarked Reuter.

The head of the Stanford Fire Department’s 9-11 Committee and his colleagues were emotional after months of hard, and a times frustrating, work to collect much-needed fire equipment and supplies for a village in war-torn Ukraine. When the group traveled from the small Dutchess County

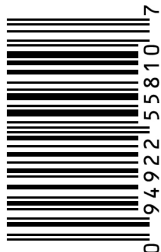

begin the search for a principal in the early fall.”

Regarding school safety, Dr. Bonk said, “In the area of school safety, which remains our top priority, the regular practice of collaboration with Dutchess County Executive Marcus Molinaro, Dutchess County Acting Sheriff Kirk Imperati, the New York State Police, local municipal officials, and law enforcement partners that serve our District from the Town of East Fishkill, Town of Fishkill, Village of Fishkill, Town of Poughkeepsie, Town of Wappinger, and the Village of Wappingers Falls as well as our security vendors continues to promote a safe school environment.” He continued, “We are very grateful for their continued support and are pleased to report that our ten elementary schools will have an increased police presence throughout each school day. Their detailed schedules will not be disclosed for security reasons, but we believe their presence will become noticeable immediately.” School Resource Officers have been added this year at both Van Wyck Junior High School and Wappingers Junior High School, said the superintendent, in addition to those previously assigned to both John Jay High School and Roy C. Ketcham High School.

The District, said Bonk, has also secured the following services:

- Engaged the services of the Putnam-Northern Westchester (PNW) BOCES Regional Safety Services program to conduct building safety audits of all of our schools. This work will be carried out throughout the fall with recommendations for improvements being made along the way.
- Ordered technology enhancements that will improve the current emergency proce-

dures and communication systems, and looking forward to the implementation of these solutions.

- Established a goal of focusing on Threat Assessment Training based upon the University of Virginia Comprehensive School Threat Assessment Guidelines (CSTAG). This work will be ongoing throughout the school year and beyond.
- Training for staff will remain an integral part of the District and building safety plans, and new system enhancements and training opportunities with PNW BOCES will be utilized regularly.

“We continue to offer our regular curricular programs as well as our extra-curricular programs and continue to expand our Career and Technical opportunities through our Career, Vocational, and Technical Education Initiative, adopted two years ago, which expands opportunities for career awareness opportunities and experiences at the K-8 level. We are grateful for the support that we have received from our business community in establishing School-Business Partnerships to make this a reality,” said Bonk.

“We are looking forward to returning to the business of education as we move forward this school year. Masks are not required for individuals during school hours, or at school extra-curricular activities or events in our school buildings or on District property,” remarked Bonk. “The remaining COVID protocols which remain, per the New York State Education Department, require those individuals who test positive for COVID-19 to isolate for five calendar

days, with Day Zero beginning with the date the sample was provided for testing or the date first signs and symptoms appeared. The individual may return to school after Day Five as long as they demonstrate symptom resolution and are fever free for 24 hours without the use of fever reducing medications.”

Bonk stated, “In closing, we look forward to the return of our 10,500 students, and a most productive and rewarding school year for all! Our staff will be ready, willing, and able to assist our students by providing a safe school environment that fosters the highest degree of academic, social, and emotional success for our students”

Excited for the new year in the BCSD

“My message to students is to relax, do your best, ask for help from any school staff when you think you need it, all questions are good, and make new friends,” said Landahl when asked what he would tell students welcoming them back to the BCSD for the upcoming school year.

Landahl noted, “We have one new principal this year, Cathryn (Catie) Biordi who is the new principal at Sargent Elementary. She was one of the assistant principals at Rombout Middle School for the past four years.”

Regarding COVID-19, Landahl said he does not have any new updates at this time. He noted, “We urge families to keep students with symptoms home from school but masks and quarantining from exposures are not required this year. We will still have the occasional vaccine clinic to help people stay updated with that if they choose.”

Regarding what he would like students in the BCSD to know, Landahl stated, “We are looking forward to a year of exciting learning experiences, field trips, and improved communication this year, and even more in-person events to build our community further.”

Landahl said, “We are incredibly excited to get this year started! We can’t wait to see everyone!”

DCC awarded 3 grants from SUNY Systems Administration

Dutchess Community College (DCC) has been awarded three grants from SUNY System Administration, each of which will support various elements of the greater Dutchess County workforce development landscape. All totaled, they approach \$1.8 million in new funding over a three-year span.

The largest of these is a three-year, \$1.49 million grant to establish a SUNY Future of Work Center at DCC's new Mechatronics and Workforce Development Labs, located at DCC @ Fishkill. The Future of Work Center will create short-term, degree-eligible and non-degree credential programs which quickly address employer skill needs and prepare job seekers – especially those from underrepresented communities – for careers in high-growth industries. The grant provides the start-up funds needed to develop curriculum – in collaboration with regional businesses – and deploy marketing tactics to prospective employers and students.

“This Future of Work Center grant aligns nicely with the strategies of Dutchess County’s Workforce Investment Board (WIB), as well as its Economic Development Advisory Council’s Education and Workforce Committee, to close the skill gaps and create pipelines to good paying jobs,” explained DCC President Peter Grant Jordan.

In addition, DCC received a \$200,000 grant in support of its Noncredit-to-Credit Pathways and Microcredential initiatives, designed to create or enhance educational pathways for learners focused on the

training needs of local businesses and organizations.

These include two pathways in health-care, starting with Certified Nurse Assistant (CNA) and EMT Basic programs that can lead to Nursing and EMT/ Paramedic degrees; one pathway in Business, a Bookkeeping micro-credential which can

lead to a degree in Business Administration; and one in Information Technology, starting with a Networking-for-the-Cloud micro-credential that can lead to a degree in Computer Information Systems.

The grant also provides comprehensive academic and non-academic wraparound support to promote student success.

Lastly, DCC received a \$70,000, three-

year sub-award for its role in a workforce consortium that is part of SUNY’s Cannabis Workforce Development Grant Program. This project is a “hub-and-spoke” model, with SUNY Orange serving as the lead institution, and Dutchess, Rockland, Sullivan, Ulster and Westchester community colleges as partners.

This grant supports the emerging cannabis industry by providing industry, business and curriculum development, education and training, student supportive services, and outreach and marketing. The project focuses on developing and implementing an employer-driven sector strategy, with a preference to serve populations who have been disproportionately impacted by the war on drugs (also known as cannabis prohibition).

“These projects fit squarely in the crosshairs of what our business community so urgently needs from us,” Dr. Jordan added. “Our grant applications received letters of support from the County Executive, Council of Industry, IBM, Global Foundries, the WIB, Dutchess BOCES, and more, and we are grateful for their support and trust in us as stewards of these investments, as well as the development of their soon-to-be business colleagues.”

Register for naturalist classes offered in the fall

Programming for youth and adults will be held at Bowdoin Park, located at 85 Sheafe Road in the Town of Poughkeepsie, and will explore topics such as an introduction to nature-inspired art, archery, or exploring the natural habitats of the park.

Dutchess County Executive Marc Molinaro said, “As the season begins to change, we kick off our naturalist programming fall sessions. We encourage everyone to take advantage of the fun educational opportunities offered and explore what our beautiful Bowdoin Park has to offer. Register quickly though, as these programs are notoriously popular!”

The Fall Naturalist Program schedule is as follows and registration will be available at dutchessny.gov/parks.

The Park Palette Art Series, for ages 10-18, will take students through a step-by-step process to create nature themed paintings. Students can choose one workshop or take all three. Cost is \$12, and includes all supplies. Classes are 3:30-5 p.m. at Pavilion 5 and are limited to 10 participants.

The Eaglet Nature Program for youth ages 5-7, along with their parents or caregivers, will give children a closer look at the unique habitats throughout the park through interactive exploration

and play. Each week’s session will focus on a different topic, and will include a related craft activity. Classes will be 4-4:45 p.m. and will begin at the Nature Education Center near Pavilion 5. Registration is \$5 per child and sessions are limited to 12 participants.



Dutchess County firefighters assist with wildland fires in Ulster County

Several Dutchess County fire departments deployed resources to assist with the suppression efforts of two wildland fires at the Napanoch Point and Stony Kill areas of Minnewaska State Park Preserve in Ulster County last week. The Dutchess County Department of Emergency Response (DER) was working with the local departments to respond to the inter-county mutual aid request from Ulster County Emergency Services and New York State Department of Environmental Conservation Forest Rangers.

Nearly 20 firefighters responded with a variety of equipment resources including utility terrain vehicles (UTV) and support vehicles with firefighting capabilities. According to the DEC Forest Rangers, the fire is believed to have been started by a lightning strike on August 27th, however suppression efforts have been challenging due to the extremely dry conditions and difficult terrain of the area. Dutchess County DER continued to coordinate mutual aid efforts until the fire was contained.

Dutchess County Executive Marc Molinaro said, "We have been actively communicating with officials from the State and Ulster County to offer our assistance with getting the fires at Napanoch Point and Stony Kill at Minnewaska under control. We are grateful to the firefighters from departments across Dutchess County who have answered the call to provide necessary support in battling this challenging wildfire."

Napanoch Point and Stony Kill are located within the Minnewaska State Park Preserve and feature very remote and rugged terrain that is difficult to access. Hundreds of emergency crews responded to address the fires. As of press time, the Napanoch Point fire has scorched approximately 130 to 150 acres; the smaller fire at Stony Kill was detected on August 30th and is approximately 0.68 acres.

Free Citizenship Preparedness Trainings set for Sept. 15

September is National Preparedness Month and the Dutchess County Department of Emergency Response announces the return of the County's popular, free Citizens Preparedness Trainings. The first sessions will be held in partnership with the Town and Village of Rhinebeck on Thursday, September 15th at the Rhinebeck Village Hall, located at 76 East Market Street in Rhinebeck. Two sessions will be offered at 2 p.m. and 7 p.m. and will provide participants with the tools and resources necessary to better prepare for any type of disaster. The sessions are open to the public.

County Executive Marc Molinaro said, "We are pleased to have these valuable trainings return and help Dutchess County residents be more prepared during an emergency and stay safe. We are grateful to our municipal partners for understanding the value of these classes and encourage everyone to attend, whether it's your first time or you're looking for a refresher course."

Participants will learn how to respond accordingly in a disaster and recover as quickly as possible to pre-disaster conditions. Each family will receive a free Citizens Preparedness Response Starter Kit. Dutchess County's Medical Reserve Corps and the Dutchess County Animal Response Team will be present with more information on how to become involved.

For a very long time, since 1809 to be precise, the best-known Knickerbockers have arguably been the fictional characters depicted by the author Washington Irving in a satirical history of New York. His work spawned the use of the iconic name to mean a “real” New Yorker, the Dutch focus reflected the fact that the first European settlers in New York were not the English, as they frequently were elsewhere.

The popularity of Irving’s work led to the popular depiction of the “Father Knickerbocker” character, with a three-pointed hat and knickerbockers, the pants that go just below the knee and socks take care of the rest. The name lives on popularly today in the basketball team, the New York Knicks, among others.

Bryan Knickerbocker lives outside of Philadelphia and has been studying his family history for decades. The Dutchess County Historical Society (DCHS) is pleased to be publishing Bryan’s findings in a less traditional way, through the serial publication of chapters that will illuminate points along an evolving Knickerbocker trail at dchsny.org/knickerbocker-trail.

Among the most extraordinary of Bryan’s findings are that 90 percent of the Knickerbockers living in the United States today are descendants of these northern Dutchess Knickerbockers. The ancestor, Lawrence Knickerbocker (1685-1766), had bought land in Salisbury, Connecticut by 1730, but maintained connections to Tivoli landing, in Red Hook. Except for the portion in Red Hook, this path is essentially the 1802 Salisbury Turnpike. Subsequent chapters will be told and assigned their place on the Knickerbocker trail! Bryan kicks off the trail with the story of the Pine Plains born Guy Knickerbocker. –

Guy Knickerbocker became famous in medical circles as a co-inventor of what we now call CPR (Cardio Pulmonary Resuscitation). Guy Knickerbocker was

born in 1932 in Pine Plains. He passed away on June 21, 2022 in Narvon, Pennsylvania.

Guy Knickerbocker’s story is well documented. During his student days at Johns Hopkins University, Guy and his colleagues noticed relationships between chest compression, electrical signals in the nervous system and heart activity. This ultimately led to the development of CPR.

Before he became an important national figure, Guy was a boy from Pine Plains. We won’t say that he was “just another boy,” because his talents apparently revealed themselves early in his life. Guy was the son of Henry and Maude Knickerbocker.

He was the grandson of Fred Knickerbocker. Fred served his country during the Spanish American War and was the subject of a program and DCHS Yearbook article by his great-grandson, Justin Kemp.

This family has deep roots in Dutchess County. The Knickerbocker family farm that was eventually owned by Fred Knickerbocker can be seen on an 1802 map of the Salisbury Turnpike. We assume that Fred was a frequent visitor to his grandfather’s farm during his early years. The farm still exists, although it is no longer owned by Knickerbockers.

Guy was mentioned multiple times in the Pine Plains Register during his childhood. He was a frequent member of the honor roll. And, in what was perhaps a portent of things to come, he was the class representative in supporting the American Red Cross.

Guy’s family moved to Baltimore in 1949 when his father took a new job. However, the Register continued to mention Guy and his family. The August 17, 1950 Register reported that Guy had received a scholarship to Johns Hopkins, saying: “Former Local Boy Awarded Scholarship. Guy Knickerbocker, son of Mr. and Mrs. Henry B. Knickerbocker will enter Johns Hopkins University School of Engineering. Guy was awarded a scholarship on the basis of his scholastic standing and the results of a

competitive examination.”

In 1959, many newspapers around the country reported on the important work that was done at Johns Hopkins. On December 3, 1959 the Pine Plains Register reported the following, “Discovery Credited to Guy Knickerbocker A new first-aid method for persons whose hearts have stopped beating was demonstrated publicly for the first time recently by a research team from the Johns Hopkins University. The method, which in time may become a standard part of all first-aid courses, keeps blood flowing to the brain. It may also cause the heart to start beating again. Credit for the discovery was given to Guy Knickerbocker, an electrical engineer and member of the research team. Other team members are Dr. William B. Kouwenhoven and Dr. James R. Jude. Guy Knickerbocker is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Henry Knickerbocker, and formerly of Pine Plains.”

Guy continued to be mentioned in the newspaper during his frequent trips to Dutchess County to visit family and friends. Guy’s father Henry died in Baltimore in 1967. His mother Maude died in 2011. Guy’s parents, grandparents, and great grandparents are buried in the Evergreen Cemetery in Pine Plains.

According to his obituary, Guy Knickerbocker donated his body to science. Guy’s family asked that contributions in his name be made to the Sudden Cardiac Arrest Foundation, 7500 Brooktree Road, Wexford, PA 15080, with General Support or Public Awareness Research Fund in the memo line.

Start planning now! 2023 Renegades schedule is set

The Hudson Valley Renegades, the High-A affiliate of the New York Yankees, have announced their 2023 schedule, featuring 132 games set to begin Friday, April 7 at Dutchess Stadium. The 2023 season marks the third year for the Renegades as a member of the South Atlantic League.

The schedule features 66 home games and 66 road games against nine opponents. Hudson Valley faces off against North Division opponents 105 times, while playing South Division foes in the remaining 27 contests.

The season begins on Friday, April 7 as the Renegades host a three-game series with the Greensboro Grasshoppers, kicking off a season-opening nine-game homestand through April 16, which also includes six games with the Aberdeen IronBirds.

“We are very excited for the 2023 season of Renegades baseball at The Dutch,” Steve Gliner, President and General Manager of the Renegades, said in a state-

ment. “We have a lot of big things planned for next year, and we can’t wait to share it all with our fans.”

The most frequent opponent for the Renegades in 2023 is the Wilmington Blue Rocks, the High-A affiliate of the Washington Nationals. The ’Gades and Rocks will square off 30 times during the season. Hudson Valley is set for 24 games each with Aberdeen (Baltimore), Brooklyn (NY Mets), and Jersey Shore (Philadelphia).

Hudson Valley hosts one new opponent out of the South Division this year, welcoming the Bowling Green Hot Rods to The Dutch from July 14-16. The Hot Rods are an affiliate of the Tampa Bay Rays, the Renegades parent club from 1996-2019.

The Renegades host two nine-game homestands in 2023 – April 7-16 and July 14-23. They will take two 12-game road trips during the season – from April 18-30 to Rome and Greenville, and July 25-August 6 against Hickory and Wilmington.

Three Hudson Valley Renegades pitchers combined to shut out the Jersey Shore BlueClaws 8-0 on Thursday night, September 1, at Dutchess Stadium. It was the ninth shutout of the year thrown by the Renegades, and the fourth against the BlueClaws.

The victory allowed Hudson Valley stay a half-game behind Brooklyn in the North Division of the South Atlantic League with just nine games left in the season.

Bailey Dees relieved Fitts and tossed 2.1 perfect innings in his High-A debut, striking out four. Enrique Santana guided the Gades through the ninth and locked down the shutout win with a scoreless inning in his High-A debut.

The Renegades will close out their regular season schedule with six games at Wilmington this week.

GLINER'S KORNER!

Educating fans and making adjustments for next season

Every week, Hudson Valley Renegades President Steve Gliner sits down with reporter Rich Thomaselli to discuss the team in particular, and minor league baseball in general.

Last homestand as we speak! Take us through the year.

2022 was all about having a season without having any restrictions and getting back into the groove. Like we talked about before, we never played Renegades games in April before and the average temperature in April was 48 degrees. So it was definitely different. We just released our 2023 schedule (see story on Page 6) and we're looking forward to that, and it starts even earlier (at home) than before on April 7. So for us it's still all about educating the market on our new league and new schedule. But as a staff we know we head into the off-season without any restrictions we're coming off and now we know moving forward everything is going to be as we knew it.

You've talked about that need to educate the market before, but was there an adjustment these last two seasons going to full-season baseball for you and the staff?

You have to kind of look at the schedule and prepare. There are a lot of things that have to fall into place. It makes it easier knowing what we've done this month. We learned things from this year, especially what April and May are like.

As April and May of this year turned into summer, did you adjust on the fly?

Not really. There's not a lot you can do once things are in place, but you can take a lot of good notes. Here's what worked well, here's what didn't, that sort of things. I kind of expected April and May to be light, with kids in school and us not having a history of playing in those months (in the New York-Penn League). Now we have a whole season of data of how things work.

I had a boss who used to used this

phrase "second notebook" to jot down ideas separate from what you were covering about things you might want to implement. Do you do that?

All the time. I have a pile of notebooks that I refer back to. There's always

instances where se can take information and move forward. We are constantly looking for ways to improve. We come in with a game plan and maybe some of it clicks and maybe some of it doesn't. So you look at what works and how to improve it, and you know at what doesn't and try to learn why it didn't.

As this last homestand comes to an end, were you pleased with the season and how things played out in terms of fan attendance, successes, fan recognition that you're a Yankee franchise, that sort of thing?

Yeah, we learned a lot from our perspective. We learned a lot. We were happy with the season but we can always improve. That's the mark of a good staff that they can recognize thoe instances. You're never comfortable. I think I've said that before. We always need to find ways to improve. We'll always want as much information as e can and that's where communication with the fans as well.

More than 150 students attend Summer Youth Employment Summit in Poughkeepsie

More than 150 young people from throughout Dutchess County attended the Department of Community & Family Services' (DCFS) Summer Youth Employment Program (SYEP) Youth Summit, coordinated by the Dutchess County Workforce Investment Board (WIB) and held at the former JCPenney site at the Poughkeepsie Galleria recently.

The SYEP provides qualified students, ages 14 to 20 and whose families qualify for Temporary Assistance for Needy Families (TANF), a 6-8 week-long course, which included summer job placement, designed to help them prepare for future, permanent employment.

County Executive Marc Molinaro said, "Dutchess County believes in its young people, and we continue to invest in the Youth Summer Employment Program because we've seen the benefits year after year: local youth gaining the skills and experience needed to become successful adults. The young men and women who have completed this year's program and attended today's summit will take with them the lessons they've learned this summer, and we, as a county, look forward to following their success for years to come."

Students who took part in the SYEP received job placements accompanied by mentorship – ranging in industry, skill level, and geographic location – and worked an average of 20 hours per week at various businesses throughout Dutchess County, including R.E.A.L. Skills Network, The Art Effect, Nubian

Directions II and Hudson River Housing. Training coincided with the students' employment throughout the course of July and August, giving them the chance to learn skills, go back and apply those skills on the job, and then gather again to discuss which were successful.

Training topics included:

- problem-solving;
- teamwork;
- verbal and non-verbal communication;
- stress management;
- fundamental fiscal management concepts; and
- goal setting and employment strategies.

WIB Executive Director Louise McLoughlin said, "The Dutchess County Workforce Investment Board is proud to again collaborate with the Department of Community & Family Services to present this important program. Today's students will take with them the critical lifelong skills they've learned this summer and apply them as they pursue a career, and we're happy to play a role in their future achievements."

Among the day's presentations were education about financial literacy and entrepreneurial training; a job fair; and a workshop about "Path to Promise," the County's comprehensive effort to ensure all young people in the county have the assets they need to achieve their full potential as they grow into young adults. Additionally, Sen. Sue Serino her personal experience with the students.

Stanford Fire Dept. delivers on promise to help Ukraine

town to watch as 3,000 pounds of equipment was loaded in Syracuse to be shipped overseas, well, let's just say a few tears were shed.

"The only regret I have," Zick said, "was that only the three of us could see this emotion going on."

Members fire departments and fire companies all over Dutchess County assisted the Stanford Fire Department in this project with donations of equipment.

It was a resilient, determined effort. When the group arrived in Syracuse, they found 18 pallets of medical supplies and firefighting equipment ready to ship. A truck was then dispatched to New Jersey and a cargo ship will begin the journey to Gdansk, Poland, this week. It is expected to take six weeks to arrive.

From there, it will be transported personally by truck by a contact that Zick met through the Ukranian church in Kerhonkson. The supplies will be taken to small village in Ukraine called Manevychi, population 10,000. Zick and his cohorts have been in contact with two fire brigades that will receive the much-

needed equipment.

"Most of the people we met could not speak English, but you could feel the appreciation," Zick said. "Over and over, Fred, our contact in Syracuse, would say 'I don't understand why you would do this for my people, but God does.' It made all those setbacks and sleepless nights worth it."

While he tracks the shipment, Zick and the Fire Department personnel will turn their attention back home. Once again, they have already planted the small flags on the hill in Stanfordville in front of Town Hall to commemorate the deaths of those lost on Sept. 11, 2001, a tradition that will live on according to Zick. The flags were expected to be in place by Friday, Sept. 2, and will stay planted in the ground until Sept. 19.

"You know, it's easy to say 'Never Forget' but to do something to remember is another issue," he said.

Class and dignity

Important lessons learned

My son Geno is in Missouri right now for Boot Camp for the Army National Guard. I am amazed how fast time has gone by. I caught myself reminiscing about the last 20 years of my life. My oldest son, Marcanthony, started kindergarten 20 years ago and now I had come full circle. As I looked at my daughter Clara sitting on the couch, I thought of all the trials and tribulations of all my children during the last 20 years. The bruised knees, egos, and occasional broken bones and all the various teaching moments that presented themselves with which I had to call on my experiences of growing up in an Italian household and how to blend my old-school lessons, with their new generation, not an easy task. Thinking about all of this brought back the memory of my most influential learning moment from when I was a child.

When I was a kid, I was very overweight. Not only was I overweight, I also had braces on my very crooked teeth. I was teased constantly being called fat, brace face, etc., always with the customary Italian insult thrown in for good measure. On one particularly bad day at school, I went home and was very down about the constant teasing. My father watched me get off the bus, observing as I walked up to the house with my head down. As I came inside looking like I had lost my best friend, he asked me what was wrong. I told him about being teased and being made fun in school. My father looked at me and, as was always the

case, Pop had a story.

During WWII, everyone in his town was very poor. Not only was there not enough food to go around, but the Nazis would steal from their gardens and take any livestock they might have. However, in spite of all the hardships, my grandmother always held her head high. She always told my father and uncles that they were to conduct themselves with class and dignity no matter what the circumstances. She also told them something that he would repeat to us many times: "While we may not have a lot of money, we have our name, and that is worth more than anything else."

On Sundays they would all go to church as a family, except for my grandmother who went earlier in order to make pasta for Sunday dinner. She would mix in the flour and eggs by hand, rolling out and cutting the pasta before hanging it outside to dry. She would make a tomato sauce with any scrap pieces of meat she could find, stretching every last ounce out of her ingredients. She also made the bread that they would have with their dinner. On Saturdays, she always sent my father down to the sea to collect salty seawater to mix into the bread. This was highly illegal during that time, because the government held control over the sale of salt. One day a carabinieri (police officer) caught him sneaking the seawater. He took the jar from my father, smashed it on the ground, and kicked him in the behind.

Flour was bought every week for Sunday bread and pasta. They would buy on credit until their bill became so high that the grocer wouldn't sell to them any more. During the lean periods, he wouldn't even return my family's greetings on the street, because he was so angry with them due to the large outstanding bill. Years later, when my father would come visit his mother from America, the grocer would greet him with "Hello, Don Antonio!" Remembering the lessons my grandmother taught them about class and dignity, he would stop and speak to him about his wife and children. It was during these times that he realized his mother was really teaching them about respect, and what it took to be respected.

After Pop got done telling me this story, he asked me if I understood what he was trying to tell me. I looked at him and said, "Don't steal saltwater or you'll get kicked in the behind."

My father slapped himself in the forehead and told me to go do my homework.

Enjoy this recipe for homemade pasta. Buon Appetito!

Homemade Pasta

Ingredients

- 1 egg beaten
- 1/2 teaspoon salt
- 1 cup flour
- 2 tablespoons water

Method

- In a medium sized bowl, combine flour and salt. Make a little well in the flour, add the slightly beaten egg, and mix by hand. Mixture should form a stiff dough. If needed, stir in 1 to 2 tablespoons water to loosen it up bit. Roll the dough into a ball and let sit for 10 minutes.
- vOn a lightly floured surface, knead dough for about 3 to 4 minutes. With a pasta machine or by hand, roll dough out to desired thinness. Using a pizza knife cut the pasta into strips of desired width.
- Using a broom handle balance between two chairs, hang the dough to dry.
- Bring a large pot of salted water to a boil and drop the dried pasta into the water. Let cook for 2-3 minutes. This pasta takes a lot less time to cook then the pasta you would buy in a box.
- Drain and toss with a nice jar of Coppola's Marinara sauce. Sprinkle with freshly grated Reggiano Parmagiana and serve with a nice warm loaf of crusty Italian bread and a bottle of chilled Pinot Grigio.

The proposed local law will provide standards and enforcement procedures for the maintenance of lawns at such properties. **SECTION 3. AUTHORITY.**
This law is enacted pursuant to §10 of the Municipal Home Rule Law. **SECTION 4. AMENDMENT TO THE CODE.**
Chapter 96, “Grass Maintenance,” is hereby established as follows: **§ 96-1. Authority; findings; purpose and intent.**
A. This chapter is enacted pursuant to § 10 of the Municipal Home Rule Law to provide for the health, safety, appearance and general welfare of the public, the residents of the Town of Pleasant Val-

ley, and the owners of real property located within the Town of Pleasant Valley. B. The Town Board finds that properties on which the lawns are not adequately maintained tend to diminish or lessen the appearance thereof or detract from the appearance of adjoining properties, which may lead to the progressive deterioration of a neighborhood. C. The purpose and intent of this chapter is to provide a method to help ensure that the lawns on properties

within the Town are properly maintained. **§ 96-2. Applicability.**
A. This chapter shall apply to all lots, plots or parcels of land on which residential, and/or mixed-use buildings are located, which land and buildings are vacant or abandoned. B. TOWN OF PLEASANT VALLEY PROPOSED LOCAL LAW B OF 2022 BE IT ENACTED by the Town Board of the Town of Pleasant Valley as follows: **SECTION 1. TITLE.**
This Local Law shall be entitled “A Local Law Repealing Chapter 95 and Amending Chapter 98, Section 98-34, of the Town Code with Regard to the Outdoor Storage of Junk Motor Vehicles”. **SECTION 2. PURPOSE AND INTENT.**
The Town’s Zoning Administrator has notified the Town Board that the Code of the Town of Pleasant Valley (the “Town Code”) contains two inconsistent sets of regulations relating to outdoor storage of junk motor vehicles. The Town Board has determined that the regulations in Chapter 98 “Zoning,” Section 98-34 “Junk motor vehicles,” should be retained and modified, and the regulations in Chapter 95, “Outdoor Storage of Junk Motor Vehicles,” should be removed from the Code. **SECTION 3. AUTHORITY.**
This law is enacted pursuant to §10 of the Municipal Home Rule Law. **SECTION 4. AMENDMENT TO THE CODE.**
Chapter 95 is hereby repealed and shall be removed from the Town Code. Chapter 98 “Zoning,” Section 98-34 “Junk motor vehicles,” shall be repealed and replaced as follows:
A. Intent. The outdoor storage of junk motor vehicles and/or motor vehicle parts constitutes a health, fire and safety hazard, is generally unsightly and tends to depreciate the value of property in the neighborhood. Therefore, it is prohibited.
B. Definitions. As used in this chapter, the following terms shall have the meanings indicated:
(1) JUNK MOTOR VEHICLE — Any unregistered motor vehicle for which a registration with DMV is required for operation.
(2) MOTOR VEHICLE — Any self-propelled vehicle manufactured for use on public highways.
(3) OUTDOOR STORAGE — The placing, maintaining or keeping in a place other than a building.
C. Outdoor storage of junk motor vehicles or motor vehicle parts is prohibited, except as permitted in a licensed salvage yard or automobile service or body repair shop as per Chapter 62 and Section 98-38.
D. Exceptions. Excepted from this section and exempted from its requirements are the following:
(1) Temporary storage of an unregistered motor vehicle owned by the property owner, for no more than 180 days in a calendar year.
(2) A motor vehicle being advertised for sale, for a period of no more than 60 days.
(3) Motor vehicles kept and stored by commercial establishments on their own property for the purpose of removing parts therefrom for use in vehicles used in their regular course of business.
(4) Motor vehicles kept and stored by duly licensed and operating vehicle repair shops and garages, upon the premises where said business is conducted, and which are currently being repaired for the purpose of placing the same back into legal operation upon the public highways.
(5) An antique or classic automobile, provided that in the opinion of the Zoning Administrator such automobile is stored and kept under conditions not constituting a public nuisance or an attractive nuisance.
(6) Any motor vehicle owned by a person currently on active duty in any of the Armed Forces of the United States or the State of New York, provided that said motor vehicle is kept and stored on property owned by said person or his spouse’s immediate family and such storage does not constitute, in the opinion of the Zoning Administrator, a public or attractive nuisance.
(7) Any motor vehicle owned or operated by a member of the family occupying said premises, who is a full-time occupant of the premises and who is attending school on a full-time basis, provided that said exemption shall be limited to the period from September 1 through May 30 or for the length of the school term, whichever is shorter, and further provided that this exemption shall not apply to any recreational vehicle, pickup truck or commercial vehicle. The exemption under this section will only be granted upon application by the owner of said vehicle with proof of ownership, proof of prior registration and proof of attendance at school. **SECTION 5. SUPERSESSION.**
This local law supersedes Local Law 19 of 2001. Also, it is the intent of the Town Board to supersede any provisions of the New York State Law to the extent that they may be inconsistent with the provisions of this local law. **SECTION 6. SEVERABILITY.**
If any provision of this local law is held invalid for any reason by a court of competent jurisdiction, such decision shall not affect the validity of the remaining provisions of this local law. **SECTION 7. EFFECTIVE DATE.**
This Local Law shall become effective immediately upon is filing in the Office of the New York State Department of State.

VACANT — Any land, structure, building or portion thereof which, except for seasonal absence, is unoccupied or unused for a period of two consecutive months or longer.

§ 96-4. Property and landscaping maintenance. The owner or person in control, as the case may be, of any property subject to this chapter shall maintain his/her lawn trimmed to a height of no greater than 10 inches.

§ 96-5. Penalties for offenses. A violation of this chapter is hereby declared to be a violation punishable by a fine not exceeding \$1,000 or by imprisonment for not to exceed 15 days, or both. Each week's continued violation shall constitute a separate additional violation.

§96-6. Enforcement. A. Enforcement official: The Building Inspector and Zoning Administrator are hereby designated as the officials authorized to administer and to enforce this chapter. Where the term Building Inspector is used herein, either the Building Inspector or Zoning Administrator may carry out the specified procedures.

B. Compliance orders:

(1) The Building Inspector is authorized to order, in writing, the remedying of any condition or activity found to exist in, on or about any premises in violation of this chapter. Upon finding that any such condition or activity exists, the Building Inspector shall issue a compliance order.

(2) The Building Inspector shall cause the compliance order, or a copy thereof, to be served by at least one of the following methods.

(a) Personal service

upon the owner or person in control of the property or premises;

(b) Mailing by registered or certified mail to the owner or person in control of the property or premises; or

(c) Posting a copy of the compliance order upon the front portion of the property or upon the main structure and mailing a copy of such notice by certified or registered mail to the owner of the property at the address shown on the current assessment records of the Town or the person in control of the property.

(3) The compliance order shall:

(a) Be in writing;

(b) Be dated and signed by the officer;

(c) Specify the condition or activity that violates this statute;

(e) Specify that such violation must be corrected or abated within seven days of the date of service; and

(f) State the appropriate consequence for failure to correct or abate the condition or activity within the specified period of time, as set forth in Section 6(C).

(4) The date of service of a compliance order issued pursuant to this section shall be the date of personal service or 10 days following the date of mailing, whichever is applicable.

(1) Any owner or person in control of any property or premises which has been determined to be in violation of the requirements of this statute shall cure, abate, correct or remove such violation, when ordered to do so by the Building Inspector, within seven days of the service of a compliance notice as provided above.

(2) In the event that the owner, tenant or person in control of any such premises shall fail to comply with the compliance order, as set forth in Section 6(B), the Building Inspector shall make an inspection of the property and report his or her findings to the Town Board.

(3) The Town Board, after review of the report, may take any, or all, of the following action(s):

Pleasant Valley for costs and expenses incurred in abatement of the violation. Such costs and expenses shall include the necessary and reasonable attorneys' fees incurred by the Town in prosecuting the violation and necessary and reasonable administrative costs of enforcement, as prescribed in the Town's Fee Schedule. Fabulous figs

A naturally decadent treat, they’re at their best right now.

Last Monday, after work and with no plans for dinner, I spontaneously decided to go to the river for a picnic. It’s been a hot summer, as you well know, and the day had been threatening rain, but when none came, I packed a few nibbles into a basket and off I went to one of my favorite spots, a quiet cove in Esopus, to enjoy the view.

Throughout this amazing spectacle I

noticed how the food I was eating seemed to taste better, in much the same way that an excellent, perfectly paired glass of wine can enhance a meal. Salty olives, rich cheeses, a loaf of crusty bread, sweet, velvety figs – a little bit of heaven by the Hudson. And oh, those figs!

Maybe it was the mood of the moment, but as the sun set and I was caught up in the idyllic setting, I found myself newly enamored with the humble fig, nature’s perfect little indulgence, a decadent treat that somehow summed up the overall experience of the evening. Sun-warm and soft, delicate and fleeting, sweet and luxuriant, figs are summer in a two-bite package and at their ripest and best right now.

If you’ve never had a fresh, ripe fig, you’re missing out, my friends. Their honeyed sweetness simply pairs perfectly with a variety of cheeses and cured salty meats, making them ideal for picnics and entertaining. Or a delightful break from the mundanity of every day.

And speaking of breaks, I’ll break away from my romantic reverie for just a moment to bring you a few fun fig facts. In addition to being tasty treats, figs negate the ill effects of sodium and help lower blood pressure. Their anti-inflammatory properties help fight arthritis while their magnesium content improves the quality and duration of sleep.

Naturally containing pectin, figs can help lower cholesterol and their fiber helps remove excess triglycerides. They also boast the highest mineral and fiber content of other fruits, nuts and vegetables.

Dried figs are high in Omega-3 fatty acids for heart- and brain health and either fresh or dried, one serving gives you a good dose of calcium, iron, magnesium and potassium. Oh, and there’s no need to peel them – the skin is soft, edible and full of anti-oxidants. Just grab one (gently) and take a bite!

As for pairing them, the possibilities will keep you happy through their brief season. Some of my favorites:

- Figs with blue cheese, freshly cracked pepper and honey;
- Fig halves wrapped in prosciutto;
- Figs, quartered, in arugula salad with toasted walnuts, lardons (cubes of fried bacon), balsamic vinaigrette and shaved Parmigiano-Reggiano
- Figs wrapped in bacon, broiled;
- Grilled fig halves with mascarpone or goat cheese, drizzled with balsamic glaze;
- And my charcuterie boards always include figs or fig jam.

Figs just play beautifully with others: nuts and cured meats, anchovies, capers and olives, mint, basil, rosemary and just about any cheese, from rich and complex to light and tangy. I may have discovered

them later in my life, but now that they’re pretty much everywhere, I intend to enjoy them at every opportunity. They bring a touch of magic and romance to any occasion – or none at all. Sometimes that’s just what you need.

If you want to not only make the most of what’s left of summer, but savor it, take yourself away for a little picnic or al fresco dining with a few of the things that make life worth living, simple things, like bread, cheese, cured meats and figs. Add a bottle of wine and what more do you really need? Summer is sultry. It’s romantic. It’s beautiful. Get outside when you can and bask in it before it’s gone, just like biting into a luscious fig, and savor every little, delectable, heavenly bit.
