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Incumbent Aymar-Blair, Truitt vie for County Comptroller role

Incumbent Dutchess County Comptroller Dan Aymar-Blair faces the challenge of Will Truitt in this year's local election. Early voting begins on Oct. 25 and Nov. 4 is Election Day.

Aymar-Blair defeated Gregg Pulver in 2024 and served the final year of the fouryear term of Robin Lois, a Democrat who resigned to become the state's deputy comptroller for local government and school accountability.

Aymar-Blair, a Democrat, emphasizes 20 years of experience in government financial operations, including 15 years at New York City Public Schools where he served as Chief Operating Officer for Teaching and Learning, which he states had a budget as large as that of Dutchess County. He also served on the Beacon City Council from 2020-2024.

Truitt, a Republican and current chairman of the Dutchess County Legislature, highlights his management of the finances of a local, family-owned construction company for the past eight years, which makes millions of dollars in annual revenue. As Chairman of the Legislature's Budget, Finance and Personnel Committee, he led the adoption of a budget in excess of \$630 million.

In response to a question on the main issues in the race, Aymar-Blair said, "Just like Sheriff and District Attorney elections, voters are more often looking at competence, not party affiliation. So the main issue in the race is competence."

He added, "As Comptroller, my job is to identify patterns of weakness in our policies and procedures and internal controls. The main patterns I have identified are a systemic lack of planning and reckless real estate deals. Dutchess County needs to do better in these areas.'

He identified two examples and said, "Better planning saves money and delivers better results for taxpayers.'

Truitt stressed the affordability issue and said, "In a state that makes it uniquely challenging to afford to stay here, we must do all that we can locally to blunt this trend. That is why in my 10 years of

service in the legislature, we have reduced the county property tax rate every year. We have done all this while maintaining a healthy reserve account of approximately \$100 million and maintaining an S&P bond rating of AA+; the highest in the state of New York.

He added that in his time in the legislature, "We have created and strengthened many grant programs that put money back where it belongs, in our communities.

Rombout Fire Company Assistant Chief John Lucariello was with his fellow firefighters, town employees and community members outside the Fishkill Town Hall, where a huge American flag was flying off a Rombout Fire Co. fire truck. The Fishkill Town Board honored Lucariello and the heroes that saved his life earlier this year, during its Oct. 15 meeting at the town hall.

"As I stand here before you all, I can wholeheartedly say, for some reason ...miracles happen - I am living proof. I have been given a second chance. Thank you," Lucariello said in the town hall.

Lucariello collapsed at a scene on Mountainview Road in Fishkill in the early morning hours of Aug. 11. According to a social media post at that time by the Rombout Fire Co. (RFC), it was while investigating an active structure fire, that the assistant chief collapsed. He was "declared dead," it said in the statement.

The statement on social media in August stated, "Five minutes later, in a moment that doctors say they've never seen before, John began breathing again on his own. His heart started beating." Lucariello was first brought to Montefiore St. Luke's Cornwall Hospital in Newburgh, Orange County, and then he was flown to Westchester Medical Center in Westchester County and was under the care of cardiac specialists.

Wappinger to host Trunk or Treat Trunk or Treat will be held from 1-



Christopher Strattner new police chief in Town of Fishkill

The Town of Fishkill has a new Chief of Police. Christopher Strattner's appointment to that position was approved by the board at its Oct. 15 meeting at the Fishkill Town Hall. He was then sworn in.

Town of Fishkill Supervisor Ozzy Albra said there were 30 applications, which were then dwindled down to 10 "highly qualified applicants." The 10 were then dwindled down to three applicants, which Strattner came out on top.

Councilman Greg Totino asked Strattner to offer a message to Fishkill residents

"I am looking forward to exercising some good ethical, strong leadership with the police department, I think that's the backbone of modern law enforcement. I am very deeply committed to listening as much as anything else.'

He added, "I would say, right now, I probably don't know what I don't even know. And I'm looking forward to working with our partners in fire, EMS, highway, schools, all of the other agencies that we will work together."

He noted he would listen to the community and police department staff.

Town of Fishkill Police Commissioner Scott Bierce said, "Chris comes to the Town of Fishkill with 28 years of law enforcement experience being first in Westchester than in Rockland County."

Strattner was employed as Director of the NYS Zone 4 Regional Police Academy at Rockland County from 2019 to the present. Before that, he was lead training developer from 2021-2024 for NYS DCJS Gun-Involved Violence Elimination.

Strattner was a police officer for the South Nyack Village Police Department from 2020-'21. Among other positions Strattner has held: President of Amarok Response Team Training & Technology in Pearl River, Instructional Developer/ Instructor MSA Security in New York City and Police Sergeant/Tactical Paramedic for the Orangetown Police Dept. in Orangeburg.

He began as an emergency medical technician in 1984 in Pearl River and was a police officer and police diver for the North Castle Police Dept. in Armonk from 1997-2001.

He earned degrees from Columbia University and Seton Hall University School of Law.

Strattner said he was "full of gratitude." "I am always grateful for the sergeants, lieutenants and chiefs who had time and patience with me who helped me" with making his resume the way it looks now, said Strattner.

"Welcome, we look forward to working with you as well," Councilwoman Jackie Bardini said to Strattner.

Councilman John Forman said Strattner was on the top of everyone's list.

"I think you're coming into a great family and welcome," remarked Forman.

Councilman Brian Wrye said the officers are ready to support him.

"We made our decision and we chose you, and we know we're going to have exceptional leadership," said Wrye.

The vote was bipartisan, noted Albra. Albra believes Strattner's experience with the Zone 4 Regional Police Academy gave Strattner "the edge."

The Board also discussed terminating the position of Officer in Charge, which Jason Murtaugh had been filling since the resignation of former chief Jonathan Clark. Murtaugh was returned to a Detective Sergeant position.

It's good to be back at work," he said.

Fishkill Highway Superintendent remembers phone calls

Town of Fishkill Highway Superintendent Carmine Istvan recalled a phone call he received after Lucariello collapsed.

"I was one of the first ones to get the call that there wasn't a pulse," Istvan remembered. Minutes later, Istvan received another call, informing him, 'John died.' "My heart stopped, literally. I was very sad and emotional," said Istvan. Then, after another 10 minutes, "I got a call again, stating they got a pulse. It was amazing!" said Istvan.

It is "great" having Lucariello back at work, said the highway superintendent. "For the guys that support him, the jokes and teasing him, it's amazing. It's a miracle!"

Neighbor prays for assistant chief

Luigi Manente said he was asked to share a story about "someone so important, so necessary to his family and community,' that "he fought off death." Manente was up early praying. "I am the one who called in the fire," he recalled. He helped carry Lucariello to the front lawn. He went "to go hose down the back deck, because I would much rather put out a fire than to watch someone die."

"I never witnessed such strong composure and confidence in something, that to me, was so frightening," Manente said. He said for the previous 3 weeks he was not getting on the road until later, but that day he woke up earlier. He gave thanks to the Blessed Virgin Mary.

Manente recalled seeing a firefighter screaming out in pain at the loss of his fellow firefighter. "I asked Mary, 'if there is anything you can do, please do it now,' "he told those in the town hall. He said at that moment on that day, the Biblical story of Lazarus, who was raised from the dead, came into his mind. He said he didn't find out the fire chief began breathing on his own until days after the incident. "He is a living miracle," said Manente.

Rosary beads from Jerusalem were given to him by the owner of the home whose house was on fire that August day. "I asked God to open a door for me" to give the rosary beads to the fire chief. He presented the rosary beads, which have been blessed by numerous people, to Lucariello. Lucariello received the beads and embraced Manente to a rousing applause from all in the room.

Montefiore St. Luke's Cornwall staff's lifesaving efforts

John Bilancione, Emergency Department Director at Montefiore St. Luke's Cornwall Hospital, in Orange County, said it was "an unbelievable" event that took place. Bilancione read emails from Dr. Shahram Ahari, Medical Director & Chairman of Emergency Services, who was not there that particular morning, but did follow up. Emails from Daniel Maughan, President & CEO Montefiore St. Luke's Cornwall Hospital were also shared.

"Your efforts definitely saved a life," Dr. Ahari stated in his email.

Maughan remarked in his email "reading this message gave me chills" and filled him with pride. Maughan said it was because of the "unshakable commitment" to beat the odds, that Lucariello was saved.

"Every link in the chain was strong," he said in the email, and noted every moment matters. "Miracles are sometimes made by people who refuse to quit," he said.

County officials offer thanks

Commissioner of Dutchess County Department of Emergency Response William Beale spoke on behalf of Dutchess County Executive Sue Serino. He said it was "an honor" to speak in front of heroes.

"Each one of you was in the right place at the exact right time and did the exact thing that you needed to do, which beat all the odds that were stacked against you all. I believe, by the grace of God, that this living miracle is here today." The Lazarus effect is extremely rare, he noted. "John would not be here today without the heroic persistence of every single one of these individuals," said Beale.

Dutchess County Chairman Will Truitt stated, "Thank you for letting us be here to witness this today. What a beautiful ceremony. He thanked "everyone who played a part in this." He added, "This story, this miracle ... we are so thankful."

Legislator Doug McHoul said, jokingly, "Everybody who knows John, knows John loves a crowd giving him attention." He continued, "John you are a top-notch individual."

Yvette Valdés Smith ,Dutchess County Legislature Minority Leader, Dutchess County Legislature, said, "Everybody in this room, this is what makes Fishkill, Fishkill." She said Lucariello is her son's hero.

"Thank you for all of your service and the service I know you will continue," said Yvette Valdés Smith.

Legislator Robert Faust said everyone did everything they could for Lucariello and they love him.

Rombout Fire Chief is 'thankful'

Rombout Fire Company and Fire District Chief Jeff Marino said the members respond

to about hundreds of calls a year. They also have a catering service to raise funds, such as the pancake breakfast. "One person that has been integral to all of that" is Lucariello, who has been an all-time responder, said Marino. "He's a very important guy. So, why'd I tell you all that? To all of you being recognized, not only did you save a life, you may have very well saved our entire organization, [we would have had] to fill a void so large that we may not have fully recovered."

Marino thanked all the RFC families and members and neighboring fire companies for "stepping up" during this time. He offered appreciation to all who were honored saying their "persistence" was

'John, we're so thankful you're back with us," remarked Marino.

Council reads and presents proclamations

Councilman Brian Wrye read a proclamation for Manente. "Everything you did put everything else in motion. It started with you, and the Lord was with you," stated Wrye to Manente

A proclamation was read by Councilman John Forman for Dutchess County Sheriff's Deputy Ben Concha. Concha evaluated Lucariello and surmised he was having a heart attack, he "immediately began CPR," said Forman.

Town of Fishkill Supervisor Albra read a proclamation for Town of Fishkill Officer Dennis Karaman, who drove the ambulance to hospital so two paramedics could stay in back with the assistant fire chief.

"To say that this moment is extraordinary is an understatement," said Councilman Greg Totino, who read a proclamation for Empress EMS paramedics Gladys Plaza-Guzman and Dustin Moore.

Councilwoman Jacqueline Bardini read the proclamation for those from Montefiore St. Luke's Cornwall Hospital.

Lucariello offers thanks to community Lucariello thanked the town board and

supervisor for taking time "to honor the people that saved my life."

He said first responders and the staff at St. Luke's performed their jobs "flawlessly." To the Westchester Medical Center cardiac thoracic unit and all doctors and nurses, he said, "I say 'thank you." He offered thanks to fellow firefighters for supporting RFC.

Istvan, he said, was there from the beginning for his family offering support and being my voice of reason."

Appreciation was offered to all who offered well wishes, texts and calls, "know, that in my heart, I was thinking of you," said Lucariello. He is grateful to all police and other first responders who escorted them to and from the hospital.

Lucariello then thanked his family for their outpouring of love and support. "The love you have shown me is truly the love of what family is all about," he said.

To my wife Linda, as was mentioned, [after] 26 years, we did get married. When this first happened, you never stopped believing I would survive," he said. "Thank you. I love from here to eternity."

I had the honor of serving as one of the two County Court judges in Dutchess County from 2011 until 2020, when I retired. County Court is where felony prosecutions, such as murder, robbery, sexual assaults, and drug trafficking are litigated.

One of those judges, Hon. Edward "Ned" McLoughlin has served in that position since his election in 2015. Since our terms overlapped for 5 years, I had the unique perspective of having worked with him on a daily basis handling the most severe crimes that occur in our county. Based on my personal and professional dealings with Judge McLoughlin, I wholeheartedly support his re-election in November.

Before his election to the bench, Judge McLoughlin served as a prosecutor in the Dutchess County District Attorney's office for more than 20 years. He was one of the best trial lawyers in that office. He never lost a felony trial in County Court during his tenure in the DA's office.

As a judge, he has brought that same work ethic and experience to the position of County Court judge. His trial decisions are routinely affirmed after defendants convicted after trial file their appeals to the Appellate Division. 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Town's 'false historical claim' and 'unauthorized' sign placement

To the Editor:

On October 14, 2025, the Town of Fishkill placed a sign on my private property without my permission, falsely claiming that the 1897 Daughters of the American Revolution (DAR) monument located on my land marks the site of a Revolutionary War soldiers' cemetery.

That claim is completely false—and, more importantly, deeply disrespectful to the soldiers who gave their lives for our freedom.

The New York State Historic Preservation Office, the Town Historian, and, in a sworn deposition on October 6, 2025, Friends of Fishkill Supply Depot (FOFSD) Chairman Lance Ashworth, all confirmed that there is no evidence whatsoever that my property contains a Revolutionary War soldiers' cemetery.

In fact, official state records and historical documents clearly show that the DAR monument was originally placed west of Old Albany Post Road (Route 9)—on the site of what is now the Dutchess Mall—as a memorial honoring soldiers buried at Trinity Church in Fishkill and at the Lower Barracks near the Putnam Valley border, not on my property. These facts are well-documented and undisputed.

Despite being informed of these facts, the Town knowingly installed a sign on my land promoting this false narrative, and did so over my explicit objections.

This action represents both a willful disregard for the truth and a violation of private property rights and free speech.

As a property owner and lifelong supporter of historic preservation, I have great respect for efforts to honor those who fought for our nation's independence. But those efforts must be based on truth and integrity, not misinformation and political theatrics.

I urge residents of Fishkill and surrounding communities to review the public records and correspondence for themselves by visiting www.continentalcommons.com— and to read the 1897 DAR dedication ceremony transcript firsthand.

Please give your background/qualifications and why you are running for re-election to the position of County Comptroller.

Before being elected Dutchess Comptroller, I had 20 years of experience in government financial operations. I worked at New York City Public Schools for 15 years, where I served as the Chief Operating Officer for Teaching and Learning, which had a budget as big as Dutchess County's. I also served on Beacon City Council from 2020 to 2024, where I consistently lowered property tax rates and successfully advocated for infrastructure investments, park improvements, housing policy reforms, better public safety and emergency response capabilities for Beacon residents - including Beacon's new firehouse.

Because of my experience, I was able to jump right in and start making good on my promises to increase financial reporting and to share information about the County budget directly with the people. In the nine months I've been in office, I've gotten the office on pace to produce a record number of reports in 2025. I've also done 11 town halls and started recording brief video summaries of our reports on social media. The result is that our reports are being read by the public 4-5 times more than before. I'm doing the job exactly as I promised and I want to see this vision through.

What do you see as the main issues in this race and the role of County Comptroller?

The question before voters this year is:

Who is more capable and independent to do the job of Comptroller?

There is no Democratic or Republican way to check that two numbers match. But a Comptroller must know which two numbers "should" match. Just like Sheriff and District Attorney elections, voters are more often looking at competence, not party affiliation. So the main issue in the race is competence.

As Comptroller, my job is to identify patterns of weakness in our policies and procedures and internal controls. The main patterns I have identified are a systemic lack of planning and reckless real estate deals. Dutchess County needs to do better in these areas.

From Dutchess County's COVID-19 funding to the stalled Youth Opportunity Union project in Poughkeepsie, I have seen well-intentioned projects fall apart due to a lack of planning. And, through our reporting, we've encouraged the County to make improvements. Better planning saves money and delivers better results for taxpayers.

I've also seen a pattern of large real estate deals that have gone sideways. For example, the County purchased a property for a homeless shelter but, not until after the purchase, did they learn that it needed \$15 million of work to get up to code. The County bought a campground for \$4.8 million even though it wasn't in the market for a campground and didn't shop around. This camp remains inaccessible to the public and has barely been used. What exactly is going on here? So we're staying on top of this and will make recommendations on improving the processes for acquiring real estate.

Because I haven't been in the legisla-

ture for the last ten years, I can look at these issues with clear eyes, pursue the truth, and make recommendations for our County government to work better.

Will Truitt

Please give your background/qualifications and why you are running for the position of County Comptroller.

I am a lifelong Dutchess County resident and earned my degree in accounting and finance from Marist University. I have the right blend of private and public sector financial experience that uniquely prepares me for the position of Dutchess County Comptroller. Professionally, for the past eight years, I have managed the finances of a local, family-owned construction company making millions of revenue. dollars in annual Simultaneously, I have served my community in the Dutchess County Legislature for the last decade, including as the Chairman of the Budget, Finance and Personnel Committee, leading the adoption of a budget in excess of \$630 million. I currently serve as the Chairman of the Legislature, where I lead the entire body. My experience allows me to understand how to make government live within its means, as well as what it means to make payroll in the private sector. Over the past decade, I have built working relationships with elected officials, community stakeholders and non-profit leaders that will allow me to be an effective comptroller, working to ensure that our tax dollars are spent efficiently and effectively.

What do you see as the main issues in this race and the role of County Comptroller?

One of the top issues I hear about all the time is affordability. In a state that makes

it uniquely challenging to afford to stay here, we must do all that we can locally to blunt this trend. That is why in my 10 years of service in the legislature we have reduced the county property tax rate every year. We have done all this while maintaining a healthy reserve account of approximately \$100 million and maintaining an S&P bond rating of AA+; the highest in the state of New York. This is made possible by making smart investments, consolidating services where we can, and effectively managing the revenues that we receive. If elected comptroller, I will provide constant oversight to ensure our tax dollars are spent efficiently, allowing us to continue this trend.

In my time in the legislature, we have created and strengthened many grant programs that put money back where it belongs, in our communities. This is why we have allocated \$500,000 in grants to local senior programming, \$150,000 for veterans' infrastructure grants and transportation needs, \$100,000 for local historical societies, as well as several rounds of grants for youth sports and youth programming, to name just a few. I believe we should continue to invest in our communities. As comptroller, I will work to ensure that these funds are being maximized and going towards the critical programming that they were intended to service.

Finally, Dutchess County over the next several years will come to consider several critical infrastructure projects. Early Voting begins on Oct. 25. The general election is Nov. 4.

Incumbents and challengers were asked to provide information on their background and why they are running for election/re-election and what they see as the main issues facing the county and in their area in particular.

In this report, incumbents are listed first. In open districts (no incumbent), candidates are listed alphabetically.

In the Southern Dutchess New and Beacon Free Press, we are providing information on candidates for districts representing Wappinger, Fishkill, East Fishkill, Beacon, plus the bordering districts of the Town and City of Poughkeepsie, Pawling, Dover, Union Vale, LaGrange and Beekman. Information on the remaining districts are given in the Northern Dutchess News.

Bob Gorman - Republican District 1, Town of Poughkeepsie



Please give your background and why you are running for re-election.

I am in my first

I am in my first term as a Dutchess County Legislator. I

am currently a member of the Legislature's Environment Committee and the Public Works & Capital Projects Committee. I also serve as a liaison to the Dutchess Community College Board of Trustees.

I am committed to holding the line on taxes and ensuring the fiscal health of Dutchess County. That is why in the most recent budget I voted to decrease the property tax rate for Dutchess County taxpayers. This was achieved while maintaining the highest bond rating in New York State and keeping a strong balance in reserves. 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Poughkeepsie Children's Cabinet to participate in national initiative

The Poughkeepsie Children's Cabinet has been selected for a new Wallace Foundation initiative that will provide funding to help seven communities across the country reach their economic mobility goals by expanding enrichment and career-focused opportunities for young people. Poughkeepsie is expected to receive funding of approximately \$5 million - \$6 million to improve interest-driven career exploration opportunities for youth outside the school day.

The Children's Cabinet was chosen by the Wallace Foundation following an extensive process, which started with an "Open Call" that drew interest from more than 1,700 communities.

The Wallace Foundation Fund for the Advancement of Opportunities for Adolescents at the Community Foundations of the Hudson Valley initiative will explore how schools, nonprofits, government agencies, businesses, and other entities can deepen their collaboration with the afterschool, enrichment, and summer programs that comprise each community's out-of-school sector. In addition to funding, participating communities will have access to technical assistance, peer learning opportunities, and other resources. Through the multi-year initiative, The Poughkeepsie Children's Cabinet will also build capacity for the community to sustain what works from the initiative and apply this to future efforts.

Poughkeepsie Children's Cabinet Executive Director Jill Gomez said, "By implementing the partnerships and innovations emerging from the Cabinet, we have been able to take a deeper dive into the data and the many out-of-school factors that influence youth development and classroom success in our city. The Children's Cabinet, formed in 2020, brings together representatives from across sectors -- including nonprofits, local government, schools, higher education, faith-based organizations, philanthropy, business and healthcare – and receives funding support from Dutchess County and the

City of Poughkeepsie, the Dyson Foundation, Community Foundations of the Hudson Valley, and local corporate and individual donors.

"It's essential to have robust afterschool and summer programs that provide positive opportunities for our youth. ers can train in live burn scenarios to prepare them for emergencies.

At its Oct. 14 meeting, the Dutchess County Legislature approved funding for the new "burn building," to be installed and ready for service by summer 2026 at the County's Emergency Response campus at 392 Creek Road in Hyde Park.

Serino said, "This new fire training building represents our continued commitment to keeping Dutchess County safe. Experiencing live burn scenarios is a vital part of firefighter training, and our volunteer and career firefighters deserve a facility that allows them to learn and prepare in the safest way possible. Our neighbors count on these brave men and women every day, and it's our job to make sure they have the tools and training they need to protect our community.

Live burn exercises are controlled training exercises where firefighters practice extinguishing a real, active fire in a designated structure, allowing them to experience realistic fire conditions and hone their skills in a saie, supervised environment.

The county's new burn building will be a three-story modular training structure that utilizes shipping containers as building blocks. It will feature movable wall partitions that can be easily reconfigured to alter the interior layout (creating rooms, hallways, etc.) to create realistic environments that simulate various emergency scenarios for comprehensive firefighting and rescue training.

Various features, including a rappelling tower, a self-contained breathing apparatus (SCBA) maze, Rebar cutting prop, pitched roof prop, forced entry door and more, will allow firefighters to train for confined spaces, forcible entry as well as search and rescue operations, including high angle rope rescues. Standpipe connections will enable trainees to be well-versed on various types of hose connections.

Dutchess County Emergency Response Commissioner William H. Beale said, "The installation of this new fire training building is an important investment in firefighter readiness and public safety. This new addition to our campus will provide for dynamic, scenario-based training, while meeting today's national standards. As a result, firefighters will be better trained and better prepared to protect our communities


The new modular building will replace an existing fire training building, which has been out of service for more than a year due to significant structural issues. The old building, which was built in 2004, has outlived its useful life and will be demolished. While the current building has been out of service, the East Fishkill Fire District (EFFD) and the New Hackensack Fire District (NKFD) have made their training facilities available for local departments to utilize.

Serino expressed her appreciation to EFFD and NKFD, saying, "I'm so grateful to the East Fishkill and New Hackensack Fire Districts for stepping up to help fill the training gap during this time. Their willingness to open their doors says so much about the dedication and unity of our fire service community here in Dutchess County.'


Total project cost for the County's new training building is just under \$700,000, which includes the modular building, installation, as well as the demolition of the former training building.

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Poughkeepsie sports star's service recognized during 'Honor-A-Veteran' Ceremony

Sergeant Major Alexander Watkins Jr. led life of sacrifice & honor

Dutchess County Executive Sue Serino and the County's Office of Veterans Affairs honored the service and legacy of U.S. Army Sergeant Major Alex Watkins Jr., a former City of Poughkeepsie resident, during today's "Honor-A-Veteran" ceremony. Today's tribute, held at American Legion Post 1302 in Poughkeepsie, was part of a monthly series dedicated to commemorating the lives and sacrifices of Dutchess County veterans who have passed, recognizing their enduring contributions to the nation and community.

Dutchess County Executive Sue Serino said, "Alexander Watkins proudly served in the U.S. Army for nearly three decades, earning respect for his hard work and bravery. He was much more than a soldier, though. He was a caring father, a proud grandfather and a strong, honest man who made a lasting impact on everyone who knew him. Dutchess County is proud to celebrate the life and service of Alexander and his fellow American heroes through our 'Honor-A-Veteran' ceremonies."

Watkins distinguished himself as a Poughkeepsie High School baseball, football and track and field star, with a second-place finish in the high jump at the New York State championship meet among his scholastic athletic accomplishments. In 1959, at the age of 19, he enlisted in the U.S. Army, beginning a military career spanned 27 years, including assignments with the 23rd Infantry Division and the 32nd Armor Regiment, and later with the 547th Engineer Company in Korea. He served in Vietnam, Korea and Germany, where he met his wife, Ursula. Rising to the rank of Sergeant Major (SGM), he earned numerous honors, including the Purple Heart, in recognition of his valor and dedication.

Following his retirement from the

Army in 1987, Sergeant Major Watkins continued to serve his community through civilian roles, including positions at the Kirk U.S. Army Health Clinic and Ames Department Stores, and he was actively involved in veterans events. SGM Watkins was a devoted father to his children, Schannon Clayton and Alex Fredric Watkins, and a proud grandfather. Remembered for his strength, integrity and love of the outdoors, SGM Watkins passed away on October 17, 2005 and was laid to rest at Arlington National Cemetery.

Office of Veterans Affairs Director Adam Roche said, "Sergeant Major Watkins showed us what true dedication looks like, serving his country with courage for nearly 30 years and living his life with strength and heart. His legacy reminds us that greatness comes not just from what we do in uniform, but from how we live and lead every day."

During the ceremony, Serino and Roche and members of the Dutchess County Honor-A-Veteran Committee presented SGM Watkins' family with several honors, including a:

- U.S. flag flown in Dutchess County for 30 days in his memory;

- proclamation from County Executive Serino;

- Veterans Challenge Coin from the Dutchess County Honor-A-Veteran Committee;

- New York State Senate Liberty Medal from Sen. Rob Rolison; and

- handmade quilt from Mental Health America of Dutchess County's Veterans Programs' Quilts2Honor.



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Physical signs remain important in marking history!

A blue-and-yellow Pomeroy Foundation historic marker will be installed in front of the home and studio of the nationally recognized female artist of the 19th century, Caroline Morgan Clowes. The public is invited to a formal unveiling that will take place on Friday, Oct. 24 at 3 p.m. at 114 Overlook Road, LaGrange, 12603.

It is a wonderful example of how physical places remain important in telling historical stories. This is best reflected by comments from Lewis Mumford at a 1926 DCHS membership meeting at Troutbeck when, in support of understanding local history, he said, "The things that we can see and touch awaken the imagination. Local history touches off these things that have happened on the spot; and the facts of local history become parts of a person's own life to an extent which is rare with [those] taken solely out of books..."

Our recent column on the potential for digital technologies and "AI" to aid (or inadvertently hinder) both the researching and sharing our local history prompts us to expand on the point of the importance of physical places and experiences.

The Pomeroy sign is installed at the home known as "Heartsease," which remains in the same family as its original 1838 builder and occupants.

The marker is one of eight being installed this year through the work of Arlington High School teacher Robert McHugh's 11th grade United States History class. For a third consecutive year McHugh let students identify and propose historic sites that can meet the Pomeroy Foundation's strict criteria for demonstrable accuracy of claims. The addition of these signs will make a total of sixteen erected through the work of his students.

DCHS started working with Linda Hubbard over a decade ago as she organized countless generations of important family documents, photographs and, perhaps most strikingly, the paintings and sketches of Caroline Morgan Clowes (1838–1904) to entrust to DCHS Collections.

A large exhibition took place in December 2022 at Locust Grove, Poughkeepsie that had over one thousand visitors. Since then, continued collaboration with the collections donor, Linda Hubbard, keep the work and legacy of Clowes alive in physical spaces in a variety of ways in addition to the Pomeroy sign.

DCHS has four Clowes paintings on long-term loan to the Francis Lehman Loeb Art Center at Vassar College. As well as being exhibited, outline reproductions allow the paintings to serve as children's educational tools in the form of paper and coloring they can hold in their hands and imagine themselves as the artist, and create.

The classic, older blue and yellow historic markers you see were officially launched a century ago by New York State as part of the recognition of the 150th anniversary of the 1776 American Revolution. From about 1926 through the late 1930s, New York erected 2,000 to 3,000 of these blue and yellow historical markers across the state. Few signs of this type were erected after that period.

The Pomeroy Foundation picked up where NYS dropped off. There are some important distinctions with Pomeroy Markers. For example, they are very rigorous about requiring proof of claims, which was not the case a century ago.

They created a "Legends and Lore" marker which is a brilliant way to help us understand the difference between fact-based historical sites, and just-asinteresting and valid but very different "legends and lore." Why do human beings gravitate to certain stories? Often they have a grain of truth but can expand in our mind's imagination and over generations of telling.

One such example is the Legends and Lore sign in the Town of Clinton. The street name, "Fiddler's Bridge Road," indicates how fixed the legend is in local minds. Erected through the efforts of the Clinton Historical Society, the Pomeroy website explains, "On September 7, 1808, an old fiddler who played at local dances and other hootenannies was robbed and murdered while walking home from a dance. His body was abandoned on a bridge that

connected the winding, narrow road. Ever since, according to tradition, his ghost can be heard playing the fiddle on moonlit nights at the witching hour."

There is a long tradition of naming contemporary roads for historic persons or events related to the site. This continues to happen. A very recent example is the City of Poughkeepsie formally naming two unnamed streets on College Hill with the support of the Revive College Hill Park Coalition and Celebrating the African Spirit. The long drive connecting the south and north entrances to the park on North Clinton Street has been named Frederick Douglass Way, recognizing the great Black abolitionist's historic speech at College Hill Grove to four thousand people in 1858, on the brink of Civil War.

The historic oval at the top has been formally named Bolin Oval. This recognizes three generations of the Bolin family whose history is tied to College Hill. In the late 19th and early 20th century Abram Bolin (1826–1910) was the superintendent of the park and important city reservoir. His son, Gaius Bolin (1865–1946), whose house is at the south entrance on North Clinton Street, became the first Black graduate of Williams College, and the first Black attorney in the county. In the spring, McHugh's class will be involved in the

unveiling of a Pomeroy historic marker there to recognize this fact. Gaius Bolin's daughter, Jane Bolin (1909–2007), was born in that house. She went on to be the first Black female graduate of Yale Law School, and the first Black female judge in the United States.

In a growing number of instances, "QR" codes are being included in signage that allow us to be easily taken to more information online. However, in keeping with our focus on the physical, we close with an invitation to see the continued evolving story of Caroline Morgan Clowes. Through November 19, 2025 there is a special exhibit "For the Love of Cows" at the Sherman Library in Sherman, Connecticut where you can see four of Clowes' cow paintings in the context of contemporary work. Visit www.ShermanLibrary.org for more information. On Friday, Oct. 24, at 3 p.m. at 114 Overlook Road, LaGrange (Poughkeepsie Post Office for gps 12603) you are invited to witness the unveiling of the Clowes marker.

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



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Grace Church to dedicate new stained glass windows Oct. 25

The windows of a church serve more than to let in light. They also very often tell inspiring stories of courage, faith and righteousness. Three such stories of remarkable Christians - Charles "Buddy" Johnson, Julian of Norwich and Eleanor Roosevelt - are portrayed in radiant colored light in newly installed windows at Grace Church in Millbrook. These beautiful works of art and faith will be dedicated by Episcopal Bishops Douglas Fisher and Alan Shin in a service on Saturday, Oct. 25, at 2 p.m. Members and representatives of the Johnson and Roosevelt families will be present, as well as local veterans and members of the community. The service will be led by the Rev. Dr. Matthew Calkins, Rector of Grace Church.

All are welcome to attend. Refreshments will be served. Visit www.gracemillbrook.org for more information.

On the left of the triptych is Charles R. Johnson, carrying on his shoulder another local man, Don Dingee. The scene is the night of June 11-12, 1953, during the ferocious battle for Outpost Harry in the Korean War. Johnson not only brought Dingee to safety but saved at least eight others as well. As his Medal of Honor citation reads: "with disregard for his personal safety, he exited the bunker, placing himself between the enemy and his injured comrades, and told them he would hold off the enemy forces as best as he could."

His body was found the next day and he was laid to rest in Nine Partners Cemetery after a service at Grace Church on August 13, 1953. The headstone reads "greater love hath no man that to give up his life for another." The stained glass window in his memory will have the same subscription. But at the top of the window will be a picture of the Medal of Honor, which President Biden awarded Johnson posthumously, after a long campaign for recognition of his valor on January 6.

On the right is Eleanor Roosevelt, formidable First Lady, renowned writer and speaker, advocate of civil rights and racial justice. She was raised - a difficult childhood - mostly in Tivoli but lived her adult life with FDR in Hyde Park and in later years in her own home, ValKill. The Roosevelts were members of St. James Episcopal Church in Hyde Park – FDR served for many years there as warden.

Eleanor is honored particularly in this portrait for her great work of chairing the UN Commission that drafted the Universal Declaration of Human Rights, ratified on December 10, 1948. This is a foundational text of the struggle for universal human and civil rights, and is built on the great biblical cornerstone of the equality of all people as made in the image of God. the inscrip-

tion at the base of her window reads, "The future belongs to those who believe in the beauty of their dreams."

The figure in the middle is Dame Julian of Norwich, whose account of her mystical visions, "Revelations of Divine Love," are the earliest surviving English language works by a woman. One short account was written shortly after her near death illness in May 1373 when she was 30 years old. Later on, while living as an anchoress in a

small room attached to a church, she composed her longer version.

She was considered a spiritual authority within her community and her works reveal a profound faith in the goodness of God and the world despite the extraordinary travails of her time and place. Her images of the maternal love of God and Christ resonant today, and her faith in the triumph of God's love and mercy over sin and evil is summed up in the words she hears Jesus saying to her, "All shall be well and all shall be well and all manner of thing shall be well" - words inscribed at the base of her window.

Chris Duke, an award-winning fine artist and illustrator, did the drawings, working with the rector of Grace Church, the Rev. Matthew Calkins. Chris, now living in Virginia, was previously a member of Grace Church and is passionate about this project of bringing new windows into conversation with the other treasured windows there, including the celebrated Resurrection window by Maitland Armstrong that was recently restored. A person of deep faith, Chris writes in her artist's statement, "Holy is the sacred mystery of life that is somehow, sometimes captured in an image."

Beyer Studio of Philadelphia has translated the drawings into colored glass. They have well deserved reputation for both new work and restorations. Brianne Van Vorst, principal of Liberty Stained Glass Conservation is providing expert technical and artistic advice.

Barclay Press, Newberg, Oregon, created the imprint Rockwood Press to make "right-sized poetry chapbooks for people who need poems."


The first book out of the gate is "Someone is Looking for You," 30 poems by Cary B. Ziter.
