Local estates in the Hudson Valley, in cooperation with the Dutchess County Tourism, are inviting visitors to see their historic gardens. Some estates will be hosting the Great Estates Garden and Landscape Weekend on September 24 or September 25. While some will be hosting the event both days. Mount Gulian Historic Site in Beacon and The Locust Grove Estate & Locust Lawn Farm in

Poughkeepsie are two of the sites collaborating with Dutchess Tourism for the event. "Fall is always such a magical time here in the Hudson Valley and touring the gardens at Dutchess County's Great Estates gives us a new way to appreciate the stories those historic sites tell," said Dutchess Tourism President & CEO Melaine Rottkamp. "We're so grateful for the love and care put in by the volunteer

organizations the professionals who work tirelessly so visitors and residents alike can enjoy the beauty that surrounds us." Mount Gulian's historic garden Mount Gulian Historic Site's garden will be open on September 25. There will be three tours that day at 11 a.m., noon, and 1 p.m. "Some of the plants have been there for years, like the yucca plants, the peonies

GE, EPA enter into new legal agreement

The General Electric Corporation (G.E.) has entered under a legal agreement with the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) to investigate the Lower River portion of the Hudson River PCBs Superfund site. The outcome will determine the next steps for addressing contamination, according to a recent press release from EPA. According to the release, "Under the terms of the legal administrative agreement, GE will immediately develop a plan for extensive water, sediment, and fish sampling between the Troy Dam and the mouth of the New York Harbor. While polychlorinated biphenyls (PCBs) will be a focus of the data collection in the Lower Hudson River, other contaminants will be evaluated as well. The new data is needed to determine from a scientific standpoint the best path forward, even in advance of a potential formal set of studies that would be required to develop a plan or plans for cleanup." According to the announcement, the agreement does require the data that is collected to begin in 2023. GE, states the release, will pay the cost of EPA to oversee the work that is being done. Lisa F. Garcia, who is the EPA regional administrator, stated, "The sampling that GE is conducting will allow us to better understand and evaluate the conditions and potential contamination in the Lower Hudson River environment."

The release stated, "Under the terms of the administrative agreement, GE will sample multiple fish species, sediment and water from various locations throughout the Lower Hudson River. There will be three different sediment sampling programs, each from a different range of depths of the river bottom." It was noted by EPA that collecting sediment at various depths and locations allows EPA to better understand where contamination is present and has deposited over time. There will be three sediment programs, according to officials. Two of the programs will be implemented next year. Then, in 2024, the implementation of the third program will occur. Garcia remarked, "The information will help us determine whether and how to prioritize investigations in each portion of the Lower Hudson and how to best address contamination." EPA plans to keep the Community Advisory Group for the Hudson River PCBs Superfund site and the public informed and involved as data is collected and follow-up decisions are made.

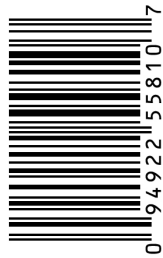



and the roses,” said Elaine Hayes, Executive Director of Mount Gulian. She noted that those three flowers “are not in bloom this time of year.”

“Those plants were here in the original garden in the 1800s, even up until the fire in 1931.” The house was destroyed during the fire and the garden was not tended to, said Hayes. One of the descendants of the Verplanck family, who owned the home- stead, came to Mount Gulian and dug up yucca, roses and peonies and brought them to her Connecticut home.

Then in the 1990s, during reconstruc- tion of the house, it was learned about the flowers being taken to the home in Connecticut, explained Hayes.

“These flowers have some of the original DNA as the original flowers,” Hayes remarked.

A new addition to the garden this year is the nicotiana colossera, “which the company Organic Matters planted this year along with other annuals in the garden,” said Hayes. Members of the Verplanck Garden Club at Stony Kill also worked in the garden this year.

If one attends, Hayes said the story of James F. Brown, a manumitted slave, will be shown in a 17-minute film. Brown went on to become the master gardener at Mount Gulian.

Virginia Eliza Darby Verplanck, who married into the Verplanck family, wrote two books on gardening. One was titled “A Year in My Garden,” which was written in 1908. In 1913, she wrote “Every Day in My Garden. Eleven-year- old Mary Anna Verplanck, designed the original 1804 garden, relayed Hayes.

“Last year was the first time this event was held at Mount Gulian said Hayes, and “they (those who attended) were impressed

with the plants and the older plants that sur- vived over the generations.” Those who attend might just pick up a technique or tip from gardeners past that could work today, she said.

The group has approximately 20-25 active members, he said. The Friends meet the first Tuesday of every month at 6 p.m. at Grinnell Library.

“We’re a very welcoming group. Anyone who would like to join us is wel- come,” remarked Evaul.

According to The Friends, in 1867, Irving Grinnell and Henry Saterlee estab- lished a Circulating Library and Reading Room on the corner of Market and East Main Streets. Information from The Friends stated that they charged a dollar a year for membership, and hired a local widow, Elizabeth Howarth, to take care of the books and clean the rooms. By 1880, said the information, the library was out- growing its space and was in perpetual need of funds. The current library was then built in 1887. Then in 2013, Grinnell

became a Public Library District. As a result, The Friends of Grinnell, which is a 501c3 organization, was formed and assists with fundraising.

“What we need, The Friends can actually provide,” said Fran Harrison. Harrison, who is the director of the library, remarked, “It is a great partner- ship. They’re really making Grinnell a community hub.”

It was noted that besides the annual Gala, The Friends are responsible for the gardens in the front of the library, the very museum passes available to the library’s patrons, the furniture for seating during the many programs held outdoors, sup- port for the Battle of the Books, the murals in the Children’s Room and many other extras to help make Grinnell the special library that it always has been.

The gala is run by all volunteers, except for the caterer, remarked Evaul.

Kendall submits local law to legislature to establish 'Domestic Partner Registry'

Dutchess County Clerk Brad Kendall has submitted a local law to the County Legislature establishing a "Domestic Partner Registry" under the aegis of the Dutchess County Clerk. Establishing a Domestic Partner Registry would address the following concerns:

- The ravages of COVID 19 over the past 26 months are well known. In some cases, the partners of those affected have been denied visitation rights, benefits and the ability to participate in medical decision making.

- Many of our new residents have moved here from jurisdictions that provide domestic partner registries.

The five boroughs of New York City, Suffolk County, Westchester County, Putnam County, Rockland County and some municipalities in Nassau County have all established domestic partner reg-

istries. When our new residents move to Dutchess County they are unable to continue to prove their partner status since most jurisdictions require residency.

The county legislature has previously considered the establishment of a domestic partner registry on two occasions.

In 2002, the proposal was removed from consideration by the sponsor.

In 2007, the proposal was defeated in committee: Resolution 207194 (8/9/2007) (dutchessny.gov)

Earlier debates about a domestic partner registry sometimes got derailed by extraneous concerns. Establishing a registry now would allow those whose long-term relationships have been acknowledged in other jurisdictions to be recognized in their new county of residence. It will also allow partners to participate more fully in joint financial and medical decision-making.

Anthony’s Walk to improve veterans shelter in Poughkeepsie

You might remember the story of Anthony Gray, but I’m guessing many folks will not. Anthony was a Marine Corps veteran who was tragically murdered in Poughkeepsie two years ago, in October 2020. When he died, it became clear that he did not have any family in the immediate area, so the veteran community came together to cover all his final expenses. That was the saddest part of the story, for me: this veteran, who had put his life on the line for his country, was very much alone. If not for the compassion of those who learned of his story, he would have ended up as just another statistic, and just another body forgotten in a nameless grave.

I wish I could say Anthony’s story is rare, but it’s all too common a tale for our veterans. With 40,000 homeless vets every night in America (a number which has likely gone up due to the pandemic) there are probably countless heroes just like Anthony out there – men and women who have no one to turn to, and no one to rely on when times are tough.

I’ve worked with veterans long enough to learn a simple truth: our veterans-in-need never suffer from just one issue. Everything is connected, from homelessness and financial troubles to opioid addiction and even serious mental health challenges like PTSD and TBI. When helping our heroes, it’s impossible to only address one problem. You have to try to address them all. You have to see a veteran as a whole person, a unique individual, not just a stereotype or statistic.

This fall, Marist College and VetZero Heroes are teaming up to create a new event to raise awareness on these challenges facing veterans not only in our own community, but across the nation. The event is called Anthony’s Walk, to remind us that Anthony’s story is not an isolated one. It’s going to be a 22-minute walk that loops around the Marist campus in Poughkeepsie, and it takes place on Saturday, October 1st starting at 10am. The event is free, and everyone is invited to participate. There is no registration required. The 22-minutes of the walk recognize that sobering statistic we all know: an average of 22 veterans commit suicide every day in America.

All proceeds from Anthony’s Walk will go to improve Liberty Station, the veterans’ shelter in Poughkeepsie. This is where Anthony was staying at the time of his death. It’s such an important place where veterans can go to get a fresh start, which is exactly what Anthony was doing there. I didn’t know him well – we may have spoken a handful of times -- but I do know he was trying to overcome some challenges in his life. He had just started a new job, and he was upbeat on the future ahead of him. There are many other vets staying at Liberty Station right now, who have a very similar life story. It’s the least we can do, to make sure their home is safe and livable.

So, I hope you will mark our calendar for Saturday, October 1st at 10 a.m. at Marist College for the very first Anthony’s Walk. Again, everyone is invited, so please spread the word among your neighbors and friends. We need to do a better job of supporting our veterans, and we can start by coming together to make sure we never forget folks like Anthony. Hopefully we can grow this event so that every year, we can all come together to support our veterans.

New COVID-19 booster available locally

With the head of the World Health Organization recently claiming the end of the COVID-19 pandemic is “within sight,” individuals are still urged to protect themselves from serious illness or death from the virus. Eligibility for the updated COVID-19 boosters has been provided by the federal Food & Drug Administration (FDA):

- Individuals 18 years of age and older are eligible for a single booster dose of the Moderna COVID-19 Vaccine, Bivalent if it

has been at least two months since they have completed primary vaccination or have received the most recent booster dose with any authorized or approved monovalent COVID-19 vaccine.


- Individuals 12 years of age and older are eligible for a single booster dose of the Pfizer-BioNTech COVID-19 Vaccine, Bivalent if it has been at least two months since they have completed primary vaccination or have received the most recent booster dose with any authorized or approved monovalent COVID-19 vaccine.

The term “bivalent” refers to the updated booster containing two messenger RNA (mRNA) components of SARS-CoV-2 (COVID-19) virus, one of the original strain of SARS-CoV-2 and the other one in common between the BA.4 and BA.5 lineages of the omicron variant of SARS-CoV-2.

Vaccine boosters are available at many locations, including Dutchess County’s Family Health Clinic at the Family Partnership Center in Poughkeepsie (appointments



required), and local pharmacies and healthcare organizations. Colleen Pillus, communications director for the County Executive’s office, noted that residents can make an appointment at the county’s clinic by calling 845-485-3535 or emailing clinics@dutchessny.gov. To find pharmacies/retailers offering the bivalent booster near you, you can use www.vaccines.gov and plug in your zip code for a quick list of where it is available.

GE, EPA new agreement

EPA will also look to engage with communities along the lower Hudson, including communities that have environmental justice concerns, states the release.

"New York State is committed to a comprehensive cleanup and restoration of the Hudson River. EPA's agreement directing GE to undertake additional sampling in the lower," Hudson is a critical step to address historic PCB contamination," remarked New York State Department of Environmental Conservation Commissioner Basil Seggos.

The sampling results will assist EPA as it moves forward with its investigation. It was stated that GE "remains legally responsible for its PCBs that migrated to this area. EPA is continuing to evaluate whether other parties may also be liable for PCBs, as well as other contamination in the Lower Hudson."

Seggos said, "This new data will supplement the extensive sampling efforts previously conducted by DEC, EPA, and GE to evaluate the health of one of New York's most important waterbodies. New York State DEC looks forward to continuing to work with EPA to understand what further actions can be taken to address unacceptable levels of contamination that remain in the river."

According to EPA, "The new data will

supplement information collected during EPA's investigation of the Lower Hudson River in the 1990s and the periodic monitoring of Lower Hudson River fish and water by GE under EPA oversight since 2004. EPA has also been gathering additional information and data about the Lower River in coordination with New York State and other project stakeholders since 2019 to support these efforts. GE is reimbursing EPA for the costs incurred for planning the work."

The Hudson River PCBs Superfund site, stated EPA, includes the 200-mile stretch from Hudson Falls to the southern tip of Manhattan in New York City. The dredging and capping work in the Upper Hudson River was conducted between 2009 and 2015, according to EPA officials.

EPA noted that between the 1940s and 1970s, "GE discharged PCBs into the Hudson River from its two former capacitor manufacturing plants in Fort Edward and Hudson Falls." These PCBs contaminated the river and its sediment from the Hudson Falls plant to New York Harbor, and contaminated certain areas of the floodplain along the banks of the river during high water and flood events, stated EPA.

A spokesperson for GE did not respond by press time with a comment.

Wake up!

A young Luigi was a real 'sleeper' in church

As the Leaves of autumn begin to turn golden, and as kids go back to school, thoughts of my childhood flood me. I find myself dreaming of going to school, school lunches, school playground, making wine, raking leaves, jarring tomatoes, falling asleep in English Class. More specifically, I dream of falling asleep in church.

It's Sunday morning here at Coppola's, and I just got here from Church. As you can probably gather from the theme of this article, I fell asleep during the sermon. Most people can identify with dozing off during a sermon during Sunday Church. It's quiet, usually the priests voice is somber, it's Sunday morning, you probably didn't have your coffee yet. Heck, I'm falling asleep writing this. However, when I was a kid, I turned falling asleep in church, into an art form. I was so good at it that people started to fill the side of the church that we sat in order to watch the show.

At the old St. Peter's Chapel, which was attached to the gymnasium, if you are facing the altar, we usually sat in the farthest set of pews, second row, facing the altar. There were rows of pews to our right and those rows of pews faced us.

Sunday Church for me meant sitting next to my father. I was not allowed to sit next to my brothers. Because I was restless, I constantly fooled around with my brothers. My brothers knew this and always egged me on. Not that egging me on was anything much more than them looking at me. In order to get everyone to

behave during church, I was separated from them. However, that strategy was a double-edged sword.

Because I was not stimulated by my brothers, I crashed during church. Pop was vigilant in trying to keep me from falling asleep. He had many methods, all doomed to failure.

Method 1 Read Along. This method was doomed from the start. What better way for your eyes to get tired than having them follow along, especially a 4-5 year old who barely reads in the first place. Moreover, there was a lot of Latin in those days so to me all I heard was "blue, blue, blee, blah, blah, amen."

Method 2 Bribery. I was bribed with everything from fresh donuts to flat out cash. Nothing worked. On the contrary, the more I tried to stay awake, the more I would fall asleep. And just so we are clear on this, when I fell asleep, I would be out cold.

Method 3. Threats. See Method 2

Method 4. The Hair Pull, the Pinch, the Hand Squeeze, the Thigh Slap. All these methods would work initially, however, as the adrenaline exited my body, they invariable were doomed to failure. Moreover, when the adrenaline left my body, I would be even more tired and sleepy and would fall asleep even faster. I remember in high school putting a rubber band on my wrist and snapping it to try to stay awake in Miss Murphy's English class only to wake up with dried drool on my face with Miss Murphy screaming at me to wake up

All during these episodes, the peanut gallery in the pews to the right, remember those pews, would be watching and snickering with my father flashing a look to the parents as if to say, "Hey. Ima trying"

Finally, my father gave up. I can remember stretching out on the pew and putting my head on Pop's lap. I can also remember the shocked looks on my brothers faces as they looked at me getting comfortable. As I dozed off, I can vaguely remember him leaning over and saying to my brothers, "Dontcha you getta no ideas"

The only time I would wake up was when they would ring the bells. I would wake up saying "hello!" and usually by then Pop could take no more and I would usually get one of the method 4 scenarios.

As you wake up from one of your Sunday sermons, try out this classic recipe for one off my favorite breakfasts, remember if you want to stay awake try coffee first. Caio!

Caprese Frittata

Ingredients:

- 1 teaspoon olive oil
- 4 eggs
- 2 tablespoons pesto
- 2 oz. diced red onions caramelized
- 2 oz mozzarella, torn into small pieces
- 2 tablespoons grated pecorino Romano
- pinch salt and pepper
- 6 cherry tomatoes, halved

Directions:

Set your oven to 220°C (425°F). On the

stovetop, in a non-stick frying pan with an ovenproof handle, heat just enough oil to create a thin film over medium-high heat.

Break the eggs into a mixing bowl and beat with a fork to combine. Stir in the pesto, half the mozzarella, caramelized onions and season with salt and pepper.

Pour the mixture into the pan and immediately turn the heat down to low. Let it cook for a few minutes until it's no longer completely runny. It does not have to set completely, like an omelet; only the base needs to be set at this stage.

Sprinkle over the remaining pieces of mozzarella and Pecorino Romano and place the tomatoes, cut side up, pushing them gently down into the frittata as you do so.

Put the pan into the oven and let it cook for 10 minutes. It's ready when it has puffed up a little, letting you know that the top has set.

Let it rest for 5 minutes before sliding onto a board or plate and cutting into wedges to serve.

Serve with a loaf of crusty bread and a nice cup of espresso.

Apple time!

A scorching summer has yielded some pleasantly surprising results for the local apple crop.

Every year at this time my mind turns to local apples. I've written about them several times and, in fact, my first ever article in 2007 was about them. I had no plans to do so again, but something significant and, to my mind interesting, changed my mind. Don't worry – I'll keep it short and sweet.

This has been one of the hottest Hudson Valley summers on record. Yeah, it's been a scorcher, with August seeing more 90+ degree days than not. That and the drought conditions had me curious and more than a little worried about this year's apple crop, especially when you consider the shallow root systems of the smaller trees a lot of growers have now. Surely the fruit from these stressed trees will be affected, even if some form of irrigation is enlisted to ease it?

Turns out much of this season's apple crop will be affected, but just how may surprise you. The size of the crop, that is the yield, should be comparable to other years. The size of the fruit, though, is another matter. Most of the apples I've seen so far have been notably smaller than usual, dare I say cute even. Then I heard a few growers say the heat and drought also mean the fruit will be sweeter since the lack of water in the fruit concentrates the sugar and flavor.

When I excitedly put this to the test, trying McIntosh, Zestar and Gala varieties, I saw, well, tasted, just how right they were! Even the more typically spicy Zestar was a little sweeter, but it was also just more complex. In other words, just take the normal flavor profile of the variety and turn it up to 11. You should expect your apple haul this year to be wee but fierce. And that makes them even more kid-friendly than they already are!

Which is a perfect segue! A lot of orchards

opened last weekend for Pick-Your-Own so why not pack up the family and go get some from the source? You'll be directly supporting local growers, getting healthy, tasty and crunchy-good snacks and enjoying a beautiful Hudson Valley day to boot!

And, sure, the smaller apple sizes mean you can get more bang for your buck but try not to overdo it. There's a good chance all that heat may have shortened their little lifespans, meaning they could go bad quicker, and that would be a shame and a waste. Then again, you could always eat two at a time! Or use them for baking. And you can always go back to get more since the season's only just started.

If you do pick your own, please be mindful. If you pick it, take it. Don't just toss it on the ground in favor of a different one. That, too, is wasteful and disrespectful of the time, money and effort the grower put into it all, especially when their year has already been challenging. But you knew that already, didn't you?

EASY APPLE CRISP

I know that's a little redundant since a crisp is already one of the easiest desserts out there. All the more reason to enlist the kids' help in making it! C'mon! It'll be fun!

INGREDIENTS

4-5 cups peeled, sliced apples (about 4 or 8-9 small)
1 cup flour
1 cup rolled oats
1/3 cup brown sugar, packed
1 teaspoon cinnamon
1/2 cup (1 stick) butter, softened

METHOD

Preheat oven to 350 degrees.

Grease a 9x13 baking dish with butter. Place or layer apple slices evenly in the dish. (If you're using a tart variety, go ahead and sprinkle some granulated sugar over 'em).

Combine remaining ingredients in a medium bowl and stir with a wooden spoon, then get your hands in there and mix it up to form crumbs. Sprinkle evenly over the apples.

Bake 45-55 minutes, until bubbly and you can't possibly go another minute without tasting what smells that good. Serve warm with ice cream. Serves 4-8.

This probably won't be the last time I write about apples. They are inherently – and historically – tempting. They're a harbinger of my most favorite season – fall. They are one of the jewels of the Hudson Valley, versatile, portable, fun to pick, fun to eat and, this year, even funner (!) because they're so adorable, not to mention extra-packed with flavor. But what's not to adore about them anyway?. Go get some and see what all the fuss is about. If I'm right, there's more than ever to love. Thanks to all the growers who bring their sweet harvest to our lives. We sure do appreciate it!
