

Passion for historic restoration

Ron Haase has a pair of passions – history and hands-on building restoration.

And you're correct – they do go together.

Historic restoration is an art that involves many facets – all with the goal of "esthetically putting back construction to its original form - as best possible," according to Haase.

So, what is specifically involved in historic restoration and what sets it apart from carpentry and construction on "regular" homes in our neighborhoods?

Haase, an 18-year veteran of the craft, says it involves a skill-set aimed at preserving history and using older tools and reclaimed materials to get the repair job done.

He now owns Rust &

Company in Hyde Park where he offers a wide variety of materials such as barn wood, antique lumber and hand-hewn beams, natural slabs, stones and bricks, and tons of nails and screws. He has become the "goto guy" for local restoration contractors.

Walking through his shop is like taking a walk through history. It even features an antique wood stove with artwork that he salvaged from a barn.

"If you're lucky, you do what you enjoy," says Haase. "I went to work as a kid – sweeping floors and then working for a great mentor and craftsman. He instilled the passion in me of working with older structures, working with history and restoring with old-fashioned hands-on techniques."

He learned to "rebuild with

love" and always working to duplicate what existed in the past.

The process includes start-

ing by assessing the rehab project, "reading the building" for structural damage and learning continued on page 3

what problems occurred and why. "You have to take your time and study the history of the building, maybe find old photos and then take your own photos," he said.

The next phase involves sourcing the materials needed for the job – visiting places like the one he now owns or salvaging needed parts from other older structures.

"In many cases, we were dealing with water damage and rotted wood, so that was more of patch-and-repair work," said Haase. "But then other jobs involved structural repairs where we would actually jack-up the structure and shore-up the foundation."

He added, "You learned by doing. It was a lot of 'hands-on' learning out in the field. Then you would go back to the source. For me, that was going back to my mentor and talking

to other individuals who had strengths or expertise in the particular area on which I was working."

Haase said he always kept and added to his "stash of reclaimed materials," which led to his current venture. Now he's the "treasure hunter" who searches older and sometimes dilapidated structures seeking items to salvage and reuse.

"I'm saving pieces of history and just hoping I don't get there too late," he said of when he learns of properties with older buildings that might fill some of his needs.

But Haase will always be the restoration craftsman and now works mainly with wood as he constructs items such as farm tables, mantles, cutting board and birdhouses.

"I think I've gotten to a good place," he said. "This is my passion."

What's in your Air? Water management is the root of most mold events in Spring

Spring is here and we all know the old saying "April showers bring May flowers," but the excess wet weather that spring can bring also brings the danger of MOLD and associated indoor air quality concerns!

The number one cause of any mold growth is water. Water management in, on and around your home or building is crucial. Unseen damage in the form of excess water or moisture is the root of most mold events.

"In so many cases, it's the water you don't see that causes the most problems," says Michael Christophides, Chief Assessor and Laboratory Director of Granite Inspection Group. Hidden leaks like water lines, drain lines, refrigerator water lines often become damaged or exceed their life expectancy and develop small leaks that allow for microbial growth to occur inside wall and ceiling cavities. "The only way to detect if you have a water related problems is with Mold/Indoor Air Quality test-

When it comes to indoor air quality, particularly mold (visible and non-visible) it's all about water, whether in a liquid form, in a solid form as in snow and ice, particularly ice damming on roofs and walls. And let's not forget last, but not least, in a gas form as in vapor intrusion, humidity - water is the problem.

Water Penetration

The bulk of water penetration comes from surface run off and drainage. To protect your home, you can easily improve, minimize and prevent water penetration and intrusion by taking some simple steps.

- Make sure you have gutters and liters on your home.
- If you do have gutters, make sure they are clean and free of any debris.
- Make sure all liters and discharge pipes are extended at least 4-6 feet away from the perimeter of the structure.
- Make sure the grading around the perimeter of the structure is properly pitched in a positive manner to ensure water will drain away from the building.

If all the above are in place, you will dramatically reduce the chance of water penetration or intrusion and protect your home from microbial growth.

The presence of mold or conducive conditions for mold growth should always lead to an assessment, investigation, cleaning and/or removal by a qualified professional.

One of the biggest ways to identify if you could have a growing mold concern is when you have that "damp, musty odor present in your home." Technically, there is no such thing as a damp, musty odor. What we smell is the byproduct of Microbial growth, Volatile Organic Compounds (VOC) or Toxins called Mycotoxins. This happens when a living organism digests organic material and through their digestion and metabolism, produce gases and odors

Michael provides a checklist

of warning signs that indicate moisture and mold problems in homes and commercial buildings.

- The humidity in the structure is higher than normal.
- You have damp, musty odors in the house, basement or a room / area.
- You see discoloration on walls and ceilings. Similar signs include warping, bubbling and sagging in walls and ceilings.
- Clogged gutters and ice damming on the roof can cause water to leak into adjoining walls and ceilings.
- You have a dehumidifier and/or it is running non-stop.
- You see leaks in walls and ceilings. The heavy rains may have made these leaks evident, but they have been there for a long time. Once water finds a way into a structure, the problem just continues to grow and get worse.
- If you had water intrusion, no matter how much, whether it was six inches of water or small puddling and seepage along the wall you cleaned what water was readily accessible and visible, but not what was inside the wall cavity or on building materials that were not accessible.

Michael warns that mold can begin to grow in as little as 24 hours. "If you see the indications of moisture problems, you must deal with them quickly," he said. "Letting it dry and hoping it will go away is not a solution. It is simply magnifying the problem."

Test Before You Invest

He notes that testing is always recommended prior to any remediation work. Whether homeowners decide to tackle this themselves or hire a professional remediation company, "The testing will dictate and prescribe the appropriate course of action," said Michael. There are testing protocols and guide-

lines to ensure proper testing and verification of potential health concerns or hazards.

And don't rely on simply seeing mold. "It must be tested to indicate the extent of the problem," he said. Seeing mold just confirms that it has been there for some time and it needs to be tested to understand the depth and breadth of concern. It's what we can't see that we need to be sensitive to and proactive in testing," said Michael.

Testing Methods


There are numerous ways testing can be performed. Testing should only be done after your building and/or home has been properly evaluated by a licensed Mold Assessor. The Assessor will determine and design a testing protocol based from the on-site assessment, building diagnostics and data collected at that time, i.e. moisture reading, thermal imaging, humidity etc. Based on the evaluation, a sampling plan will be determined. Sampling methods can vary from air grab collection, swabs, tape lift and direct samples to name a few.

There are over 100,000 identified mold species and many experts believe the number to be as high as 10 times more that are not identified at this time, due to the complexity of these organisms.

Not all mold is bad. In fact, we eat, drink and digest quite a few species in our everyday lives when we consume cheese, wine and beer to name a few. In addition, many species are used for medical purposes, such as antibiotics with Penicillin being a great example. Like everything else in life, it is all about moderation. If you are eating digesting or breathing an elevated amount of mold, there could be health concerns and

side effects to you and your family. Symptoms are not universal and may vary on a case by case or individual level.

Mold Exposure and Health Symptoms

There are many symptoms from mold exposure. The most common are allergy or cold like reactions, which are typically respiratory, such as wheezing and common difficulty breathing and Asthma like symptoms. Other symptoms may include burning/dry eyes, watery eyes, reddened eyes, blurred vision,

sore throat, nasal and sinus congestion, cough, shortness of breath, skin irrigation and difficulty sleeping. If you are having any of these symptoms and the symptoms are reduced or completely gone when you leave your home or building, chances are you have been exposed to some sort of elevated levels of mold, allergens or possible toxins.



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Landscaping tips for choosing & installing plants

(StatePoint) The perfect landscape may start with a healthy, lush lawn, but for interest and depth, you'll also need to consider the plants that surround it.

Thankfully, it's easy to make considerable improvements to your backyard life using tips from professionals. Check out these tips for selecting and installing plants that will beautify your outdoor living areas.

Choosing Plants

- Choose plants well-suited for your specific growing conditions. Knowing your growing zone is important, however you should also be mindful how conditions like sun exposure can change as you move around your yard.
- Choose the right size plants for the space. Bear in mind that what you're planting today is much smaller than what it will be once it's matured. Always read a plant's care label to understand its optimal growing conditions and size at maturity.
- From a design perspective, think in terms of texture, layers

and drifts. When addressing the overall texture of your planting beds, choose plants that vary in form, size, color and leaf structure. This will create greater interest, and a space that's more visually appealing and enjoyable to spend time in.

For a lush look, think in terms of layers when considering composition. Much like in a painting, you should have background, middle ground, and foreground layers. Your background layer should consist of taller evergreen shrubs to provide something alive and green to look at all year long, no matter what's happening in front of them. Your middle ground layer should be lower than the background layer to create interest, and is where you can add a contrasting evergreen shrub or pop of color with a perennial plant. Finally, your foreground layer should help transition the planting beds to your lawn space. You can accomplish this with smaller perennials, evergreens, annuals or creeping ground covers.

When addressing drifts, read the plant labels to know how large they'll grow. This can help ensure plants grow in together as they mature, but are not overcrowded.

Installing Plants

- 1. Dig a hole that's about two times the diameter of the pot your plant's being transplanted form, and about the depth of the pot.
- 2. Mend in compost or soil conditioner to give your plant the organic material it needs to thrive. If you'd like, add slow-release

fertilizer, and mix well.

- 3. Place your plant in the hole, making sure that it sits at, or just above, the level it did in the pot.
- 4. Backfill with soil, stopping to add water when the hole is about halfway full.
- 5. Fill the rest of the hole with soil, then firmly press down.
- 6. Soak your plant with more water.
- 7. Finish by adding mulch, making sure it's pulled away from the base of your plant.

Plant hardiness is the ability of a plant to survive adverse growing conditions such as drought, flooding, heat and cold. American farming contributes billions of dollars to the gross national product every year, which is one reason why the USDA has long monitored weather data. If determining when the average final frost may occur for every region in the country is worth billions, what could that same knowledge mean for your garden? Well, choosing plants with hardiness levels appropriate to specific planting zones gives you the best chance of gardening and landscaping success.

What is My Growing Zone? The United States is divided into 13 zones. Zones 1-6 being the coldest, and 7-13 the warmest. Zone 1 averages -60 degrees F while zone 13 never drops below 70 degrees F. A general guideline is to plant anything designated for your zone or lower, but never higher. Know what zone you live in, and be sure to always check the tag on the back of the plant or seed pack before planting anything.

Perennials Versus Annuals -

There's a reason you see palm trees in Miami, not Minnetonka, Minn. In the case of perennials, it's not about when the first frost is, but how cold it gets, and whether that plant can survive and thrive through winter.

Plant hardiness zones are less important however when it comes to annuals. Because these plants are only meant to last the length of one growing season; waiting until after the average first frost date will save you from having to re-plant. Know that even if your plant survives the frost, it may never match the photo you saw advertised at the nursery.

Planting Zone Rule of Thumb - Plant hardiness zone maps are, well, all over the map. Consider the number assigned to your zip code as a starting point. You may live right at the break between one zone and the other. Remember that it's better to guess too low, than too high. In

the South, the heat can put real stress on a plant not made for it. Your particular geography can also affect your hardiness zone, like if you live on a hill or in a valley.

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WET/COMPACTED SOIL

- We have gotten a lot of rain this winter and spring. Avoid working in your garden if the soil is still wet. There is a danger of compacting the soil when stepping in, tilling or working wet soil. Plants need air and nutrients from soil and have a tough time accessing these from compacted soil. It is also hard for good solid root systems to thrive in compacted soil.

In order to determine if your soil is workable, pick up an clump of soil. Squeeze it. If it clumps together but will easily fall apart, it is workable. If it is a muddy mess or is leaking water, wait! In the picture below, the soil is still too wet.

COLD CROPS - If the soil temperature is at least 40°F, you can safely plant cold-season crops like spinach, peas, Swiss chard, radishes, turnips, parsnips, carrots, kale, lettuce, leeks,

rutabaga, onion seed and sets, bare root strawberries, asparagus and potatoes directly into the garden.

ROTATE YOUR CROPS -

Remember to rotate your vegetable crops each year. Plant each variety of vegetable in a different part of your garden than you did last year.

OFF TO A GOOD START -

Give asparagus beds a good layer of compost or well composted manure for better production and larger stalks.

NEW TREES & SHRUBS -

Prune new shrubs and trees very little for the first two years. They need time to get established and grow a strong root system. The more top growth (leaves and branches) the plant has the more the plant can produce its own food to grow. Only prune out dead, broken or crossed branches.



GET YOUR HOUSE-PLANTS READY. Take a look at your houseplants. This a a good time to transplant into a the next size pot. They will be going into a growth spurt with spring, more sunlight and, if they are lucky, a summer outside.

Don't jump too many sizes up in pot size. Most plants like it a little snug in their pots. If their roots are too much smaller than the pot, there is a lot of soil that stays wet too long promoting root rot. Use a good quality, well-drained houseplant potting mix.

Clean up the plant by removing and damaged or browned growth. Prune back leggy house-plants now before the spring flush of growth.

As the warm weather approaches, your houseplants will put on a growth spurt. Over the winter, we often suggest cutting back on fertilizer. Now is the time to resume regular application of a fertilizer like Jack's Classic Houseplant Special or All Purpose fertilizer.

LEAVE WINTER MULCH

- Mother Nature is fickle and we could still have some harsh weather. Leave any winter mulch around roses and perennial beds for another couple of weeks.

PRUNE OVERGROWN SHRUBS OR VINES - Shrubs and vines like lilac, honeysuckle and pussy willow that are really overgrown should be pruned by removing two or three of the oldest, largest stems to rejuvenate these plants.

LILY POLLEN STAINS -

The stamens of lilies have anthers that are coated with pollen. This pollen can stain your clothing, tablecloths and furniture. To avoid this, remove the pollen with your fingers or with a pair of tweezers over a sink or paper towel. Keep an eye on your lilies in an arrangement or plant. As each flower blooms, there is more pollen. If you do get pollen on some fabric, don't touch it with your fingers or wet it. Brush it off with a brush or tissue.


